Almost an Accident

Three train engines and 17 coal cars passed over the body of Fortner Junior "J.R." Mink, 57, of Mt. Vermon about 1½ miles north of the railroad crossing on Richmond Street, according to Charles Hurd, policeman for the city of Mt. vernon.

Ironically, Mink came out

Carol Bertram received class 2 injuries and was transferred to the St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington for treatment.



Warehouses selling by the pound were limited to 340,200 pounds per day, per set of buyers.

Any warehouse exceeding the daily poundage quota by more than 2,000 pounds will be forced to switch to basket sales, according to a committee resolution. The overage will be deducted from its first sale the

following season.

Committee members Ansel Herndon of Danville and Gene Rose of Owenton dissented in the voting, saying central Kentucky harkets needed an earlier starting date.

"This crop is anywhere from 10 days to two weeks early," said Herndon, adding that many farmers, fearing theft, already are hauling leaf

"There's going to be a terrific jam, in my opinion, before Christmas," added Rose, an officer of Lexington Loose Leaf Tobacco Warehouse. "Poundwise, there will be a lot less tobacco bought before the

Clay, a Mount Sterling Sterling sterling sterling that central Kentucky markets face a serious problem selling bales and sheets of leaf.

"You're gota-

"You're going to be in a block from beginning to end" and, possibly, only half the crop will be sold before Christmas," Clay said.

y said. Bales and sheets are especially popular in central Ken-tucky, where crops tend to be larger, Rose said. In areas where crops are smaller, leaf is sold mostly in hand-tied bundles. in traditional.

Warehouses by law are limited in the number of floor "spaces" from which leaf can be sold. Warehouses can pack up to

700 pounds of bundled tobacco in each space, congarred to 400.
pounds of baled tobacco and 100
to 200 pounds of leaf in sheets.
"This makes a big difference in the amount that can be

sold," Rose said.

Forty percent of the burley sold in Lexington last year was

baled, Rose said. He predicted that would increase to 60 percent this year. For the first time, an unlimited quantity of baled burley has been approved for federal price supports. The supports have not been extend-ed to sheets, however.





Descendants of pioneer Benjamin VanHook, buried near Brodhead, recently erected a memorial marker at the gravesties of Benjamin and his wife Susannah and about 30 other graves of family members. Benjamin was born in 1786 in Virginia and was captured by the Indians at Ruddles Station with his father Samuel VanHook in about 1781. Indians scalped his mother, Hannah, and took the father and son north to

Detroit. They escaped some four years later and made their way back to Kentucky. Most of the VanHooks of Laurel and Pulaski Counties are descendants of Benjamin who reared two families having a total of 19 children. Shown beside the marker are from left, Charles, Helton, Wayne VanHook, of Somerset and former Rockcastle County resident and W.E. Helton. The Heltons live in Lincoln County.

Memorial Stone Erected At Brindle Ridge In Memory of Benjamin J. VanHook and Wife

A memorial stone has been crected at Brindle Ridge to mark the homestead and grave stees of Benjamin J. VanHook and his second wife, Susannah Higgins KanHook and about 30 other of the county's earliest settlers, many of whom it is believed were members of the VanHook family.

The marker, bought and erected by descendants of this Benjamin VanHook was placed on the site last week. Benjamin was born in 1768 in Virginia, the son of Samuel and Hannah Higgins VanHook. His long life was doubtlessly one filled with adventure, hardship and daring. Benjamin-lived to be 86 years old, dying in 1854 near Brodhead.

His father, Samuel, however, was a frontiersman and Revolutionary War soldier as tough as any of his time. According to Illinios Historical Society records and other documentation. Samuel Van-

According to Illinois Historical. Society records and other documentation, Samuel Vandock with George Rogers Clark when he and 127 backwoodsmen captured Vincennes on the Wabash River in February of 1779. "When a powerful British force followed him and recaptured Vincennes, Clark and his followers doubled

back for a surprise attack across 180 miles of frigid swampland. "The floods that winter had driven all the game from the forest and Clark's men soon ran out of food. Wading for days at a time through freezing shoulder-deep water, the expedition took a week to cover the last 9 miles before Vincennes. But Clark's approach was so unexpected that the British commandant capitulated on February 25, 1779." (1).

Samuel VanHook was 46 years old at the time and already' had a distinguished service record having served in the Milittis since 1774.

Samuel was born in 1733 in New Jersey and migrated at an early age to North Carolina and Virginia with an uncle and some cousins. In Virginia, records show land transactions and his marriage to Hannah Higgins. It was in Virginia that Benjamin and other children were born.

According to former Somerset lawyer and judge, Ben VanHook Smith, now deceased (descendant of Samuel via Benjamin), the wife and Mother, Hannah and her son Benjamin "were trying to call the cows and she had climbed a tree so her voice would carry when Indians sneaked up and killed her with a tomahawk."

(2) They captured the boy and his father and took them north to Detroit. Admilring the courage and endurance of the two, the Indians adopted the boy and gradually gave Samuel more and more freedom. He and the boy found the opportunity and made their escape south, mostly, by following waterways. They returned to Bryants Station in 1784 or 1785, according to Samuel's deposition.

The deposition reads as follows: "In the Spring of

1784 or 1785, according to Samuel's deposition.

The deposition reads as follows: "In the Spring of seventy nine, I settled here, in the year eighty, in the winter after Christmas, I moved to Martin's Station, taken prison in June following and I returned in four or five years. I don't recollect which, but I believe about four years and 2 months..." (2)

Mr. W.E. Helton and his son, Charles, of Route 3, Crab Orchard, Ky., descendants of Samuel and Benjamin heard a slightly different story concerning the particulars of the capture. Hannah, her son and husband were in a field-of tobacco when the "attack occurred, according to recounted versions of the capture they haveheard. Other children were safe at the fort.

Records also show he petitioned the Virginia State Legislature to make Kentucky a state. Young Benjamin VanHook married thirteen year old Frances Higgins around 1787. Frances was his first cousin, the daughter of his dead mother's brother. To the marriage were born nine children: Samuel (whom many descendants. in this area are of the lineage), Hannah, Elizabeth, Peggy, Polly, Benjamin, Jr., Frances, Nancy and Thomas.
Frances died after 20 years of marriage at the age of 33. Benjamin them married his dead wife's sister, Susannah Higgins, another first- cousin. Their marriage is recorded in Pulaski County and dated 10-21-1808. (Rockcastle County was not made a county until 1810 and was formed from several surrounding counties including Pulaski.) To this marriage was born 10 morg-children: Martin, Sarah, Lydia, Rebekah, Hariet, Eliza Jane, James H., Susan, John Larkin and Nancy, (Rockcastle County resident Shirley Riddle is a descendant via Eliza Jane. It is no mistake

that a daughter by each wife was named Nancy. Possibly the elder one died at an early age.)

ed out all but the hardy. Although a party might sart out in wagons, most of the route was fit only for pack animals. Hundreds of miles of walking lay ahead. In packsaddles, one on each side of a horse, small children could ride swaddled in bedding. Babies were carried in held middles on their mothers' arms, and those too sick to walk were carried in litters. Some migrants rode pack animals, but most walked, carrying part of the load.

Rain added to the missries of the trail. "Languaged by wet shoes were common, without wagons, the travelers slept outdoors, the women unloading the packborses each night and setting up makeshift shelters of blankets. In wet weather, neighter bedding northing was ever dry. Babies and small children must have presented special problems for although clothing could be washed in creeks, it could not be dried in a rainy Kentucky spring or fall.

The further the migrants went, the more tedious the food seemed. A diet of meat, often without affected even the root of the work of all the solitude of the wilderness oppressed them. One account tells that the silence affected even these difficulties were trivial compared to the threat of Indians or winter. Because

trivial compared to the threat of Indians or winter. Because Indians were more active in the summer, many parties of immigrants started out in early

immigrants started out in early fall, with the goal of arriving in Kentucky before cold weather. Winter on the journey was dreaded almost as much as Indians. In the bitter winter of

1779-1780, cattle froze, sheep died from eating ivy, ice formed in minutes on travelers fording creeks, the Kentucky River froze two feet deep, and dear and buffalo starved in the

forests.






In January, 1978, Ernie returned to Somerset, where he was associated with John crather in the general practice of law for over three years.

CHANGE IN BURLEY WEIGHING PROCEDURES

There is a major change in the weighing procedures for burley tobacco this year according to Agriculture Com-missioner Alben W. Barkley, II. In previous years, the department's division of

In previous years, the department's division of weights and measures has set only one tare for each scale, Barkley said. This year, because burley producers are preparing tobacco for market in so many forms, the division will allow more than one tare.

For example, there may be a tare for baskets, pallets' or sheets.

"It will be the responsibilit will be the responsibility of the warehouse to see that the correct tare is used for each method of sale," Barkley said. "But I want to emphasize to the farmers that they should check

the tare also. Since this is new, it may be easy to forget to change the tare for a different

method."
The different tares will be
print in the outside of each
scale house, and farmers should
check with the weighman to
make sure the proper tare is

being taken.

Also, Barkley said, the Burley Sales Committee voted to get uniformity of marketing considering all burley containers as baskets for the containers as baskets for the purpose of allocating selling time and the number of baskets per warehouse. Baskets, sheets, bales, pallets or any other units will count as baskets.







Kentucky farmers should

it tests for fall fertilization. soil tests for fall fertilization. Soil samples taken now are going to give farmers a reading when the soil is under the greatest stress because of the bleeding effect that fall harvest-od crops have had on soil nutrients. Sampling now gives an advantage in that soil testing laboratories traditionally, are not as busy at this time of the year as they are prior to spring planting.

year as they are prior to spring planting.

Lime that is needed is easier to get applied in the fall and the lime has more time to dissolve and increase the pH before next year's crop comes on. When soil tests indicate a on When soil tests indicate a need for phosphate and potash, this is also a good time to apply because it usually costs less than if you wait until spring. There is a better chance that the weather will be good for spreading during the fall and P and K are not likely to be lost during the winter. Tobacco growers should consider fall fertilization to their ground before the winter cover crop is planted. As soon as the tobacco is harvested, soil samples should be taken to

determine if lime and other nutrients are needed. If lime is recommended, put it on before disking tobacco stuble. This will cause a better reaction with the soil. Fertilizing now will also help reduce the risk of manganese toxicity in tobacco

Even If you do not fertilize this fall, go ahead and take soil sample now so you will know what materials will be needed later. Soil sample containers are available in the County Extension Office.

Freshly picked pears that are mature, but still green and hard, will keep from 2 to 7 months.

Potatoes That Turn Green
There have been lots of
questions lately about Irish

turns the skin green.
Sometimes a poisonous
crystalline material called "solanine" forms in these greenskin areas of the potato. It gives
