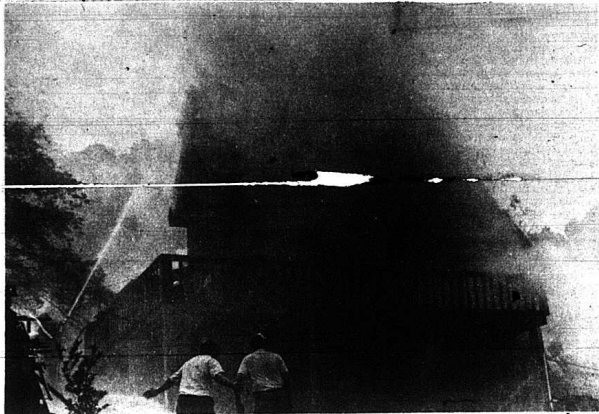

Rockcastle Countians "Socked" With Big Increases in Property Assessments

Rockcastle Countians received quite a shock Monday when their mail arrived and they found, not "greetings from Uncle Sam," but "greetings from the Property Assessment Administrator's Office" - "greetings" which meant a hefty increase in property assessments, sometimes four-fold over last year's assessment.

In an interview Tuesday, PVA Robert Cromer said that in about December of 1979, he received a letter from the State Department of Revenue Property Tax Division that said, in effect, for Mr. Cromer to either get property assessed to its fair cash value or they (the Department of Revenue) would stop his pay (Mr. Cromer's office is paid through the state), send a crew into Rockcastle County and make a complete assessment.

Mr. Cromer said that he felt he could better do the job then leave it up to the Department of Revenue, thus, the county-wide increases. Cromer said the main under-assessments were in properties which had not changed hands in years or new cases. He also said this was the first raise in real estate assessments in ten years in Rockcastle County.

But, do not despair too quickly, because there is a bright spot, Mr. Cromer said that HB 44 says, in effect, that county-wide, property tax can only generate 4% more in revenue in 1980 than in 1979 and this means that last year's \$5,574 per \$1,000 assessment rate will be lowered substantially, probably by at least one-half. The same ruling applies to the state tax rate, which last year was 27.6¢ per thousand and this rate will also be lower but how much is not certain.

About 50 property owners came into Mr. Cromer's office Monday to protest the increase

but by Tuesday, the number had dwindled considerably. If you wish, you may appear before the Assessment Appeals Board which will meet Tuesday, or come before this board, you must file notice with the Irene Bales, court clerk,

before hand. If you are not satisfied with the ruling of this board, you may then appear before the State Appeal Board which will meet in August.

The tax rate for 1980 will be set by Fiscal Court, probably at their August meeting.

Fiscal Court Meets

As the first order of business conducted by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday, settlement, presented by Carolyn Abney representing the Sheriff's office, was approved.

The court also, on the recommendation of County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker, approved pay raises for several employees and the employment of Paul Hansel as County Road Supervisor at an annual salary of \$10,000.

Those receiving raises included: truck drivers and grader operators, 15¢ an hour; Elmer Decker, janitor, \$25 per month; Anna Rose Mullins, secretary, 15¢ an hour; Floyd Owens, county treasurer, \$25 a month; James York, dog warden, \$25 per month and Williametta Cromer, ambulance service secretary, \$25 per month. All the raises are effective as of July 1, 1980.

The court also approved the hiring of three employees, effective July 1, 1980. They were: John Bullock, as janitor, at \$3.50 per hour; Charles Bussell, maintenance of county equipment, \$5 an hour and William Miller, laborer, at \$3.50 per hour.

Recommendations for sick leave and vacation policies were approved (effective July 1, 1980), as follows: five days sick leave with pay per year with a doctor's statement and five days vacation with pay per year after the first year's service for 1981-82, not to exceed two weeks.

Judge Thacker was also authorized by the court to borrow \$15,000 to be used at the Brodhead Fairgrounds for installation of lights and for miscellaneous expenses.

Two amendments to the new annual budget (in the form of unanticipated revenues) were also approved by the court. One check for \$704.40 was from the Dept. of Transportation, Energy Road Fund as money returned to the coal producing counties to be used for road repair and the other budget addition was for a check for \$181.61 from Title IV D State Child Support Unit.

Ninety-seven county residents showed up to donate and,

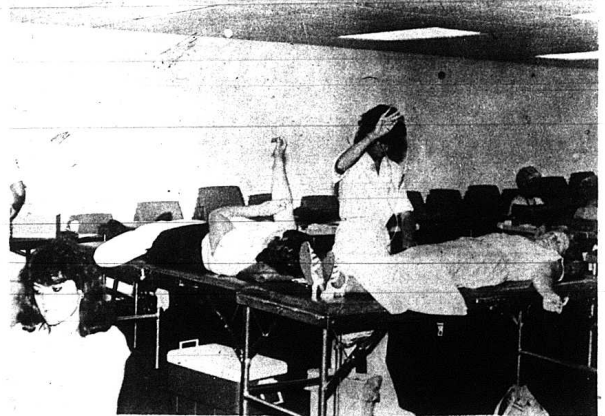
after proper screening, seventy-eight were eligible to donate.

Legislative Report

During every legislative session, there are issues which receive large amounts of attention, but still fail to be enacted.

The regular session of Kentucky's 1980 General Assembly was no different.

Although many hours were spent debating, amending and just plain haggling over these various topics, such well-publicized issues as professional negotiations for school teachers, the bottle bill and a bonus for Vietnam veterans did not reach final passage.

For the most part, Kentucky's General Assembly is a conservative body reflecting the fiber and voting habits of the Commonwealth's population. As a result, a bill is usually considered in two or three legislative sessions before it has a real chance of becoming law. There are exceptions to this rule, but very few.

Senate Bill 149, sought to allow public school teachers to bargain collectively with their respective boards of education. This bill defined a grievance procedure which included final and binding arbitration.

This legislation has been labeled the "P.N. bill." It has been introduced in one form or another during the last three legislative sessions.

Senate Bill 149 received action on the Senate floor. The vote resulted in a 19 for and 19 against tie. The Lt. Governor broke the tie with a "no" vote

and Senate Bill 149 died for the lack of one vote.

House Bill 809, better known as the "bottle bill" was introduced in both the House and Senate but failed to be passed out of committee.

The bottle bill seeks to require that beverages be sold in returnable containers and prohibits the sale of beverages in metal cans with detachable opening tabs. Of course, the

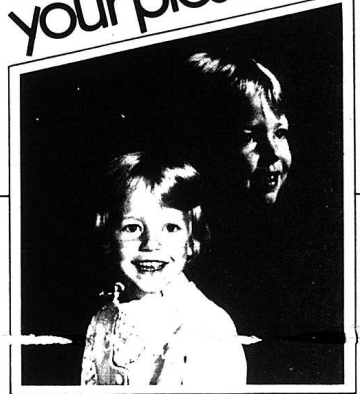
purpose here is to remove one source of litter.

The bottle bill has been introduced during every legislative session since 1976, but has always gathered more opposition than support. During the past session, I introduced the bottle bill, because it served to address an ever-increasing problem.

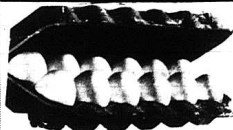

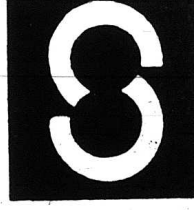

Salvaging Gone-By-Peas: If you let your peas get too mature so they've gone by the young- and tender stage ideal for fresh eating, freezing, or canning, don't despair. You can shell them out, blanch and freeze them, then use them only in soups and long-cooked dishes. Or you can blanch and dry them, following the directions for mature legumes in our publication, "Home Drying of Fruits and Vegetables."

Freezing or Drying Onions: If the green salad onions in your garden have grown to be great big onions, not as good any more in salads, you can do several things with them.

You can let them go on and mature further into dry bulb onions, then dry, or chop them. Or you can pull some of them now and freeze them. Wash and peel them, then blanch in boiling water for 1 1/2 minutes. Chill them in cold running water, drain well, package and freeze at once. These lose flavor after about 3 months in the freezer. Or you can dry these onions in your oven, dehydrating in the sun. Follow the directions given in our drying publication.

Anti-Darkening Dip for Canned Fruits: Apples, pears, apricots and peaches need this anti-darkening dip during preparation to keep their colors from darkening. Work with a small amount of fruit at a time. As soon as you peel and section them, drop pieces into a solution of 2 tablespoons each of salt and vinegar per gallon of water. Don't let the fruit soak for more than 15 to 20 minutes, or you'll lose some nutrients.

Treatment for Frozen Fruits: You can use this dip for frozen fruits during preparation. Then, to help the above fruits, strawberries and raspberries keep their natural color during freezer storage, add ascorbic acid. You can buy this in crystalline or powder form under various brand names in the canning and freezing section of your food store.

Dissolve ascorbic acid powder or crystals in the cold syrup before adding to fruit or in an unsweetened pack, sprinkle ascorbic acid powder or crystals over the fruit and mix thoroughly just before packing into containers.

Canning Tips on Peaches-Q: Is there any easy way to remove the peel from peaches? A. A reliable trick is to scald the peaches by dipping them in

boiling water for 1/2 to 1 minute. Follow this with a quick dunk in cold water. The loosened skins will slip right off. Note: Peaches prepared for freezing are less ragged if you omit this hot dip and peel them with a knife.

Q: Is there a quick, neat way to remove the peach pit? A. Cut both sides through to the stone, beginning at the stem and following the "crease". Hold with both hands and twist gently. For cling-stone varieties, use a special peach pitter.

Q: Must I scrape off the red or pink fiber left in the cavity after the pit is removed? A. Many people consider the brownish discoloration this fiber produces after storage to be unsightly, but it is not harmful.

Q: How can I prevent peaches from darkening during preparation? A. Drop cut and peeled peaches into a salt-vinegar solution. Use 2 tablespoons of each per gallon of water. Rinse off before packing. Or use ascorbic acid dissolved in water, following directions on package.

Q: My canned peach halves are full of air bubbles. Any suggestions? A. In most cases, boiling water or bath processing will remove the air bubbles. Peach halves are an exception, since air held in the cavities remains trapped. To remedy this problem, run a #10 gently over the inside of the jar before adjusting lids for processing.

Q: How many peaches do you need to make a quart? A. It takes approximately 3 pounds of fresh fruit for one quart of canned peaches.

Atheist, Madalyn Murray O'Hair's Son Repents

The following article was published in Jefferson Today, San Antonio, Texas and was sent to us by a friend. We wanted to share it with our readers who, like we, are appalled at the success Mrs. O'Hair has had in propagating her atheism.

"A son of atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair renounced his mother's organization last week and apologized for his part in the suit that ended prayer in public schools.

"Looking back on the 33 years of life I wasted without faith and without God, I pray that I may be able to correct just some of the wrongs I have created," William Murray of Houston said in a letter published in the Austin American Statesman.

Murray, then 16, was plaintiff in the 1963 litigation that led to a ban on classroom prayers. He said, "the part I played as a teenager in removing prayer from public schools was criminal."

"I removed from our future generations that short time each day which should rightly be reserved for God. As much as we suit to destroy the tradition of prayer in school was brought in my name, I feel gravely responsible for the resulting destruction of the moral fiber

of our youth that it has caused," he said. Murray, 33, also apologized to the people of Austin for helping build his mother's "person's empire."

"My efforts to that end were an affront to the people of Austin, the people of this nation and to God," he said.

"My crime was two-fold in that I was aware of the wrong that I committed at the time and continued them for the purpose of my financial profit. I was continuing and practicing the hateful and anti-moral way of life I had learned from birth in an atheist home," Murray said. He said he felt deep regret for "strengthening Madalyn Murray O'Hair's society and moving it from a falling-down, three-room house to a modern, staffed office complex."

He added the idea that he lowered himself to editing her anti-God magazine, Murray said.

Kentucky: White bass fair at night and early and late in the lake; in tailwaters, catfish fair to good, sauger fair; clear, stable at one foot above pool and 81 degrees.

Barkley: White bass fair in the jumps; in tailwaters, white bass slow, clear, stable at pool and 81 degrees.

Barren: Black bass good at night casting spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off steep banks; white bass fair in the jumps and by trolling medium runners over the flats; clear, stable at one foot above pool and 79 degrees.

Rough River: Black Bass fair at night casting artificial nightcrawlers off steep points and banks; bluegill fair around stick ups; white bass fair in the jumps in South Fork; clear, stable at pool and 79 degrees.

Nolin: Bluegill slow off deep banks; black bass slow at night casting spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off steep points; clear to murky to muddy, stable at one foot above pool and 80 degrees.

Green: White bass fair in the jumps early and late; black bass slow at night off points and steep banks; in tailwaters, trout fair; clear, stable at pool and 80 degrees.

Harrington: White bass slow in the jumps; bluegill slow off steep banks; drum, black bass and catfish slow still fishing soft craws off points; clear, stable at 6.5 feet below pool and

82 degrees. Cumberland: White bass and crappie slow to fair (better in lower lake) night fishing off deep banks; crappie fair to good (but small) drift fishing in coves; black bass fair at night off rocky points in upper lake; walleye slow trolling deep runners off points in lower lake; in tailwaters, trout excellent with several limits; clear, falling, 10 feet below timberline and 78 degrees.

Dale Hollow: Black bass fair casting artificial nightcrawlers and jigs around weed beds and off deep banks at night; white bass slow in the jumps; clear, falling, one foot below pool and 80 degrees.

Laurel: Trout good night fishing off deep banks; black bass good at night casting spinner baits and artificial nightcrawlers off points; bluegill fair in coves; clear, stable at five feet below pool and 78 degrees.

Cave Run: Crappie fair off mud banks; musky slow casting medium runners in upper lake coves; black bass slow casting artificial nightcrawlers off deep points and banks; clear, stable at pool and 78 degrees.

Buckhorn: Crappie fair over submerged cover; bluegill fair off deep banks; clear, stable at one foot below pool and 82 degrees.

Fishtrap: Crappie slow over submerged cover and around drop offs; clear, stable at one foot below pool and 80 degrees.

Dewey: Crappie slow around stick ups; clear, stable at one foot below pool and 78 degrees.

"We thought last year would be our worst year," said Curci, "but I think most of the older teams on our schedule were down too. We didn't play anybody like Oklahoma and Alabama last year and we've got both of them on our schedule this season. Our schedule has improved more than we have."

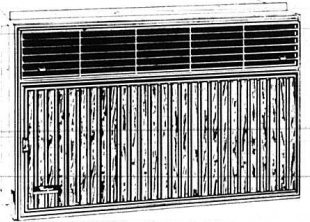
Curci points out that forty of the seventy-one players on the squad last season were freshmen. But shouldn't that make Kentucky a better team this year? "We'll be better offensively," says Curci, "but we'll be much weaker on defense. Our defensive team did a great job last season. Defensively, we were second to Alabama in the conference and Alabama won the national championship. We're really hurtin' at linebacker and defensive end this season and we just don't have anybody like Richard Daffie to put at nose guard."

Curci calls his incoming freshman class a "good group" and says they will have to offer help in some key positions right away. Two starters that were being counted on this season are, at best, doubtful. Shawn Donigan, the burly fullback, is nursing an injury and Curci calls him very doubtful for this season. Don Fielder who started at defensive end last season is sitting out a one semester suspension and is definitely lost for the coming campaign.

Football coaches always seem to get gloomy between seasons. Fran Curci isn't known to make rash statements either, but I found it a little disconcerting to call to get his reaction to being ranked ninth in the S.E.C. and to get the response, "We should be tenth."

sought to amend Kentucky's

Constitution to give the General Assembly the power to establish a state lottery, which is a form of gambling. The bill was going nowhere until it was amended to establish an annual state lottery on the Kentucky Derby, with part of the proceeds being allotted as a one-time bonus for Vietnam veterans.

The legislature felt that the Vietnam veterans were being used as leverage to legalize gambling in the Commonwealth. Kentucky's 1980 General Assembly did not support legalized gambling nor did it

favor the manner in which a bonus for Vietnam veterans was manipulated.

In July, the legislature's interim committees will begin to devise a method of giving our Vietnam veterans a bonus without having to legalize gambling. Vietnam veterans are the only veterans who have not received a bonus, and for too long they have been our forgotten soldiers.
