



Is Cave House-Wave of the Future? John Holbrook Thinks So

By Jane Kundtz

Being a cave man may be the wave of the future, according to John Holbrook of Brodhead.

In fact, Mr. Holbrook is so-enthusiastic-about-living-underground he is currently building an "earth-powered Tave house" near.

Lake Linville. He is also encouraging others to do the same, and has become a franchise dealer for a company that owns the cave house idea.

"The earth's temeprature remains constant underground," he said, "about 52 degrees. So when you build underground, you only have to—provide about 10 to 15 degrees of heat or cooling. You get with a conventional house."

He and his family later made a trip to Armington, Illinois, to visit the deligner of cave houses, Andy Davis, Mr. Davis' own house is heated solely by a wood-burning stove, and in the worst of winters in 1976, the Davis house required only two truckloads of wood. — a one four-day—period, the temperature outside varied by as much as 50 degrees, but the Davis house care without heat from the stove.

Mr. Holbrook also learned that the houses are not usually built entirely underground, but with an exterior side open to the south where the sun enters to provide more free heat and light.
