Peach halves are an exception, since air held in the cavities remains trapped. To 'remedy this problem, run a knife gently around the inside of the jar before adjusting lids for pro-cessing.

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Q. How many peaches do yo need to make a quart? A. It takes approximately 2.3 pounds of fresh fruit for one quart of canned neaches




