There were in attendance about twenty five teachers, besides a number of citizens. After the singing of the opening song, Battle Hymn of the Republic, Rev. Geo. S. Watson conducted the devotional services in his usual custom and impressive manner. Prof. Houston's address, "The County High School," was a urgent appeal to teachers to have such pupils as were finishing eighth grade to take the examination for Common School Diploma, and if prepared, to enter High School. The appeal extended to teachers to broaden their mental vision by taking up High School work, rather than keep in the narrow rut by continuing to take reviews. "The Central County Library" was the subject of Miss Ida May Adams' address. The subject was ably handled and very interesting. Several points of interest were brought out and in the general discussion which followed, changes in the management of the County Library were suggested for the convenience of teachers. At 11:30 the house adjourned for lunch. The ladies of the Women's Club served lunch at Langdon Dormitory. The lunch was most delightful, being tastefully prepared and daintily served. All present appreciated the hospitality of Langdon Dormitory and the effort made by the ladies of the Women's Club for the welfare of the teachers. At 1:30 the house again convened. The subject of Good Roads and Public Schools, in their relation to each other, introduced by E. R. Gearty, was one in which all present were deeply interested. All seemed to thoroughly understand that better roads mean better schools. The Women's Club have a gross of one-half pint drinking cups. They desire that the teachers of the county call for enough of these cups to supply the pupils of their schools. If there are children who cannot buy them at two cents each, the Women's Club will gladly donate cups to such children. Since the last term of the Whitley Circuit Court there have been less than fifteen homicides in this country. They are becoming more numerous. Who is to blame for the situation? Let us see. Tom Mead was put on trial here Friday for the murder of his aunt, an invalid of over 70 years. Three of his own children were put on the stand and they detailed one by one the most brutal and horrible murders that was ever listened to in the Whitley county courthouse. These witnesses were corroborated by other witnesses. It would be impossible to conceive a more heinous crime than this one. No defense was offered whatever. When the prosecution closed its case, the defense closed without any proof. Everybody who heard the proof thought the jurros would be out only a few minutes before they reached a death verdict. They were out only a few minutes, but they only gave him a life sentence. It does not mean much those days to send a man to the penitentiary for life as they usually get out after a few years, especially if they have money. There have been two or three men paroled from the penitentiary within the last two or three years who were sent from Whitley for murder and they shot some one else soon after they were released. With these conditions, criminals do not care much for going to the penitentiary. Conditions will never be any better in Whitley or murders any less frequent until jurros get to doing their duty. In this case the attorneys for the State brought out the proof, made out the case and urged the jurro to do its full duty. The jurro did its duty and saw that the defendant had a fair trial but the jurro, as usual, flunked to Whitley county the jury system is a failure and a farce.
