

# Homelessness is closer than many think

By: Richard Anderin Had a 21-year-old Mt. Vermon zenoffice last Thursday moming she might have suffered the same fate as a Lexington man who was found dead last week after seeking shelter in a verent apartment.

vacant apartment, Thursday the windchill factor was 30 degrees below zero. Thursday the Red Cross office in Berea was closed and Thursday Billea, and her 2-year-old son Jamie, were homeless. We've all heard about homeless people and many of us think that

problem exists only in the big city. After Thursday, we can vouch that it doesn't only happen in bigger metro-politan areas. When you have no politan areas. When you have no food, shelter or money you are homeless.

Here is how we got involved. A slim girl with long red hair carrying her two-year-old in her arms entered our office looking for the Red Cross office.

After learning that the office was sed Billea looked confused, she

But, Billea's problems didn't just start right before Christmas, they hung her head and left our office. It was evident when she left, that she actually began when she was placed

was very pregnant. It took only a few or a staff member to get the girl and her little boy into our warm office, where she informed us that she had no place to stay, no money, no transportation and no food for her or her son, who is still taking a bottle. It was obviously that she needed help.

People's Bank clock showed a reading of eight degrees and that was even more evident by the red nose and teary eyes of the child in her arms.

arms. The next few hours was a blur of endless phone calls. We called or-ganization after organization, social services offices, charity groups and churches.

After long, long waits, each place called would inform us of a reason they couldn't help Billea and Jamic. Some couldn't help because she was pregnant, some because she al-

ready had a child, some because she hadn't been beaten recently and some said they just didn't have any more money in that fund.

money in that fund. Through the South Madison F.A.C.T.S. Center we got several names of organizations who might have helped and the lady at the center was very helpful and called back very few minutes to see if we had found anything for Billea:

According to Billea, she and her son were made to leave their Mt. Vernon home just before Christmas and ever since then she has been l ever since then she has wing from place, to place r

the time spent in a motel room in Berea. But, when her money ran out she had to find somewhere to go.

Eight months pregnant, a two-year-old son, and relatively uneducated, Billea had few choices on that Thursday morning.

in an orphanage in Indiana at a young age. She and her older sister were adopted by a couple and lived there for a couple of years, before they takked their real mother into taking them back. #### **Decline in Student Attendance Continues** as Enrollment Increases Slightly

Enrollment in Rockcastle County schools at the close of the 4th month of school was 2922 in comparison to 2893 one year ago. Along with this slight increase in enrollment, there is a notable reduction in average daily attendance. The average daily attendance for the 1990-91 school year was 96.27%. The attendance for the first 4 months of the current school year is approximately 1% less than corresponding months of the 1990-91 school year. Various factors have contributed to the decline, including sickness due to flui-like conditions as well as complacency on 6ehalf of the students. As the district progresses through the second semester, continued emphasis will be placed on good attendance (exceeding 96%) by all school personnel. by all school personnel.

Time is a most valuable asset and can never be regained once lost or wasted. The benefits gained through good attendance in school are lifetime benefits. These benefits are not only for the individual, but society as a whole when this time in school helps promote a useful and productive citizen for the future. The Rockcastle County School System considers both these benefits when promoting good attendance







sone with mental illness received little attention to their needs. Most mental health care was provided in secluded hospitals and institutions. The new law drastically altered hedelivery of mental health services and inspired a new eraol optimism in mental health care. The original act was amfended eight times between 1963 and 1978 and was responsible for constuction and staffing over 730 community mental health centers community mental health centers


