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MAGISTRATES

CANNOT SERVE AS BOARD OF SUPERVISORS IN COUNTIES.

One Lawful Supervisor.

In reversing judgment of Boyd circuit court in a case of Boyd county against Jack Arthur and others, magistrates of the county, the Court of Appeals construed the law authorizing the appointing of Supervisors of roads in counties and the expenditures of public money for that purpose.

The opinion of the court was delivered by Judge Hinton. The question was presented to the court through the making of an order by the fiscal court of Boyd county appropriating to four magistrates the sum of \$1,400, to be spent according to the directions of each magistrate, and of another order appropriating \$1,400 in subject matter as in so far as the orders direct that the money shall be according to the directions of each magistrate, they are void.
