Distances were limited to a few miles, and wergone always-arrived early, enough in the day to help put dinner on the table. In the last 80 years many ulings have changed in Kentucky, Familles still get together at Thanksgiving, but they no longe go by buggy. Sometimes they arrive only in time to sit down to eat.

With inflation and interest rates running a neck in neck race to finish us all, it becomes imperative for state government to hold the line. If government cannot work within a framework and hold down spending, then a peaceful solution to inflation will be hard to find.

Considering that Ken Considering that Ken-tucky's state government con-sists of 40,000 employees and a 57.5 billion budget, it is hard to believe that we cannot work within this framework. If the new governor and legislature are unable to reduce the size of government or at least hold the line, the alternative will be a continuation of spiraling infla-tion.

How to Buy Turkey Turkey is a popular main dish for Thanksgiving, Not only is it one of the most ec

is it one of the most economical sources of protein based on cost per serving, but it is also plenti-ful this year. Turkey and othe poultry products are an excel-ent source of high quality pro-tein. It supplies calcium, thia-mine, riboflavin, niacin. Also, it is lower in calories than most meats.

meats.

Look for USDA marks. The circular inspection mark of the United States Department of Agriculture appears on all poutry sold across state lines. This mark, usually found on label,

mark, usually found on label, were to gibt marked to gibt when packed in the cate that the bird has been inspected for wholesomeness and has met rigid standards set by the Federal government.

A grade for quality in the form of a shield, is usually found near the inspection mark. Highest quality birds are marked "USDA Grade A", indicating they are meaty and have good appearance.

These grades indicate wholesomeness and quality, but tenderness depends upon the age of the bird.

age of the bird

Young birds have tender meat and are best for roasting,

meat and are best for roasting, frying, broiling or barbecuing. The meat of mature birds is less tender. These birds should be stewed or braised. Young turkeys may be labeled "Young Turkey". "Fryer-Roaster," "Young Hen" or "Young Tom". Turkey comes frozen or fresh chilled; whole of halved, quarters or roasts. Most uncooked whole turkeys are frozen, stuffed or unstuffed. In unstuffed turkeys, the giblets and neck are wrapped in paper or plastic inside the bird. Be sure to remove them and use in sure to remove them and use in

sure to remove them and use in gravy or dressing.

Many frozen turkeys are also probasted. This means that butter fat or seasoned stock has been injected into the meat of the turkey before it was frozen. As the turkey cokes, this basting keeps the meat tender and moist. There is no need for you to bast the turkey as it cooks.

Some turkeys have a "bullt-in" meat thermometer inserted in the meat. When the turkey is done, the thermometer inserted in the meat. When the

turkey is done, the thermometer pops up.
To choose the correct size of your fresh or frozen turkey, allow one pound per serving if the bird weighs 12 pounds or less, if it weighs more than 12 pounds, there will be more meat on it and you should allow about ¼ pound per serving. When buying uncooked boneless turkey, allow ½ to ½ pound per serving.

After purchasing your holiday bird chilled, store loosely wrapped in the refrigerator. It will keep 2 or 3 days. Leave the wrap on prepackaged pountry;

A small turkey will take 3-6 hours, a medium 6-8 hours, and a large 8-10 hours. Refrigerate small turkey will take 3 hours, a medium 6-8 hours, and a large 8-10 hours. Refrigerate thawed birds if not cooked immediately and use in 1 or 2

immediately and use in 1 of 2 days.

When roasting follow this time table: 4-8 lbs, 2½ to 4 hours; 8-12 lbs, 4-4½ hours; 12-16 lbs, 4½-5½ hours; 16-20 lbs, 5½ to 6 hours and 20-24 lbs., 6-7

hours.
Allow thirty minutes more for stuffed poultry. Never partially roast any poultry one day and complete roasting the following day. Bacteria thrive under conditions. se conditions

Let turkey set after removing from oven for 30 minutes, before carving. Store left-over turkey in refrigerater promptly. Any cooked poultry is dangerous after left at room temperature for more than 2 hours. Cooked turkey will keep in the refrigerator 1 to 2 days and in the freezer for one month. If frozen with broth or gravy, cooked turkey will keep in freezer up to 6 months.

Aug®t sightings of quall in the western portions of Kentucky were up 41.2 percent over last year, the survey shows. Eastern Kentucky sore of a 40 percent gain, while the west-central portion of the state showed an increase of 11.4 percent.

The Bluegrass was the only region to show a decrease. August sightings were down 27.5 percent from a year ago.

These results are from a survey in which cooperating rural mail carriers record the number of quail and rabbits they see on their regular routes. Separate figures are kept in June, July and August. Comparing results from year to year gives biologists an index of population changes.

gives biologists an- index of population changes.

"The June sightings were low this year," says Ben Burnley, the wildlife biologist in charge of collecting and tabulating the quali figures for this survey. "But the big increases in August over most of the state are encouraging and probably

The first phase of this year's small game season runs through November 30, when it closes for the December 1-3 deer gun hunt. From December 4, the rabbit season runs through Jan. 21. Quail hunting will be allowed through Feb. 17.

Biologists predict that it will take at least another two years for quail and rabbit populations to reach what they were before "the winter of '77".

The limis on rabbits are four daily and eight in possession after two or more days of hunting. Quail limits are 8 daily and 16 in possession.

#### Survey Says Prices Higher Here

According to a Marketbas-ket survey conducted by volun-teer reporters, under the coord-ination of the Kentucky Farm Bureau Women's Advisory Committee, it costs more to shop for groceries in Mt. Vernon than any other of the 26 survey locations.

The survey showed that 40 selected food items cost \$54.81 in Mt. Vernon while the cheapest place to shop in the 26 survey locations was Shelbyville where the price for the same 40 items was \$47.69. Average for all the survey locations was \$51.36, up just over 1 percent from the September figure but still 1.5 percent below July's



Best time to apply the mulch is when plants go dormant following the first hard freeze-usually in late November or early December. Spread it at

# Mulch Strawberries For A Bigger Crop Next Spring There are several reasons for covering strawberry beds with a mulch this fall and they all add up to better crop next year. A mulch prevents winter injury in two ways. It reduces root damage from heaving caused by freezing and thawing. And the protective ground cover keeps frost from going deep, especially important during a winter when there is little or now snow cover.



"And year after year, we repeat the same fact and those same warnings over and over again to anyone who will listen, but people go right on driving as they always have, killing themselves and others," he said.

Thus far this year, more than 119,000 motorists already have been cited by state police for moving hazardous violations, most of which involved speeding, drinking while driving failure to yield.

But the worst may still be ahead of us.

The 1,500 bow hunters have bagged 70 of the 1,800 available deer since the season opened October 6. The largest deer was claimed by a Radelliff resident, Roger Logsdon, who checked in with a 196-pound, 12-point buck. Gun hunters registered on Fort Knox this year total 4,800. Three-fouths of those are civilian shooters, mostly from Kentucky, Indiana, Tennessee, Ohlo and Virginia, an official from Knox's Hunt Control Section said.

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
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
