General Smith was a man of some importance in the early history of Rockcastle County even before his services in the War of 1812. All his work on the project was completed by 1820 but payment was not made during his lifetime. It was not until 1859 that the trustees of Rockcastle Academy deeded to Smith's heirs 2,500 acres of land due him for his services.

The substantial home which General Smith had erected on the outskirts of Mt. Vernon in which he had raised his family and in which he died on February 15, 1849 was still standing and in good useable condition in the 1940's at which

time it was torn down to make room for a motel. General Smith was buried in the old part of the Elmwood Cennetry at Mu. Vernon and following her death, in 1982; his wife was laid beside him. Near them sideep, two of their sons, sa previously noted. The markers over the gravies of Smith and his wife, which were the slab type, in common use at the time of their burial, are broken and deteoriated almost beyond repair. In 1915 their grandson, James Maret, had them restored but they are again in deplorable condition. It will be no credit to Rocksatle County and the town of approvable condition.
