# CMSgt. Phillips Wins 15th Air Force Honors

CMSgt. John E. Phillips, 341st Strategic Missile Wing (SMW) senior enlisted advisor, has been named to the 15th Air Force Senior Noncommissioned Officer (NCO) of the Year for 1975 and will represent them in the Strategic Air Command (SAC) competition.

If he wins the SAC competition, the sergeant will be in the running for the "15 Outstanding Airmen of the Year" award.

In nominating Sergeant Phillips for the award, Col. William T. Brooks, 341st SMW commander, said, "As evidenced by higher headquarters staff assistance, inspection, and evaluation reports, the 341st SMW has enjoyed a command-wide reputation for excellence. In practically every report, the wing has been cited for its outstanding people programs and attitude, moral and appearance of the personnel assigned. Sergeant Phillips has played a major role in raising these conditions to exist."

The colonel further stated, "He has accomplished this by extending a basic philosophy of 'take care of the people and they will take care of the mission' and an effective two-way communication. His genuine personal concern and compassion for people, coupled with the highest standards of discipline, have produced an effective, motivated military force."

Assigned to Malmstrom in July, 1971, Sergeant Phillips first served in the 341st Missile Maintenance Squadron However, "As soon as I met the commander, he brought me on here," he said. "Since that time, I've served under four wing commanders, he added.

In a job the senior NCO describes as, "Listening to the enlisted crew and keeping the wing commander informed on enlisted matters," the sergeant gets involved in many base affairs. He is president of the Maintenance Activities Club, an active member of the NCO Academy Graduates Association and Air Force Association and is a member of nearly every council or committee that involves the enlisted force or betterment of the community.

"I get pretty well all over the area here," Sergeant Phillips said of his various activities. He added that he spends a lot of effort in the social facilities and is areas frequented by enlisted personnel.

Sergeant Phillips is married to the former Margaret Campbell of his hometown, Livingston, Kentucky and their son, John E., Jr. 15, attends Montana State University in Bozeman where he studies computer science.

Among his hobbies are "fishing and fishing when I get a chance," the sergeant said. He added that he is often joined by his wife and son, commenting that his wife goes along because, "She just likes to travel and in the blue."

"Activities such as The best enlisted advisor I've known have been bestowed on this NCO in the past year in distinguished visitors," Colonel Brooks said in his nomination to the 15th AF.

This wing's excellent excellence and the individual accomplishments of its members must be credited in a great degree to this one NCO," Colonel Brooks further commented. "He is truly the spirit of energy and dedication which challenges all to perform to the limit."

## Braden Steel Plant To Shut Down Production Here By End of August

**Editor's Note:** The Braden-Steel plant in Brodhead will be closing down their operation by the end of August. In connection with this shutdown, the following release, detailing the reason for the shutdown, was given the Signal Monday by W. R. Lee, Plant Manager.

On June 16, 1976 the decision was made, with deep regret, to close our Brodhead Plant operation due to lack of work.

Our employees were notified Friday, June 18, 1976. Layoffs started immediately and will continue at a gradual pace until the entire plant is closed down by the end of August.

In October of 1974 it was decided to start the Brodhead operation. Fiscal year 1974 had record sales and Tulsa plant employees totaled 286. Our customers were projecting an even better year in 1975. However shortly thereafter the recession hit and sales for fiscal year 1975 dropped to about one-quarter of that which was projected. Due to the large backlog of work

sold in 1974 we were able to keep both the Tulsa and Brodhead Plants busy during 1975. However, our backlog has been depleted and sales so far in 1976 are still low. As of June 16, 1976 the Tulsa Plant employment was down to 219. Our industry continues to be in a recession. The outlook for the future according to our customers is not good. Therefore, at the present time it is not known if the Brodhead Plant can be reopened in the future.

Each of our employees has made a significant contribution to our company which we appreciate very much. The Brodhead Plant had become a very efficient operation. Needless to say, it's a sad day for all of us to have to close the plant.

## FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

"New mine laws are written with the blood of somebody else." The United Mine Workers member stepped away from the microphone to affect before continuing. "We used to have the best safety program possible. You followed that into the mines and he looked after you... but that's changed now."

The union man was addressing the governor's Deep Mine Safety Commission, says during a public hearing in Madisonville. In the emotionally charged atmosphere after the two deadly Scotia Mine explosions, legislation was proposed in the final days of the 1976 Kentucky General Assembly which would authorize resident mine safety monitors for underground mines. The proposal was the work of Representative Glenn Freeman of Harlan County. Several of the men who died in the Scotia blasts were his neighbors.

Freeman's bill would give the mine safety monitor the power to remove men from an unsafe area. The bill came in the final hours of the legislature and Governor Julian Carroll and more than 200 were needed before the proposal could be enacted. In the most emotional moment of the session, Freeman, realizing his bill had failed, left the House chamber with his head bowed and tears running down his cheeks.

After the session the governor appointed the 15 member commission to study Freeman's idea and report back to him by October 15th. The commission

reduced their accident frequency rate by 90 percent. The UMW countered Island Creek's testimony with the logical assumption that not all operators would offer a safety program comparable to Island Creek's. The union says Freeman's bill would protect those miners who work for coal companies who don't have in-depth training programs. Representative Freeman, who is beginning to see little chance for his plan to be recommended by the commission, says the final decision on his bill rests with the governor anyway. Freeman says that's why it's important Governor Carroll appear at the reopening of the Scotia mine in mid-July. Freeman is hoping Carroll will get personally involved in the disaster, and after he begins to "share the grief," he will see the need for Freeman's proposal.

A spokesman for Carroll discounts Freeman's theory and says the governor will abide by the commission's recommendations.

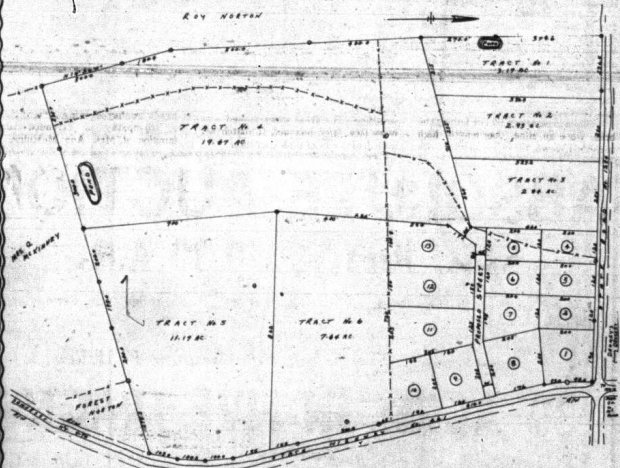

Harris, Commissioner, Kentucky Department of Agriculture, for certification to conduct a program of research, market development and education to increase the domestic and foreign consumption, use, sale and markets for bovine (cattle) animals and bovine animal products.

The program is to be implemented by the bovine animal producers levying upon themselves an assessment of ten cents (10¢) per head on all bovine animals marketed in the state.

The referendum is to be conducted in all 120 counties in the Commonwealth in early fall of 1976, with the deduction beginning on November 1, 1976, provided the referendum passes.

**food preservation clinic**

**WHAT FREEZER CONTAINERS ARE BEST FOR?**

Use only those made for frozen-food storage: rigid plastic containers, heavy-weight plastic freezer bags, freezer jars, and specially-treated paper for wrapping, meats, fish and poultry. Cold air is dry. It will cause stored foods to dry out and get "freezer burn" if the moisture is not held in with the proper freezer wrap. Freezer burn causes food quality and flavor to deteriorate.

Rigid plastic freezer containers are probably best for packaging juicy foods, and they can be used year after year. Freezer jars are good, too, but they don't stack as easily. Protect freezer bags with the re-usable cardboard cartons made to go with them.

Can you use other food cartons? No, not by themselves. Cottage cheese, ice cream, sour cream and yogurt cartons do make satisfactory outer containers for frozen foods in plastic freezer bags. However, they are hard to stack neatly in the freezer.

Can you use Canning Jars? Yes, but freezer jars are much more satisfactory. NEVER use ordinary jars—these have not been tempered to withstand sudden severe changes in temperature. They could crack and break in your freezer.

**BLANCH VEGETABLES BEFORE FREEZING**  
Blanching vegetables with boiling water or steam is the most important step in preparing them for freezing. Red and green peppers are the only vegetables that don't need blanching to keep them from losing food value and flavor during freezer storage.

Boiling-water blanching is easier, but steam blanching saves more nutrients. Corn tastes better when it has been steam-blanching. Use a minute timer to help you blanch for just the right amount of time. Then plunge vegetables into ice water or cold running water for at least as long to cool thoroughly, and freeze immediately.

Use fresh water each time you start to process a new vegetable. Blanch no more than one pound at a time.

Check date on coming lids. Check the manufacturer's date for your two-piece canning lids and use the oldest ones first. The sealing compound is supposed to be good for several years—unless the lids have been stored too long in too hot a place. If the sealing compound has started to deteriorate, it won't seal your jars properly.

It's really best to buy new lids every year. You can use those old ones on jelly jars after you seal them with paraffin. Or use them for closures on jars in which you're storing dried foods or on jars for refrigeration storage of leftovers.

Buy new rubber rings for canning. If you're using procelain lined zinc caps, or old-style lightning jars with wire caps and brass lids, be sure to buy new sealing rubbers. Used ones will have lost some of their stretch and may not give you a good seal.

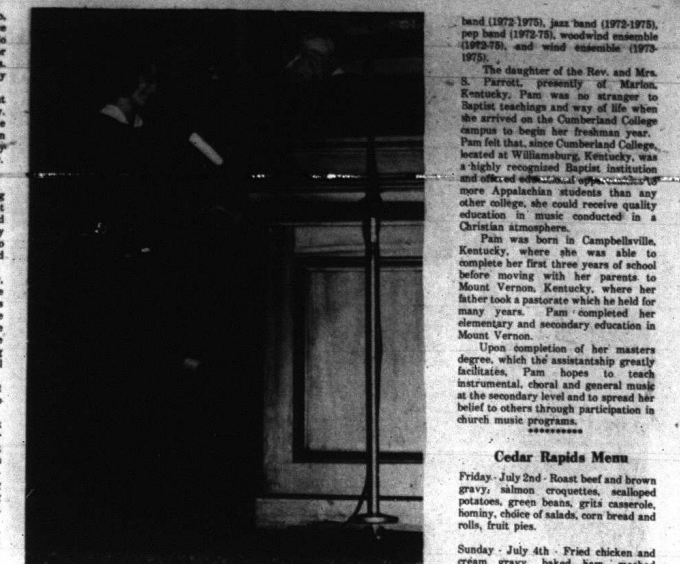

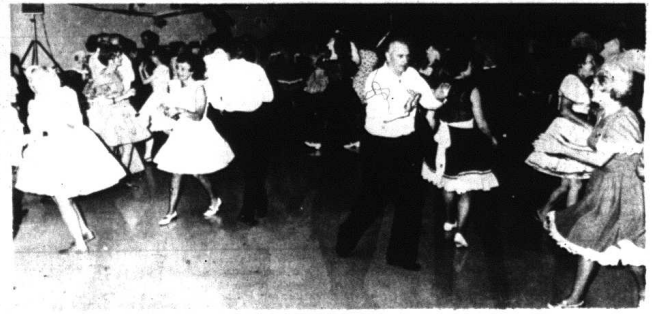
