Lamero man shot to death Sunday near Livingston

A Lamero man is dead and another local man has been charged with murder.

Farley Newcomb, 45, of Route 2, Livingston was arrested last Tuesday morning by Kentucky State Trooper Jimmie Silvers after turning himself in at the Rockcastle County Jail, according to Rockcastle County Sheriff William Taylor.

Taylor said that a murder warrant was sworn-out for Newcomb after a two-day investigation by State Police Detective Roy Wheat into the Sunday morning shooting death of Ernest Humphrey Singleton.

According to Sheriff Taylor, the circumstances leading up to the death of Singleton were as follows:

At approximately 4 a.m. Sunday morning, Singleton and Tim Boshears of Red Hill were apparently traveling toward Livingston on the Red Hill road when they had a collision on Gaultey Mountain with another vehicle reportedly driven by Robert Earl Newcomb of Livingston.

Taylor said that after the vehicles collided, both of them stopped and Robert Earl Newcomb and Farley Newcomb, who was reportedly a passenger in the car, got out and pulled Boshears from the truck in which he was riding with Singleton.

The Sheriff said that

while Boshears was apparently involved in a scuffle with one of the men, he heard a gun go off near the truck where Singleton was still sitting behind the steering wheel.

Boshears told police that he was let up from the ground after the shot and that he then ran over the hill to hide.

Taylor said that Boshears went to the home of Sandy Clark and she phoned police.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said that the preliminary report from an autopsy, performed on Singleton at the U.K. Medical Center in Lexington Monday, indicated that Sin-

gleton died from a close contact penetrating gunshot wound to the chest. Dowell said the murder weapon was probably a small caliber handgun.

Newcomb was released after filling a \$10,000 bond. Singleton was born July 1, 1943 in Rockcastle County, the son of Homer and Vivian Bullock Singleton and was a member of the Freewill Baptist Church in Ohio.

Besides his parents, he is survived by his wife, Mrs. Sharon Singleton; four sons, Ernest William, James Arthur, Eric Daniel and Joseph Robert Singleton, all of Lamero; his paternal

Brodhead man killed in one vehicle accident

A Brodhead man became the first fatality of 1984 on Rockcastle County roads when he died in a one vehicle accident on Hwy. 1505, 5 miles north of Brodhead, last Wednesday night around 7:30, according to Kentucky State Police at the London post.

James A. Northern, 27, of Brodhead was killed instantly when he was thrown from a vehicle in which he was a passenger, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

Dowell said that Northern died from massive head injuries.

The police report on file at the post, said that the vehicle in which Northern was riding, was driven by Ricky Dale Bussell, 26, of Route 1, Brodhead.

According to police, Bussell's vehicle, a vehicle being driven by Mike DeBorde of Mt. Vernon, was traveling south, side by side, at a high rate of speed.

Police said that eyewitnesses said that DeBorde and Bussell went into a sharp left hand curve and

that Bussell failed to negotiate the curve and drove his car over a steep embankment.

Northern was dead at the scene. Bussell was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital where he was treated and released. However, police said that Bussell was later arrested by Brodhead City Policeman Bill Lawrence for public drunkenness and lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail.

Northern was born February 19, 1957 in Madison County, the son of Leonard Northern of Brodhead and the late Hettie Dyer Northern.

Survivors besides his father are his stepmother, Mrs. Geneva Martin Norton.

Holley sentenced to 31 years

A sentence totaling 31 years in the Kentucky State Penitentiary was handed out last Friday in Rockcastle Circuit Court by Circuit Judge Dan Venters against Denver Earl, Holley of London.

Holley pleaded guilty to manslaughter for the May 1983 deaths of three members of a Rockcastle County family in a traffic accident on Interstate 75.

Mis-trial granted in McCowan murder trial

Rockcastle County Circuit Judge Dan Venters granted a mistrial last Friday in Circuit Court in the murder trial of Robert Jackson McCowan of Lamero.

A mistrial was granted after McCowan's attorney, Gary Crabtree of London, filed a motion asking that the trial be thrown out because of a story in the April 26th issue of the Mt. Vernon Signal concerning the case.

A majority of the jurors told Venters that they had read the story which included some of the circumstances surrounding the case.

According to a spokesman for the Circuit Clerk's office, a new trial date has been set at which time a new jury will be selected. The trial was already in its third day when it was ruled void.

Fiscal court to apply for grant for new fire truck

It will be at least three months, and possibly never, before the citizens in Western Rockcastle County will have a new fire truck to protect their homes from fire.

During the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court meeting Tuesday morning, two motions were made to get Brodhead a fire truck and both of them failed.

Third District Magistrate Alex Albright made a motion to borrow the money to buy a fire truck and to pay it back, possibly with a grant from the Cumberland Valley Area Development District. The motion died for lack of a second.

Fifth District Magistrate Joe Clark then made a motion to buy a new truck if the grant was approved. That motion also failed.

Rockcastle County Judge Executive Bob Jasper told the some 25 concerned citizens gathered at the meeting that the county was going to apply for a grant of \$35,000 to buy a truck but that it could not be submitted until July 1st.

Jasper said that, if approved, the money would come through the area development district.

"I am a member of that committee down there. I think our chances are very good of getting that grant," Jasper said. "I know a lot of those people down there and have never been turned down when I asked for money to help the county," he added.

Several members of the committee formed during a

public meeting a few weeks ago at Brodhead were present at the meeting and they, as well as some members of the Brodhead Fire Department, had suggestions of their own as to what could be done about the problem.

Deputy Fire Chief DeeAlva Bussell and others suggested to the court that they borrow the money now and buy a truck so that people would not have to wait another three or four months. That suggestion prompted Albright's motion but that was all the action taken on the suggestion. Albright represents most of the area concerned.

"This is a serious matter, you can put off taking money to build a county road somewhere but you can't put off putting out a fire and maybe saving someone's life," said James "Doc" Brown, a member of the committee.

First District Magistrate Donald Rowe agreed with Brown. "What if a child is burnt up in a county fire," Rowe said. "I think a county this size with a budget of almost a million dollars could surely afford a \$50,000 fire truck he said.

When Magistrate Clark's motion was on the floor, the County Judge told told members of the court that a motion such as Clark's could hurt the chances of the grant being approved. "I was just on the phone with the Director of the Development District before I came in here to this meeting and he seemed to think we would not have any problem getting the grant,"

Jasper said. "I'll give a thousand dollars out of my pocket if that grant fails to help buy a truck, instead of putting my county in bad financial shape," the judge said.

The Judge's secretary Anna Rose Mullins told the court that the county was going to have to borrow money to make it until July 1st as it was and if another payment such as one on a fire truck had to be made, there was no way the county could pay it.

After the two motions failed, Joe Clark told those gathered that if the grant applications failed, they would get a fire truck. "I promise that we will get you a fire truck if we don't get that grant," Clark vowed.

However, Judge Jasper told the group that if the grant failed, he wanted to get back together with the committee and try to figure something else out. "Surely, there are 40 or 50 people out there that would give a \$1,000 a piece for a fire truck."

When Clark told the group that they would get their fire truck no matter what, they wondered aloud why the court, if they could borrow the money later, couldn't borrow it now so that the county would have the fire protection it needed.

When the hour-long discussion, without any formal action, finally drew to a close, DeeAlva Bussell told the court to not be surprised when they got a call in the next day or two that the Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department was unable to make county runs any longer because their truck was no longer safe to drive.

Roy Brown, president of the Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District, was present at the meeting with local soil conservationist Davin Stipes who requested that the county include some additional funding in next year's budget for the Soil Conservation office. Stipes and Brown asked the county to supplement their budget \$2,000 so that they could purchase some new equipment for the office. Stipes said that his office had been without a typewriter for several months. However, the court did not take any action on the mat-

ter but did promise to look into the matter further.

The court did approve a tentative budget for the Rockcastle County Jail, presented to them by County Treasurer Floyd Owens. The budget will run over \$114,000 for 1984-85.

Second District Magistrate Tom Denny made a motion to pay the county grader operators \$4.75 per hour only when they were actually running a grader

Baby killed in bizarre incident near Interstate 75

A twelve-month old baby girl was killed early Wednesday morning in a bizarre incident on U.S. 25 near Interstate 75 at Burr, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

Dowell said that Katherine Roberta Pettit of College Park, Georgia, died around 4:45 a.m. at the Rockcastle County Hospital from massive head injuries she received in the accident.

Kentucky State Police said Wednesday that the baby's mother, Kathy E. Pettit, 25, also of College Park, Georgia, was arrested and placed in the Rockcastle County Jail and charged with second degree manslaughter.

Police said the events leading up to the death of

the child were apparently as follows: the mother was hitchhiking on U.S. 25 when she left the baby in a ditch line, 25 feet from the roadway, and got into a car. She traveled about three-quarters of a mile before getting out the car and walking back to where she had left the baby. When she returned, the baby had crawled onto the roadway and been struck by a motorist, who said he thought the baby was a small box lying in the road.

Dowell said that the body was taken to the U.K. Medical Center for an autopsy.

Ms. Pettit's bond has been set at \$10,000 and a preliminary hearing has been scheduled.

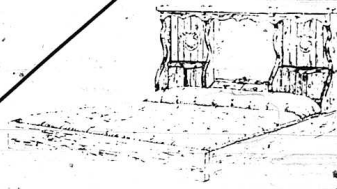

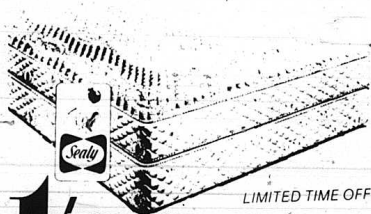

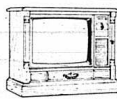

Labels, Labels, Labels

Anywhere you look, you will find labels. They are on clothes, food, furniture, appliances, household items and beauty aids. Their purpose is not decorative but rather to guide the consumer when he or she is making a purchase.

Labels may be sewn, glued or tied to merchandise or printed on an article or on a band or wrapper enclosing it. Sometimes the product is hidden by packaging, making the label the only way to find out about the contents.

Labels are used to identify products. Food labels should tell what is in the package, the style of pack, any seasonings added to food, the net contents, and the percentage of ingredients in decreasing order.

Labels are good guides for making comparisons. To get the most for your money, it may be necessary to read and compare labels, then try some comparisons for quality in your home.

The Fair Packaging and Label Act requires that labels provide certain information: Labels must:

- Identify the product, and include the name and address of the manufacturer.
- Have net contents listed in units of quantity.
- Not contain misleading phrases.
- List ingredients in order of amounts.
- Identify the generic family name.

There are similar acts which provide guidelines for wool and fur products, flammable fabrics, textile fibers, drugs and cosmetics. The Federal Hazardous Substance Act requires warning labels on any product that may be harmful in any way.

Not only must the labels contain certain information, but they themselves must meet certain standards. They must not ravel during laundering or dry-cleaning and must remain legible for the "reasonable life" of the garment. They must be permanently fixed in the corner back neckline or waistband.

When you buy a product, make sure it has a guarantee or warranty and then record the date that you purchased it. Many times, your warranty is void without this.

It is the consumer's responsibility to read and understand labels and refer to them for making comparisons, follow the use and care, instructions on the labels and refuse to buy products not labeled or with poor descriptions.

Always buy from reputable, reliable dealers and keep and refer to labels for operation, use, care and repair or replacement of parts. It pays to develop skills in reading and comparing labels.

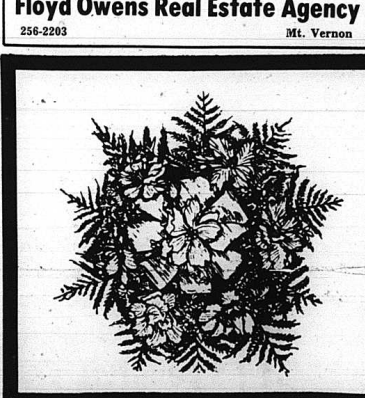

The Rockcastle County Hospital is fortunate to have employees who display an attitude of caring and kindness in performing their hospital duties. Many of these professionals are people you have grown up with or live close to.

National Hospital Week is May 6 - 12 and the theme for this year is "We're the Caring Kind." We'd like to use the occasion to honor some of our employees who are indeed the "Caring Kind" by telling how they feel about working in a hospital.

Janice Jones has been working at the Rockcastle County Hospital for over three years as a radiologic technologist. She is involved in all routine functions of the radiology department and has frequent contact with patients. Miss Jones chose a health care profession because "I like working with people."

Terry Burton, a laboratory technologist, has worked at the hospital for almost 11 years. Burton said, "It's our job in the lab is important because we assist the doctors in the diagnosis of a patient's illness. And, during the treatment, we keep tabs on how the patient is progressing. It makes me feel good to know that I'm probably the doctor's last contact with the patient before he's being discharged."

Hershel Callahan has been a materials management technician at Rockcastle County Hospital for almost five years. He is responsible for receiving and controlling the inventory of the hospital's medical and surgical supplies. Callahan said, "I don't make sure that supplies are on hand for all departments, that causes trouble. My job is to let the supplies be available when the patients and staff need them. I'm glad to know that even in the most difficult way, I'm helping the patients."

Sheri LeCompte has been the director of physical therapy for five months. She thinks her job is essential "mainly because after so many people have a heart attack or a stroke or burns they're in a different physical state than they were before and if we don't treat them some part of them is lacking. In physical therapy, we take them at that point and build

them back up to their normal state. Without physical therapy, many people that could return to normal function are hindered by a condition that could have been prevented."

Debbie Martin is head of the medical records department and has been at the hospital for seven years. Mrs. Martin explained why her job is necessary. "It's the collection of all patient information according to

each person's illness and that information is always here when they come back for further medical treatment. I feel the medical records department is as important to the patient as any other in the hospital."

Barbara Bowman, a licensed practical nurse, has been an employee at Rockcastle for over three years. She said, "My job is important to the patients because I give them the medicines

that are ordered to help them recover again. I have always enjoyed helping the sick and I enjoy so much seeing someone who is ill get well again."

These are just a few of the employees at the Rockcastle County Hospital who are there to be the "Caring Kind." They're there around the clock to see that patients receive the best possible treatment every day of the year.

Don't suffer needlessly with hearing and speech problems

Hearing and speech problems affect nearly one out of every 10 Americans. This means that there are approximately 1,260 people in Rockcastle County alone with hearing and speech problems.

May is Better Hearing and Speech Month, and a good time to realize that communicative disorders make up our nation's No. 1 handicapping disability. Studies indicate that more people suffer from hearing, speech and language impairments than from heart disease, paralysis, epilepsy, blindness, tubercular, cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy and multiple sclerosis combined!

An estimated 21 million Americans suffer from communicative disorders, with close to 17 million of these people suffering from some degree of hearing loss. At least half of these individuals have significant loss of hearing in both ears. Hearing is a precious ability and here are some tips to protect it:

- (1) Immunize against childhood diseases, such as German Measles and Mumps, which can cause hearing loss.
 - (2) Wear earplugs to protect against loud noise.
 - (3) Wear earplugs while playing football or boxing.
- Children, as well as

adults, must learn to cope with communication problems. For the millions of children with hearing, speech or language disorders, school is a challenge that can't be met alone. These problems can often be overcome if they are diagnosed and treated early. But, without help, hearing, speech or language disorders may get worse and educational, social and emotional development may be severely impaired.

People with communicative disorders shouldn't suffer needlessly. Most people can be helped medically, surgically, through hearing aids, or through hearing, speech and language rehabilitation.

When was the last time your child had a hearing, speech and language check-up? Do you know or suspect that you have a communicative disorder? Then call Dr. Joseph P. Fox, president of the Kentucky Speech-Language-Hearing Association, at (606) 233-4511, ext. 3131, or write him at 3432 Clays Mill Road, Lexington, Ky. 40503. Ask for the name of a professional to care for any child who can help you communicate better.

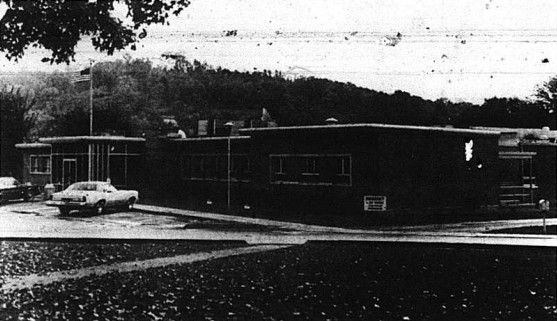

The only exception to the regulation is if the child is in danger of loss of life or limb. If that is the case, the doctor can treat them at his own risk. But, without the parents' permission, the doctor cannot treat a child for a minor injury, such as a cut or broken bones.

Bern Stapleton, director of nursing at the hospital, urges parents to leave written permission for their child to receive medical treatment while they are away. Mrs. Stapleton said permission can be as simple as a handwritten note with the child's name, consent for medical treatment to be given, and the parent's signature. Or, the parent(s) can come into the Emergency Room ahead of time and fill out a consent form available there.

If you'd like to arrange to leave your child at any time this summer, give the baby-sitter a note stating that "your child may be seen by a doctor during your absence. Then you can rest assured that your child will receive medical attention when they need it."

Be aware of your blood pressure during High Blood Pressure Month

May is National High Blood Pressure Month, and a good time for you to be aware of your blood pressure and how it affects your health.

A pamphlet from the American Heart Association answers questions you may have about high blood pressure, which is also called hypertension.

What is high blood pressure? Everyone has blood pressure. It is the force of blood against the walls of the arteries. This force is created by the heart as it pumps blood to all parts of the body in some people blood pressure is nearly always higher than it should be. Doctors still don't know what causes most high blood pressure, but they can help you control it.

What does high blood pressure do to your body? High blood pressure adds to the workload of the heart and arteries. The heart must pump with more force, and the arteries must carry blood that is moving under greater pressure. If high blood pressure continues for a long time, the heart and arteries may not function as well as they should and other body organs may also be affected. There is increased risk of stroke, heart failure, kidney failure and heart attack.

How do you know if you have high blood pressure? Most people with high blood pressure have no symptoms at all. There are no specific warning signs. Although persistent headaches, dizziness, fatigue, tension and shortness of breath sometimes go with high blood pressure, they may result from a variety of causes. The only way to find out if you have high blood pressure is to have your blood pressure checked. Have your doctor check it for you or visit a local blood pressure screening program.

What can you do about high blood pressure? If you

have high blood pressure, you can do a great deal to reduce it. First, work with your doctor to determine the best treatment for you. It may include a low-fat diet, a low-salt diet, and changes in your living habits such as quitting smoking, losing weight, and getting more exercise. Reducing your alcohol intake may be recommended. If you are on a weight reduction diet, remember alcohol is high in calories. In addition, many medications can be used to reduce and control high blood pressure. Your doctor will decide whether you need drug treatment in addition to dietary and lifestyle changes. When you and your doctor work as a team to control your high blood pressure, you can help to reduce your risk of stroke, kidney and heart failure, heart attack.

Remember ... (1) have your blood pressure checked to find out if you have high blood pressure (2) if you have high blood pressure, follow medical advice about changing your diet and living habits, and taking medicine if it is prescribed by your physician (3) Take your medicine as the doctor advises. If you have any new symptoms, call your doctor (4) Cooperate. You and your doctor must work together in order to keep your blood pressure under control. It's up to you to help your doctor control your blood pressure.

If you'd like to have a free blood pressure test, take a few minutes this Saturday and let personnel from the Rockcastle County Hospital give you a screening. They'll be located in front of The Bank of Mt. Vernon from 9 a.m. until noon. A few minutes of your time could give you a warning about your blood pressure or put your mind at ease.

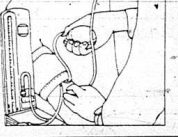

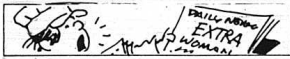
