

A general fund budget of \$131.093 for 1985-86 was proposed at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

The proposed budget is \$17.752 less than the 1984-85 revised budget of \$148.875, or about 12 percent less.

The reduced amount reflects anticipated cuts in revenue sharten in 1984 585 514.

ing: In 1984-85 the city got \$36,514 in revenue sharing, but expects only about \$18,000 in 1985-86, if the federal government follows through on its phasing out of revenue sharing.

In the Water and Sewer partment, the 1985-86 budget anticipates income and expenses at \$351,602. The 1984-85 revised Water and Sewer Department income was \$347.537 with expenses of \$332.125. leaving the department with a surplus this year of \$17.412. Mayor Roland Mullins said it

was "a good year" for the city, and added the Water and Sewer Department is in "better shape" than any he knows about.

In local races for county-wid offices in this May's Primary election, candidates have spent anywhere from no money at all to \$2,529.72, as of April 24, accord-ing to the campaign financial records on file in the county clerk's

April 24 was the date that candidates seeking county-wide office must file the first of three financial reports showing exactly how much they have spent thus fa-

how much they have spent thus far in the primary election.

The money has been spent in a variety of ways, such as newspaper advertising, radio spots, printing, campaign work-

Kentucky Law KRS 121:180 through 121:200 says that financial reports must be filed 32 days prior. to the election. 12 days before the election, and a post election report at least 12 days after the election. Penalties for not complying

with the law include voiding election and a fine of \$1,000 and/or one year in jail.

Any candidate running for an office other than a county-wide

one does not have to account for their spending, according to County Clerk Irene Bales.

The spending reports are open for public inspection and

include such things as names and addresses of campaign workers and contributions, as well as how much money has been contributed

to the individual's campaign.

As of the April 24 filing deadline, candidates for countydeadline. candidates for county-wide office had spent a total of \$42,494.68. with the biggest spender so far being local lawyer John Clontz. Clontz has spent

John Cloriz Cloriz has spent \$2,529.72 in his efforts to win the county attorney's seat.

His opponent, incumbent-County Attorney James H. Lam-bert, is not far behind in the spending dropping a total of \$1,988.99 on his campaign through April 24.

Probably the most talked about, because it is the top county.

seat, is the race for county judge/executive. Candidates have spent a total of \$7.925.83 on the race for this office.



berries with caps still-attached. Avoid dull or shrunken berries or containers stalned from leaky Because strawberries have a slightly rough skin and grow close to the ground, they are likely to be

To store strawberries, Burrier said they should be covered and refrigerated, unwashed, with the

said they should be covered and refrigerated, unwashed, with the cap or hull on. Do not crowd or press them. They should be used within one or two days. To prepare them, wash gently and cut out the cap or hull with a sharp spoon, knife or huller. Strawberries may be eaten as is, served whole or cut un or sliced. served whole, or cut up or sliced, sprinkled lightly with sugar and served with milk or over ice cream. They can be used in numerous dessert recipes.

Strawberries, without sugar strawberries, without sugar, are low in calories. One cup of berries has 55 calories. With one teaspoon of sugar added, a cup contains 71 calories, she said.

Strawberries also are an excellent source of vitamin C, one cup providing more than the amount needed daily by the normal individual.

Here are some ideas for preparing strawberries in different

#### Strawberry Slush

2 cups unsweetened pineapple

1 quart strawberries 1 cup lemonade 11/2 cups unflavored soda

Blend fruit juices and straw berries until frothy. Pour mixture into 9x9x2" pan and freeze solid. Remove from freezer and let stand at room temperature for 10 to 15 tes. To make slush, scrape spoon over frozen mixture and spoon into a bowl. Slowly add soda and stir gently to mix. Spoon or pour into glasses.

3 cups fresh strawberries

1/3 cup sugar

1/4 cup water 1 tablespoon cornstarch

Wash and hull strawberries Crush 1 cup. Slice remainder and set aside. Combine crushed berconstantly until mixture thickens and boils. Boil and stir one

minute. Fold in sliced berries. Yield: 2 cups. (Sauce may be served over crepes, plain cake, ice cream or other fruits. The sauce be cooled, packaged and frozen for later us

Whole: Choose firm, ripe, red berries with a bright color. Sort berries, wash them in cold water, lift gently from water and repeat until clean. Drain well and remove caps. Sugar syrup packs make better quality frozen strawberries than berries packed without sweetening. Add ascorbic acid or commercial ascorbid acid mixture commercial ascorbid acid mixture to sugar or syrup to help hold color and flavor. Whole berries may be sprinkled lightly with sugar, spread in one layer on a tray, frozen, and then packaged and frozen at one

Frozen at once.

Sugar Pack for Berries: After washing strawberries, drain, remove caps and place berries into a bowl or shallow pan. Measure one quart of strawberries and combine with ½ cup of sugar that has been mixed with ½ teaspoon crystalline ascorbic acid. For commercial ascorbic acid, follow-manufactascorole acid, follow-manufacturer's directions. Sprinkle sugar mixture over sliced berries, and turn berries over gently until sugar is dissolved and juice is

Syrup Pack for Whole Ber-ries: Place berries into containers and cover with cold 40% syrup (3 cups sugar to 4 cups water). Leave headspace, seal and freeze.

#### Freezer Berry Jam

Freezer jam is quick to make retains both color and flavor.

3 cups crush strawberries 1 package powdered pectin 1 cup water



Infestation sites are often marked by scars or callous formation, suckering, or large areas of cracked or loose bark. Feeding holes left by woodpeckers or other birds are a good sign that borers are under the bark.

# 1984 CONVICTION RAT Here's the Rest of the Story

The County Attorney is not involved in a vast majority of the cases in District Court. The reason for this is many people voluntarily plead guilty and pay a fine (example - almost every traffic ticket, except tickets for drunk or reckless driving, is disposed of by mailing the fine tothe District Court). The conviction rate that truly reflects what happened in District Court in 1984 is the number of convictions in cases when people pled not guilty and asked for a jury trial. these cases were handled by the county attorney. Here is what the Rockcastle County District Court records show:

(The record for 1985 is even worse. Only 1 trial has been attempted and it resulted in a mistrial after an improper question by the County Attorney.)

When cases go unprosecuted, witnesses get tired of coming to court, police officers lose interest and the cases get so old the judge dismisses them. Rockcastle County can have effective law enforcement -- but it requires a lot of hard work by the County Attorney. I WILL DO THAT.
