No money involved in law suit

A recent civil suit between a local constable, a former state trooper and a former candidate for county judge/ executive was held in Rockcastle Circuit Court recently.

The four day trial, which was spurred by an automobile accident in February of 1986 ended with a local jury awarding no money for the plaintiff, Constable Randall Stevens.

The third district constable filed the suit against former Kentucky State Police Trooper Darrell Presley and Leonard "Roge" Hammond, of Mareburg, a former candidate for County Judge/Executive.

Stevens sued both men for medical expenses, lost wages, mental and physical suffering and permanent impairment of his power to earn money.

According to court records the jury found that Presley was 95 percent at fault for the accident and that Hammond was 5 percent at fault.

Stevens, who was a passenger in Presley's cruiser was injured as well as Presley and Hammonds.

According to a report filed by KSP Sgt. David Biggersoff of London, Hammonds apparently ran a stop sign while turning left off old Ky. 461 onto U.S. 150. Hammond's truck was struck broadside by Presley's cruiser, which was traveling at a high rate of speed with no emergency lights in use.

Both the cruiser and Hammonds truck were totaled.

At the time of the accident Hammonds was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, failure to stop at a stop sign, and failure to yield the right-of-way.

He was found guilty in Rockcastle District Court of D.U.I. last December 1.

That case has been appealed to Circuit Court.

The wreck involving Presley and Hammond was Presley's third accident in a trooper's car. He is no longer with the Kentucky State Police.

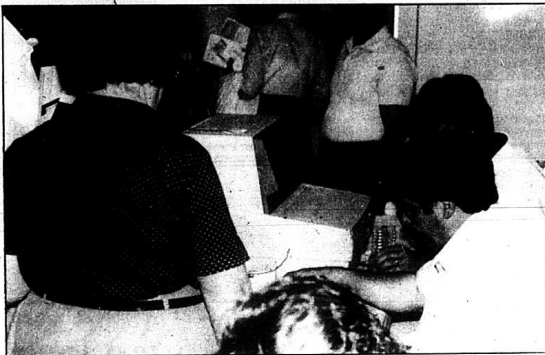
Carter asks

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to annex about 80 acres, more or less, owned by Clarence Carter and located on the Mt. Vernon bypass of Ky. 461.

All legalities will be at Carter's expense, the council was told. The area will be partly commercial and partly residential.

The council agreed on the basis the sewer lift station near the high school will take care of the additional sewage. The council and state will have to approve the plans for the area.

Employees get wage hike

Ignoring a survey of city residents that turned down water skiing on Lake Linville, the Mt. Vernon City Council voted 3 to 2 Monday night to allow skiing on the lake.

Voting for skiing were Councilmen Wayne Adams, Earl Nichols and Tommy Bussell.

Voting against skiing were Larry Burdette and Billy Ray Doan.

Councilwoman Clarice Kirby did not attend the meeting.

Asked after the meeting if she planned to veto the action, Mayor Elizabeth Baker said she would have "no comment at this time."

The mayor earlier in the discussion expressed surprise that the council would disregard the 250 to 166 vote against skiing.

"The survey was agreed on by the council, and the people expressed their wishes," the mayor said. "This action goes against their wishes."

If the mayor vetoes the skiing action, it will reportedly take one more than a majority of the council to override the mayor's veto, in this case five votes. Since two councilmen voted against skiing, the mayor's veto would stand.

If the skiing is finally allowed, the city will have to draw up an ordinance designating the skiing area and other regulations. "Under the ordinance, skiing would not be allowed in an area known as Hysinger Hollow. Skiing would be allowed from May 28 to the day after Labor Day, this year, Sept. 6."

The city will also have to purchase a boat to patrol the lake which currently has a 25 mile per hour speed limit.

In another discussion relating to Lake Linville, the council heard that state and local police officers have permission to put their boats into Lake Linville for one dollar instead of the present \$3.

But Mt. Vernon escaped the severe storm that raged across southern Kentucky clobering Middlesboro and nearby Frakes.

Most local residents agreed, the sky sure looked funny, as one resident put it. That was caused by a combination of dark clouds, raindrops and even a little sun thrown in.

When things began to look better, only 1/4 of an inch of rain had fallen all day Monday and only 2 on Tuesday. Some areas only got a little wind.

The nearest severe damage was at an 1-75 motel at the new Fort Sequoia just over the line in Laurel County where a section of the roof was blown off.

Most local residents agreed, the county was lucky. Farmers could have used the rain, but you can't have everything. There's been 1.42 inches of rain since May 1.

Million dollar county budget

A tentative 1988-89 county budget totalling \$1,097,800 will be presented for review and passage by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, probably at its June meeting.

The public will have an opportunity to review the budget before final passage at a public hearing at 3 p.m., May 24, at the courthouse, and the public may submit written or oral comments on the proposed usage of county road aid and local government economic funds as it relates to the county's entire budget.

The 1988-89 budget is \$312,611 less than last year primarily because \$387,085 was budgeted last year for a loan to Mt. Vernon Plastics. The county will receive \$35,000 during the coming fiscal year from interest and principal on the loan.

The money loaned to the plastic factory came from a Community Development Block Grant to the county and was listed in the budget last year and allocated officially.

The 1988-89 road fund is estimated at \$650,000 up from \$561,400

last year, due to increases in the gas tax and other funds allocated to the county.

The jail budget totals \$152,800, up from \$119,788 budgeted last year. The increase is due to the addition of costs for keeping prisoners from other counties that must be budgeted for the first time this year. The basic jail budget is about the same as the previous year.

The local government assistance

fund (coal and minerals) totals \$64,000 down from \$85,706 last year.

The general fund allocation totals \$196,000 down from \$268,432 last year. The decrease is reflected in a \$68,000 jail grant to the county that was budgeted last year.

To repeat, the budget figures are tentative and await final approval by both the state and fiscal court.

GOP candidate named

Ricky Ray Kirby of Brodhead has been chosen by the Rockcastle Republican Party Executive Committee to oppose a Democrat candidate for the 3rd District magistrate seat recently vacated by Doug Bishop.

To date the Democrat Executive Committee has not met to decide on a candidate, according to Mrs. Verla Scott, county Democrat chairwoman.

Gov. Wallace Wilkinson will appoint a successor to Bishop to serve

until the November election at which time the winner of that election will serve the remaining one year of Bishop's term. (Cont. to 16)

Another Break-in at grocery

A Lexington woman will be arraigned Monday in Rockcastle District Court following arrest for a break-in in Mt. Vernon.

Emma Bowers, 37, is charged in the break-in at Food Fair supermarket last Thursday morning.

According to Mt. Vernon City Police Officer Larry Thompson, he witnessed Bowers coming out of the back of the store about 3:45 a.m. Thompson said he noticed that all the

cigarettes on the store shelves were missing when he made his rounds.

Thompson said he turned on his cruiser light and went behind the store where he saw Bowers and another suspect. The officer said he thought the suspect was a man. A pickup truck was located behind the store loaded with cigarettes and food, enroute to the store was gained by breaking out concrete blocks at the rear of the store.

Marker dedicated to Revolutionary soldier

Dedication of a marker at the grave of George Sigmon, a Revolutionary soldier buried in Sigmon cemetery near May 1 at the cemetery near just off U.S. 25 on Sigmon Road.

The dedication was carried out by the Rockcastle Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Mary Alice Hunt dedicated the marker, assisted by members of her family and chapter members. It was co-opted by Mrs. Gordon Walker, a member of the Berea Laurel Ridge Chapter.

According to records, George Sigmon was born in February 1755 on the banks of the Delaware River in Pennsylvania. He went to North

Carolina at a very early age. In October 1778, Sigmon volunteered to help in the fight for the independence of America. He was 22 years old.

He served until April of 1779 as a private Captain Lee Taylor and James Richardson's Companies of Colonel Locke's North Carolina Regiment. He fought in the battle of Briar Creek in December, 1780, he volunteered for service in the battle at Brice Creek as a member of the company of Captain Dillinger and the regiment of Col. McDowell.

After a one-day march, he came down with smallpox and was unable to see further service during the war. Later, he enlisted and served three months in Capt. Henry Whitner's

North Carolina Company. After the war, about 1783 or 1784, Sigmon returned to Philadelphia where he met and married his wife, Catherine. They later went to live in Burke County, North Carolina. During this time, they became the parents of seven children: Elizabeth, George, Sally, Henry, Peggy, John and Mary Polly.

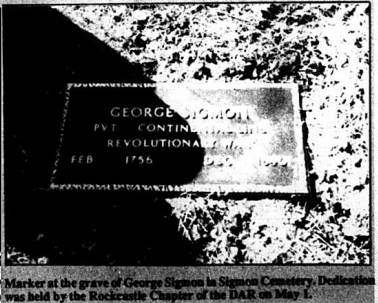
On July 26, 1853, Sigmon applied for and was granted a pension. His place of residence was Lincoln County, North Carolina.

In 1835, Sigmon, his wife, widow daughter and grandson traveled to the Rockcastle County, Kentucky to see their son, George, and family. His widow daughter was Mary Polly Sigmon, wife of Wil-

liam Sigmon and her son, Barmett. It is not hard to imagine the trials and hardships that this little family must have endured to get from North Carolina to Rockcastle County.

George Sigmon died about 1840 and his widow, Catherine, was allowed to draw his pension. She was blind and her daughter, Mary, made her application to get from North Georgia was a farmer and a blacksmith. Records show that several young men were indentured to him for the purpose of learning to be a blacksmith.

If one looks at this very small cemetery (Sigmon), they will be able to determine that at least one of every

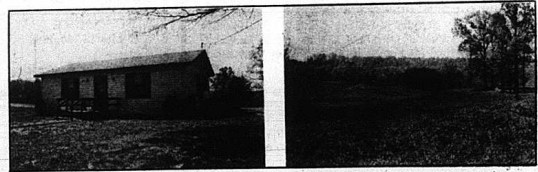

Ordinance 541.0 Amendment for the Public

Adopted & Effective 5-2-88
 As set forth in KRS - Chapter 446

SECTION I.
 Parking on Main Street in The City of Livingston, Kentucky. No exceptions to be made at any time. There will be no double parking, no parking on the wrong side of the street and/or the wrong way. No vehicle shall be parked on yellow lines or by fire hydrants.

SECTION II.
 Parking on Back and/or Side Streets can be parked as always in the past - either side of the street and/or facing either way. This is to be allowed only if the vehicle is not blocking right-of-way to entrance of street or street itself. This is to allow for all emergency vehicles if and when needed.

SECTION III.
 Parking on Main Street for vehicles Loading and/or Unloading will be excluded from Section I, except for blocking fire hydrants and emergency vehicles.

SECTION IV.
 Violation of Section I, II, or III of this ordinance constitutes a misdemeanor, with a penalty of a fine not less than \$25 for each offense. Also, violators shall be responsible for towing charges of vehicle and storage costs, if applicable.

SECTION V.
 This ordinance shall be in full force and effective as of 5-6-88 at 7 a.m. As required by law on its adoption, approval, attestation and publication by law.

All fines payable and due 10 days from issue to either Mayor Medley or Rebecca Bullock, city clerk. Payable between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

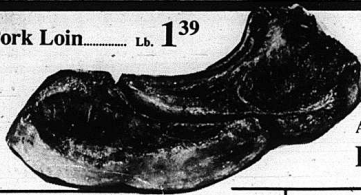

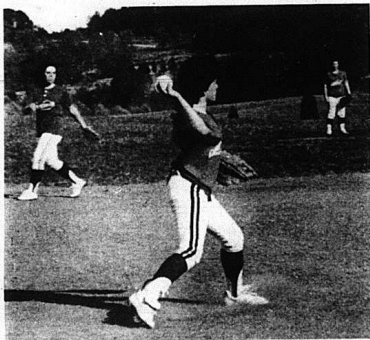

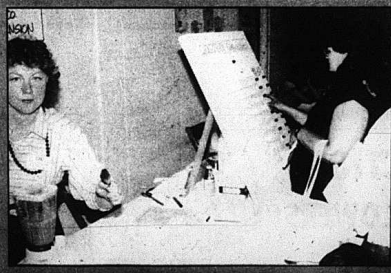
Wreck on off ramp

Eastern Kentucky family has new cat trivia game

An Eastern Kentucky family has designed and produced a new board game. Sam, Lana, Jaymie and Chip Begley of London, are the inventors of "Kentucky Wildcat Basketball Trivia."

The Begleys have always been Kentucky Basketball fans. Sam Begley is a London attorney. Lana is a social worker employed by the Cabinet for Human Resources. Jaymie is a freshman at Sue Bennett College and Chip is a sophomore at Laurel County High School. They had enjoyed other trivia games and

decided that developing a UK Basketball trivia game would be a fun project for the family. It was more of an undertaking than they realized. It has taken about three years to complete.

"We love UK and we just started designing the game," said Chip. "It is the only game that has trivia about UK that I know of. It was a family project, time consuming, but fun." The standard size game board has the official University of Kentucky logo as its centerpiece and is in full color. As you would expect, the

game follows a basketball theme, allowing for up to five players. Players can make turnovers, free throws, and offensive, defensive or technical fouls. It even allows players to be benched. Players may receive one, two or three point scoring opportunities, just as in basketball. Points are awarded by correctly answering trivia questions on UK Basketball history. The trivia questions are in five levels of difficulty, ranging from very easy to very difficult. Players get easier questions on a free throw (1 point) and harder questions on field goals (2 or 3 points). The player is given some control over whether he gets a free throw or a two or three point field goal. This allows everyone, whether a lifelong UK fan or a relatively new fan, to enjoy the game and be competitive.

Samples of the trivia questions are featured throughout this article. What was the nickname of the Wildcats who wore #21 and scored 41 points in an NCAA Championship game?

The game is being produced and will be marketed by Chipnjay, Inc., a company the Begleys formed for that purpose. The University of Kentucky has officially licensed the game and copyrights and patents have been applied for. The game will sell for \$24.95.

The Begleys said one of the most difficult tasks was the design of the board. Although they did not keep track of the number of boards designed they tried, there were several. "We would make a board layout and play the game," said Lana Begley, President of Chipnjay, Inc. "We would notice problems or improvements that could be made and redo the board layout and start again. It took a lot of trial and error to design an attractive game board that played well while staying with the basketball theme."

Kentucky Wildcat Basketball Trivia has been designed to appeal to all UK Basketball fans. There are senior citizens who can draw on a lifetime of following the Cats when they play this game. There are youngsters and others who have only followed the Cats for a few years. This is the reason for having easy and hard trivia questions. "The game has a lot of information and you can learn a lot," said Jaymie Begley. She likes the fact that anyone has a chance to win. She said she can even compete with her father, who is more knowledgeable about UK Basketball.

What UK player scored the winning points in the '82 Kentucky High School Championship game with a last second midcourt shot?

The game will not contain any questions about Rex Chapman or any of the current players. NCAA rules prohibit the use of the name of any player who still has collegiate eligibility remaining in any commercial product.

Chipnjay does intend to update the game by producing new trivia cards after each season. Current plans are to produce an additional fifty cards, each containing five questions, every year. Work has already begun on the first set of update cards, which will contain questions about UK's graduating seniors, Bennett, Davender, Lock, Madison and Jenkins.

Does any SEC school have an all time winning record against UK?

The game will be marketed exclusively by Chipnjay, Inc. It will be sold directly to the public by taking mail and telephone orders. Chipnjay does not plan to place the game in any retail stores. Although Chipnjay is already taking orders, the game will not be available for shipment until late May. The game can be ordered by mail at P.O. Box 399, London, Ky.

40741, or by calling 606 878-4609. What player led UK in scoring in '76, '77 and '78?

Having the game manufactured was about as large an undertaking as designing it, the Begleys said. None of them had any experience with manufacturing products such as this. They learned by trial and error. Chipnjay hired a firm in Lexington to do the graphic artwork. The color separations, or preparation of negatives for the printer, were done by another Lexington firm. The game board and box were printed in Louisville and shipped to Nashville, where they were laminated to heavy cardboard. The trivia cards were printed in Lexington. Dice and playing pieces were ordered from a company in New York. The game rules were printed in London.

How many times has UK been eliminated from the NCAA Tournament by an SEC team?

Chipnjay is now receiving shipments of various parts of the game. The next problem is assembling the games. Thousands and thousands of cards and game pieces must be sorted and packed in game boxes. When asked how she intended to handle the assembly, Lana Begley laughed and said, "I don't know. We are still working on that."

Are other games planned for the future? "We really haven't decided for sure," Lana Begley said. "We have discussed the possibility of producing games for other schools; but we are going to wait and see how this one does before going further."

Incidentally, "Goose" was the nickname of Jack Givens, who wore number 21 and scored 41 points in the 1978 NCAA Championship Game. Paul Andrews hit the shot that provided the winning points for Laurel County in the '82 Kentucky High School Game. No SEC team has an all time winning record against UK. Jack Givens led the Cats in scoring in '76, '77 and '78. UK's

Why Teach "Just One Church?"

Sometimes people ask, "Why does the church of Christ teach there is just one church?" (1) THE LORD PROMISED TO BUILD BUT ONE CHURCH: "Upon this rock I will build my CHURCH" (singular—Matt. 16:18). If there is more than one church, He would have said "churches."

(2) HE BUILT BUT ONE BODY: The body is the church (Col. 1:18); the church is the body (Eph. 1:22-23). There is one body (Eph. 4:4). There is BUT one body (1 Cor. 12:13, 20). Therefore there is only ONE CHURCH. How can anyone read such clear language then say there is more than one church?

(3) It says that hundreds of religious bodies bearing DISTINCTIVE NAMES, DOCTRINES AND PRACTICES constitute one body! I know it is not so, and I know that you know that I know it is not so! These hundreds of religious bodies no more make ONE BODY than Israel and Arabia make ONE NATION!

The oldest denomination of othem all (the Catholic church) originated in 606AD. The Lord's church originated in 33AD. Thus, the oldest denomination in the world is 573 years too young to be the Lord's church or a part thereof.

(2) It would mean that 1 one must be a member of one of the denominations to be saved. This is why I asked if the ones making this argument would stay with their reasoning. If all the denominations make up the Lord's church, the Bible says salvation is in the church (Acts 2:47), so ALL saved persons would, of necessity, have to be a member of one of the denominations. But this is much too STRONG for modern tolerant-stand-for-nothing "protestantism!" THEY TELL US CONFIDENTLY THAT ONE DOESN'T HAVE TO BE A MEMBER OF ANY CHURCH TO BE SAVED. If you don't believe this is true, ask your preacher who he believes. But if the Lord's church is made up of all the denominations, and one doesn't have to be a member of any denomination to be saved, then one doesn't have to be a member of the Lord's church to be saved. If this prescription is too strong for protestantism, who is the druggist?

Nearly 200 people have passed the GED at EKVU in 1988 so far. Adults who have not completed high school can take the GED tests to meet job requirements, to become eligible for further education, and for personal satisfaction.

To be eligible, an individual must be at least 17 years old and must have been out of school for at least one year.

Any person wanting to take the GED must obtain an AE-6 form from the office of the Superintendent where he or she last attended school in Kentucky. The person must then call the Institutional Research and Testing office at EKVU to reserve space on the test day. The EKVU number is (606) 622-1281.

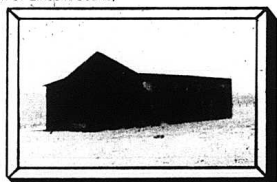

- over the age of 35
- no known breast problems (lumps, bleeding or discharge from nipple, puckering or dimpling)
- not pregnant or nursing
- not had a baseline mammogram

During this period the cost will be reduced to \$60.00.
