## Rockcastle Health Department Aiming for <br> District Organization by July 1

The Rockcastle County Health Department should be part of a district program by
July 1, 1981, according to Steve Midkiff, Sanitarian for the department.

Midkiff said that he was told by now administrator of cold by now administrator of that Frankfort was shooting for the July 1st date, apparently because this is the date on which the fiscal year will begin.

Rockcastle's Health De partment will be part of a district comprised of at least eight. There are two counties at the present. Clay and Jackson. Midkiff said that it is not definite on the number of counties that will go into the district besides Rockcastle but Midkiff
said that he felt like there said that he
would be more.
'I don't thinternare.
their right mind can predict that we will get more money by going with the District," Midkiff said, "but if we had refused to go along with the state and not went into the district we would of had $25 \%$ of our state funds cut.

Midkiff said that one of the biggest advantages of the district will be that the health department will be getting some more part-time help that they could not have afforded stayed within the county system. He also said that the department might receive more Federal money because the Federal Government gives more money to Districts than to little county systems.

Midkiff said that each health district will have a supervisor that will watch over
the separate counties to make sure the departments are being operated efficiently and effect
ively and have no problems. "It's better than closing the doors." Midkiff said, "but if we way whe open and operate the any of our state and federal funds cut I'd rather not be in the (Cont'd to P-10)

'The terms of these mort gages are more complicated than the traditional mortgage understand each type thorough ly to determine the mortgag that will best suit his or he needs before signing," noted Attorney General Steven L. Beshear.
Flexible rate mortgages permit the lender to raise o the life of the loan. There are two types of flexible rate mort gages-renegotiable-rate mort gages and variable-rate mort gages The renegotiable-rate
mortgages are issued for a term mortgages are issued for a term specific rate. At the end of the specified period the mortgage can be renewed for another three to five years at a higher of lower rate. The lender is re quired to automatically renew
the loan and give the borrower 90 days notice of changes in the interest rate. The unhappy homebuyer has the opportunity to seek more favorable interes rates with another lender The second type of flexible mortgage is the variable-rat
mortgage. These mortgages are indexed to the rate lenders must pay for money they lend and can change as often as every six months. This type mortgage should not be used by anyone who budget does not have room ing outlay.

The graduated paymen loans make it easier for the first-time home-buyers to acquire a house. Montly payments are lower initially and rise each at an amount higher than the borrower would pay for a stand ard, fixed-rate loan. For ex ample, a $\$ 50,000$ loan issued at 14 percent would cost th consumer $\$ 461$ the first yea compared to $\$ 592$ with a annually until the monthly pay ment reaches $\$ 616$

The third type of mortgage is the shared appreciation mori gage which allows the borrowe to lower the interest rate by an agreed-upon percentage in ex of the house's appreciation when the house is sold. These mortgages are advantageous to young buyers enabling them to purchase more house than they could affort on the fired-rat mortgage and advantageous afford big payments and who
expect to own their house the However, one should be aware that a mortgage agree ment of this type might state that the lender can collect his or

Although the Bluegrass re gion continues to have the low est unemployment in Kentucky the number of persons seeking jobs in the area has risen steadDepartment for Human Resources statistics show.

March labor force estimates placed the area's unemploypent at 7 perent of the laby force.
'"This doesn't sound like much when you compare it to other counties which regularly have rate of 10 percent and above, but it is high for the Bluegrass," said Bob MacDonald, chief labor marked analyst or the Human Resources De partment.

In March 1980, the unemployment rate in the Bluegrass was 4.6 perfent. MacDonald said the area's rate has been around 4 percent for the past severa years.

We believe this is an indication that the recession has hit the Bluegrass," MacDonald ex plained. "Because Lexington is a regional trade center and inflation is cuasing consumer to buy less, the metropolitan area has suffered job losses in vice industrieg
