



**Book Containing** Kv. Laws **To Be Printed** 

Gov. Julian Carroll is providing money to publish in one book for the first time all laws relating to the first time all laws relating to the 300-mills of the second second to the 300-mills of the second second tory provisions that now are scattered through several vol-umes of Kentucky Revised Stat-utes. There now are 17 third class titles-those with populations be-tween 8,000 and 20,000.

Similar volumes already have been published for fourth, fifth and sixth class cities, with funds from the Office of Local Govern-ment in the state Finance Depart-ment

ment. Gov. Carroll is providing mon-ey from his Governor's Contin-gency Fund to publish the third class city book, which should be out by the end of the year, he said. The cost is estimated to be around \$2,000.

Work is under way on books for-first and second class cities. The job of bringing together all the laws pertaining to each class city is being done by a subcom-mittee of the Interim Legislative Committee on Cities, with the help of the University of Louis-ville's Local Government Law

"The compilation of this infor-mation greatly enhances the ability of local elected officials to identify their powers and duties in all aspects of concern to local government," Gov. Carroll said.

"Ready access to statutory obligations and constraints has never before been possible for our cities," he said. "It is clearly part of the state's responsibility to provide this kind of information assistance to its local units of government.

"It will be of particular impor-tance should the General Assem-bly act on my recommendation to establish a Commission on Muni-cipal-Statute Reyision," Gov. Carroll said.
