



Water skiing gets city council approval

No money involved in law suit

A recent civil suit between a local constable, a former state trooper and a former craditales for county judge/ executive was held in Rockcastle Circuit Court recently. The four day trial, which was symred by an automobile accident in February of 1986 ended with a local jury awarding no money for the plaintift, Constable Randall Stevens. suit against former Kenutcky State Police Trooper Darrell Presley and Leonard "Roge" Hammond, of Maretburg, a former candidate for County Judge/Executive. Stevens sued both men for medical expenses, lost wages, mentail and physical suffering and permanent impairment of his power to earn money. According to court records the jury found that Presley was 95 percent at fault for the accident and that Ham-mond was 2 bercent at fault.

fault for the accident and that Ham-mond was Spectran taf fault. Stevens, who was a passenger in Presley's cruiser was injured as well as Presley and Hammonds. According to a report filed by KSP Sgt. David Biggerstoff of London, Hammonds apparently ran a stop sign while turning left off old ky. 461 hammonds apparently ran a stop sign while turning left off old ky. 461 noto U.S. 150. Hammond's truck was struck broadside by Presley's cruiser, which was traveling at a high rate of speed with no emergency lights in use.

use. Both the cruiser and Hammonds truck were totaled. At the time of the accident Ham-monds was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, failure to stop at a stop sign, and failure to yield the right-of-way. He was found guilty in Rockcastle District Court of D.U.I. last Decem-







Ordinance 541.0 Amendment for the Public

Adopted & Effective 5-2-88 As set forth in KRS - Chapter 446

SECTION L Parking on <u>Main Street</u> in The City of Livingston, Ken-tucky. No exceptions to be made at any time. There will be no double parking, no parking on the wrong side of the street and/or the wrong way. No vehicle shall be parked on yellow lines or by fire hydrants.

SECTION II.

SECTION II. Parking on <u>Back</u> and/or <u>Side Streets</u> can be parked as always in the past – either side of the street and/or facing either way. This is to be allowed only if the vehicle is not blocking right-of-way to entrance of street or street itself. This is to allow for all emergency vehicles if and when needed.

SECTION III.

Parking on <u>Main Street</u> for vehicles <u>Loading</u> and/or <u>Un-loading</u> will be excluded from Section I, except for blocking fire hydrants and emergency vehicles.

SECTION IV. Violation of Section 1, II, or III of this ordinance constitutes a misdemeanor, with a penalty of a fine not less than \$25 for each offense. Also, violators shall be responsible for towing charges of vehicle and storage costs, if applicable.

SECTION V.

SECTION V. This ordinance shall be in full force and effective as of 5-6-88 at 7 a.m. As required by law on its adoption, approval, attestation and publication by law. 
