For the last two summers, July has not been a happy month for our family. Last July, we buried my husband's father and this year I lost my father to that dread disease Cancer.

Dad was only 68. An age which, for several years, had not seemed a very advanced one to me at all. I was at first struck by the bitter injustice of losing Dad when I loved dearly and was not much reconciled by the fact that he did not suffer a great deal. He had gone through the ordeal of 29 Cobalt treatments, finishing the last one only two weeks prior to his death. Blindness is always best of course, but now I wish he had not put him through the treatments because he was relatively strong when they began but so very weak at their completion. Of course, we all had hopes they would be able to arrest the steady advance of the disease but it was not to be.

Dad knew what was happening and I think this perhaps bothered me more than anything. I didn't want him to be afraid. Dad was small in stature but had the proverbial "Heart of a Lion." The disease took its toll and at the last he wanted desperately to cling to life as we all will.

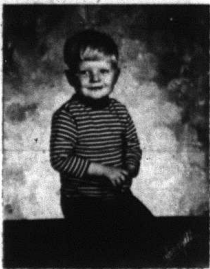
He was incoherent some of the time the last three days he was so sick and his mind wandered back to the days when we lived on a farm. This, of course, made us all remember those days. I was the baby of the family and there were eight years between me and my brothers and sisters and I got a little more of their time and attention than the others had, particularly from Dad. Quite often, in the morning, I would get up and go with him to take care of the animals. At tobacco market time, I always went with him and resided on a basket of tobacco while he watched his year's work being sold. I remember his taking the time and effort to teach me to ride my first bicycle and the roller skates he bought me. But, I suppose most of all, I remember that he was always there and had the time to listen to my small troubles and to wipe my tears when these same troubles became too much for me. My other

My husband remarked after the funeral that his fondest memory of Dad was his devotion to our oldest son, who was named for Dad. While we lived in Versailles after Rick was born, he repeated the same process with him as he had with me, taking him with him whenever possible anywhere he went and spending hours helping Rick to accomplish the smallest task. It grieved him deeply whenever I disciplined Rick and I recall once, after handing out a spanking to Rick over some infraction, I was sternly taken to task by Dad. I

reminded him that he would not have let me get by with a similar offense when I was small and was told gently but firmly, "Yes, but you weren't as cute as he is." This threw me for a minute, and I remember I even suffered a twinge of jealousy toward Rick but then I was glad that he would receive the same love and attention from the man that I had. Dad loved all eleven of his grandchildren equally but Rick was his namesake and the one that he and mother kept when he was small and I worked. When we told him of our decision to move to Mt. Vernon, his first reaction was, "Well, don't forget and come visit me, your mother and Rick often."

Mother accused Dad and I more than once of being together in a conspiracy to outwit her and perhaps we were. Stern disciplinarian that Mother is, Dad was often called upon to act as arbitrator between me and her and he usually managed to keep both sides happy. Looking back, I realize that he hated contention within our family and went out of his way to keep the peace. He was very tolerant of the shortcomings of others and hated gossip in any form. This probably drew more criticism of me from him than any of my other faults usually ending with the admonition, "If you can't say something good about somebody, don't say anything."

Dad is gone but we have the comfort of knowing that his life was well spent, that he left behind to us good memories and that he will not be forgotten as long as any of his children or grandchildren live.

Down On The Farm

Summer is passing very swiftly. Moving on, we will soon be in the month of August and then comes September, the month fall begins and the harvesting of crops.

Remember August is the month of county fairs, which brings us to our own Rockcastle County Agricultural Fair and Exhibits, August 9-13.

We have many divisions for exhibits and the more farmers making exhibits the larger and better the fair we can have. The Rockcastle County Agricultural Fair Board would like to encourage all farmers, FFA, FHA and 4-H club members to start now, if you haven't already, to select your entries.

We would like to have a good selection of beef and dairy cattle, home economics, agronomy and horticulture, flowers, crops, clothing, and anything listed in the Fair Catalog.

Remember the time, August 9-13 at the Brodhead Fairgrounds, where we can display our farm products and workmanship and meet old friends and neighbors from "Down on the Farm".

Fishing Report

Generally fair fishing for bluegill, crappie and white bass prevails across Kentucky, with black bass activity slowing. The lake-by-lake rundown, as compiled by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife:

Laurel: Crappie good early and late and at night over submerged cover; trout good at night still fishing worms off deep banks; clear, stable at power pool and 82 degrees.

Dale Hollow: Bluegill good on fryed poppers and worms and crickets in weed beds and willow bushes; black bass and white bass slow to fair in jumps; clear, falling slowly; four feet below summer pool and 84 degrees.

Cumberland: Crappie fair to good still and drift fishing minnows in deep covers over submerged cover; black bass fair still and drift; fishing nightcrawlers and small crawfish along points and deep banks; in tailwaters, crappie good, sauger fair, trout slow; clear, falling, 30 feet below the timberline and 82 degrees.

Rough River: Bluegill fair to good off deep rocky banks; white bass fair early and late in jumps; in tailwaters,

crappie slow; clear, stable at summer pool and 81 degrees.

Cave Run: Musky good casting and trolling deep runners- over the river channel and along deep banks; bluegill slow in inlets and bays; clear, stable at pool and 80 degrees.

Herrington: Bluegill good still and drift fishing worms and crickets along deep banks; black bass slow early and late on surface lures in inlets and bays and in jumps; clear, stable at pool and 83 degrees.

Kentucky: Sauger fair casting and trolling medium to deep runners and drifting minnows in the canal; white bass fair at night along bridge piers; in tailwaters, catfish and sauger slow; clear, stable, one foot below pool and 80 degrees.

Rockley: White bass fair in jumps early and late; black bass fair on spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers over drop-offs; in tailwaters, catfish good; clear to murky, stable, 1 1/2 feet below pool and 81 degrees.

Buckhorn: Bluegill fair in inlets and bays; white bass fair trolling spoons and spinners in same area; clear to murky, stable, one foot above pool and 78 degrees.

Dewey: Crappie fair early and late over submerged cover; bluegill fair in inlets and bays; clear to murky, stable at pool and 84 degrees.

Fishtrap: Bluegill fair off shallow points; crappie fair around stick ups; clear, stable at pool and 84 degrees.

Barren: Bluegill fair to good along deep banks; black bass slow early and late at night on artificial nightcrawlers off points and over drop-offs; in tailwaters, catfish fair; clear to murky, stable at pool and 81 degrees.

Grayson: Crappie fair over submerged cover; black bass slow to fair casting artificial nightcrawlers and live eels along rocky points and shallow banks; in tailwaters, trout slow; clear, stable, six inches above pool and 84 degrees.

Nolin: Crappie fair early and late around stick ups; bluegill slow off deep banks; in tailwaters, white bass fair; clear, stable, 1 1/2 feet above pool and 85 degrees.

Green: Bluegill fair along deep banks; black bass slow early and late on surface lures and at night on artificial nightcrawlers off points; in inlets and bays and over drop-offs; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear, stable, six inches above pool and 81 degrees.

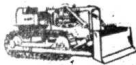

God knows how much we miss you. He counts the tears we shed. And whispers that you are only sleeping. Our loved one is not dead.

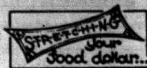
If all the world was ours to give, We'd give it, yes, and more. To see the face of the one we loved And have you back once more."

Check the label for a list of ingredients—what makes up the highest percentage of the margarine will be listed first, the second highest percentage second, and so on. Margarines that do not contain the 80 percent fat required by law are labeled "imitation."

WEEKEND (SCHEDULED) JULY 31
AUGUST 1 AT UK

Whether you have a large lawn and garden or you "green thumb" activities are confined to an apartment balcony, there'll be something to interest you during the 1976 Landscape and Home Garden Weekend at the University of Kentucky.

This annual event is scheduled Saturday, July 31, from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m., and Sunday, August 1, 1-5 p.m., at the Landscape Garden Center on Nicholasville Road, just south of the Limestone-Waller intersection, in Lexington.

planned for homeowners, and others interested in flowers, shrubs, vegetables and fruits.

On either Saturday or Sunday, you can tour the Landscape Garden Center and see the variety of trees and shrubs as well as All-America Flower and vegetable trial plots, where outstanding new varieties are being tested for Kentucky use.

An exhibit of foliage plants also will be a special feature during the week end.

TOMATO AND POTATO - EARLY AND LATE "BLIGHT"

Two blight diseases, early blight caused by the fungus *Alternaria solani* and late blight caused by the fungus *Phytophthora infestans*, are present on tomatoes and potatoes in Kentucky this year. These two fungi can attack leaves, stems, fruits, and tubers, however, the most noticeable symptoms occur on the leaves.

Early blight symptoms on the leaves are characterized by brown to black dead spots, especially on older leaves of the plant. These spots enlarge to 1/4 to 1/2 inch in diameter taking on a target pattern with concentric ridges in the dead areas. The spots may run together causing the leaf to yellow and drop.

Late blight symptoms include leaves showing a water-soaked dark green lesion, frequently extending interior from the leaf margin. On the

lower leaf surfaces, near the margin of the lesion, a ooze of downy white mold may be noticed. The foliage soon dries, becomes brown, and shrivels. This disease can be very devastating, killing entire plants within three to four days after infection occurs.

Both diseases are favored by moist weather conditions. Early blight is more active at higher temperatures than late blight. Cloudy days with light rainfall and temperatures between 50-70 degrees are best for late blight disease development.

Control for these two diseases is by spraying the foliage with fungicides at the first sign of disease and at weekly intervals. Use zinc maneb 80 percent WP, 1 1/2 lbs./gal; Maneb 50 percent WP, 1/2 lbs./gal; Fixed copper, 1 lbs./gal.; Zineb 75 percent WP, 1/2 lbs./gal.; or Bravo 75 percent AP, 1 lbs./gal. Observe waiting days to harvest.

SORGHUM - MAIZE DWARF MOSAIC VIRUS

Several sorghum samples received in the past week are believed to be infected with maize dwarf mosaic virus (MDMV). Symptoms of this disease are a chlorotic mottle of light and dark green areas. Red leaf symptoms may develop on some varieties with leaves containing dark red streaks. Malformed heads and varying degrees of sterility may also occur. Severely infected plants may fall to the ground.

Extent of this symptom depends on the growth stage at the time of infection and reaction of the variety to virus infection. Best prevention of MDMV infections is eradication of perennial host grasses such as johnsongrass in fields or near fields where sorghum is grown. Prevention of MDMV by aphid control has been considered but has not been investigated sufficiently to warrant recommendation. Conventional insecticide application cannot effectively control incoming aphids before they have an opportunity to transmit the virus.

Insects Attack Oak Trees In Rockcastle County

Rockcastle County residents may expect to notice that most of the oak trees on wooded mountaintops are now turning brown and appearing dead according to Duane Bristow, Assistant District Forester, with the Kentucky Division of Forestry in Pineville. This is a result of defoliation caused by a small slug less than 4 inch in length called the pin oak sawfly. The sawfly, a member of the Asp family of insects, eats the lower surface of oak leaves killing the leaves. "However, since most of the growth of oak trees takes place in the spring and the sawfly does not begin defoliating the trees until July, damage is usually not serious," Bristow says. "Many people become alarmed because the damage is

Rockcastle To Get Increase In County Road Aid Funds

Rockcastle County is getting an increase in its annual county road aid funds, according to an announcement by State Transportation Secretary John C. Roberts.

Roberts said that the allocation to the county for this fiscal year, effective July 1, will amount to \$135,330 as compared with \$98,318 a year ago. The new fiscal year allocation will provide for maintenance and improvements on six bridges and along more than 185 miles of local county roads. The listed mileage includes 89 miles of

backtop surface and 46 miles of gravelled roads.

The county road aid program was established in 1936 to help county governments meet the costs of maintaining their county road systems. It is financed under a formula which provides that nine-tenths of one cent collected in tax on the sale of each gallon of motor fuels in Kentucky be set aside for allocation to support county road aid programs.

The allocations to the counties are announced annually, on a fiscal-year basis.

FRANKFORT WATCHLINE

Governor Julian Carroll has saved several hundred women from a lot of driving. The announcement from the Governor that he would not include the question of repealing the state's ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment in his call for a special session of the General Assembly was not surprising.

In a shrewd political maneuver following the legislative session, Carroll said he would include the controversial repeal effort if a majority of the lawmakers requested. It was a safe gesture.

A check of the response several weeks after Carroll's statement revealed that only four lawmakers had written the governor asking for another shot at rescinding ratification. The hundreds of "pink ladies" who filled the hallways during the last session in an effective lobbying effort on behalf of repeal can save their gas and bus money for 1978. The women, some crying, promised reporters on the last day of the session they would work against re-election of General Assembly members who had not supported their cause. It will be interesting to see what degree of success they'll achieve.

With ERA repeal erased from the bill, it appears the lawmakers were most of their time dealing with the lower tier of Kentucky's new judicial system. The creation of the new district courts which will be operated by the state will not be an easy task since it affects every Kentucky county. Lawmakers will have to determine how the counties will be compensated for the use of their facilities; how courts will operate; and how much the judges will be paid.

The implementation of the local level of judicial reform will alter the structure of county government. Lawmakers will have to determine how the counties will be compensated for the use of their facilities; how courts will operate; and how much the judges will be paid.

In addition to judicial reform, some type of mine safety proposal seems certain to be included in the call. It appears, though, the proposal of putting mine safety monitors selected by the miners into the mines will not be recommended.

If a special commission consisting of the Jefferson County delegation can reach a consensus on how sewers can be built, it will be a major step.

WHY DID PICKLES DARKEN?
If you pickles turned dark, instead of keeping that fresh translucent look, it might be because you didn't use soft water (minerals cause darkening); you used ground spices instead of whole ones; you used too much spice, or you used iodized salt instead of plain coarse salt.

STORING DRIED FOODS
Cool your dried foods down to room temperature before you store them away. If they are still warm, they will sweat in the packages. Use moisture-vapor-resistant containers with tight fitting lids. Glass jars, coffee cans, plastic boxes, and plastic frozen food bags with twist ties are all good containers.

Store them in a cool, dry place. Once you open a package, keep it in the refrigerator.

DRYING FRUITS AND VEGETABLES
The easiest produce to dry at home are apples, herbs, dry beans, peas and corn, sweet potatoes, and onions. Fruits need an anti-darkening treatment before drying, and vegetables should be blanched, just the way you do before freezing them.

You can dry them in the sun, your oven, a well-ventilated attic, or a dehydrator built especially for that purpose. For step-by-step directions, come to the Extension office and pick up a free copy of our drying publication.

MUST YOU SULPHUR FRUITS?
You can dry fruits without sulphuring them, but they will gradually darken during drying and storage without this treatment. Sulphuring also decreases the loss of vitamin A and C, as well as preserving more of the color and flavor. There are two sulphuring methods - one uses pure sulfur fumes, the other is a sodium-bisulfite dip. See our publication for how to do it.

USING WAXED CUCUMBERS
If you are using cucumbers in a pickle recipe, be sure to use cucumbers without a glossy wax coating. This wax will keep your pickling spices from doing their job. Many of the locally grown cucumbers on the market won't have a wax coating, but those shipped in from other states often do.

Pioneer is a good cucumber variety to use for pickles and relishes.

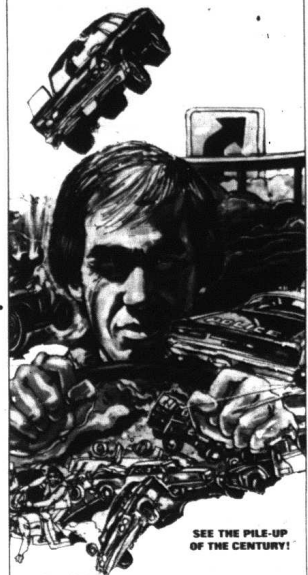

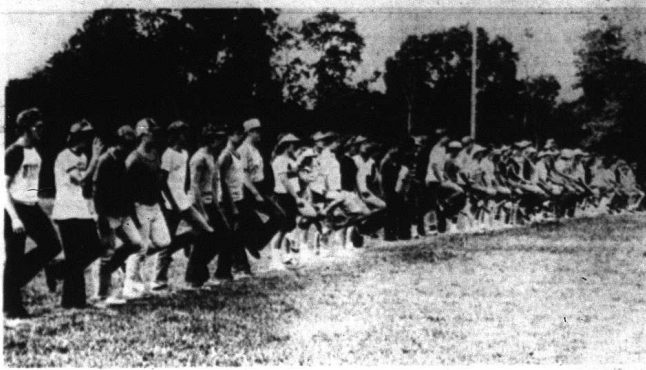

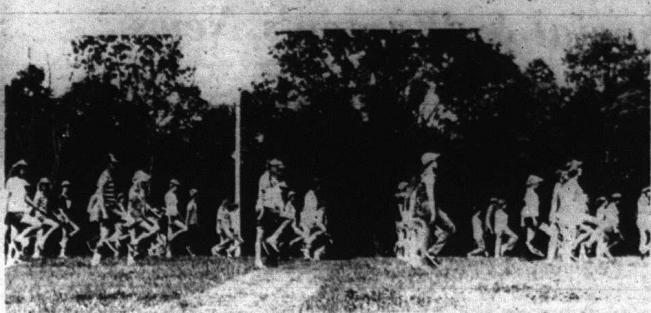

Rockcastle Recollections

By John Lab

Among better-known physicians in the history of Rockcastle County was the Pennington brothers, Monroe and James. Monroe, the elder, had received his earlier education at the point where it is said he was taught to read and write by his wife after they were married. He was, however, a man of some natural brilliance of mind that much determination and a site of early handicaps completed a medical education and became a competent practitioner, with a wide client.

Much of his ability was devoted to business matters and he became not only one of the wealthiest men in Rockcastle County but also exerted much influence in political and civic affairs. He was an indefatigable worker and always engaged in any movement for the betterment of the county. I recall that he was interested in securing for Mt. Vernon, the Rural Electric Co-op later located in Jackson County but found our people not responsive when it appeared that the deal might be consummated. For many years he was the moving influence behind the Bank of Mt. Vernon. It was through the far-sightedness and liberality of Dr. Monroe Pennington that many businesses in the county (Retro Valley Enterprises among them) were able to get their start.

Dr. James Pennington, younger brother of Dr. Monroe, secured a good medical education with the help of his older brother. He spent much of his early practice in the coalfields of Eastern Kentucky, as company physician for many of the larger companies. After many years of such practice he removed to Mt. Vernon, where he continued in practice until his retirement, after which

he made his home in Lexington, Kentucky, for the remainder of his life. A son, Dr. James Pennington, Jr., also now retired, spent many years in the medical service of the U.S. Navy.

Dr. Lee Chesnut, long-time medical practitioner of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky came of a long line of ministers, but chose instead to follow the medical profession. Dr. Chesnut once told me that when he came into Mt. Vernon and opened his first practice there were no other doctors already there that a beginning country doctor attracted very little attention. To attract notice to himself as a successful practitioner, and therefore, a man to be called on in case of sickness in the home, he would get on his horse several times a day and go riding out of town as if on an emergency call to show how much in demand he really was. He said that he almost wore out a good middle horse by such maneuvers before he began to get his share of the trade. Once he was established as a regular physician for a family, however, his friendly manner and close attention to patients made it almost impossible for another physician to take his place. Bank in the days when most medicines were dispensed by the doctor himself, wrapped in paper, in individual doses. Dr. Chesnut kept on hand in his office a number of Sears, Roebuck catalogues, from which pages were torn out and used to save the cost of paper. Long after he had become a very successful physician and a wealthy man this old habit of frugality remained and his friends and neighbors would smile at the practice. Dr. Lee Chesnut was a man of many eccentricities and odd habits, but he was the kind of a country doctor who if you had sickness in your home came and stayed till the crisis was past and a man like that you'll never forget.

An early contemporary of Dr. Lee Chesnut was another country-born turned-doctor, Dr. Walker Owens. Dr. Owens, like so many others of his profession, also had a mind for business and was for many years interested in timber and in coalmining. He was also for several years my partner in the ownership of Great Salspeter Cave, or rather, I was his partner, as he owned most of the property before I bought into it with him. After several years of general practice, Dr. Owens became deeply interested in good health and sanitation measures and was for the remainder of his life, until retirement, Chief Health and Sanitation State Officer for Rockcastle County, having established the Health Department here in the thirties. In his younger days, Dr. Sidney Walker was an ardent fan of the community and quite The Man About Town.

As a boy, I remember a Dr. Atkins, who practiced for a short time in Mt. Vernon, having his office in his home, which stood on Main Street, about where the Town House Restaurant is now located. He was killed on the sidewalk in front of his home in a gun battle with an attorney who was representing his wife in a divorce case. I recall very few of the particulars, but I do remember hearing Jamie Thompson, a boy about my own age, give his witness-stand version of what he saw and how he ran. Apparently the jury considered it justifiable homicide, as the attorney was acquitted.

Among doctors living on a farm and practicing a large medical practice was Dr. Geo. Lawrence, of the Lovel Green section. Of five boys in his family, three became physicians—Dr. George, Dr. John Will and Dr. Joseph. Dr. John Will died in 1897 and Dr. Joseph in 1905. Dr. George survived until 1945, being 80 years old at the time of his death. Dr. Lawrence spent many years in an attempt to find a cure for cancer and at

one time felt certain that he had achieved his objective. His niece, Mary Elizabeth Adams, has in her possession a copy of the printed prospectus which he mailed out to inquiring patients. Although Dr. Lawrence was well known for many other things, he was most famous among us boys as the owner of Togo, a dappled stallion of Arabian appearance and conformation. Mounted on Togo and dressed in a form-fitting dark suit, wearing a pair of polished leather leggings and further embellished with a set of red dandywhiskers, he presented a pattern of sartorial splendor we never even hoped to ever equal.

Outstanding among the medical men who practiced in Brodhead, Kentucky were Dr. Benton, Dr. W.E. Gravelly, and Dr. W.F. Carter. Dr. Carter was long our family physician. Our farm home was more five miles from his home and office. My mother was long subject to violent migraine headaches and at all hours of the night I might find it necessary to saddle my horse and make a run for the doctor. I would want to come back at the same gate, in a desire to bring her relief from her suffering. Many doctors, to spare their horse as well as to impress one with their professional calm, would jog leisurely along the road and take their time—but not Dr. Carter. He would ride stirrup to stirrup with you no matter what gate you took, thereby winning your respect and confidence as one who really cared. After leaving Rockcastle Dr. Carter moved to another county and continued in practice until he became so feeble that his wife had to accompany him on all calls. After he quit making home calls he treated patients in his office as long as she could sit up. His service to mankind in his chosen profession intended over a period of more than 50 years. There was only one Dr. W.F. Carter and I'll always be glad I knew him.

Dr. Benton, concerning whom little is now remembered, was one of the earliest practicing physicians in the town of Brodhead. A Dr. Clarke was located there at about the same time, but little could be learned of him, except that an old resident remembers that he held a license to sell whiskey some time prior to 1908. Dr. Wylie E. McWilliams and Dr. Neville Jarrett practiced for some time in and around Brodhead. Dr. Byron Owens, a young man of much talent and considerable promise, a native of Brodhead, came to an untimely end after practicing for only a few months after his graduation.

It will require at least only more article on members of the medical profession in Rockcastle County to give even brief attention to all of them, or to many as I

can find out about. Anyone having the name of a doctor to suggest, or any facts concerning those who might have been overlooked, is urged to call it to our attention within the coming week.

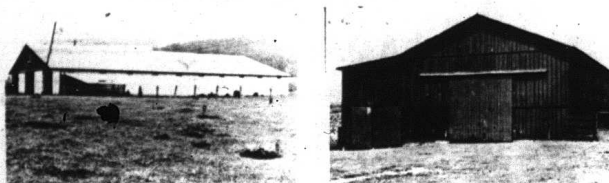
