experience was paid \$6,210. Today that salary is \$9,330. With a master's degree and no experience, a teacher would have received \$8,510. Today that figure is \$13,520.

Mr. Parsons said that although the state does require money be spent in certain ways, and although most school expenses are fixed, the par equalization program has meant about \$100,000 extra each year to Rockcastle County. This money is being "saved" toward a new school.

Mr. Parsons said that the bonding potential of the Rockcastle School Board of Education is about \$900,000, according to estimates made by state workers last year. This would not pay for a new school.

The rest of the money could be "saved" from the budget each year and through the School Building Authority, a new program established by the state legislature that will take effect in 1980. The Authority will help districts by backing bond issues, Mr. Parsons said.

Mr. Parsons said that the new school would ease overcrowding at Mt. Vernon Elementary and may be for grades 7, 8 and 9. Several years ago a state survey of the Rockcastle system indicated the need for a middle school, he said.

The budget was begun with a balance of \$209,765 from last year. With the \$100,000 extra each year, the Board will have over \$300,000 toward the new school.

The budget is for total receipts of \$2,963,847. The biggest items are for salaries. Mr. Parsons said the schools employ over 150 teachers, and about 140 custodians, lunch room workers, and others.

Figures from the budget are given with last year's in parenthesis.

Elementary school teachers, \$1,032, 335 (829,854); Secondary teachers, \$494,407 (424,066); Special Education, \$178,847 (145,470); Transportation costs \$385,621 (299,887); with drivers' salaries at \$123,000 (102,713).

Administration including salaries and supplies is \$60,000 (\$50,787). Operation expenses including utilities, \$201,500 (181,078) of which \$71,444

(\$61,008) are custodians' salaries, and \$69,000 (\$4,994) for electric bills. Library books will cost about \$20,000. Mr. Parsons said the local districts do not buy textbooks, which are provided by the state. The district does choose between several available textbooks, he said.

In the capital outlay budget, \$115,387 is being paid on the high school building and \$100,000 is budget for roof repairs.

Robert Cromer Attends Annual Conference

Robert Cromer, Rockcastle County Tax Assessor, attended the annual Conference on Assessment Administration Monday and Tuesday in Louisville. California's Proposition 13 and its ramifications on property taxes were among the topics discussed. Proposition 13 cut California's property taxes by more than 50 percent.

Conference discussions also centered around a tax break proposal which failed to pass the 1978 Kentucky General Assembly. House Bill 945, designed by tax assessors, would include the annual consumer price index in tax assessments.

There were also discussions on tax qualifications, certification techniques, deed tax, records and so on.

\$6,000 of each annual salary, and up to 2.2 percent if the county files a certain number of claims. Money is returned to the Board however, if there are few or no claims.

The high school's public address system in the gymnasium will receive a \$3,190 improvement. The Board voted to hire Consolidated Electronics of Knoxville to upgrade the system, and will pay them half the price when the work is finished. If the work is unsatisfactory, the company will keep working until the Board is satisfied with the address system.

Consolidated was hired without advertising for bids. The Board does not have to advertise for jobs less than \$5,000, Mr. Parsons said.

The Board voted to sue Celotex Company of Lockland, Ohio for failing to pay on a \$7,000 bond on the high school roof. Celotex agreed to guarantee the roof for 20 years, and its representative recommended payment when the roof required over \$51,000 replacement costs.

Carl Glantz, Board attorney, agreed to sue the company. His fee will be 25 to 33 percent of the amount collected from Celotex.

The Board agreed to advertise and accept bids on a chain link fence around the school bus garage near the high school to protect it from vandalism.

Officers were elected at last week's meeting of the local chapter of American Association of Retired Persons.





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


Mitchell was the leading yard gainer with 117 yards in 20 carries.

Senior Citizen Program Faces Cutbacks

The Rockcastle County Senior Citizens Program will have to reduce its office staff, move out of the county courthouse, and into the Rockcastle County Library, and cut back on some of its transportation services, according to John Zupanic, chairman of the Rockcastle County Committee on Aging.

Mr. Zupanic told a group of about 30 senior citizens of Otis that the cutbacks are necessary if the program is to stay in the black.

"We are unable to get CETA workers this year," he said. "We do not have any money to do the things we wanted to do."

The 1979 Senior Citizens' budget is for expenditures of \$21,746, but the program has only \$14,878 to spend. Of this, \$11,902 is from the federal government and the rest is from the county and city of Mt. Vernon.

Philp Martin, of the Cumberland Valley Area Agency on Aging Office in London, told the group that it cannot operate as it has \$21,000 when it only has \$14,000.

Rockcastle County has become a little spoiled," he said, explaining that three times in the past the area office saved the program from debt by finding money from CETA and other counties. He also said that other counties raise up to \$2000 from contributions from senior citizens who share in the lunch program. Rockcastle seniors last year gave \$222 which amounted to 11 cents on every 72 cent lunch served, he said.

This was one of the smallest contributions given by any county in the program.

Mr. Zupanic said that out-of-county trips to the doctor will be eliminated. These trips cost an average of \$7.00 each. The lunch program and transportation to the lunch program will not be cut.

The office staff will be cut from three to two workers, and its operations will move to the library. One telephone will be taken out. Mr. Zupanic said, and the office will operate six or eight hours per day.

"People think that government programs have a lot of money, but it is not always the case," he said.

Robbins Concert Makes Over \$400

A benefit concert by country music singer Jenny Robbins made \$422 for the Livingston Fire Department, according to Jerry Mink, fire department lieutenant.

The concert was held Sunday at Livingston Elementary School and lasted an hour and a half. About 300 people attended, he said.

Ms. Robbins has appeared at Grand Ole Opry and one of her records recently made the "Top Ten" in country music charts. He is originally from Rockcastle County, but now lives in Ohio.

The musicians were: Ernie Vaughn,

boss; Tom Nuttini, piano; Clyde Marcum, lead; Bill Tyree, drums; Wendy Hargraves, steel; and Junior Bennett, fiddle.

Mr. Mink said that Ms. Robbins and five carloads of professional musicians performed free of charge for the fire department.

"The musicians had performed till 2 a.m. Saturday night in different clubs," he said, "and we certainly appreciated their coming to Livingston."

Mr. Mink said that the department is planning other fund-raising activities, with the Livingston Lions Club which donated \$1000.

Roses

Provide winter protection for your roses which need it. Many roses, including quite a few species, shrubs and climbers are naturally cold hardy and need little or no protection. Round the base of each plant back to 16-30 inches before mounding. Be sure to destroy all the clippings to prevent the spread of disease. You can also tie the canes together to prevent lashing in the winter wind if you like.

Add hay or straw over the mound and exposed canes after the first hard freeze. The mulch acts as an insulator to protect against fluctuating temperatures and freezing and thawing around the canes.

Don't allow salt from the roads to get on your roses. Cover them with plastic and then mulch them with straw or hay if this is a problem.

Other methods of protecting plants from winter winds and fluctuating temperatures are:

Burlap wrapping around bushes insulated inside the burlap with evergreen boughs, or corn stalks.

Bottomless bushel basket over the roses.

Tar paper cylinder wrapped around roses insulated with bark mulch or peat moss.

Styrofoam rose cone.

Potato Storage

The four conditions one must provide to successfully store Irish potatoes are: 1. proper temperature; 2. air circulation or ventilation; 3. proper relative humidity; and 4. darkness. Two of these conditions are difficult to provide in today's homes where no provisions have been made for storing vegetables. These are controlled temperatures and relative humidity conditions.

The potato or tuber is living tissue. The "eyes" are dormant for about one month after harvesting. The tuber should be cured for about a week or 10 days before placing it in storage to heal the skin and wounds and allow for the loss of excess water. This is done by keeping the potatoes at 50-60 degrees at a relative humidity of 75-85%. The potato respire and give-off moisture, heat and some gases—mostly CO₂. After curing, and to reduce respiration and prevent sprouting, tubers must be stored at 40-45 degrees.

Ventilation or air circulation is essential in order to have dry air move over and around the storage area to remove the excess water and heat given off in respiration. To prevent rotting and shriveling, a relative humidity of 70-90% must be maintained. If the potato is sweating, the relative humidity is too high and air circulation will need to be increased. Darkness is essential to prevent

greening. The greening is chlorophyll production, possible because the tuber is a stem, a continuation of the stem tissue above ground. It is capable of carrying on photosynthesis if light is present.

Strawberries

A mulch of clean straw applied to your strawberry plants in the landscape between Thanksgiving and Christmas (20-30 lbs. per 100 feet of row) will benefit your plants. The mulch helps reduce winter injury and plant heaving, helps suppress weed growth next spring, and helps keep the fruit and pickers clean.

An application of Etnide or Dethal just before mulching also helps in weed control.

DUAL 6E LABEL EXPANSION PERMITS SOYBEAN ROTATION

The Environmental Protection Agency has expanded the Dual 6E herbicide label, allowing rotation to crops other than corn the next season.

Dual is CIBA-Geigy's preplant incorporated (PPI) or preemergence herbicide for use in corn grown for grain, excluding popcorn.

Under provisions of the expansion, soybeans, corn and root crops may be planted on Dual-treated acreage the following spring; small grains as early as four-and-one-half months following treatment. All other rotational crops may be planted 18 months after application, without restriction.

Dual 6E may be used alone or in combination with AAtrex formulations. When combining with AAtrex, the AAtrex label applies. Dual also controls barnyardgrass (watergrass), crabgrass, fall panicum, foxtail millet (premerge only), giant, green and yellow foxtails, signal grass (PPI only), witchgrass, yellow nutsedge, pigweed, and common purslane (PPI only). Tank mixing with AAtrex adds cocklebur, lambquarter, pigweed, ragweed, smartweed and velvetleaf to the list of weeds controlled.







Pop, Pop, Pop, Goes an American Fav.
What's enjoyed to the tune of 400 million pounds per year? None other than one of the earliest American foods—popcorn.

Introduced to American colonists at the First Thanksgiving celebration, popcorn has become a firmly entrenched American tradition. The average American (man, woman or child) eats about two pounds of popcorn per year in Minneapolis/St. Paul (the popcorn eating capital of the world), that number doubles to four pounds per person!

More than half of all the popcorn consumed is eaten (and popped) at home—with the remainder being enjoyed at movies, ballparks, zoos, the circus and all sorts of sporting events. About 10% is used in export, in decoration and in packing of fragile materials.

Where does this popcorn come from? Much of the world's popcorn supply is grown in the U.S. cornbelt—along with the four other varieties of corn, pod, flint, and sweet. But, popcorn is the only corn that explodes to many times its original volume when heated. Compared to the other types of corn, popping corn is small in stalk, ear and kernel.

But, it's big on many a person's snack guide. Here's why:
Popcorn is about 77% carbohydrate, 12% protein, 5% fat and 2% minerals, plus some water and roughage. A low-calorie snack, containing only 23

calories per cup, plain popcorn is considered an acceptable "snacker's food" by the American Dental Association, in place of sweets.

It's economical, too. Only half cup of unpopped corn will fill a four-quart popper. That means you'll have enough popcorn to satisfy the whole family for about 30c, including the price of oil and salt.

For variety—especially at Halloween—try popcorn balls. Remember that the looser they are, the easier they are to eat. Press the balls just enough so the shapers hold together. Gently reshape them several times as they cool.

Then "witch" out, or before you know it, the neighborhood ghosts and goblins will pop out of nowhere (and everywhere) for their Halloween treat.

Popcorn Balls

- 1/2 cup light or dark corn syrup
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 qts. popcorn
- Mix syrup, sugar and salt in heavy saucepan. Cook until mixture boils and boil for 2 minutes. Pour syrup over popcorn. Grease hands and shape into balls. Makes 6-8 balls.

Popcorn Faces

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1-10 1/2 oz. bag miniature marshmallows
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 cups popped corn
- nuts or small candies
- Licorice whips
- Melt butter in large saucepan. Stir in marshmallows and salt. Cook and stir

over low heat just until marshmallows melt. In large roasting pan combine marshmallow mixture with popped corn. Mix well. With wet hands, form into balls. To make faces, use small candies for eyes and use pieces of licorice whip for mouths. Place eyes and mouths on each popcorn ball and push to stick. Wrap balls in plastic wrap or cellophane. If desired, insert a wooden stick into each ball for a handle. Tie with ribbons or twine. Makes 10.

Kentucky Afield

The first cool days of autumn mark the beginning of a "season" that none of us like to see—the deer poaching season. Although "illegal hunting" is a year-round problem, poaching seems to increase with the coming of fall. Because poachers work at night in isolated rural areas, most of us don't realize how widespread or serious the problem is.

It's hard to gauge exactly how many deer are taken annually by poachers but wildlife biologists with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources estimate that at least as many deer are killed illegally as are taken by hunters during the legal seasons.

The poacher makes an even bigger dent in deer populations than is indicated by just the number of deer taken illegally. While legal hunters are limited to bucks only in most areas of the state, the poacher shoots any deer, buck, doe or fawn—that has the misfortune to fall within the beam of his spotlight.

It is this indiscriminate, year-round shooting, especially of does, which keeps deer numbers depressed in many areas of Kentucky, according to wildlife biologists. Several counties are currently closed to deer hunting because poachers take so many deer that a legal harvest cannot be allowed.

Fish and wildlife conservation officers do all they can to combat poaching, but with only one officer per county, it's a difficult and often frustrating job. And many officers have had the disheartening experience of spending several sleepless nights of sending a poacher only to have the case filed away or a minimum fine imposed.

Things are looking better this year, however. The 1978 General Assembly passed a law increasing the fine for illegally taking a deer from \$300 up to \$1,000. Convicted poachers can also be imprisoned from 30 days to one year, can lose hunting privileges for from one to three years and can be forced to pay for the deer taken. The law can also confiscate all equipment used by convicted poachers—including guns and vehicles.

These new penalties, coupled with Kentucky's new court system, could lead to a dramatic drop in poaching,

- Thursday: Shredded turkey on bun, french fries, cole slaw, milk, cookie.
- Friday: Pizza, toss salad, green beans, milk, fruit and cookie.

according to R.W. Garrison, director of the fish and wildlife department's law enforcement division.

The new law should certainly serve as a deterrent," Garrison says. "I'm pleased to see the penalties for poaching come more in line with the seriousness of the offense."

"And the new district court system should help us get more maximum or near maximum fines," Garrison adds. "I feel that more and more judges are beginning to view poaching as a form of stealing—both from the state and from the sportsman who pay for deer management through their license fees."

Garrison urges anyone who suspects poaching in his area to get in touch with the county conservation officer. "Rural residents are among our best allies in the battle against poaching," he says. "Poachers hesitate to operate in areas where they know their activities will be reported, so citizen cooperation with our law enforcement efforts is one of the most effective deterrents we have."

200,000th MEMBER FAMILY JOINS KY FARM BUREAU

Kentucky Farm Bureau has reached a major membership milestone with the announcement recently that the 200,000th member family has been enlisted in the state's largest farm organization.

A 28-year old Mercer County farmer, Glenn B. Devine, his wife Martina and son, Jason, joined Farm Bureau on Sept. 28, enabling Kentucky Farm Bureau to become the fifth state in the nation to pass the 200,000 mark. Other 200,000-member states are Illinois, Indiana, Texas and Alabama.

Founded in 1919 in Kentucky and nationally, Kentucky Farm Bureau reached the 100,000 member plateau in 1970. Nationally, Farm Bureau claims a total membership in 49 states (all but Alaska) and Puerto Rico of 2.9 million families.

The Devines farm just over 200 acres near the Mayo section of northern Mercer County. A 60-sow Holstein dairy herd, four acres of burley tobacco and 65 acres of corn comprise their major crops.

Both husband and wife grew up on farms in Mercer County, and both have worked off the farm prior to the purchase of their farm two years ago. Devine said he joined Farm Bureau because of the organization's economic services and its legislative and other work on behalf of farmers.

Kentucky Farm Bureau President J. Robert Wade said the Devines represent an "important benchmark for Farm Bureau in Kentucky," and said he welcomed them and the other 199,999 members into "the most effective farm organization in the world."

Wade said Farm Bureau's history of stability, strength and sustained growth have set it apart from other farm organizations which have come and gone during the 59 years FB has been in existence.







Brodhead School Broken Into - Again

Brodhead School was broken into this weekend for the fourth time since school started, according to Bigg Tower, principal.

Mr. Tower said the burglars probably entered through a window, and then smashed the top lock on the door, including milk cartons, loaves of cheese and ice cream.

As far as we can tell, nothing of value was taken," he said.

The school was burglarized Sept. 25, when valuable audio visual equipment purchased through children's fund raising efforts were taken. One cassette recorder, brass-trimming equipment, and an am/fm radio were returned

through the efforts of Kentucky State Trooper Greg Ennis, Mr. Tower said, but a Weather Alert machine and two tape cassette units are still missing.

"Last year was actually not a bad year for us as far as break-ins are concerned," Mr. Tower said. "Two or three years ago, the building was broken into periodically."

School superintendent Charles Parsons said that a security system may have to be considered for Brodhead School. Mr. Parsons said that Mt. Vernon Elementary and Rockcastle County High School have night guards that have eliminated the break-in program.

School Board Meets

The Rockcastle County School Board's main business (October 4) was to adopt the 1978 budget, which is covered in a story elsewhere.

But other business was conducted as follows:

Six buses will be ordered through the state Department of Education, at a cost of \$15,000 each. Charles Parsons, school superintendent, said that the state will pay the Board back after eight

years. The buses hold 65 passengers and have manual shifts.

Unemployment insurance through a non-profit organization of the state School Board was ordered for employees of the county schools. Mr. Parsons said that beginning January 1, the Board has to provide this insurance, which was formerly paid by the government.

The cost is 1 percent of the first

Flu Vaccine Available For High-Risk Individuals

The Rockcastle County Health Department has been informed that they have been allocated 400 doses of influenza vaccine for administration to high-risk individuals only. They expect a late October delivery.

The vaccine will be given only to persons 65 years of age and over who reside in Rockcastle County. Any high-risk individuals under 65 of age must have a note from their doctor stating that they have a chronic illness and should receive influenza vaccine.

Certain dates will be set for the vaccine to be given and it will be given on a first-come basis.

These dates will be announced later.

"An Old Parking Ticket?"

Better See About It

Larry Williams, chief of the Mt. Vernon police, has sworn out eleven warrants on people with parking tickets, Sheriff Henry Abney said today.

Sheriff Abney said that anyone who has an unpaid parking ticket since January 1 should check in his office in the Mt. Vernon courthouse to see if a warrant has been taken out in his case.

"People can save themselves a lot of trouble and embarrassment by coming to the office," Sheriff Abney said. "If he said each warrant requires bond if served."

Renfro Cancels Boat Dock Lease; Other Business Before Council

John Lair and Wayne King of Renfro Villa cancelled their lease on the boat dock property near Lake Louisville at the Mt. Vernon City Council's meeting Monday night.

The lease was for five years, and was to run out in June, 1980. It required Mr. Lair to pay \$1000 for two years, and then \$2500 for three years to use the property. Mr. King has come to the last six Council meetings, asking each time that the rent remain at \$1000 this year, but has been refused each time.

The Council agreed however, to allow Mr. Lair to pay \$1000 this year and utilities (about \$500), and to cancel the lease.

Mr. King said he had the property "buttoned up for winter," and would take care of it until the council made other arrangements. Mayor Road Mullins said the Council would have to advertise for new tenants.

Mr. Lair is the fourth to try to make money at the boat dock, and the fourth to take a financial loss. The others were the city itself, Bud Shanks and Bill Ramsey, who each ran the dock for two years, according to Mary Craig, City Clerk.

Mr. King said the dock was a 24-hour season day a week job, and that it had been a bad season. He blamed the weather on the 4th of July, and the condition of the road near the lake for some of this year's loss, but said he had lost money all three years.

The road is now being blacktopped, but too late for the summer season, Mr. King said.

He said that the boat dock was a weekend business, and that about \$3000 could be made over a summer. The campground loses money in particular because of high utility bills.

"We've got a beautiful city park and we should look at it that way," Mr. King said. "It's a city park, not free enterprise. We have put too much money into it."

He said their investment was \$10,000 equipment, \$1200 in sand for the beach, among other expenditures, and that they would be lucky to get \$2000 back by selling the equipment.

In other business, the Council directed Mr. Craig to write to the Cedar Rapids Country Club and ask them to pay their \$1200 water bill, due since February. The Club incurred the bill when a pipe froze last winter, and had an engineer make a report to the Council this month. The Club will not be penalized for late payment.

The Council moved to "buy or beg" trash cans for Main Street. A snow plow from Central Equipment costing \$2178 will be purchased for the city.

Mayor Mullins was authorized to sign an option for six months with R.A. Williams Development for land purchased from Ralph Sigmon for \$12,000. The Williams Company will be developing the property for a senior citizens housing project.

Maizie Bussell told the councilmen that water was running into her yard and basement on Tevis Street. The Council directed water superintendent Matt Powell, Jr. to check the problem and see if building up that side of Tevis Street might solve it.

Boone Cromer was given permission to use the city's blacktopping equipment for streets in McGuire's Subdivision.

First Factory for Rockcastle County May Be Determined By Labor Survey

Are there 2500 women near Mt. Vernon who are willing to work in a garment factory?

If the answer is yes, Mt. Vernon may get its first factory soon.

According to Bill James, chairman of the Rockcastle County Industrial Authority, a garment-manufacturing firm will build a factory in the Industrial Park near Mt. Vernon, if there are enough people willing to work here.

So, the Authority is now conducting a survey for this firm through newspaper advertisements and handbills to see how many women living within 25 miles of Mt. Vernon, between the ages of 18 and 45, would be interested in working for a garment factory.

Mr. James said the factory would be completed during the first six months of 1979, if the survey goes well, and employment interviews would be held after October 23.

Mr. James said the company's current business is to rent uniforms but its management wants to get into the manufacture of uniforms as well. The proposed factory in Mt. Vernon would employ about 250, he said.


Potential employees should have at least an eighth grade education. Among the jobs available would be factory power sewing, service, cutting, shipping, office work, inspecting, supervision. The form, which is printed elsewhere in this week's Signal should be mailed to Box 592, Mt. Vernon, Ky. 40456 by October 23. Mr. James said the forms will be distributed all over the county in stores, offices and schools.

The industrial park will be built on U.S. Highway 150, about one mile west of Mt. Vernon. The total cost will be more than \$1 million, including land, water and sewer service, construction costs and access roads.

The Kentucky Department of Transportation will provide access roads to major highways once the first factory comes to the park. Other financing has come from grants and loans and the county fiscal court.

VOLUNTEERS ARE NEEDED: to help interview and test applicants. 25 men and 25 women will be needed for this work the week of November 6-10 and November 2. will be required for training to conduct these interviews and tests.

Bro. Wendell Belew Has Fond Memories of Pastors Here

Brother Wendell Belew laughed and talked as he painted the picture above the altar at First Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon.

"I was 25 and as ignorant as any guy has ever been when I was pastored," he said. "I did the dumbest thing, but it was such a happy church, nobody seemed to mind."

"They had just done away with one of those that used to stand up here and put in a furnace," he said. "It was a wonderful congregation, happy. There was never negative voice in meetings."

Brother Belew was pastor of First Baptist from 1948 to 1952, the only church he ever pastored. He was back in Mt. Vernon to paint the picture, a country scene of sky and trees done in pastel blue, gold and pink.

"I've been wandering around town all day and I can't believe how it's grown," he said. "I had been back a time or two, but it's really changed in the past few years."

Brother Belew is now Director of Missions for the Home Mission Board of the South Baptist Convention, which has 2900 missionaries in 50 states, as well as Seneca, and Rico, Virgin Islands, Cuba and Haiti.

"I have a staff of 60 in Atlanta," he said. "I just felt good being back in Kentucky, that is."

He grew up in Grant County, and his wife is from Harrodsburg. As pastor of First Baptist he had his first experiences in mission work. He had some thirteen missions started and operating in Rockcastle County, including one at Sand Springs, Roundstone, Ottawa, and Northside.

When he lived in Mt. Vernon, he was director of Mountain Missions in Kentucky. His first mission, he said, was held on Hill near Horse Shoe Bend.

"What I did here, I've been doing ever since," Brother Belew said. "I started my work here in Mt. Vernon."

His current work involves helping churches start missions and expanding churches. He and his staff start 700 new churches every year.

But Brother Belew also finds time for painting and writing. He is the illustrator of "Tomorrow's Land," a mission work about Eastern Kentucky, and the author of several books, including "The Dark's A Creeping," a children's inspiration book just now being published.

In "Dark's A Creeping," Brother Belew said he wrote about life in Mt. Vernon.

"But I mixed up the names like Asher Williams," he laughed.

The congregation invited Brother Belew to come to Mt. Vernon and paint the altar picture. He had done a similar picture when he was pastor there.

The church has recently been completely remodelled on the inside. A committee of six persons chose a gold and white theme, with white textured wall paper, molding around the ceiling and altered, gold chandeliers that are dimmed to candlelight effects and amber windows.

"That's another thing I can't get over - the church looks just fantastic now," Brother Belew said. "It's good to be back."

Killed in Auto Accident

Jeffrey Baker, age 19, was killed Friday night when his car overturned and caught fire on Brindle Ridge Road, six miles north of Mt. Vernon.

Mr. Baker's body and the smouldering 1966 Ford he was driving were discovered about 9:30 p.m. by Jimmy Frewitt and Randall Reynolds. The car was in the middle of the road, overturned, and Mr. Baker had been pinned under the hood.

Kentucky State Trooper Danny Coleman investigated the accident, and said that as far as can be determined, no one was in the car with Mr. Baker. He said the accident probably occurred about 9 p.m. because the car must have been burning about an hour before it was discovered.

Mr. Baker's funeral was Monday through the Beasley, Raney, Spake & Martin Funeral Home in Crab Orchard. Burial was in Wilmont Cemetery in Rockcastle County.

Mr. Baker was born March 7, 1959 in Madison Co. He was a graduate of Rockcastle County High School, and employed by Frane Manufacturing Company in Lexington.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Joanna Smith Baker; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Baker, all of Rt. 3, Crab Orchard; two brothers, Gary Wayne and Johnny Ray Baker, and a sister, Mrs. Sherry Lynn Turner.

School Board Approves Close Estimate Budget

By Jane Kamata

The Rockcastle County School Board passed a close estimate budget at its regular meeting October 4. This budget shows in detail how the Board estimates that almost \$3 million will be spent this year in the county school system.

The budget was made up primarily by school superintendent Charles Parsons and Lloyd Shuttis, financial officers.

Mr. Parsons explained that a major change in the way schools are funded occurred in 1976, when the Kentucky Legislature adopted the "pair equalization" program. This program made the state collect the bulk of school revenue instead of the counties, and gives the

state authority to distribute the money equally among every child.

In 1976, property taxes collected in the county for schools amounted to \$195,991. This year's budget estimated that figure at \$73,223. In 1976 the state contributed \$1,824,661 to Rockcastle schools. This year that figure is \$2,457,716.

Although the state of Kentucky is contributing more, it also is telling the counties how to spend the money, too. Mr. Parsons said, Rockcastle County has had to raise its teachers' salaries to the minimum level required by the state.

To illustrate how the salaries have increased, five years ago a beginning teacher with a bachelor's degree and no


