## Decline in Student Attendance Continues as Enrollment Increases Slightly

Enrollment in Rockcastle County schools at the close of the 4th month of school was 2922 in comparison to 28930ne year ago. Along with this slight increase in enrollment, there is at notable reductoon in average daily attendance. The average daily attendance for the 1990-91 school year was $96.27 \%$. The atendance for the first 4 months of the current school year is approximately $1 \%$ less than corresponding due to flu-like conditions as well as complacency on through the second semester, continued emphasis will be placed on good attendance (exceeding 96\%) by all school personnel.
