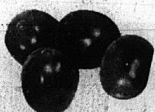

# Citizens against lottery ask for debate with governor

Jim Fugitte, Campaign Chairman for Citizens Against State Lottery, announced today that "After waiting for over two weeks for a response" to his request to Governor Wilkinson for two committee public hearings in each of the seven Congressional Districts, "we've decided to challenge the governor himself to public debate on lottery issues people all over Kentucky want to know more about."

Fugitte said that many people are beginning to wonder whether or not Governor Wilkinson wants Kentuckians to understand the lottery amendment they're being asked to vote on. He said, "With just over a month left before we cast our votes, he's still not responding to real people with real questions. Maybe he's so confident about winning on this number one priority of his that he believes he can pretend opposition doesn't exist, that we're ghosts from Kentucky's Past. But we want to tell him we're for real today, and we're not going to vaporize tomorrow just because he refuses to treat us as real."

Governor Wilkinson doesn't seem to remember that he's now governor and not just a candidate for governor. When he was a candidate, he could listen and talk to people or not, just as he chose. But now he doesn't have that choice. Now he's governor of all the people, even those who don't agree with him.

"I'd be sure that a state-owned lottery is good for Kentucky, he shouldn't be afraid of public hearings or debate. We believe his failure to do these things means he knows deep down that the only good lottery is an unexamined lottery."

Asked how Citizens Against State Lottery feels about the latest Bluegrass Poll showing Kentuckians favoring a lottery still substantially ahead of those opposing it, Fugitte responded, "We always want to

know how friends and neighbors are thinking. We might be just a little happier if the percentages were reversed, but one thing you've got to keep in mind is that we're 24 percent age points ahead of where we were according to this same polling service just over a year ago. It looks as if as we get closer to voting time and the unanswered lottery questions grow, opinion is shifting our way. And we expect the shift-rate to accelerate in the next five weeks."

"My guess is that the governor's seeing the same pattern we are and that his concern has shifted to worry. If he's not worried, then why'd he have Frank Keener, his Lottery Commission director, switch his fact-finding role to advocacy role?"

"You know, when the Lottery Commission was appointed two months ago, the common understanding was that it would be neutral on the lottery question and that its purpose would be to study lottery operations other places and report back to the governor with recommendations on how to operate one in case Kentuckians approved one. But no sooner did they get started than all of a sudden Frank Keener's no longer a vice-president at Citizens Fidelity Bank, and then he's out publicly promoting the lottery. I know he's representing lottery proponents on the Metz Show in a couple of weeks because I'm going to be there on the other side of the table."

"Governor Wilkinson on the one hand seems to be saying that they're so far ahead they don't have to respond to Kentuckians with questions. But on the other hand he's now demoted his fact finding general to lottery lieutenant."

"I don't know how we're going to be able to take any Lottery Commission recommendations seriously when its director's job description has changed so radically. Frank Keener can no longer be considered an ob-

jective factfinder. The blue of that blue ribbon commission has faded fast."

"We're ready to go anywhere in Kentucky any time, to vigorously and publicly discuss all aspects of the proposed lottery amendment with its chief advocate, Governor Wilkinson. We're ready. Is he?"

## Cold, hard facts about the drinking driver

Forty-three percent of those who died on Kentucky's highways last year were in a crash involving a drinking driver. That statistic, along with others, was included in the newly-released 1987 Kentucky Traffic Accident Facts Report.

The report, published by the Kentucky State Police Records Section, stated that 359 of the 849 people killed were in an alcohol-related crash. In 1986, 42 percent of the 808 people killed were in alcohol-related crashes. "A collision that involves a drinking driver is not what we call an accident -- it's a crash. The driver consciously made a decision to drink and drive knowing there are risks in that action," said Justice Secretary Michael Troop.

According to the study, many drivers involved in these fatal crashes exceeded Kentucky's legal BAC (Blood Alcohol Content) limit. In fact, 70 percent tested 10 BAC or higher. (In 1986, 74 percent involved in fatal crashes tested .10 or higher.)

Occupant restraint statistics remain fairly constant from 1986 to 1987. Ninety-four percent of the vehicle occupants killed during 1987 were not wearing any kind of restraint -- the same as in 1986. Seventy-one percent of those vehicle occupants who were ejected from their vehicles were killed. (In 1986, it was 70 percent.)

Thirteen children, four years of age and under, were killed on Kentucky roadways. Two were in child restraints, however, data is not available as to whether those two were properly secured in the restraint or not. (In 1986, 10 children four years of age and under were killed; none were in child safety seats.)

Additional facts from the 1987 study: Only one-third of all fatalities were between the ages of 15 and 24. Of the 849 killed, 596 were men and 253 were women.

Most fatal accidents were head-on collisions on dry pavement at night. One of every 4,388 Kentucky citizens died as a result of a fatal crash. People injured in Kentucky traffic accidents totaled 50,015.

Most non-fatal accidents were rear-end collisions on dry pavement during the day.

"One of every seventy Kentucky citizens was injured in a traffic crash. Kentucky traffic accidents in 1987 cost the state (wage loss, medical expenses and property damage) between \$763 and \$780 million dollars."

## Fund Raiser Pleads Guilty

U.S. Attorney D. Michael Crites, Southern District of Ohio, and A.F. Landrum, Postal Inspector in Charge, Cincinnati, Ohio, today announced the conviction of Peggy M. Williamson, Huntington, WV, for violation of Section 1341, Title 18, U.S. Code, Mail Fraud.

Ms. Williamson pled guilty to one count of Mail Fraud in connection with the soliciting of donations, via telephone, for magic shows she promoted on the behalf of various Chapters of the American Cancer Society and the Portsmouth, Ohio Jaycees. Williamson recruited local salespeople in Ironton, Oh. Maysville, Ky. and Portsmouth, Oh, to help promote the events. Donations from contributors for tickets were sent via the U.S. Mail to addresses controlled by Williamson. Williamson converted to her own use, funds intended for these charities. Williamson paid no money to the American Cancer Society in Ironton, Ohio, or Maysville, Ky. Moreover, magic show expenses were not paid in full, as agreed, by Williamson.

Williamson could be sentenced up to five years in prison and fined up to \$1,000 or both. Sentencing to be scheduled within 30 to 45 days.

# Report to Kentucky

## SENATOR WENDELL FORD



U.S. Senate, Washington, D.C. 20510  
WORKING TOWARD A MORE EFFICIENT SENATE

The Senate, while steeped in tradition, is hardly above change and improvement. Numerous internal and external studies have been done on the structure and operation of the Senate. The Committee on Rules and Administration, of which I am the chairman, has a continuing responsibility to study and report to the Senate on its operations.

Over the past several months a comprehensive analysis was conducted by Dr. Otis A. Singletary, President Emeritus and professor of history at the University of Kentucky. He was charged with submitting a report on the Senate that would encompass earlier reports, while analyzing current proposals for change as well.

Dr. Singletary's report was the basis for this report and was not intended to be a new study. Instead, we wanted to present a survey of recent attempts at reform to look at what has actually been done and to identify some of the more significant issues that remain unresolved.

If we are to continue to fulfill the needs of all our citizens, we must strive for a more streamlined and efficient process. Your time and money are wasted as well when unnecessary delays bog down the true work of the Senate.

The study revealed, with no surprise to any of us, that the number one priority is more efficient use of time on the Senate floor. Senators expressed concern about certain time-consuming procedures such as quorum calls, votes on issues that have little opposition and repeated consideration of the same issue. Changes in these areas appear to be essential if more efficient and more effective use of the Senate's time is to be realized.

A second concern was the lack of a definite Senate schedule. While the current schedule of three weeks in Washington and one week in the home state is seen as a positive improvement, it has led to problems in committee scheduling.

A third area of concern was the extraordinary time devoted to the budget. Somehow, the Senate must bring the budget process under control. I have been involved in efforts to move our budget cycle to a two-year rather than an annual cycle. This will relieve a great deal of frustration and complexity that now overruns the process. Such a change would allow all levels of government to make better spending decisions.

In its work to address the operations of the Senate, the Rules Committee has been guided by two fundamental beliefs. First, members of the Senate must be as concerned with preserving the Senate as with changing it. History and experience show that prudent change may be necessary to preserve this body's fundamental nature and purpose. And second, the responsibility for improving the condition of the Senate lies with all Senators.

The report was presented to the entire Senate recently for consideration. I have also asked my colleagues on the Quality of Life Committee to review the report's options and submit proposals to the full Senate for action. As a member of that committee I will urge my colleagues to give this matter top consideration so that any proposals can be acted on early in the 101st Congress.

## Help for Agriculture Diversity, Trade, New Prisons Approved

As Vice Chairman of the House Appropriations Subcommittee which funds the Departments of Commerce, Justice and State, it is my job to make sure that we provide adequate funding for each of these agencies and to target that money to programs that need it the most. Our bill which provides the money for these programs for next year has now gone to the White House, and I am pleased that I was able to secure funding for numerous programs of local and national interest.

Here are just a few examples:

**AGRICULTURAL DIVERSITY.** As I announced last week, I secured \$247,000 to help start up a demonstration project in our district for fish farming, or aquaculture. We need additional options for our tobacco growers and other farmers to help them supplement their farm income. This project will hopefully provide us with a whole new industry and with new economic benefits for our small farmers in Southern Kentucky.

**TRADE.** I successfully pushed through additional funds to help us hire more Foreign Commercial Service officers at our embassies overseas. These people are international salesmen for American products, including gold and tobacco, and hopefully they can help us sell more products abroad. This funding will also help us enforce the new trade bill signed into law by President Reagan and bring down our trade deficit.

**PRISONS.** Thanks to tougher laws and sentencing, we have overcrowded prisons throughout the nation. Our bill includes funding to help reduce that overcrowding by up to 15 percent by adding 6,500 new prison beds. We must make sure we can put behind bars those who pose a threat to society.

**WEATHER WARNINGS.** As this year's hurricanes and tornadoes have shown, we need to improve our technology in weather forecasting and warnings. My bill includes funding for new weather satellites as well as state-of-the-art Doppler weather radar, tools we need to track storms and warn people of potential danger. This bill also includes the instructions I inserted which require the National Weather Service to improve weather radio service in Bell, Harlan, Knox and Clay Counties, which this May's Middleboro tornado exposed as too weak in some areas.

**THE WAR OF IDEAS.** While relations between East and West have thawed, we still face the challenge of gathering international support for American foreign policy. I was pleased to help secure additional funding to modernize Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty, whose broadcasts to Eastern Europe help get our message behind the Iron Curtain. We also include continuing funds for the Voice of America, heard worldwide, and for Worldnet, our international television programming which has already reaped great benefits for us in foreign policy and goodwill.

**STOPPING ILLEGAL IMMIGRATION.** I was able to place instructions in our bill setting up a pilot project to fingerprint illegal aliens caught crossing our border into the San Diego area. These fingerprints can then be checked to see how many of those caught are repeat offenders or are wanted for crimes in California. If this system works, we hope to expand it all along our southern border.

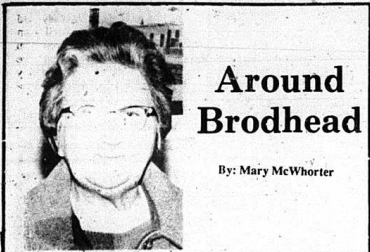

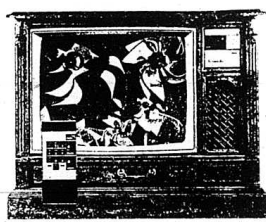

## Highly touted Bell crushes Rocketts 32-6

For a brief time last Friday night it looked as if the Rocketts were going to roll to their seventh straight victory of the season, that was until Bell County got their hands on the ball.

The Rocketts took the opening kickoff and marched straight down the field for the first touchdown of the game and an early 6-0 lead. Quarterback Chad Burdette scored on a 1 yard run with 6:37 remaining in the first quarter. The extra point attempt by Chuck Napier was wide right and it was Bell's turn to play offense.

The bigger, stronger Bell team quickly proved why they are rated as one of the top teams in the state. They too, scored on their first possession and tied the score at 6. After a Rockett possession failed to get a first down it was time to punt.

One of the bright spots of the evening was the punting of Adam Coleman. Coleman punted four times for 207 yards and an average of 52 yards per punt. His first punt of the evening was over 50 yards, but the end result was six points for Bell County. Bell County's Joe McGeorge fielded Coleman's punt on the eight yard line and streaked down the side line 92 yards for the second touchdown of the evening for Bell County.

Bell County added another touchdown just before half time and led 20-6 at the break.

The Rockett defense, led by Chad Hodges and Adam Coleman held the Bobcats in check for most of the second half. However, the hitting that was going on resembled a college game more than a high school football game. Luckily the Rocketts escaped with few injuries none of which were serious.

Offensively, other than the first drive, the Rocketts had difficulty getting on track against the big line of

Bell. Dane Cox and Kevin Rowe both ran hard but more often than not there was very little running room.

Quarterback Chad Burdette was only 3 for 9 passing on the evening with four interceptions. At times Burdette appeared to be forcing the ball where there was very little room. Chuck Shields was the leading receiver with two receptions for 24 yards followed by Adam Coleman with one reception for 8 yard.

A touchdown late in the fourth quarter made the final score Bell County, 32-6.

On offense the Rocketts were led by Dane Cox with 75 yards on 14 carries, Kevin Rowe had 73 yards on 13 carries and Mike Spires had 15 yards on 5 carries. Chad Burdette had a negative six yards on 34 carries.

Defensively Chad Hodges led the Rocketts with 24 tackles, Adam Coleman had 21, Kevin Rowe had 12, Dane Cox 9, Chad Merritt 7, Les Scalf 6, Bobby Hayes 5, Chad Burdette 5, Chuck Napier 4 and 1 quarterback sack. The Rockett defense was on the field substantially more than offense thus resulting in the high number of tackles by each player. The Rocketts, now 6 and 1 on the year, must journey to Monticello to take on the Wayne County Cardinals. According to Coach Tom Larke, Wayne County has perhaps a better offense than Bell. If this is the case the Rocketts may be in for a long evening. The Rocketts defeated Wayne County 6-0 last year when the Rocketts scored in the final two minutes of the game.

This year Wayne is 5-1. They are coming off a 24-22 heart-breaking loss at the hands of Leslie County. Their only other loss was 24-7 to powerful Corbin.

Game time this Friday night will be 8 p.m.

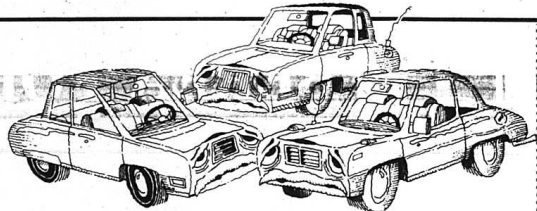

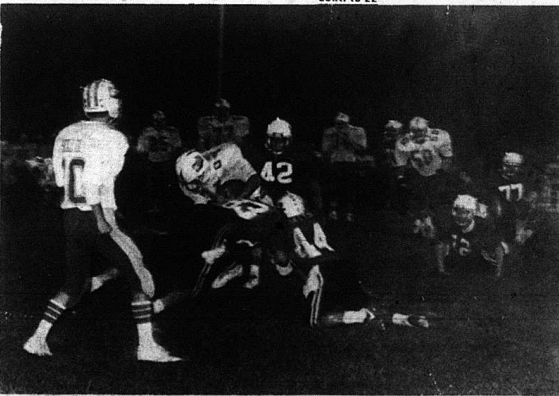

### FREE TRADE AGREEMENT IS GOOD FOR KENTUCKY

The United States and Canada share the longest undefended border in the world. The relationship between our countries is forged in the spirit of peace and strengthened by our economic ties. The Senate, with my full support, made the bonds between our countries even stronger with the passage on September 19 of the U.S.-Canada Free Trade Agreement (FTA). This landmark piece of trade legislation will play a part in boosting the economic future of our state and the nation while acting as a catalyst to create thousands of new jobs.

Although the FTA still must be ratified by the Canadian Parliament, the key provision of this treaty mandates the total dismantling of tariffs between our countries over the next ten years. This will eliminate protectionist taxes and fuel expansion of the \$166 billion in trade that passes over our northern border each year.

The latest trade figures show that Kentucky exports nearly \$400 million worth of commodities to Canada each year. Major exports include motor vehicle engines and parts, computers, alloys, aluminum, equipment and tools. Nearly 50,000 Kentuckians are employed in producing these goods. In addition, our state's service sector currently restricts these exports with Canadian firms. When provisions in the FTA phasing out tariffs and duties become effective, our manufacturers will be able to gain a greater share of this market and put more people to work.

Kentucky plastics, chemical and rubber companies will also find new doors opened in the Canadian market by the FTA. The duties that currently restrict these exports will be removed and prices will be more competitive with Canadian products.

Manufacturing is not the only area covered by the FTA. Kentucky bourbon and other distilled spirits will enjoy new access and increased profits in the lucrative Canadian market when duties are dropped. In addition, U.S. firms will be eligible to compete for an additional \$500 million in Canadian government purchases.

What is critically important about the FTA is that it will allow the free flow of goods and services between the world's largest trading partners in an era of increased competition for foreign markets.

Nearly every segment of Kentucky's manufacturing base will benefit from the FTA. This treaty is a giant step forward in the effort to break down trade barriers between U.S. and Canadian marketplaces and will serve as model for the rest of the world to follow.

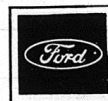

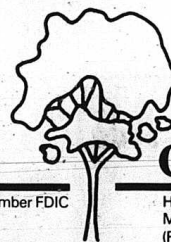

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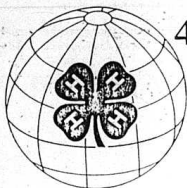

The Cumberland College Department of Mathematical Sciences invites the public to observe the planet Mars. Observations will be held on Monday nights: Oct. 3, 10, and 17 beginning at 8:30 p.m. in front of the Science Building on Maple Street. In case of cloudy conditions on Oct. 3, an additional observation will be scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 4. No alternate dates are set for the other two Mondays.

The observations will be narrated by Dr. James Manning, assistant professor of physics at Cumberland College.

Mars, the fiery red planet, is 228 million kilometers (142 million miles) from the sun and is passing closer to Earth (about 60 million miles) than at any time during the past seventeen years. This rare opportunity offers a brighter and larger Mars disk which includes a few surface features. During the early weeks of October, Mars will be ten times brighter than normal.

In addition to Mars, observations of Saturn, Jupiter, and the Earth's moon may be possible on some nights.

Cumberland College offers degrees in mathematics and physics and provides pre-engineering background necessary to transfer to engineering schools.

### Helping Children Handle Conflict

Conflict with brothers and sisters is a normal part of development. Through conflict children become aware of rights and needs of others, assert themselves as individuals, and develop social problem-solving

skills. While conflict with friends is common during childhood, arguments and fighting among siblings feel less need to inhibit conflict. There is no possibility that the relationship will end as may happen as a result of conflict between friends.

The ability to get along with others

requires complex knowledge and skill. Children must be able to understand the others' perspective, correctly identify the intent of another's actions, generate and evaluate potential responses to a conflict situation, be capable of negotiation, and be able to communicate effectively. Until children possess these abilities, they are unable to handle conflict in a mature manner.

During middle childhood, increases in mental and verbal abilities lead to changes in how children handle conflict. While physical aggression declines, verbal insults and arguments increase. During the early elementary school years children typically view conflict as a problem that is caused by one party and felt by the other. To overcome the conflict, children expect the "guilty" party to confess and make amends. They have difficulty understanding that conflict usually arises because of mutual disagreement. During the latter elementary school years, children begin to recognize that both parties contribute to the conflict and must therefore, participate in its resolution. However, it is not until adolescence that children fully understand that solutions must be acceptable to both parties.

Although children's response to conflict is, in part, a function of their developmental level, parents, and families also play a role. You can help your child develop good conflict management skills by:

1. Fostering a positive self-concept in your child.
2. Giving individual attention to each child.
3. Establishing clear rules.
4. Helping children develop good communication skills.

### Don't give up on tomatoes even if they are green

It has been a hard year on tomatoes. If yours are still not red, you might want to pick them anyway. Green tomatoes can be used in a variety of ways.

Green tomatoes can be canned using any recipe calling for red tomatoes. In fact, since green tomatoes are more acidic than red ones, they actually are safer to eat. Green tomatoes also make wonderful pickles and relishes. Here's a recipe for piccalilli, or green tomato relish.

- Piccalilli**
- 2 gallons green tomatoes
  - 8 medium-size green peppers
  - 8 medium-size onions
  - 1 medium-size head cabbage
  - 1 cup canning salt
  - 1 cup brown sugar
  - 2 cups vinegar, 4-6% acidity
  - 3 tablespoons mixed pickling spices
  - 1 tablespoon white mustard seed
- Chop the vegetables, mix with the salt, and let stand overnight. Drain and press out as much liquid as possible. Mix vinegar and sugar, and add spices (in a clean cloth) and cook slowly for about 30 minutes (until clear). Remove spices. Pack in hot jars and adjust lids. Process for 10 minutes in boiling-water canner. Yield: about 14 pints.

This recipe for pickled green tomatoes is a good way to use up a bountiful supply of green tomatoes.

### Pickled Green Tomatoes

- Green or dry dill
- 3 tablespoons mixed pickling spices
- 36 medium or 72 small green tomatoes
- 1 1/2 cups canning salt
- 2 cups vinegar, 4-6% acidity
- 8 quarts hot water

Wash and dry tomatoes. Place a layer of dill and half of the pickling spices in a stone jar or stainless steel

container; top with tomatoes. Put another layer of dill and remaining spices over tomatoes. Dissolve salt in vinegar and water. Cover with dinner plate or glass pie plate. Fill jar with water; use to hold plate under brine. Cover and store in a cool place (68-72 degrees F) 2 to 4 weeks. Be certain that the tomatoes are covered with brine at all times. If necessary, during the curing process, make additional brine and pour over tomatoes. Remove scum each day. The tomatoes are cured when well-flavored and even in color. Drain. Pick tomatoes into hot jars, leaving 1/4-inch head space. Prepare fresh, hot brine: Combine 3/4 cup salt, 1 cup vinegar and 4 quarts water; boil 5 minutes; or strain brine in which tomatoes were cured and boil 5 minutes. Pour hot brine over tomatoes, leaving 1/4-inch head space. Adjust caps. Process pints and quarts 20 minutes in boiling-water canner. Makes 6 quarts.

If you have little time for canning or pickling, a simple way to preserve green tomatoes is to slice and freeze them in layers separated by plastic wrap or wax paper. This method is good for people who like fried green tomato slices.

### Notice of Passage and Summary of Bond Ordinance

Notice is hereby given that the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, at its meeting on September 20, 1988, at the Courthouse in Mount Vernon, Kentucky, considered and gave first reading to an Ordinance relating to the issuance and sale of \$3,550,000 (plus or minus up to \$250,000) of County of Rockcastle, Kentucky School Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1988, dated October 1, 1988, and such Ordinance was given its second reading, final passage and enactment on October 4, 1988.

The Ordinance authorizes the issuance and sale of said Bonds in stated form and denomination, the proceeds of which bonds are to be applied to pay the costs of the construction of a new 800 student elementary school for the County in Mount Vernon; approves the Board's designation of Johnson/Romanov, Lexington, Kentucky, as the Architect to prepare the plans and specifications for and to supervise the construction of said new school building project; approves Dupree & Company, Inc., 167 West Main, Sixth Floor, Lexington, Kentucky 40507, Kentucky, as Fiscal Agent for the County and the Board in the issuance, sale and delivery of the Bonds; provides for the creation of funds sufficient to pay the principal of and the interest on said Bonds as and when they mature; authorizes the acceptance of a Deed whereby the property site will be conveyed to the County; and authorizes the execution of a lease of the school building property to the Board of Education, on an annual lease-option basis, in the form of a Contract, Lease and Option, which instrument states that the Board expects to receive annually the amount of up to approximately \$153,500 toward the payment of the debt service on said Bonds, as a grant from the Kentucky School Facilities Construction Commission.

### Notice to Parents, Teachers and Employees of the Rockcastle County Board of Education

On October 22, 1986, President Reagan signed into law the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), Public Law 99-519. The law required EPA to develop regulations which provide a comprehensive framework for addressing asbestos problems in public and private elementary and secondary schools. On October 30, 1987, EPA published the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule (40 CFR Part 763 Subpart E). This New Rule requires all public and private elementary and secondary schools to inspect for friable and non-friable asbestos, develop asbestos management plans that address asbestos hazards in school buildings, and implement response actions in a timely fashion.

To carry out the above activities involving inspections, management plans, and response actions the Rockcastle County Board of Education has utilized accredited personnel. On April 30, 1986, EPA published the Model Accreditation Plan (40 CFR Part 763 Appendix C to Subpart E) required by AHERA, which specifies training, examination and other requirements for persons who inspect, develop management plans, and design or conduct response actions in schools. The Model Plan became effective on June 1, 1987.

By October 12, 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education will have completed an initial inspection to locate all asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM) and will have developed and submitted to the State of Kentucky an asbestos management plan that includes the results of the inspections. Prior to July 9, 1989, the Rockcastle County Board of Education will have begun to implement this management plan.

Copies of the management plan are available for review for those interested persons at the Administration Office at Rte. 5, Box 69, Mt. Vernon, Ky., after October 12, 1988.

The Wildie Christian Church, with Kenton Parkey as minister, meets at 10 a.m. for Sunday School, 11 a.m. for worship, and 7 p.m. for Wednesday prayer meetings and children's choir. It has a bi-monthly radio program on WRVK, 8:30-8:45 a.m., called "New Testament Christianity On The Air."

The Wildie Church first met in the railroad commissary in the 1880s. The first building was in 1893. The church is now located 1 1/2 miles on Rt. 1786 off U.S. 25 south in the Wildie community.

Elders are Billy Hiatt, Robert Huff, and Astor McNew. Deacons are Homer Brown, Lonnie Brown, Jack Daley, Jack Parsons, David Parsons, Hugh Ramsey, and James Reynolds. Randy Stone is Sunday School superintendent.

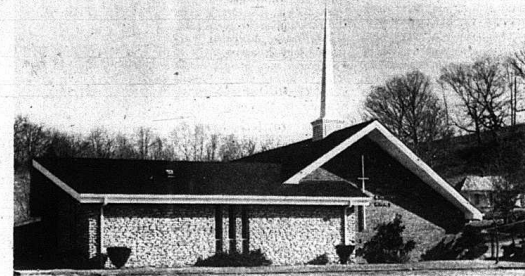
In 1872, when progress was beginning to sweep through the lonesome hill land hollows of Rockcastle County and big industry was reaching out greedy hands toward the wealth of coal and timber south of us, the Southern Railway obtained from the Kentucky legislature a permit to extend their line from Cincinnati across the state southward.

In the course of time, their advance engineers sought a water level route through the valley of Roundstone that carried them by a point later to become a passenger stop under the name of Wildie.

Part of the duties of the advance crew were to locate buildings, shops and equipment centers to expedite the job of handling the many workmen who would be required for leveling the ground, digging the tunnels, and laying ties and rails. A commissary was intended to supply the necessities for the work crews, and naturally a building must be erected to house such a commissary.

This building was on or near the property later known as the Aunt Sis Coffey place.

During the coming years, the work on the railroad was finally completed and the commissary, having served its purpose, was evacuated and abandoned. A small church congregation that that vicinity had been in existence for some time with no regular place of assembly. They were quick

to seize upon the opportunity of using the vacant commissary building for that purpose. The building had been known as Shattahans Commissary and the surrounding area as Shattahans Community.

It is not known exactly how long the congregation worshipped there. Sometime prior to 1893 they found a better location in the new community of Wildie, which had grown up around the railway station. The community had been named Wildie in honor of two brothers, Will and Dee Albright. In 1893 Isaac and Ann Phillips decided to the congregation a spot of ground on which the church was built.

On Oct. 5, 1975, the Wildie Christian Church congregation began a new era in their history as they vacated the old church building (where worship had been held from 1894 to 1975) and began worshipping in their present building located in the center of the Wildie community.

The congregation held official dedication services for its present building on Nov. 16, 1975. The church structure, with about 7,000 square feet of space, has a seating capacity of 180 plus 100 overflow. It also contains 12 classrooms, a

kitchen and a minister's study. On April 11, 1982, the Wildie congregation celebrated the payment of all building debt with a new building ceremony.

Some critics of the project contend that the restoration may be going too far, removing layers of paint which belong to Michelangelo's own work.

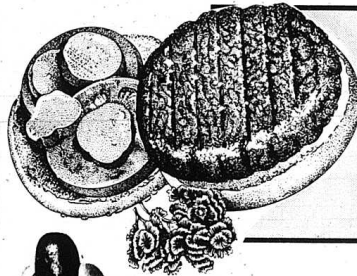

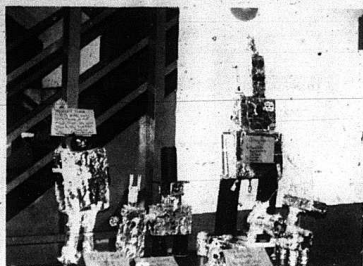
