Adaptable . flexible . customized . No matter what they call conservation tillage, there is a system for you. With the different systems available, you are not equired to use just one general practice to keep 30 percent of the soil surface covered with residue after planting. That's what conservation tillage is all about -keeping the ground covered with crop residue.

When looking at practices available, consider how serious is erosion affecting your soil's productivity, which system fits into your conservation plan, and what local equipment is available and being used supposed. local equipment is available and being used, suggests District Conservationist David Stipes, of U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service. Then look at the pros and cons of the systems available: no till, ridge-till, strip-till, mulch-till, on

ridge till. strip-till, mulch-till, or other minimum tillage practices. With no-till, the soil is left undisturbed. Seeds are planted in a narrow seedbed about one to three inches wide. Weed sontrol is accomplished primarily with herb



Doris G. Petercheff. 50. an administrative assistant to U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers of Somerset, bas resigned her position after she allegedly reimbursed herself improperly with funds from Rogers campaign account.

The amount involved totals 577.669 71.

Rep. Rogers said since she has returned the money, he will not press charges against her However. The Federal Election Commission could pursue the matter. but he doubts it, since he will not personally file a complaint.

plaint.

He said she told him she borrowed money from an out-of

town bank to repay the money.

Ms. Petercheff had been Rogers' assistant since he went to Congress in 1980. Prior to that time, she was an assistant with Tim Lee Carter.

Rogers said Ms. Petercheff, who has an annual salary of \$40,307 a year, had repaid all the money. He added he was shocked and devastated by the disclosure. He explained that the money

was taken from his campaign accounts by checks, all written by Ms. Petercheff to herself. He said some were for meals and travel and some "uncharacterized." He stressed some of her expenses

He discovered the funds were missing when he checked with the bank and found the fund had only bank and found the fund had only \$31,000 in it. He had expected it to be about \$93,000.

The Congressman has not named a successor.

. In another announcement this week. Ms. Petercheff said she will resign her post as treasurer of the Pulaski County Republican Party on Thursday.

TAX ON TAX THREATENED

I know it is a very sensitive time to discuss rates. Some of you are still struggling-with the 1985 federal tax forms. Others are trying to figure out how you are going to come up with the money to per tet ax bill. Even as the April 15th deadline comes and goes the Senate will be working on another "tax reform" bill. The major proposal before the Senate Finanec Committee is disappointing.

Least tax felor it is a must. It is long overdue from the Congress and is long sought by taxpayers across the country. Real tax reform would make the method of computing taxes simpler and the tax form you file more easily understood. Most importantly reform would ensure that all taxpayers pay their fair share of taxes. The bill before the Senate Finanec Committee exist that as its goal. But the plan outlined by Finanec Committee Chairman Bob Packwood of Oregon misses this goal by a mile. goal by a mile. The President has said he will yeto a hill that includes "new taxes."

I support the President in this. Rather than take the President at his word, some in Congress and some in the President's own administration have set out to find a way to increase taxes without calling it a tax increase.

tion have set out to find a way to increase taxes without calling it a tax increase.

The idea they have come up with is called "denying deductibility." The best estimates are that it would raise \$75 billion in five years. It would work this way: Eyery company and individual who under current law must collect excise taxes for our Federal government on the products they sell would have to pay taxes on those taxes they collect. No longer, would these excise taxes be deductible business expenses, even though the money collected is turned over directly to the U.S. Treasury, Only, minor changes in current law would be required to raise these funds, and that seems to be popular with some groups in both Congress and the Administration. It is popular until you explain the effect, of these "minor changes," Excise taxes would increase on average 54%, This increase would be inevitably passed on to the consumers. That means that every gallon of gasoline, long distance phone call, new tire, artifue ticket, cigarette pack, other tobacco products, and coal — all the products and the service of the control of the c

dollars in revenues.

Senator McConnell and I have begun the fight against this proposal. We have sent a letter to Chairman Packwood requesting hearings by the Senate Finance Committee. More than half the Senate signed this letter of a similar one sent by members of the Finance Committee. Hearings will give us a chance to make Kentucky's case and show how harmfur this tax on taxes would be to consumers across the country. Our letter also shows the Chairman of the Finance Committee that this idea is not popular in the Senate and that Congress must find a equal, less harmful way to achieve fair tax reform.

The bill, which will go into effect July 1, raises Kentucky's minimum wage from \$2.60 an hour to \$3.35. bringing it into alignment with the federal minimum wage. Service industry workers in Kentucky's hotel, motel, restaurant and retail industries will be the principal benefators of the new wage provision.

Taxpayers who file Form 1040 or 1040A can request an automatic four-month extension of time to file their federal income tax returns, according to the Internal Revenue Service. The IRS stresses that the extension to file tax returns is not an extension of time to pay.

To obtain the four-month extension beyond April 15, tax-payers must complete Form 4868. "Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return," and forward it to the service center processing returns for their area. Kentucky residents file federal tax returns at the Cincinnati Service Center Cincinnati. Ohio 45999 Form 4868. must be filed on or before April 15. On Form 4868. taxpayers should make a tentiative estimate of the year's taxes and submit any balance due with the form. If the unpsid tax is more than 10 percent of the total tax, a penalty is assessed for late payment unless the taxpayer can show reasonable

cause for not paying the tax when due. The penalty is one-half of one percent per month on the unnaid halance, up to a maximum of 25 percent. Interest is also assessed

percent. Interest is also assessed on any unpaid balance. Taxpayers who wish to take an Individual Retirement Arrange-ment (IRA) deduction for 1985 must make their IRS contributions by April 15, 1986, whether or not




Fishing Report

Unseasonably warm, dry wea-ther has cleared up the muddy water conditions that hampered fishermen earlier in the season although the lack of rain now looms as a threat to normal springtime fishing patterns. During the past week water surface temperatures climbed into the 60's at most lakes. Fishing has greatly improved and almost summerlike conditions have fured thousands of anglers onto the states' lak spring crappie run is in full bloom at Kentucky Lake, and good catches of white bass, muskie, and largemouth bass were reported during the April 5-6 period

covered by this report. The lake by lake rundown is as fol-

WEST: Heavy crapple fishing activity was reported at Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley with good catches being made. explain why the bask is my own clear winner.

Certainly trout are more beautiful, they fight better, and their inhabit much more dazzling waters and landscapes than do bask 50 why on Saturday, will. I be durking plasfic worms tinder broken down, dirty water beat docks rather than sailing high-floating, files among bubbling bouldered streams?

Bookwagon Service

While the Commission was estab-lishing traveling/biraries, Berea College was initiating librarys service of a dis-terent form. 
