





The yarn, which it's beliewed to have been the source of infection causing the deathway of a California resident late last month, was imported from Sarfraz Brox, Lahore, Pakistan and is distributed throughout the United States by a California company, Creative Handweavers, and one in New York, Tahki Imports, Ltd.







Five weeks after the start of the 1976 session of the Kentzdy General Assembly, the governor presented his much heralded "iax package" to the citizens of the Commonwelath.

Just five weeks ago in his state of the Commonwelath message, the governor stated, and I quote, "I will ask governor stated, and I quote, "I will ask consumers in Kentucky," I will recommend changes that ease the tax burden on citizens who most need relief."

In that same speech made before the Legislature, the governor further

Legislature, the governor further stated, and I again quote, "Everything we hope to accomplish depends upon Kentucky having the financial resources necessary to meet the needs of our

people."

It seems to me that these two statements are sli odds with each other. At the present time, Kentucky nad the highest gasoline tax in the nation; —one of the highest sales taxes in the nation; —one of the highest set taxes in the nation in the state administration will add on more tax to this vital industry for our state);

more tax to this vital industry for our state);
—and one of the highest income taxes in the nation.
And on top of this, Kentucky has one of the largest surplus in the treasury of any state in the nation.
However, the governor's tax package which was presented does not contain a cut in the gasoline tax, whith is the highest in the nation. It does contain a benefit in the sales tax to be given to charitable, educational and religious institutions on goods purchased. Another provision in this package would exempt purchases and services sold to all governmental agencies.

The income tax benefits will go to those "who need it most," the aged, the blind and the low income." However, the income tax benefits to be derived are not as significant as they appear to be at

When I dig into the history of our own county I came across case after case where individual conflicts on the battlefield had led to longlasting enmity and stirlle long after the blue and the gray had been laid aside for the garb of the civilian. If a father, son or brother on one side had been killed by a neighbor on one side had been killed by a neighbor on the other, that nieghbor had every reason to expect that his own life would be offer.
