





Since this week was marked by the passing through the country of a group of hiers from the Yadkin River region of North Carolina Donale Boose's home country) on their way to Boonesborough. Kentucky as a feature of our Bi-Centennial Celebration. It might be well to take up this week's space in a discussion of the different trails followed by Daniel Boone on his various journeys to the

Since we are concerned primarily with his trails across Rockcastle County we will have little to say about his first incursions into the wilderness that was to become Kentucky. In 1767, with two or three companions, he crossed the Blue Ridge Mountains and reached the headwaters of a branch of the Big Sandy River in the edge of eastern Kentucky, Pushing on later, they reached Salt Spring, near Prestohury, where they were sonowd in and camped for the winter, shooting deer and buffalo and other wild game that frequently visited the spring to lick the salt deposits there. Returning home at the end of this hunt, they turned in glowing reports of the abundance of game for hunting and trapping, which had aroused Boone's interest to the point where it never subsided.

In 1769. Boone with John Finley, John Stewart, and three others, set out from Boone's cabin the first of May, well equipped for a long stay is the unknown wilderness. After passing through Cumberland Gap and following the Warrior's Path for some distance, they bore the the west and camped near the headwaters of the west branch of Rockcaste River. This was in Jackson County, as was also the principle part of the Big Hul area which they visited. For two years Daniel Boone remained in the Wilderness, sometimes with companions, sometime entirely alone. During that time her roamed over a big expanse of country, including the neighborhood of Great Salipetre Cave and the headwaters of Dick's River, but he followed no established trails and it is impossible at this late date to know definitely what paths he pursued.

Boone was determined to make his future home in Kentucky, and in 1773 started out with a party of about forty, including his brother. Squire, and some of the Bryans, members of his wife family, all with children, livestock and earthly possessions, on the move to The Promised Land, They got only as far as Fowell's move to the Promised Land, They got only as far as Fowell's son, James, and several others. Most of the party gave up and returned home, but Daniel Boone and his family settled down on Clinch River, determined to go on when the opportunity presented itself.

The next year, 1774. Governor Dummore wanted to send a scout into the interior of Kentucky to warn various parties of engineers to atop their surveys and come back, by the safty of the settlements. Daniel Boone was the natural choice for the job, and with his friend Wishael Stoner, another famous frontersman, they set out to search the Wilderness for the few scattered surveying parties. It is quite likely that on this journey Boone for the first time followed a definite, established path across Rockcastle County, coming to Hazel Patch, them bearing west to strike Skagga Trace near the entrance of Skagga Creek into Rockcastle Ryer. Following Skagga Creek to the headwaters of Negro Creek, stifking the beginning of Dick's River at present Brodhead, leaving Bockcastle, at the Lingon' County, line and on to Harrodsburg, where a new settlement was just beginning to be built up. After warning the surveys, the two scouts returned home, probably over the same route.

By spring of 1775 Richard Henderson and company had closed the deal with the Cherokee Indians for a vast tract of land, including

all of Kentucky between the Kentucky and the Cumberland Rivers and a part of Tennessee, and had employed Boone to cut a path from Long Island to a location for a fortified settlement on the Kentucky River.

On the tenth of March. 1775, the road-cutting party got underway. It numbered about thirty picked woodsmen and hunters and included Boone's brother Squire, his hunting companious Stoner discussed to the property of the p

Feiss Walker, who left a journal of their expedition says that soon after crossing Rockcaste River they encountered rough going on account of brush and fallen timber, through which they had to cut their way for a distance of around twenty miles. This was particularly dead in the region of the mouth of Brush Creek, where it flowed into Round Stone, which accounts for Brush Creek being so named. In going over Boone's old trace it appears that in some localities he seemed to veer away from what would have been the natural route for buffalo which he followed) to travel. This may be explained by the fact that in some cases the original trail they made may have been blocked fallen trees, forcing them to detour around the obstructions or take a new route.

At any rate, in addition to his meanderings over the county during the time he spent exploring this part of Kentucky, we do know definitely of two well-defined, and established routes which he hollowed across Rockcastic County; one of which he himself created. These were Skages Trace and Boone's Trail the only two roads leading from the south through Comberland Gap and into Central Kentucky.


