# What Is Adult Responsibility When Children Take Drugs

For years, people in rural pockets of America have read about and seen pictures depicting the dirty drug abuse problem in cities like New York, Chicago, Detroit, Los Angeles and other heavily populated areas. The mental picture most small town people conjured up stimulated both fear and relief - fear that

people conjured up stimulated both fear and relief - fear that such a dafagerous substance had penetrated American society and relief that the big cities, with their drug and crime problems, where far away.

Many of us tend to think that drugs and drug abuse are new While they may be relatively new here, in the 1800's, English novelist, George Eliot, wrote Silas Marner, a short novel which included a laudanum (10% opium in alcohol and water) addicted

What is new about drugs is the rapid, wildfire spread of their use-numberwise, locationwise and agreeise in the Cut dents begin to become sarchously involved with drugs and their abuse, it becomes a serious and sobering concern. We can blame whomever and whatever we choose in trying to fligure out why youngsters experiment and get hooked on drugs, but the real blame lies with the adult pushers and providers who are making money by placing in the hands of children, potential death when we have the word "pusher", we think of the stereotype viruse? who comes from fair to corrupt our community. We don't want to believe the fact that local parents, grandparents and fairly respected citizens-in the community are making a living from selling various drugs to school children who are sorreading their use to other children and thereby increasing emmand.

living from seming various and thereby intreasing semanding their use to other children and thereby intreasing semand.

Young people are particularly vulnerable, being introduced to drugs by friends, not sellers or "pushers." It is sometimes tough to refuse favor or a dare from a friend it is harder still to resist a group and perhaps be the only holdout in a gang or otherwise harmless social group. But, these are often the settings for the introduction of illegal drugs including alcoholwhich often paves the way for experimenting with the last few years voice relief that here they were invited and encouraged to practice of drugs, but the "peer pressure" or demand to do so was not nearly as strong as they had experienced in other schools. Other local high school students indicate they experienced more drug encouragement as freshmen. Some believe there is more "drug talk" at school than actual use on school grounds but many youths are concerned about friends,

ienced more drug encouragement as freshmen. Some belleve there is more 'drug talk' at school than actual use on school grounds but many youths are concerned about friends, acquaintances and team members, whom they realize are heading for problems connected with drugs whether taken at school or elsewhere. These have voiced their concern to their ministers, doctors, mental health agencies, newspapers and even to the grand jury.

Marijuana is one of the more popular drugs and several years ago was thought to be relatively harmless in comparison to other types of drugs because it is not addictive. Recently, however, short term experiments have shown that marijuana is more harmful to the lungs and throat than tobacco. Time and space may seem distorted to the smoker and he or she has trouble-remembering—what just happened which leads to problems in thinking and talking. Could this—and other mind-bending drug use be a factor to consider in the highly publicized fact that increasingly high school students cannot read or write?

We have all become guinea pigs at best, being experimented upon by medical science in the constant bombardment of our bodies with prescribed an thus "accepted" drugs. Only now are we beginning to realize the tragic results of some of these drugs such as DES.

To a generation which grew up with the term "miracle drugs." it may be hard to convince them now that drugs they use do not produce miracles, but how can anyone say it is not our responsibility to try?

A bill is being drafted to
give sheriffs an expense allowsince for collecting taxes. Under
this plan a sheriff would receive
an expense allowance of \$1,200
if he collected 95 percent of a
county's taxes and on up to
\$6,000 for collecting 99 percent.
Sheriffs collecting less than 95
percent of a county's taxes
would not receive any expense
allowance.

Also, the subcommittee is
studying the possibility of requesting additional appropriations for the Department of
Revenue so that county map
ping projects can be completed
by July 1, 1984.

The County Finance sub-committee will review these bill drafts and perhaps add some modifications. After this pro-cess its completed the legislation will be considered by the inter-in joint committee for Counties and Special Districts. If the full interim committee approves the bills, they will then be pre-filed for the 1982 legislative session.
