





What does high blood pressure do to your body? High blood pressure adds to the workload of the heart and arteries. The heart must carre the arteries must carre preater pressure. If high blood pressure continues for a long time, the heart and the arteries may not function as well as they should and other body organs may also be affected. There is increased risk of stroke, heart failure, kidney failure and heart attack.

How do you know if you have high blood pressure Most people with high blood pressure have no symptoms at all. There are no specific warning signs.
