**ORDINANCE NO. 160** 

The Board of Trustees of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, do Ordain as Follows:

SECTION 1: Any and all persons owning real pro-perty in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, or any interest therein, or any lessee of real property therein, or any person or persons, having charge or control over any real property in said Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, shall be, and is hereby required to keep buildings thereon clear and free from debris and the yards and premises clear and free of debris, weeds, briers and other growth that may become combustible when dry and create a fire hazard to the buildings located thereon or adjoining property and building.

SECTION 3: All persons owning real property in Mt. Vermon, Kentucky, or any interest therein, or any lessee of real property or any person or persons who have charge or control over any real property located in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, shall keep the said premises clear and free from boxes, cans, crates, pa-per, lumber, parts of discarded kutomobiles and the name and there more the said property adjuding thereto a liev, or on property adjuding thereto.




