Democrats Sweep State Offices; Incumbent Councilmen Defeated

Rockcastle Countians gave a 972 vote margin to Republican guide B. Num Thesday, in a light turn-out, but state-wide, Demo-crat John Y. Brown, Jr. swept into the governor's office with a landslide victory and, along with him, the entire Democratic slate.

Wednesday mornings daily papers reported that with over 90 percent of the vote counted, Brown had received 59% of the vote so far to Nunn's 41%.

Predictions were that when all the votes were counted, Brown's vote would surpass the 192,000-vote margin of Gov. Ju-lian Carroll in 1975.

In addition, in another state e vote, two constitutional

amendments were both approved by voters.

The Fifth District, long a Republican stronghold, only gave Nunn a 15,000 vote majori-ty as compared to 40,000 when he last ran for state office in

Locally, the largest vote-get ter was Harold Rogers, running on the Nunn ticket for Lt. Gov. Rogers, got 2,570 votes to his opponent, Martha Layne Col-'ins' 1,239.

In the three council races, two incumbents on the Mt. Vernon City Council were de-feated for re-election: Oscar Bullock and Elmer Alcorn.

Elected were, in order of

votes cast for them: Ernest Stanley, incumbent Bob Jasper, Roger McClure, Ernie Tolle, incumbent Conrad Parrett and Tom Welch.

In Livingston, Mayor Bertie Rice was defeated. That council will now be made up of: Bobby Wilson, Donald Jones, Michael Robbins, Danny Bullock and Curtis McHargue.

There were only five candidates for the Brodhead Board of Trustees. Elected were: Ronnie Cash, Billy B. Bussell, D.A. Robbins, David Cash and John-

In unofficial results, Mon-roe Baker of Mt. Vernon was defeated in his bid for Railroad Commissioner of the 3rd Dis-

trict by about 10,000 votes.

Although both constitutional amendments were defeated locally, they won statewide.



According to folklore, you can tell how severe a winter is coming by checking how thick a coat woolybear caterpillars grow in the fall. Or, some say, it's the width of the black wands on the caterpillar's body-the more black, the colder the

Either way, local weather prognosticators have an abundprognosticators have an abundance of help for making their winter forecasts this fall. There ance of freep to winter forecasts this fall. There is an unusually large crop of orange and black caterpillars that you may have seen on walls of buildings, in yards, on side-walks and crossing roads. They are larvae of the Isabella Moth, more commonly known as Banded Wootlybears, seeking a place to overwinter. These larvae will pupate into moths next spring.

But what, are the wooly-bears preparing for? A severe, cold.winter like last year, or a milder one that's more like normal for this area?

are confined.

Regardless of what control method you use in your home, attic flies will be a nuisance every winter until you close the openings that let them get inside.

Kentucky Afield

Nov. 1 marked the begin-ning of a new kind of fishing season on three of Kentucky's lakes. On this date, commercial fishermen began using gill and trammel nets on Kentucky, Barkley, and Rough River lakes nder a newly instituted "special peimit" system of commercial

nder a newly instituted "special permit" system of commercial fishing.

The holders of these special permits have paid \$500 each for them, in additin to the regular commercial fishing licenses. (\$502.50 resident, \$125.50 non-resident) for themselves and the one assistant each permit holder is allowed.

These fishermen are required to fish at least 800 yards of nets for at least 25-percent of the season, which runs through March 31, 980.

Gill and trammel nets were

Gill and trammel nets were banned on most Kentucky wat-ers in 1976. However, these nets

remain the most effective means of harvesting certain kinds of rough fish, according to Charlie Bowers, director of, the Fish and Wildlife Department's fisheries division.

"The high populations of carp and buffalo, particular in Kentucky and Bärkley lakes, need to be controlled for the good of the ecological balance in these waters," Bowers says. "Without some check on their numbers, sport fishing could suffer."

The carp and buffalo in Kentucky and Barkley represent a potential resource worth \$4 million. Boyers says, a resource which could represent an observation of the could represent and the lakes. So, according to Bowers, this commercial fishing should help both the sport angler and the local economy. "By setting this season during the winter, we hope to avoid most interference with sport fishermen," Bowers says, adding that the netting will be carefully monitored. The permit






