and that he thought the school bus was moving when he met it on the roadway. In their suit, the Kirbys allege that Michael Kirby was not properly
supervised or directed while he was supervised or directed
exiting the school bus.
The suit further states that the school system failed to safcly operate
and plan its school bus routes, and and plan its school bus routes, and
morespecifically the school bus route more specifically the school busroute
in question. That the suit said in question. That the suit said
constituted neglience on the school system's part.
The suit also alleges that the school system, through its agents,
servants or employecs, violated the pupil ransporation safety statuesand regulations duly enacted by the Asaresultof the admissionsand commissions of the school system, vehicle on U.S. Hwy. 25 , injured and subsequently died.
The suit states that Michacl Kirby has been damaged for all medical expenses
$\$ 10,849.88$ and funcral expenses in the amount of $\$ 4,197.85$.
"As a result of the death of Michacl Kirby his power to carn
money has been destroyed to the damages of his estate," according to
the suit. The suit also alleges that Larry Kirby and Iva Jean Kirby were
deprived of the affection and deprived of the affection and
companionship that they would have received from their child, had he not died in the accident.
The Kirbys have asked for a jury trial and a judgement against the Boardof Education. Thedriver of the
