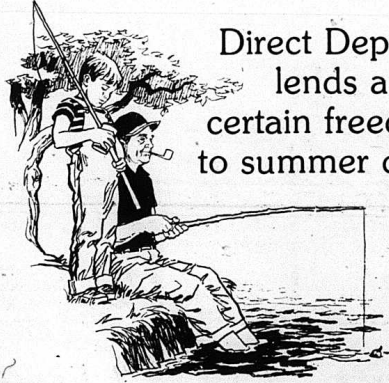

Adams brothers team up to farm

Wayne and Kenneth Adams have been dairy farmers "since boys growing up on Brindle Ridge." "We grew up on this farm and dairying has always been our way of life."

Teaming up together, the two brothers operate a 284 acre dairy farm. The partnership is essential in their operation because dairying is a two man job. Wayne notes that milking keeps him busy. Starting at 5 a.m. and again at 4 p.m. along with feeding, can run into a 8 to 12 hour split shift. Kenneth gets his share of milking on Wayne's days off as well as planting and harvesting crops.

Running 60 cows, 30 replacement heifers and 10 or more baby calves requires large amounts of feed. To produce this they grow 55 acres of no till corn which is harvested for silage. Wheat follows corn and is cut each spring for silage or round baled hay. Alfalfa is an important protein source for most every dairy and the Adams' depend on 25 acres to produce high quality forage. An additional 35 acres of grass legume hay is harvested for dry cows and heifers.

With a second person to concentrate on crops, tobacco has been an important cash crop. However with cuts in the quota, their allotment is just over 2.5 acres.

The loss of income from tobacco isn't the only cut dairy farmers are facing. With lower support prices has also come check offs to pay for the dairy herd buyout. The Commodity Credit Corporation receives over 325 dollars of their milk check each month. That's a large chunk of profit over 12 months time.

When asked how will dairy farmers make it through the next few years, they said, "By concentrating on management and getting more production per cow."

"Farming is the hardest we've seen in our lifetime; mainly because of the expenses." As with a majority of farm families today, both wives, Josephine and Barbara hold public jobs. Their main concern is the uncertainty in the future, however, a dedication to hard work and the desire to make their living through farming keeps them going.

Due to efforts of American farmers like the Adams Brothers, last year consumers spent about 15 percent of their income on food. This is the lowest percentage in United States history, and the lowest of most major nations in the world.

Today the average factory worker has to work 7.4 minutes to earn enough to purchase a

half-gallon of milk. Ten years ago, it took 10 minutes to buy the same product. More amazing is the fact that Dairy farmers receive about 50 percent of the consumers milk dollar. Transportation, processing and marketing receive the remainder.

As in the past, during June Dairy Month, we take a moment to recognize our dairy farm families, and say thank you. On Monday, June 30, local business and WVRK would like to host our Dairy Farm Families at Renfro Valley's Big Barn for an evening of entertainment and saying thanks as well.

Rabies outbreak

Keep an eye on your pet! The worst outbreak of rabies in the U.S. in 30 years continues to grow at a frightening rate. The number of cases this year are up 11 percent from 1985. If your animal is not vaccinated against the dread disease, it should be, officials say. On the animal scale, leading carriers are raccoons, skunks, and bats, in that order.

No parking

A new parking ordinance has been approved by the Mt. Vernon City Council. There will be no parking between 2 a.m. and 4 a.m. on Main Street between First Street and the railroad crossing; on First Street from U.S. 25 to Main Street, and on Church Street from U.S. 25 to Main Street. Reasons: Those streets are cleaned during the two hours.

Schools can sue

The 66 school districts that claim the state's funding system for education is unconstitutional have a right to sue the state, a circuit judge has ruled. The ruling includes Rockcastle. The suit says state officials have failed to meet requirements and provide for an efficient system of common schools in the state, noting that children in poorer districts have a lower quality of education.

A total of 1.80 inches of rain has fallen in Mt. Vernon during the first 10 days of June, according to the rain gauge at Cox Funeral Home. Largest amounts were on June 8 and June 10.

Past State Representative Harold DeMarcus, Sr. dies

William Harold DeMarcus Sr., who served as Republican floor leader and minority whip during a nine-term career as the state representative for the 80th House District, died of cancer Tuesday at Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington. A Stanford resident, DeMarcus was 73.

In 1963 DeMarcus was elected for the first time as state representative for Rockcastle, Lincoln, and part of Pulaski counties and served eight more consecutive terms in his legislative career which ended in 1981 with his retirement.

Known for his quick wit and speaking ability, DeMarcus was elected minority whip for the 1964 General Assembly and served as Republican floor leader from 1970 to 1980. In 1975, he defeated Larry Hopkins, now U.S. representative to become House minority leader. DeMarcus was born Feb. 4, 1913 in Wilton. He moved to

Revenue Sharing cut County budget over million dollar mark

A tentative county budget of \$1,033,861 for 1986-87 was approved at a special meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Monday.

A budget hearing for the purpose of obtaining written and oral comments of citizens has been scheduled for 10 a.m. June 26 at the courthouse.

School board buys supplies

The Rockcastle County Board of Education made several routine personnel and purchasing decisions at its regular June 3rd meeting.

The major single purchase by the board was that of a freezer and shelves for Livingston School. Four sealed bids were opened and reviewed with the board voting to buy from Institutional Distributors who submitted a low bid of \$5,849.46, a price which included \$49.46 for the shelves. Ameri-Cool's total bid of \$6,343.82 and Greg's Heating and Cooling's bid of \$9,386.64 were rejected, as was one from Institutional Jobbers for shelves only, \$483.96.

The board, at the suggestion of Superintendent Charles Parsons, also decided to change its method of buying and allotting custodial supplies for the 1986-87 school year. The board accepted the low bids for supplies to clean all schools during the summer, but beginning this fall, each school will be given a supplies budget based upon an average of the

Work inmates at jail - maybe

A suggested plan to work prisoners outside who are serving time in the county jail is being studied by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court.

The subject of working prisoners was brought up at the June meeting of the court by representatives of the Corrections Cabinet, who suggested prisoners could be allowed to get two days off their time by working one day.

The cabinet representative, Richard Stevens, said some prisoners may be happy to work in return for time off, and that the practice is now legal.

Magistrates questioned Stevens, but seemed to take a wait-and-see attitude for time being.

"I think it is a good idea for them to clean up the roads, dumps and trees in the county," Magistrate Doug Bishop said, "but we need to discuss liability before deciding. What if one gets hurt while they're out working?"

Stevens said the liability would apply in that case the same as if now applies to prisoners who are in jail.

When questioned, Truism Commissioner Robert Robinson said he would like to put prisoners out and let them work.

"If they get hurt in jail the county is responsible," Robinson said. "It would be the same if they are out working and get hurt. The county has to repair them either way. But think of all the trash and dumps that could be cleaned up. Some counties are already using this method."

The magistrates took no action on the suggestion, but appeared to support the plan if it could be worked out.

increase reflects the increase in the motor fuels tax approved in the last session of the Kentucky General Assembly. Road funds can only be used for roads, associated salaries and expenses.

One new salary of interest shows up in the new budget—that of "solid waste collection coordinator" at \$12,000 a year. The county garbage collection plan is now being studied by the state which mandates a coordinator. A coordinator has not been chosen, pending approval of the plan by the state and a job description that will be outlined in the garbage program.

A breakdown of various appropriations follows:

General Fund—General government, \$93,054; protection of persons and property, \$18,000; general health and sanitation, \$25,900; social services, \$13,650; recreation and culture, \$2,000; debt service, \$74,194; administration, \$47,856, for a total in the fund of \$274,654.

Road Fund—Roads, \$391,825; general government, \$74,375; administration, \$45,500, for a total of \$511,700.

Vote on annexation scheduled by council for July 14 meeting

A vote on whether to proceed with the annexation of two areas adjoining Mt. Vernon will be taken by the Mt. Vernon City Council at its July meeting.

The council voted at its meeting Monday night to settle the issue, one way or another, at the July session.

"I think it's time we settled this issue," Mayor Roland Mullins said. "So come prepared to vote, and in the meantime you (councilmen) should contact as many as possible who will be affected."

The areas that would be annexed are generally in a line from the north city limits near Red Top Restaurant to the Renfro Creek Bridge, and from the city limits near Super Test Service Station south of the Burr Interchange of I-75.

The exact areas to be annexed would have to be determined by legally drawn boundaries.

Each councilman expressed his views on annexation, and if no minds are changed, the council will probably vote to proceed with

annexation. Advertising of and public hearings will be held before final annexation is made, admittedly a lengthy process.

Visitors at the meeting who were interested in the annexation issue, expressed the need for fire hydrants, which councilmen agreed probably could be installed soon after annexation.

"It would also mean a decrease in insurance rates for two areas."

Not so sewer lines and lift stations which are very expensive. Councilmen noted sewer lines could be "well down the road," probably meaning a few years.

"Sewer lines can be very expensive," one councilman said. "We already have a sewer project under way, so I think it will be quite awhile before we can have another sewer project."

City Clerk Kaye Rader told councilmen she had not had any telephone calls at all concerning annexation.

In another action, the council voted to accept the withdrawal of a request by the Veteran of Foreign

Council unveils city budget

A cut in Revenue Sharing funds is having an effect on the Mt. Vernon city budget for the coming year, the city council was told at its meeting Monday night.

In short, the council will have to "find" \$19,788 to balance the 1986-87 budget, according to figures revealed in the tentative budget handed councilmen at the meeting.

Income for 1986-87 in the general fund is estimated at \$177,945. Operating expenses total \$197,733.

The 1985-86 budget totaled \$196,165.

"We'll have to find the money somewhere," Mayor Roland Mullins said, "or we will

have a deficit at the end of the year. We'll have to do some thing."

The water and sewer budget balances for 1986-87. Income and expenditures both are estimated at \$400,591.

However, because of the sewer renovation project at the sewer plant, rates will likely be increased by Jan. 1. The city will need \$480,000 as the share of the \$1,924,407 project. The remainder of the money is a grant for \$1,443,305.

A breakdown of expenditures in the water sewer budget shows salaries at \$85,986 and operations at \$117,477.

the Rockcastle County Extension office for the opportunities that await her in Versailles.

Stating personal reasons for the move, Ms. Wesley said Monday that she regrets leaving Rockcastle and it's people, but it was something she felt that she had to do at this time in her career.

Ms. Wesley was assigned to Rockcastle County in December 1982 after she completed her

education at the University of Kentucky.

"I don't think I could have started in a better place," she said. "The people and students in the 4-H programs have been so nice and helpful it has really been a good three-and-a-half years."

Before being assigned to Rockcastle on a full time basis, Ms. Wesley served as a summer intern under the local home economics agent Cheryl Witt.

"People seemed to like me and I liked it here. I guess that is how I ended up here." However, Martha said that several local people wrote letters to the University of Kentucky requesting that she be placed in Rockcastle County. "I'm sure that helped too," she commented.

Martha's father, Rex, was also an extension agent for the University of Kentucky. Mr. Wesley is retired now and living in Laurel County and he too did his training for an agriculture agent in Rockcastle County in the 1950's. Martha was raised in Laurel County.

Michael Robbins, a Livingston Elementary school teacher and president of the Rockcastle County 4-H council said Tuesday that Martha would definitely be missed. "Martha was a good

SALT II ABANDONMENT IS RISKY MOVE

There is a growing bipartisan concern in Congress that the Administration's plan to abandon the SALT II treaty is a very risky idea.
The debate was touched off recently when Secretary of State George Shultz told a meeting of NATO foreign ministers that the United States no longer considers itself bound by limits of the SALT II treaty. The treaty, though never ratified by Congress, has been our unofficial arms control policy for six years.
The SALT II treaty itself is part of a structure of offensive arms limitation that has been laid down over a 15-year to 20-year period by four presidents - Johnson, Nixon, Ford and Carter. (SALT is an acronym for Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty.)
Shultz announced that from now on the Administration will begin to decide what U.S. nuclear weapons to obtain on the basis of perceived military needs rather than according to the technical limits of the 1979 treaty. The President has said his goal is to keep up with the Soviets in the number of missile launchers and bombers; not to outpace them.
Although the Soviets have committed violations, none has gone to the heart of the treaty and it has served as a useful yardstick for measuring these violations. The limits have also been a way to contain a Soviet arms buildup.
We do not have to look far in history to find reason to predict that an accelerated arms race will be the result of the planned Administration move. During the late 1950s, President Eisenhower announced that the U.S. was going to pull out of an informal Soviet-American nuclear test suspension. What followed was an outburst of Soviet testing. By abandoning SALT II we will be giving up the only control we have today over the arms race.
It is widely feared that scuttling the treaty is a far greater threat to U.S. than any likely Soviet violation under the treaty. The first gain for the Soviets will be a propaganda victory because, in world opinion, the United States will be the party whose action is unpopular.
But beyond world opinion is a far more serious matter: the actual effect of treaty abandonment on the arms race. President Reagan is risking an accelerated arms race in which the Soviets have an advantage. The Soviet Union is in a far better position to quickly increase its military weaponry, particularly given our federal budget constraints. In a guns versus butter budget decision, the Soviets are far more able and willing - under their governmental system -- to opt for more guns.

I believe coming months will see strong NATO opposition to this treaty abandonment, as well as passage of measures in Congress which will protest and try to block the planned move. It is my sincere hope that the President will hear these protests and reconsider his position on SALT II. Beyond that, momentum toward serious new arms control negotiations would be both welcome and long overdue.

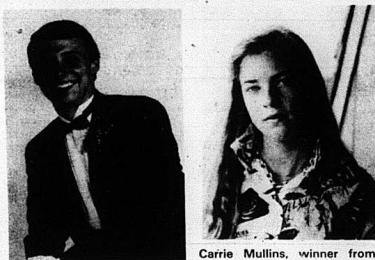

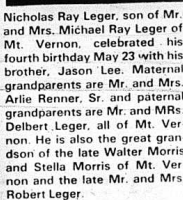
Breaking the vicious cycle

For too many years, most industries have told our part of the state that they could not locate

here because the educational level of our people was not as high as others. Yet, our high school graduates could not stay home and help raise our educational level because there were no jobs for them. And so we have sat crippled, caught in this vicious cycle of a lack of jobs and a lowered level of educated people.

The past year has not aggressively addressed this basic problem. Now, we are beginning the recent meeting of the Shalersport Roundtable, a two-day conference focusing on education and economic development in the Fifth District, has put us on the right road toward solving these twin problems of jobs and education.

I believe we need to take a four-pronged approach in solving these problems. First, we need to improve our educational standing. We need to cut our dropout rate

and keep our kids in school. A study done by the Mountain Association of Community Economic Development has given us some good starting point for attacking this problem, and I intend to follow that up aggressively.

Second, we need to attract the jobs that those graduates will need. Our new Southern Kentucky Economic Development Council has already begun to market our district on a regional basis to auto

supply industries, which could provide parts for the numerous auto assembly plants nearby. We will also be going after other industries. Our new executive director, Forrest Wright comes on board June 16th and will give our group a full-time recruiting effort. And our president, Ray Mencer, recently returned with the Governor from a trip to Japan with a number of good prospects with whom to follow up.

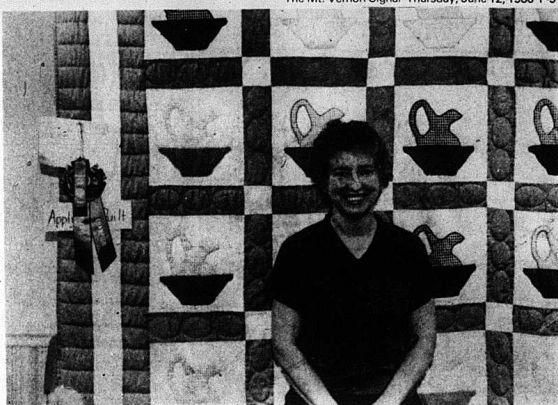

Foreign Language" from the College Board and the acceptance of an extension of the contract with Ballfour for class rings.

General Liability Insurance for boardmembers and the superintendent was renewed with the KSBA for 1986-87 and bids for yearbooks, school pictures, gasoline, oil lubricants and several other necessary items will be opened in July it was decided.

In personnel matters, the board accepted the recommendation of Superintendent Parsons and hired Margaret L. Huckleberry as special education teacher for the hearing impaired, subject to proper certification. Ms. Huckleberry will replace Miss Jennifer Waller who has resigned. Students in this unit are transported to Madison Central for instruction.

The board put off until July the hiring of a school psychologist. Parsons reported two applications have been received: one from Charles Yonis, clinical psychologist who did the psychological testing for Rockcastle County Schools last year, and one from Janet Rader Burke, a classroom teacher who has been certified by the state as a school psychologist. Mrs. Burke has asked for a leave of absence for next year. According to Parsons, since Mrs. Burke is not a licensed clinical psychologist, she must be school-based, that is, she must be hired in some capacity by the board.

Parsons said she could be hired as substitute teacher. The job involves testing about 100 students yearly at a rate of \$75.00 per testing. Superintendent Parson was reluctant to make a recommendation and the board refused to act until he does.

Parsons also announced to the board the state approval of another special education unit for the county and he said it would have to be taught by a person with a degree in learning disabilities.

Salary increases of 3% for classified personnel and a 10 cent an hour increase for wage and hour employees were approved, but in light of recent efforts to trim the budget, Chairman Rudolph Burdette asked Parsons if the budget could stand the raises. Mr. Parsons told Burdette that the budget could certainly not stand any more increase than this. The board also officially employed office secretaries, custodians, and maintenance and garage personnel for the upcoming year and authorized Mr. Parsons to review all positions and adjust the number of work hours as necessary.

Continuing contracts were granted to Mary Greaves and Nelson Graves and GED certificates for Amanda Owens, Regina Heide, Ruthetta Kirby, Mary Mink, Barbara Smith, Sandy Alexander, Lisa Warf, and Patricia High.

Since forty-two hours per year of instructional leadership training is now required by the State Department of Education for 14 principals and administrative personnel and the cost of the training

must be met by the local district's general fund; the board voted to place some restrictions on the mileage allowed; miles traveled and persons attending will be encouraged to carpool when possible. The board will pay 18 cents per mile, not to exceed five roundtrip to Frankfort, and will pay the registration fee. The total cost of the training is expected to near \$8,000.

Superintendent Parsons reported to the board that only nine students had registered for Humanities, a course designed for gifted students at the high school level. As a result of this, and with encouragement from the state, there will be an Honors English for 10th as well as 11th and 12th grades this fall. The state recommends that high school gifted programs take a turn to Advanced Placement Programs (programs whereby students study a college level curriculum and take a test at the end of the year that will enable them to earn college hours) and advanced academic programs.

In other business, the board approved the check writing policy which is the same as last year; appoint the same adult committee as last year (Shirley Mullins, Bibe Towery and Garlan Cummins) to audit elementary fund accounts; approve depository bonds as follows: \$800,000 in U.S. Government Bonds and School Revenue Bonds at the Bank of Mt. Vernon; \$300,000 in First National Mortgage Assoc. Bonds and School Revenue Bonds at the Citizen's Bank; approved a school trip policy; authorized a review of transportation routes in an effort to economize; approved the use of school buses to 4-H camp and the State Fair; approved a \$4,059 staff development grant for science and math.

Following the payment of the bills, the superintendent and board discussed the board's evaluation of Mr. Parsons.

Warp's post to purchase land from the city on Old Broadhead Road for a new post, and asked the council if the post could have a 35-year lease with an option on land near Lake Liville boat dock to construct a post. The council agreed.

The council was told the Environmental Protection Agency has warned the city that "high strength sewage" is getting into the system from some source and a remedy should be found immediately. A random watch will be placed in manholes in an effort to discover the cause, believed to be privately owned trucks dumping sewage into the system during the night.

Locks on manholes were ruled out temporarily as too expensive, but engineers said later it might be cheaper for lock than for the city to pay a \$10,000 a day fine.

Rockcastle Re-Act was denied a permit to solicit money from motorists on the Fourth of July at the intersection of U.S. 150 and Richmond Street.

Two bids were accepted by the council. It will buy concrete from Thrifty Lumber for a culvert under a city owned lot on East Main Street where a new fire station and parking lot is to be constructed. The concrete price is \$43 a yard. Steel for the culvert will be purchased from Steel Service Co. of Knoxville, Tenn., for \$19.95 a hundredweight. The two bids were "the only ones received."

How did S-Tree get its name?

How did the S-Tree section of the Daniel Boone National Forest get its name?

According to Ralph Marcum of Sand Gap, S-Tree was named by Sid Martin, Marcum's great-grandfather. While Martin was searching for lost cattle, he found a peculiar shaped tree that looked like the letter "S" and that's what he named the area.

Martin died at the early age of 36, but he accomplished a lot in those few years. He is best known for his invention of the "Little Margaret" or "thumping keg," a device which is used in the doubling back process of making whiskey. He was

granted a United States patent on this apparatus and it is still used by whiskey distillers today. Martin's wife Sytha Morris sold the patent rights to a representative of one of the early distillers shortly after 1900.

Marcum has written of his great-grandfather, "He was an inventor, musician, distiller, preacher and a skilled carpenter." Martin was one of the first people to pick the five-string banjo with three fingers, as is commonly done now, but was unheard-of in this part of the country in the late 1800s.

Martin's whiskey was known for its excellent taste and quality. In his later years, he took up preaching, but apparently that didn't interfere with his whiskey making. When he missed church services one Sunday, he apologized and said "business had kept him away," when in fact everyone knew

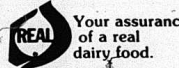
that he had a "run" of whiskey that had to be made that day. Martin died in 1899 and is buried in the Hamilton graveyard on Indian Creek. He was the son of Liberty Martin, who was the son of Milton Martin and the grandson of Azariah Martin.

Azariah Martin was born in 1764 in Albemarle County, Va., and came to this part of Kentucky before 1784 and settled directly on the Warriors' Path or Indian War Road on Station Camp Creek just below where the present Red Lick Creek empties into Station Camp Creek. Marcum says that "Isriah" was "a noted scout, Indian spy, hunter and skilled woodsman."

There is a family legend that "Isriah," on a certain election day, got into an argument with another man

and the election ended in a gunfight with the old type muzzle-loading pistols. Isriah fired his single-shot pistol but missed, and the other man's bullet hit him squarely between the eyes. But because Isriah had a peculiar slanting shape in his forehead, the bullet just glanced off and, after recovering his senses, Isriah proceeded to "soundly thrash" the other man.

The Martins have had a colorful history in this part of the country.

Jackson/Rockcastle farmers invited to run for county committee

Jackson and Rockcastle County farmers are invited to run for county committee. Eligible farmers in these counties are invited to become nominees for the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) county committee. FmHA County Supervisor Robert W. Hornsby announced today.

As a result of the 1985 Farm Bill, two of the three members of FmHA county committees must be elected. The third member is designated by FmHA. The Jackson and Rockcastle county committee assists the FmHA county office in determining the eligibility of applicants for certain types of

FmHA loans. Generally, farmers who are residents of the county but not FmHA borrowers, are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA county committee.

"Farmers in this county, serving on the committee, play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews," said Mr. Hornsby.

For the first election only, two members will be elected at the same time. One member will be elected for a term of one year, and one member will be elected for a two year term. In the future, all terms of service will be for three years each on a staggered basis.

Two honored at banquet

Kentucky seventh graders who participated in Duke University's Sixth Annual Search for mathematically and verbally brilliant students were honored at a ceremony held at Western Kentucky University on May 28, 1986.

Local students participating were: Cindy Gregory of Mt. Vernon Elem. and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William D. Gregory and Michelle Hamm of Brodhead Elem. and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Hamm.

The students had obtained scores on at least one section of the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) equal to or greater than the scores obtained by 50 percent of college-bound high school seniors. These very capable seventh graders or 12-year-olds took this college entrance test as participants in Duke University's Talent Identification Program (TIP).

"TIP was initiated in 1980 to

identify bright young students, to help develop their special abilities, and to direct them toward special programs for the academically gifted. The 1986 TIP Talent Search involved more than 37,000 students and covered 16 southern, southwestern and midwestern states. 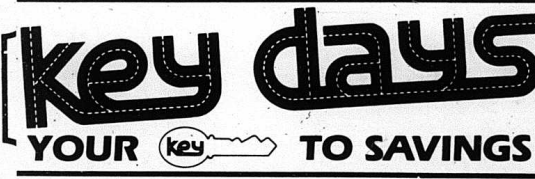

Contestants test land judging skills in Oklahoma

More than 800 competitors in the annual National Land, Pasture and Range Judging Contest tested their judging skills at the historic Fort Reno on May 1. This is the 35th year the National Land, Pasture and Range Judging Contest has been held in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The contest attracts competitors, most of them FFA and 4-H members, from coast to coast and from Wisconsin to Texas. More than 200 awards, including trophies, plaques, medals, and cash, were awarded by Farm Credit Services in Wichita, Kansas, and its affiliated Federal Land Bank Associations. Production Credit Associations and Farm Credit Centers in Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and New Mexico, the primary financial sponsors of the event. These awards were presented at an awards banquet attended by more than 900 people on May 1. Winning honors were contestants from 14 of the 33 participating states. Contestants from Oklahoma and Indiana each claimed four of the possible 15 grand champion awards. Texas entrants took home two grand champion awards while contestants from Kansas, West Virginia, Tennessee, Kentucky, and Wisconsin each captured one. The annual contest involves three events: land judging, pasture and range judging, and homesite evaluation. Each event has three divisions: 4-H, FFA and adults. 4-H and FFA members compete individually and on teams. The contestants judge the soil's capability to raise crops, provide pasture and serve as homesites. They also evaluate the topsoil, subsoil, slope and other land characteristics. Contestants also have the opportunity to become more familiar with the Oklahoma soil the day before the contest at a practice school. Representatives from Oklahoma 4-H, FFA, Soil Conservation Services, Oklahoma State University and numerous other agricultural organizations joined Farm Credit Services in staging the National Land, Pasture and Range Judging Contest.

Easy Tips for Boosting Calcium in Your Diet

- Stir shredded or diced cheeses into creamed soups.
- Freeze milk in ice cube trays; use as is or crushed in milk beverages.
- Add milk or sour cream and shredded cheese to beaten eggs when making an omelet or scrambled eggs.
- Add cheese, sour cream or yogurt to potato and pasta salads.
- Toss bits of cheese with fruit and mixed green salads.
- Prepare pizza quickly by topping an English muffin half with a tomato slice, a spoonful of ricotta, a sprinkling of oregano and grated Parmesan. Heat until hot.
- Stir shredded Cheddar, cottage or ricotta cheese into mashed potatoes or rice.
- Prepare canned or packaged cream soups with milk.
- Prepare salad dressings and dips with yogurt in place of mayonnaise.
- Top casseroles and vegetables with shredded cheese.
- Serve barely melted cheese (perhaps sprinkled with your favorite spice or herb) as a dip for chips and vegetables.

Cheese & Mushroom Strate

- 4 eggs
- 1 1/2 Tbsp. Dijon-style mustard
- 2 Tbsp. butter
- 1 loaf (8 oz.) Italian bread, sliced 1/2 inch thick
- 2 1/4 cups sliced milk
- 2 1/2 cups sliced fresh mushrooms
- 3/4 cup sliced onion
- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) sliced Swiss or American cheese
- In a medium bowl beat eggs, milk and mustard; set aside. In a medium skillet melt butter. Add mushrooms and onion. Sauté until golden, about 5 minutes; remove from heat. Arrange half of the bread slices in a buttered 9-inch square baking pan. Spoon half the mushroom mixture over the bread. Pour half of the milk mixture over all. Cover with half of the cheese slices. Repeat layering with remaining bread, mushroom and milk mixtures and cheese. Cover and refrigerate for 1 to 24 hours. Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Bake uncovered, until puffed and a knife inserted in the center comes out clean, 30 to 35 minutes. If desired, brown under a hot broiler.

DeMarcus later moved to Stanford and became owner and operator of Stanford Monument Co., a business he ran until 1977.

At one time, DeMarcus headed the Stanford-Lincoln County Chamber of Commerce and served as president of the Stanford Rotary Club. He was a director of the Lincoln County National Bank at his death. He was a 32nd degree Mason and a member of the Stanford Christian Church.

In 1976 he was named an outstanding alumnus of Sus Bennett College.

Besides being a state legislator, DeMarcus was a delegate in 1964 and 1976 to the Republican National Conventions. In the 1970's he served on the GOP National Rules Committee. He also had served as a member of the Republican State Central Committee and was a member of the Legislative Research Commission from 1970 to 1981.

DeMarcus is survived by his wife, Elizabeth Edwards DeMarcus; four sons, W.H. DeMarcus, Jr. and David DeMarcus, both of Lexington; John P. DeMarcus of Edgewood and Frank DeMarcus of Stanford; two sisters, a brother, 10 grandchildren; and a great-grandchild.
