The House of Representatives has seen 1,021 bills and 115 resolutions introduced and the Senate has discretional the Senate has 150 resolutions. By most accounts the 1,021 bills introduced in a bills in the House of Representatives is the most ever introduced in a single session of the state legislature.

The House of Representatives has passed 181 bills and resulutions, the Senate has passed 153 and 132 have been passed by both Houses.

has passed 153 and 132 have been passed by both Houses. And, of that number the governor has signed 56 bills into law.

Although the 1984 ses-sion has been very busy, with only seventeen days to

with only seventeen days to go, there are many very im-portant issues still to be addressed by the legislature. For example, the state budget has yet to be voded on by either house. Also, still to be addressed are several education .reform bills and the governor's ever changing revenue pro-posals.
