The Senate, while steeped in tradition, is hargly above change and improvement. Numerous internal and external studies have been done on the structure and operation of the Senate. The Committee on Rules and Administration, of which I am the chairman, has a continuing responsibility to study and report to the Senate on its operations.

Over the past several months a comprehensive analysis was conducted by Dr. Oish A. Singletary, President Emeritus and professor of history at the University of Kentucky, He was charged with submitting a report on the Senate that would encompass earlier reports while analyzing current proposals for change as well.

Dr. Singletary's report was the basis for this report and was not intended to be a new, study, Instead, we wanted to present a survey of recent attempts at reform to look at what has actually been done and to identify some of the more significant issues that remain unresolved.

If we are to continue to fulfill the needs of all our citizens, we must strive for a more streamlined and efficient process. Your time and money are wasted as well when unnecessary delays bog down the true work of the Senate.

The study revealed, with no surprise to any of us, that the number no priority is more efficient use of time on the Senate floor.

Senators expressed concern about certain time-consuming procedures such as quorum calls, votes on issues that have little opposition and repeated consideration of the same issue. Changes in these areas appear to be essential if more efficient and more effective use of the Senate's time is to be realized.

A second concern was the lack of a definite Senate schedule. While the current schedule of three weeks in Washington and one week in the home state is seen as a positive improvement, it has led to problems in committee scheduling.

A third area of concern was the extraordinary time devoted to the budget. Somehow, the Senate must bring the budget process under comittee has been guided by two fundamental bel

mittee has been guided by two fundamental beliefs. First, members of the Senate must be as concerned with preserving the Senate as with changing it. History and experience show that prudent change may be necessary to preserve this body's fundamental nature and purpose. I have also asked my colleagues on the Quality of Life Committee to review the report's options and submit proposals to the full Senate for action. ### Help for Agriculture Diversity, Trade, New Prisons Approved

As Vice Chairman of the House Appropriations Subcommittee which funds the Departments of Commerce, Justice and State, it is my job to make sure that we provide adequate funding for each of these agencies and to target that money to programs that need it the most. Until which provides the money for these programs for next year has now gone to the White House, and I am pleased that I year as better funding for númerous programs of local and national interest.

Here are just a few examples:

AGRICULTURAL DIVERSITY. PRISONS. Thanks to tougher laws and sentencing, we have over-growded prisons throughout the nation. Our bill includes funding to help reduce that overcrowding by up to 15 percent by adding 6.500 new prison beds. We must make sure we can put behind bars those who pose a threat to

WEATHER WARNINGS. As this year's hurricanes and tornadoes have shown, we need to improve our technology in weather forecasting and warnings. My bill includes funding for new weather satellites as well as state-of-the-art Doppler weather radar, tools we need to track storms and warn people of potential danger. This bill also includes the instructions I meeted which require the National Weather Service to improve weather radio service in Bell, Harlan, Knox and Clay Counties, which this May's Middlesboro tornado exposed as too weak in some areas.

THE WAR OF IDEAS. While relations between East and West have WAN OF IDEAS. White reasons occure assault west nave thawd, we still face the challenge of gathering international support for American foreign policy. I was pleased to help secure additional modernize Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty, whose broadcasts to Eastern Europe, help get our message behind the Iron Curtain. If this system works, we hope to expand it all along our southern border.

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





## Helping Children Handle Conflict

While conflict with friends is common during childhood, arguments and fighting among siblings feel less need to inhibit conflict. There is no possibility that the relationship will end as may happen as a result of conflict between friends.
The ability to get along with others

They have difficulty understanding that conflict usually arises because of mutual disagreement. On October 22, 1986, President Reagan signed into law the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA, Public Law 99-519). The law required EPA to develop regulations which provide a comprehensive framework for addressing asbestos problems in public and private elementary and secondary schools. On October 30, 1987, EPA published the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule (40 CER Part 763 Subpart E). This New Rule requires all public and private elementary and secondary schools to inspect for friable and non-friable asbestos, develop asbestos management plans that address asbestos hazards in school buildings, and implement response actions in a timely fashion.

To carry out the above activities involving inspections, management plans, and response actions the Rockcastle County Board of Education has utilized accredited personnel. On April 30, 198, EPA published the Model, Accreditation Plan (40, CFR Part 763 Appendix C to Subpart E) required by ARERA, which specifies training, examination and other requirements for persons who inspect, develop management plans, and design or conductresponse actions in schools. 

The community had been named Wildie in honor of two brothers. Will and Dee Albright. In 1893 Isaac and Ann Phillips deeded to the congregation a spot of ground on which the church was built.

On Oct. 5, 1975, the Wildie Christian Church congregation began a new era in their history as they vacated the old church building (where worship had been held from 1894 to 1975) and began worshipping in their present building located in the center of the Wildie community.




