Among the first of the county's natural resources to be squandered were the valuable stands of virgin timber. Giant yellow poplars
rooted in the rich loam of the coves and valleys grew to tremendous height in reaching for the sunshine above the heads of
their neighbors and massive whiteaks grew on the upland levels. their neighbors and massive whiteoaks grew on the upland levels,
while mellow-grained chestnut trees fourished along the sandy ridges. Although all varieties of trees common to the area were
found here, these three were the found here, these three were the most valuable.

Even before it was demonstrated that the timber crop had a cash
value, early settlers were converting it to their everyday value, early settlers were converting it to their everyday use with
prodigal unconcern. Huge yellow poplars, or tulip trees, were cut down and hollowed out to make "spalt logs" for the smokehouse,
canoes, watering and feed troughs for stock and even beds canoes, watering and feed troughs for stock and even beds for the
children. Wheif an early settler needed rails to fence his clearings his first choiee was Chestnut. If it was not readily available, he carefully chose whiteoak trees with the straightest grain and after
one or two butt cuts had been split into rails, the remainder of the
tree was allowed to rot in the woods.

Surrounded by a seemingly endless forest of trees, the pioneer
could not conceive of a time when they would not be plentiful. If he could not conceive of a time when they would not be plentiful. If he
gave any thought at all to diminishing natural resources, eh found
justifiea justification lor his wastefulninss in an old adage I I have beard my
father quote - "Let him that lives longest carry his wood and water the furtherest." I well remember when Burgess and Wade
Hysinger and myself Hysinger and myself spent most of one Sunday in chopping down a
giant Poplar to get a squirrelthat had taken refuge in a hole giant Poplar to get a squirrel that had taken refuge in a hole near
the top of it. We were around twelve and fourteen years of age and by no means expert axmen, which accounts for the length of time we spent on the job - but there can be no explanation for why we
cut such a valuable tree in the first place for so trivial a prize.

I remember having seen in my youth, acres of big trees felled and cut into lengths and rolled together in big log heaps and burned, mearly to clear the ground for crops. If an early settler wanted to
build so much as a chicken house or a cow shed finest tree on his farm and have it sawed into lumber for the purpose. It took a choice whiteoak tree indeed to make roof boards to astisfy a larmer who took pride in his outbuildings and I recall that so long as my grandfather Lair lived, he never used anything
except white walnut in making his

But it was when commercialism came in that Rockcastle Countr's
forests really began to disappear. Small sawmills sprang up in all forests really began to disappear. Small sawmills sprang up in all
sections of the county to produce lumber for the local trade while
special mills for special mills for sawing out wagon and buggy felloess and bucking
staves from the biggest and straightest staves from the biggest and straightest whiteocaks soon made their
appearance. Big dimension timbers too big to be handled by local appearance. Big dimension timbers too big to be handled by local
sawmills were hewed out and shipped to distant cities to be used in sawmills were hewed out and shipped to distant cities to be used in
big buildings, while the building trade in general called for a
constant supply of first class lumber after the railroads reched the county to make a wider market available.
The first sawmill of record in Rockeastle County was brought in by
Mordecia (Mudkins) Mullins and operated by him and his four sons from 1895 to 1820 . It was located about three quarters of a mile Rockcastle River above the mouth of Parker's Creek, wher Daniel Boone and party crossed the Rockcastle on their way to Boonesboro. This mill used the sash type saw and was powered by
an undershot or "whirlpool", waterwheel. The water-powered sawmill in the county was built and operated b James Henry and Gardner Mullins between 1865 and 1875. It was also equipped with burrs for grinding corn and wheat. This will was located on Roundstone Creek, near Mullins Station. rributaries so that logs could be floated down to the mill from greater distance. In the early nineteen hundreds, a great number of logs were caught in booms along the river to be released and
floated down to the mill dam, where they were caught up and fed into the big band saws. Poplar logs as much as fifteen feet in diámeter would often be cut into narrow weatherboarding for the building trade. This dam, across Rockeastle River, was built
entirely without the use of machinery and was of such sturdy construction that it withstood floods and tidewater for years after the mill was dismantled and abandoned, when it was dynamited and destroyed to allow the river to return to its normal flow.
Timber was one of a new country's first resources to be put to
practical use, With it, the Pioneer built and heated his ho made many of his tools and implements, fenced his fields and built his barn and outbuildings, while the bark from some of these
trees tanned his leather, made his baskets and bottomed trees tanned his leather, made his baskets and bottomed his
chairs, later becoming - next to skins and furs - his first cash crop.

The forest lands of Rockcastle County, as elsewhere in America, served a double purpose. Once cleared, they furnished their owner
a valuable farm home while their by-products supported during the process.
In my boyhood. 1 witnessed some of the final stages of the timbe erain this section. I remember seeing tall, swarthy mountaineers
standing erect on big poplar logs as they came bucking out standing erect on big poplar logs as they came bucking out of
Indian Creek into the ydlow tide of Rockcastle River. balancing with long peavy pole to preserve their precarious balance. remember seeing old man John Walton, filting from log to log,
like a jaybird from limb to limb. when one misstep would have like a jaybird from limb to limb, when one misstep would hav
been his finish because he couldn't swima lick. When reminded what his fate would be if he fell in the water under such conditions. he would always reply that he wasn't planning on falling in. So far
as I know, he never did. as I know, he never did.

When my father bought our homeplace on Little Renfro Creek. It took a couple of years to cut the timber on it. He brought in a
sawmilling outfit and built shacks of the raw lumber for the mill sawmilling outfit and built shacks of the raw lumber for the mila
men and loggers to live in. The men all took their noon meal in a men and loggers
cookshack presided over by one of the sawyers, whose wife did the
cooking. His pet name for her was " "adddles." As I recall, she was cooking. His pet name for her was "Daddles." As I recall, she was
not much of a cook and her menu was limited. dumplings being a not much of a cook and her menu was limited. dumplings being a
great favorite with her after they had long ceased to be with her boarders. When they came in to eat one day, her husband. on a featured item of the meal. Hoping to influence the hungry boarders with feigned enthusiasm, he went outside where they
were washing up at the wash bench, joyfully chanting "Dadde were washing up at the wash bench. joyfully chanting "Daddle's
got dough ballies, Dadde's got dough ballies." One unhappy diner got dough ballies, Daddle's got dough ballies," One unhappy diner
in scornful disapproval, exclaimed "Daddle's got dough hellies!" and the fight was on. But the time everybody took sides and got
into the fray. Daddle's dugh ballies had probsty into the fray. Daddle's dough ballies had probably gotten cold and
reverted to their original state. I didn't wait to see but at the first sign of conflict put for home at $m y$ best gail.
I recall the day that one of the loggers in the woods on our place got his arm between two logs rolling together and suffered a dee
bursting laceration from inside the elbow to near the wrist Bein bursting laceration rom inside the elbow to near the wrist. Being
aware of the medical effect of raw tobsceo juice, his friends quickly gathered around him and deposited their cuds of chewing tobacco in the trench and wrapped the forearm tight in a couple of red bandanna hankerchiefs. He was then mounted on a mule and
started on the three-mile trip to the doctor's office. When he came to the home of a good friend, the pain had grown so intense that he alighted for a stiff drink of whiskey to help alleviate it. His friend. anxious to show his sympathetic spirit, took drink for drink with
him until both passed out. Three days loter, he was sober enourh him until both passed out. Three days later, he was sober enough
to continue on to the doctor's office for treatment. Strange zo $9 x x^{2}$ : the wound healed cleetn as a hound's tooth but left a broad white scar along his arm.
As further proof of the dangers of logging in those days, remember that a waggoner by the name of Poynter (brother to
Uncle Billy and Uncle Dave Poynter) was driving a four-horse hitch around the hillside bark of our house when the loaded wago turned over, rolling with him and a tangle of horses and harness,
down a steep hillside. Fatally injured, he was carried to our house where he soon died. My sister and I always claimed that the roem in which he died was haunted, and when as penchtree by the side the house grew to a size where its limbs wóld scrub against the
