readily understand how impossible it would be for me or any other ne individual to keep up with thirty or fourty families. One thing that adds greatly to the confusion is the fact that there are such requent recurrences of the same name running through each generation. By the time you run across the name Jim Smith for the
fifth or sixth time you find it hard to figure out which is which Al a meeting of the local D.A.R. last Saturday, the occasion being their annual work session. In most cases everybody who lives a reasonable length of time will have their name on record alleast ance. Even in the people you are
looking for were born well before the period when we started ecording births in this country, or before there was a public schoo system thatisted students in each district. there is still a good chance that your ancestor's name appears on a land grant. a deed records in at least one of the many wars in which America has bee engaged. If you suspect an ancestor was a Revolutionary War nquiry to the proper government agency to see if his name is on rom Rockeastle County. There was no Rockcastle County then ind out. as you will from his war record, the name of the country in which he did enlist and try to trace his back from there. Often you can trace a family all the way back to their arrival in America
by contacting the port of debarkation in New York. So very many of our people first entered America there - and the office has kept records of all of them in many cases, the name of the ship on which hey arrived and the name of the ships master. There are other ports to contact, but I have innd that most of our people eame
hrough the Port of New York. with succeeding generations noving down through New Jersey, Pennsylvania and the Shenandoah Valley. Virginia and North Carolina and through Cumberland Gap into Kentucky. Maybe it would take many years
and many generations of a family to complete this trek, but you'd nd many generations of a family to complete this trek, but you'
be surprised at how many came that route.

Ast have said, most everybody gets their name on some kind of ist during their lifetime. Finding that particular list may take a interested in it. you'll spend the rest of your life at it anyway ase of Rockcastle County and twenty other counties like it in entucky, where all court records were completely destroyed by fire, you face a monumental task.

Census records, only recently made available to many Kentucky
counties, have been of untold value in tracing and placing counties, have been of untold value in tracing and placing
ancestors, but these, too, are not one hundred percent accurate. I have acquired records for 1790, 1800, 1810, 1820, 1830, 1870. and 1880, the latter two being so dim as to be almost illegible. I have access to 840 and 1850 but they also are too dim to be useful. have been left out either through oversight or the laziness of the censustaker who didn't take the trouble to cover such sections arefully. I have found several such errors in Rockcastle records. ensus until 1830, when I have actual old delinquent tax bills showing that he was living here in 1818 .
As mentioned in a recent article, I have long tried to get additional information on Will French, my graadmother Lair's father, but

how early tintypes were being made. If anyone around Civil War ime (and I believe it was) then this is the Will French I am tracing. since he is the only one of the four that could have been around the
right age to have posed for this picture. right age to have posed for this picture.
By a somewhat similar process of deduction, I believe I have been able to authenticate a picture of Devil Bill Adams concerning
which we have had some doubt. It was given to me several years ago by an actual grandson of Devil Bill, but some doubt had been cast on its authenticy of the fact that we had understood that photography originated with the invention of the Daguerreotype which year Devil Bill was buried and it was assumed that it did not get into American cities smaller than New York and Philadelphia until sometime hater. Recently, quite unexpectedy, came across
an advertisement in an old Lexington paper telling of the opening here of a photograph gallery which had just installed the narvelous new invention, the Daguereotype, and was fully prepared to make pietures by that method. This newspaper was
dated in 1839 . This would have put the process closer to Devil Bill dated in 1839. This would have put the process closer to Devil Bil for him to have this photograph made. Being born in 1776, he would have been around sixty three when the picture was taken,

about 3 things as you decide how to manage your alfalfa and red clover hay fields: (1) quantity hay harvested . you probably want all you can get: (2). quality of hay harvested - don't plant to make poor quality hay. You will get enough of that kind because
of factors such as weather which you can't control; and (3) stand persistence this sometimes requires a compromise between
quantity and quality If you cut often enough to get the highest quality possible, you will reduce yields and/or kill the alfalfa or Three questions need to be answered when deciding on the
proper eutting schedule for alfaifa and red clover: (1) when
should the first be made? should the first be made? (2)
when shoutd the last cut be made? and (3) how many cuttings should be made in-between?
The management systems
