Protective Parenting

Consequences inevitably follow irresponsible behavior. By far the most effective consequences result from the deed, itself, and are termed fratural. Other kinds of consequences can be imposed by parent consumers of consequences can be imposed by parent consumers. Example: the breadwinner does not keep back enough money to pay his taxes on April 15. The natural consequence is the sweat and guilt and hassle to get the money together, the penalty and interest charged by the IRS are the logical consequences, and the punishment might be a jail sentence if he refuses to pay at all. With children it works this way, Junior totals his car because of his reckless driving. Now the natural consequence is that Junior has no car and must somehow deal with getting it removed from the road. Parents should recognize the value of this lesson and not intervenc; or they can impose some logical consequences like not allowing him to use the family car alone for several weeks until he improves his driving habits. Or they may impose a punishment such as grounding him. People definitely learn more and are most agit to change their behavior if consequences imposed are logical. In the example above, if parents jump in and arrange their behavior if consequences imposed are logical. In the example above, if parents jump in and arrange to have Junior's car lowed, perhaps buy him a new car. then lecture him and ground him. the will not feel the impact of his mistake and can shift the blame to his mean parents for restricting his freedom.

Bringing this principle down to the very young child: little Alice refuses to eat, or worse yet, dumps her food on the floor. The sensible parents' response after the first or second episode would be to remove the plate calmly and allow little Alice to get good and hungry before the next meal. No battle of wills is going to work. (Children will eat what is given them when they are hungry and they cannot literally starve for several days.) At the logical fevel, the child should be ignored until the family has finished eating. The punishment often used in situations such as this is a spanking. Again this is a set up for parents to become the had guys and rivites a vicious cycle of negative bids for attention from the child.

Imposed punishment doesn't work very well. Virtually all negative behavior brings on natural consequences that are pretty effective and have the most impact for real change. However children often need parental to consequences.

Since major life-impacting natural consequences are often far removed in time from the irresponsible behavior that causes them, dialogue about these issues needs to begin early life so that when situations arise that warrant concept, the ground work warrant concern, the ground work has been laid. 



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
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Patch is gone

Within a year the kids were as much mine as if I had been their natural father and I felt like I had raised ole Patch from a pup. It is no understatement to say that he was a member of our family. I say "was" because we burled him last Saturday in a little pine grove in Madison-County and it was one of the toughest things I've ever had to do. The toughest thing is Ve ever had to do. The toughest thing as agreeing with the viet that he would die a horrible death if we didn't put him to sleep. Patch was going on 16 years of a dog's life is supposed to be equivalent to seven human years. That made him nearly 112 in relative terms.

Lots of folks have asked us over the years, what breed he was and the closest description we could 'offer was All Dog. Over the last three years we had watched him age pretty rapidly. He lost most of his hearing and he devel-

oped a pretty bad hitch in his get along, but as recently as two weeks ago he would attempt to bounce around and play tag in the yard with the kids or myself. He was still the first member of our family to greet whomever showed uprat the door and, he still managed io, somehow, wag all over when we came home from work and school.

In his prime, I have seen him snap to attention and trot to the end of the driveway as much as five minutes before Lorett's car came into sight, or for that matter within hearing distance of my own ears. He could even recognize the different motors of the tumerous school buses that passed our house on \$2. He paid no attention to the ones that our kids weren't on, but when he saw it coming in the distance, he would trot out to welcome them home. We thought that he might have been poisoned. We were not overly concerned that he was stolen because he simply wouldn't have stood for it and the local hospitals told us that nobody had been admitted.

A few days later our neighbor, Lola Prewitt, called Loretta to tell her that she could faintly hear a dog barking. They found him stuck in a culvert They found him stuck in a culvert more than two feet below the surface of Harmon's Lick Road. Notonly that but a thunderstorm was underway and he was in great danger of drown-

Thank God for the Cartersville Fire Thank God for the Cartersville Fire Department because more than a dozen of its members show up with picks, sledge hammers and iron diggers. While some of them flaggers and rerouted traffic, the others cut a hole through more than a foot of black top and another foot of gravel. The culvert had separated in the middle and they were able to pull him out no more than five minutes before it was completely filled with a raging current. He was covered with mud, but Loretta went back to the hot bath and after a few ravenous meals and much loving care he was back to nor-hal in less than a week.

Junior Helton guarded the hole in the road while I rounded up 1000 pounds of ready mix concrete. We

The Mt. Vernor Sipatched the break in the culvert and used every ounce of ready mix to fill the hole. That was five years ago and the kids still joke when we go visiting on Harmons Lick and pass that culture that we are on the strongest part of any road in Garrard County. This time though, he couldn't be saved. No heroic efforts of any neighbors or fire departments or even a hospital could have done anything to

Child Abuse Prevention Month

Parenting Tips:

Parenting is a job that does not come easy for anyone. Below are some parenting tips that may help make your role as a parent easier.

1. When there is a problem and you are mad at your child, think, calm down and count to ten to avoid taking your anger out on your child.

2. Instead of hitting, use time out. For example have your child sit on a hair for a few minutes.)

3. Take every opportunity to reward and praise good behavior.

4. Before leaving your child at home alone look at his age in relation to his maturity, behavior and judge-

ment. If your child is not mature enough to answer questions on safety, then he may not be old enough to

then he may not be old enough to leave alone.

5. Be consistent with your child and the discipline you use.

6. Make sure your child under-stands the discipline being used and that it fits the behavior.

7. Be patient with your child.

8. Be honest with yourself and your child! (It is o.k. to say to your child-that you are mad or that you made a mistake.)

9. Take time everyday to spend

What is Child Protective Services?

Child Protective Services is one of the duties of the Department for Social Service (DSS), and its pur-pose is to assure the safety of chil-

dren.

The law requires that DSS staff investigate each report of suspected child abuse, neglect or dependency when the parent or caretaker is involved. Part of the job of DSS is halping parents get the services thiat

are available to build better family relationships. DSS can put parents in touch with people or organizations who can be of help.

What is child abuse and neglect?

There are at least four types of

There are at least four types of buses and neglect:

1. Physical Abuse - Injuries to a child which are not accidental (brochen bones, bruises, burns, cuts, etc.)

2. Emotional Abuse - Intentional actions which damage a child's menal or emotional health.

3. Neglect-Not have a safe home, proper food, clothing, education, or medical care: leaving a young child alone or with someone who is not subject to ears for them.

lone or with someone who is not ble to care for them. 4. Sexual Abuse- Using a child for ex acts, pomographic pictures, pros-fuition, or other types of sexual ontact between adult and child. lems you may be having and what help is available to make things bet-ter for you and your family.

When do the police get involved?

All reports of suspected abuse or neglect must go to law enforcement. The police are required to tell DSS about all child abuse and neglect reports they receive. In some cases, DSS and the police work together but key may make separate investigations. The police may also get involved if it becomes necessary to place a child in custody.

Will you take my children?

It is the goal of DSS to keep fami-ies safely together. In a small number of cases it is

In a small number of cases it is necessary to remove a child. If your child is believed to be in danger of serious harm the worker will make refforts to provide immediate protection. These efforts may include: 1. Seeking an order from the judge to immediately remove the child or the offending parent from the home: 2. Requesting a temporary removal

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


