the first time all laws relating to Kentucky's third class cities. The 300-page book will bring
together Constitutional and statutogether Constitutional and statu-
tory provisions that now are scattered through several vol-
veres umes of Kentucky Revised Stat-
uttes. There now are 17 third class tites. There now are 17 third class
cities- those with populations be-
tween 8,000 ities--those with population
tween 8,000 and 20,00 .

ability of local elected officials to identify their powers and duties in all aspects of concern to tocal
