## Fiscal Court says "No" to \$163,000 CB&S bill

A change order totalling \$163,115 from CB&S Construction to pay a subcontractor for drilling at the Justice Annex at the courthouse was rejected by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Monday.

Koker Drilling Company said "unforeseen" drilling at the site exceeded the unit price and asked to be reimbursed.

The court agreed some restitution probably should be made, but not the amount stated by Koker. Architect Garland Vanhook suggested \$15,000. The Department of Transportation and Development have reported tourism figures for 1991 through May 1992, as reported by Glynnis Miller.

In 1990 there were 8,199,636 tourists visited the county. In 1992-93, there were 12,460,678 up 47.5 percent. In 1990 there were 235 jobs related to tourism in the county. In 1991-92 to date there are 347. Rockcastle ranks 47 in the 120 counties.

The court added roads to the county road program. They are Aster Durham Road, Old J.T. Bullen Road, Bob Lear Road, Carpenter Subdivision extension and Shug Todd Road.

Three were appointed to the county board for assessment, including Henry Coffey for the city and Lloyd Cain and Rolla Cornelius for the county.

Bids for various housekeeping items were opened by the court, in-

cluding gasoline, culverts, insurance, asphalt emulsion, asphalt roller and crushed stone.

The court took all under advisement to check details of the bids. Only insurance was finalized since there was only one bid.

It was from KA All Liner Fund Insurance, and showed a total bill for all insurance at \$18,598 for the fiscal year. That amount was up some over last year's \$17,813. The same firm has last year's insurance for the county.

It showed \$16,474 for auto/truck insurance, general liability, public officials and boiler.

Bond insurance cost is \$2,124 for all county officials. In a letter presented to the magistrates, Judge Mullins wrote:

To Rockcastle County Magistrates: This is submitted as a note of commendation, congratulations and thanks during these 24 months into this administration.

Each of you have worked diligently to serve your district and to serve all the people of the county through cooperative endeavors.

More importantly, you have served without consideration for self. Not one issue has been raised where you have sought to receive personal gain. This is not always the case with public servants.

Again, on behalf of all the citizens of Rockcastle, thank you.

## Sewer problems noted at Livingston Council

Hiring a police officer and meeting government regulations at the city sewer plant, were among problems discussed at a meeting of the Livingston City Council Tuesday night.

The sewer plant is under order by the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet to correct several problems.

James Flannery, Water and Sewer Superintendent, told the council that he had worked to correct the problems and that outside assistance is helping the situation.

The letter informing the city of their noncompliance is dated May 14 of this year. Among the problems cited in the letter were a pump station that is now working properly, over-

grown drying beds and lack of monitoring for the chlorine in the system.

The letter informs the city that a \$2,500 fine could be levied if corrective action is not taken.

Flannery told the council that the drying beds have been cleaned and that is was a problem caused by inclement weather.

He said the flow meter in the pump station will need corrective measures taken, and that an engineering firm is working to solve the problem.

The council also discussed hiring a city police officer while examining three resumes from local people.

Mayor Payne Baker said it would be wise to hire before July 12 when regulations go into effect that will

Newly purchased school property on the Mt. Vernon bypass to be used for a new high school, was annexed to the city at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

The city received a letter from the school system in April requesting the property be annexed.

Since there was no other property between school property and the city limits, the council complied with the request.

Mayor Gary R. Cromer told the council the school system will bear the cost of a survey and two publications.

He said the new school will get police protection, a smaller water and sewer rate and a decrease in the tax burden.

The mayor reported a 24-unit housing project will be constructed behind the Dairy Mart on Crawford Street.

Owned by R.A. Williams of Lexington who has the housing project behind city hall, the project will be for the elderly with assisted income.

The group asked the city to take over a road into the project into Crawford Street. The council approved. Councilor Clarice Kirby abstained.

A 16-foot area adjacent to the new courthouse annex, once a part of First Street was transferred to the county by the council.

Mayor Cromer said the section will be used for an exercise area for prisoners in the county jail, and is of "no use to us."

Mayor Cromer said he had a good reason for new parking regulations on Main Street. He said the first day the new safety officer wrote \$65 worth of tickets.

However, he reported some motorists were parking on yellow curbs and that they are being ticketed. Parking time when tickets are written is 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

When asked by a resident to add more policemen to the force, the Mayor said the city does not have the finances to comply, reporting a "shortfall" this year and probably next.

"We can't run the city without money," and prospects look dim for major improvement.

Attorney Susan Martin of Richmond representing garbage collection owner Linda McWhorter asked the council for a resolution to go to the county reporting she is a legal collector/transfer station opera-

"Several years ago we had quite a bit of turnover but this is more than we've had in several years," Towery said.

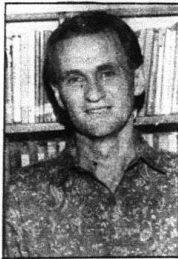
The superintendent said that a number of retirements and other circumstances have led to the openings.

Ridgeway Apartments, an assisted living facility located in Brodhead, hopes to open their doors soon, according to administrator Linda Whitt.

Whitt, who has been at the nearby Sowder Nursing Home for some 22 years, said the facility is not connected with the nursing home but has some of the same partners.

"The apartments will be open to those who need assisted living yet want to have some independence."

"We visited a lot of facilities in Lexington and around and it just seemed there was a gap between the nursing home and living at home," Whitt said.

The apartments, which open into a central room for extra security, will feature meal delivery, seven days, housekeeping, transportation, social services, planned activities and laundry facilities in each apartment.

The project was started in March of 1991 and is now going through the final inspection phases, according to Whitt, who said the owner is Built-Well Development Company, a partnership.

The facility will mainly serve senior adults and the handicapped,

according to Whitt, who said there will be eight units available.

"Assisted living provides services to help people remain independent for a longer time than what they could on their own," she said.

The design is for couples or persons, even brothers and sisters, according to Whitt, who said residents may come from anywhere, not just local communities.

"They can come from anywhere — we expect some retirees," Whitt said. "We have a list of people who have expressed an interest."

According to Whitt, if the project works, an expansion in the form of a separate building might come along

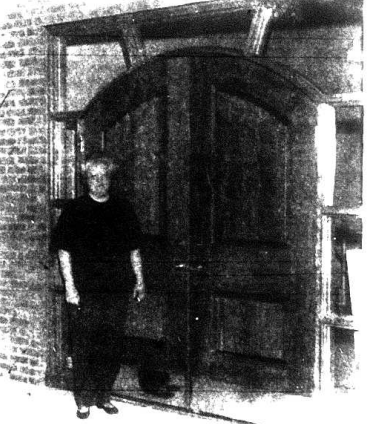

## EKU Special Programs offers summer classes

Nothing for you or your children to do this summer in Rockcastle County? Eastern Kentucky University's Division of Special Programs has the solution -- more than 80 community education courses for all ages and interests.

You can learn: new computer skills, canning tips, how to play musical instruments, how to do the western two-step, how to swim and much more.

You can even learn how to host a murder. But more about that later. Besides the learn-to-swim courses, there are 14 courses geared specifically for children. "College for Kids" features classes in gymnastics, jazz dance, clothing for beginners, karate, tai chi, tri-arts, tennis, drawing for beginners, oil painting, depression dolls, the environment, getting ready to drive and workshops for pre-readers and young readers.

All the courses are open to the general public. No previous college experience is required. And the classes are informal, with no tests or grades. Many of the classes meet only once; others meet on several occasions. Some are for an hour or two; others all-day.

Eighteen computer skills courses will be offered this semester: Introduction to the PC for the Scared and Nervous, Introduction to DOS, Advanced DOS, How to Buy a PC and Software, Introduction to Windows 3.0, Lotus 1-2-3, Advan-ed Lotus 1-2-3, Introduction to Word Perfect 5.1, Intermediate Word Perfect, Advanced WordPerfect, WordPerfect Tips, Tricks and Traps, WordPerfect Flyers 5.1 and Forms, PageMaker 4.1 for the PC, Microsoft Word for Windows, Introduction to the Macintosh with Word Processing, Macintosh Desktop Publishing and Graphics Seminar, Beginning PageMaker on the Macintosh and D-base III+.

The instructors are EKU faculty and staff, as well as community professionals. Each participant will be seated at a computer terminal.

For the first time, community education units (CEUs) will be available for every computer class. The CEU is nationally recognized, standard unit of measurement that is awarded on the basis of one CEU for every 10 contact hours of participation in an organized continuing education activity, capable of direction and qualified instruction.

While the CEU is not intended to be equated with academic credit, many business firms and professions have recognized the CEU when considering persons for promotion, salary increases, transfers and professional recognition, according to Leigh Ann Sadler, special interest coordinator.

Another plus, Sadler said, is the low cost. "The classes that have taken computer classes in the Bluegrass area will realize that EKU will save you 15 to 50 percent," she said. "And if you're deciding whether or not to buy a computer or software, it's good to try it out with us so you can make an educated decision."

Personal development courses include piano, guitar, banjo, mandolin and songwriting lessons, as well as classes in faux wall finishes, cake decorating, marbelizing, jewelry casting, canning fruits and vegetables, German wine tasting, planning flowers, improving self-image and "Children and Death."

"At least one of those interests Sadler.

"I think canning is a lost art," she said. "I don't know how to do it myself, so I might take one of those classes."

Finance and business courses focus on grammar skills, German for travelers, bookkeeping, writing news releases and skills for the outstanding

assistant, as well as how to host a murder. But more about that later. In adult fitness and sports, courses are offered in adult beginning swimming and water exercise, adult tennis, tai chi chuan, beginning golf, country dancing and Body recall.

Sadler said the "College for Kids" workshops for pre-readers and young readers will help children view reading and writing as an exciting tool for learning, and match the techniques and goals expressed in the Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA). The instructor for both workshops is Dr. Joanna Dickey, president of the Kentucky State Council of the International Reading Association.

Over 300 children learn to swim each summer through EKU's summer swim program. Sadler said, attributing the program's success to "qualified, experienced instructors who have years of teaching experience," including Model Laboratory School and Arlington coach Dan Lichy, Joan Hopkins, who has taught swimming for 18 years, and Sarah Biddy, a physical education teacher at Sayre High School in Lexington.

Swimming classes are available at all times of the day and evening at several age and ability levels: Tiny Tots (ages 1-3), Polliwogs (ages 4-5), Beginning (6-and-older), Advanced Beginning (6-and-older) and Intermediate (6-and-older).

Now, to the suspense about that class on how to host a murder. The instructors are Mason Smith and Jamie Hamon, co-creators of Murder Ink, an improv-mystery group that produces "crimes" for dinner guests to solve. Participants will discuss how to set up a role-playing evening, the kinds of "crime" appropriate and how to set up ground rules so that the amateur detectives don't run amok in your home looking for clues.

Pre-registration is urged for all classes. Classes begin as early as Friday, June 5 and continue through mid-August. Tuition per class ranges from \$12 to \$84.

## Grant funds for college

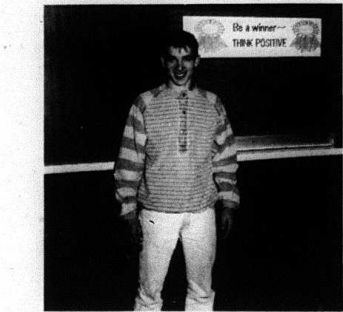
Over 22,000 Kentucky students enrolling in college for the 1992-93 academic year have been offered College Access Program (CAP) Grants totaling \$12,326,300, according to Paul B. Borden, executive director of the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority.

Grant funds are now depleted, and new applicants will not be sent individual notification letters.

Although CAP Grant funds were exhausted before the needs of all eligible applicants were met, Executive Director Borden said that many sources of financial aid are still available.

Applications for Stafford Loans, Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students (PLUS), and Supplemental Loans for Students (SLS) are being accepted and processed. In addition, students may establish eligibility for the Federal Government Pell Grant Program or for financial aid available through some Kentucky colleges.

CAP funds are limited and those who apply early -- by April 1 for the 1993-94 academic year -- will have the best chance of receiving funds. This year's CAP Grant award amount for a full-time student is \$700 per academic year, which will fully pay tuition at a community college, and \$30 per semester hour for a student enrolled at least half time.

## EKU students collect money for scholarship for Rockcastle student

When Destination Graduation students at Rockcastle County High School had Eastern Kentucky University student Tanya Parrett as a tutor, they were linked to a concerned friend.

"They couldn't believe that I would check up on them," she said. "I thrilled them to death to see someone care."

Just ask J.W. Bunch. Parrett and other EKU student-tutors cared enough to solicit money from Mt. Vernon and Brodhead businesses for a \$300 scholarship that will help the senior enroll at Eastern this fall.

EKU's Destination Graduation program, launched in Rockcastle County four years ago, targets mainly high school freshmen and sophomores identified as "at risk" of dropping out of school. Besides the ongoing school-year tutoring program, which matches high school students with EKU students from their own county, a rigorous summer program combines traditional academics with a wide variety of off-campus enrichment opportunities.

According to RCHS guidance counselor Dale Whiaker, Destination Graduation showed Bunch "what hard work could do and that he was able to do the work. The tutors were good role models."

The money for the scholarship came sort of by accident. The tutors fanned out into the community to

simply ask community merchants to provide prizes to be used in a program under way, "but we ended up getting much more than we thought we would. The community was very generous."

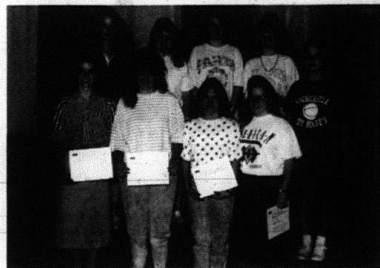
But few are more excited about the program's possibilities than the Rockcastle tutors themselves: Parrett, Mark Brummet, Bruce Blanton, Angela Bussell and Paulita Thomason.

"I run into the students all the time," said Parrett, "and they'll run up and say they've improved a lot. I've tried to explain to them that everybody has strengths and weaknesses and if they just work on their weaknesses, they'll overcome them."

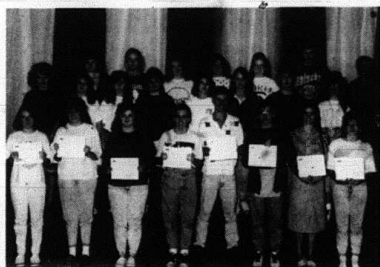
"It's a wonderful feeling to see how happy they are. They see now that education is important."

The Destination Graduation program expanded in 1990 to Estill County and will begin in Jackson County this fall. It is funded through the Council on Higher Education to serve at-risk high school students in the area with monies provided by the BellSouth Foundation and the federal School, College and University Partnership Program.

The majority of the summer school funding is provided by the school systems through the Kentucky Education Reform Act. The program's coordinator at EKU is Nancy Thames.

## EKU to co-host "Kentucky Conference on At-Risk Students"

The needs of at-risk students in Kentucky schools will be addressed at a July event co-sponsored by Eastern Kentucky University.

"The Kentucky Conference on At-Risk Students," an all-day instructional leadership workshop geared to all grade levels, will be held at EKU's Carl D. Perkins Conference Center Wednesday, July 15. Besides EKU's Destination Graduation program, sponsors are the Estill and Rockcastle county school systems and Forward in the Fifth.

Forty-eight Kentucky school districts, including Rockcastle County, have been invited to send representatives to the event, which counts toward 42 hours instructional leadership credit. The event can also serve as an in-service conference for teachers, according to Nancy Thames, EKU's Destination Graduation director.

"The conference goal is to provide public school administrators with increased understanding, expertise and resources relative to at-risk students in order that the needs of those students may be comprehensively addressed."

The keynote address will be given by Dr. Robert Morris, dean of education at the University of Maryland, author of "Solving the Problems of At-Risk Youth" and co-author of "Resource guide for Working with Youth At-Risk."

Both books will be available to conference participants for \$25 total through a special arrangements with the publisher.

The Estill and Rockcastle districts participate in EKU's Destination Graduation program, which combines a six-week summer school project with tutoring throughout the school year by EKU students from the respective counties. The goal of the program is to keep the students in school and make them aware of various career opportunities. Forward in the Fifth is a Berea-based organization formed to advance education in the Fifth Congressional District.

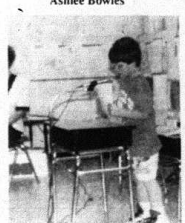

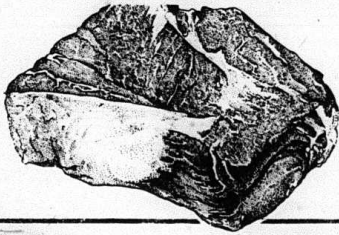

## Local band to perform in Nashville

"What goes around comes around" is an old, worn adage that no one can dispute. After dedicating hours of time and talent to local charities, Strait Shot Band is getting back the generosity and opportunity they have been giving to others for years.

Strait Shot members have recently drafted a route and are on their way to what manager James Miller calls "a rare opportunity."

Formed in October 1985, the band was recommended by Austin City North in Lexington, to perform at Gilley's of Nashville, in what is called a "Showcase of Talent" to display original songs.

According to Miller, the performance, scheduled for Saturday, June 13 at 8 p.m., will be the host to numerous producers as well as recording labels. "The ultimate goal is to get a recording contract," he said.

Possessing the same honest, down-to-earth demeanor that has made such acts as Alabama and Exile famous, the band has performed in four benefit concerts this year alone. In addition to aiding in the collection of over \$10,000 for the new scholarship fund, Strait Shot has played for such causes as Project Graduation, The Kentucky Kidney Foundation and the WHAS Crusade for Kids.

"I think we were raised this way," said Keith Mink, guitarist and vocalist, "It is better to give than to receive, and I believe we'll all get back someday what we give away."

"Some of the concerts helped raise money for education," lead vocalist Keith Bussell added. "We all have kids and we all felt it was important."

Sporing one album, the group is currently working on the release of a second. "We were told on our last trip to Nashville that in order to get 'kicked off,'" said Terry "Trooper" Cromer, stage manager, "We have to either get the attention of a record label or

have \$250,000. So we're obviously trying to get the attention of the record label!"

Miller continued by saying, "They also told us that breaking into the business is 15 percent talent and 85 percent luck."

"We want to be recognized for our talent, which we have at least 15 percent of," said Bussell.

"We don't just play top 40," said Mink. "We write a lot of our own songs."

Originality is a key factor to the success, according to Mink. "It is easy for bands to get caught up in mocking other performer's music. We think original songs are important assets."

Since the origination of Strait Shot, the band has formed a publishing company as well as trademarked the name. "We have James to thank for so much of our success," said Bussell. "He has a full time job of being our manager and has gotten our foot in the door in many places that we

wouldn't have if it weren't for his dedication."

"It is important to us that our fans know how important they are," Miller said. "We use all of the proceeds to build our inventory of equipment. Without that, we wouldn't have the resources to do what we have already."

"When posed the question, 'Where will this band be in five years,' the consensus was to 'simply be recognized.'" "All we really want out of this is a comfortable life," said Keith Bussell. "We just want to be recognized for what we do."

"We are all thankful to have experienced the success we have," said James. "We just thank our Lord and Savior for the talent we've been given and the support from our families, friends, and especially our wives."

## At Mt. Vernon Elementary Kentucky Chautauqua presents Jessie Stuart "Kentucky's Poet Laureate"

Jesse Stuart poured out his love for his native eastern Kentucky hills in a prodigious flow of poems, short stories, and novels - more than 60 books in all. Stuart's works won many literary awards and have been translated into more than 30 foreign languages, but he was much more than simply a famous author. Stuart was also a charismatic teacher, a farmer, an environmentalist, and a worldwide spokesman for Kentucky's mountain people and their way of life.

On Tuesday, June 9, 1992, at 7 p.m. at Rockcastle County School in Mt. Vernon, the Kentucky Chautauqua proudly presents James Lowe as Jesse Stuart, Kentucky's Poet Laureate. In a presentation that is by turns moving and amusing, Lowe celebrates Stuart's great gift for story-telling. The stories he tells illuminate the Appalachian values - belief

in hard work and education, love of land and family - that are at the heart of Stuart's writings.

## Drawings approved for new high school; summer 1994 completion

The Rockcastle Board of Education approved the schematic drawings for the new \$7.7 million Rockcastle County High School which is set to be completed by the summer of 1994.

Board members and Superintendent Bigge W. Towery had their questions answered during the special called meeting.

The architect for the high school, Johnson Romanowicz, presented the plan to the board saying that it was not final and would be refined and examined further as the project progresses.

They presented a site plan for the school, which is off Highway 461 on a sixty-plus acre site.

The plan included sports facilities, but those will not be finished along with the school and are called for after the school is built.

The playing fields will be graded and prepared, then later, when the budget allows, they will be completed.

There will be only one exit and entry to the school, which, according to the architects, will make it easier to get by the state highway department.

Bus and car traffic will be separated and there will be a number of entrances into the school building.

The school will include facilities for mathematics and sciences, computer labs, classroom wings, agriculture shop, home economics, band and chorus, computer room, art room, media center, and an academic wing that will have classroom and lab functions as well as language arts facilities.

The gymnasium is central in the building, and will have locker rooms, weight rooms and coaches offices nearby.

The cafeteria will be smaller than the present one, but that is due to state standards. Even so, according to the architect, the use of the cafeteria will be more efficient and use outside hall space.

The floor plan is zoned into six different areas: academic wing, media center, home economics, art/music auditorium, gym and food services.

Technology education in the form of computers will also receive space, as well as a traditional agriculture shop.

According to the architects, the building features an efficient floor plan that exceeds the state standards by five percent.

The architects said that 20 different studies went into the present rendering and that they have met with

individual teachers and even taken written critiques of the plans. They emphasized that the plans are part of an ongoing process "and not written in stone."

Superintendent Towery said input is important and that "having a lot of input helped Mt. Vernon Elementary."

The project architect, Russell McFarland, discussed the roofing and the model of the school.

He told the board that the roof would be warranted for 10 years with an option for an additional 10 years.

There will be a hydraulic heat pump system with a pump for each room and a register for each room.

One side of the school can be heated while the other side may be cooled, all at the same time, making for what the architects called "a very energy efficient system."

The project should be completed by the summer of 1994. The planners emphasized that grading work would need to start by this fall, most likely in October.

The bond sale will take place in December 1992, and January and

February of 1993.

The project should be completed after 16 months of actual construction.

"It makes me a little bit nervous to see us going all the way up to June (of 1994)," Towery said.

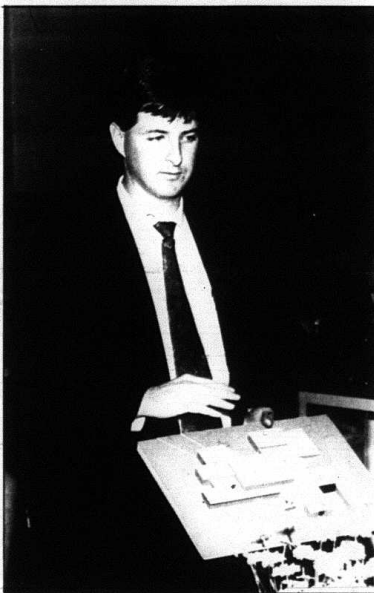
The architects then explained that if the grading is done this fall then materials can be ordered by the first of year.

The construction will be done in phases with the initial phase being to put up a steel shell which will allow most of the work to be done inside.

The board also heard from Finance Officer and Director for Administrative Services, Richard Bray, who told the board that the board is about \$6,186 short on the literal construction cost.

He said that \$750,000 will come from the general fund and that other money will come from capital outlay and the nickel tax, among other sources.

The board will meet next Tuesday night at the Rockcastle Board of Education at 7 p.m. No agenda for that meeting has been released.

He is on a journey (walking, that is) which began on April 12 in Jamestown, Virginia, and is scheduled to end before Christmas in Bodega Bay, near San Francisco, where Englishman Sir Frances Drake is notorious.

Paul carries a card which reads: "Following Yesterday's Pioneers Today," which is exactly what he is doing. His mission is one of great interest. Not only is Winsper traveling in distance, but in time as well.

Having started his trek in Jamestown, Winsper is tracking the beginnings of America and its continual westward expansion. "Right now, I am round the 1770's in time," he said.

"I work with kids and I care a lot about young people," he said as he began telling how he is sending a newsletter to various schools in England.

Through a short conversation with Winsper, his devotion and motivation toward his trip is easily detected. "I thought the best way to see a country is by foot."

Winsper left the Lawson home early the next morning headed toward the 19th Century to tour the William Whitley House and Fort Harrod.



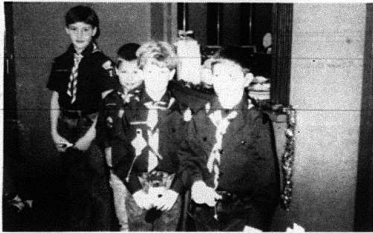

## Protective Parenting

The rainy weather has had most of us a little down over the past week or so. This includes the kids, newly released from school with visions of the freedom to frolic in the summer sunshine.

But instead, they are in the house. Some houses have several of them in there. Restless, champing at the bit to get out, irritable with each other and with you, making a mess, and bored. Parents have several choices under these circumstances: 1) escape, either by finding an excuse to literally leave the house, or by pulling down that invisible curtain that helps you ignore the whole scene, and letting them fend for themselves; 2) yelling, nagging, pleading, giving orders, threatening, making useless suggestions that usually begin with, "Why don't you..."; 3) plucking the kids with treats (bribery) like trips to the movies, pizza, new toys, playing games and reading stories; or 4) having a pre-conceived strategy for making shut-in days a pleasure.

A little of each of the above choices is healthy. Parents do not need to have an escape plan that will allow them to find space in each day for their responsibilities and pleasure for peace of mind. Parents do need to maintain discipline (though yelling and cajoling are pretty ineffective ways to do it). Parents should incorporate treats into their dealings with their kids; but beware of basing your relationship on what you do for them as this will encourage demanding self-centeredness.

Of course choice (4) is the "right" answer; but what does it mean? Pre-conceived means that you have to do a little advance planning and thinking. No one would expect a teacher to "walk into the classroom and" "wing it," and a parent cannot be expected to either. There are so many variables in planning, that it is difficult to get too specific. Each parent must take into account the age and numbers of children, their interests, the personality and skill of the parent, the nature of the home, and so forth. But here are some ideas to get you thinking.

The major principle and secret to success is to think of a project or activity that is reserved and kept special only for rainy days. Suggestions: children produce a play or show (complete with costumes, scenery, musical backup, or whatever) to be performed, say after dinner; children might make cards, scrapbooks, photo

collages, or create their own cartoon story to send to a relative or friend they seldom see; older children may experiment with a complex cooking project such as bread-making, or an exotic dinner menu they find in a magazine (this may include a trip to the store to buy special ingredients); children may have special tools or equipment they can only use on rainy days. My sister and I had a card table with such items as old pattern books for cutting paper dolls, scrapbooks, colored tissue paper and glue. They were covered until the raindrops started to fall, and I can remember looking up hopefully as the afternoon sky in Washington clouded over and lightning flashed in the distance so we could get to our treasures. Any table with a sheet draped over it can become an inviting rainy day cavern. Kids will outfit this space with a safe light source, probably pillows and blankets, favorite books or dolls or whatever. We used to like to call ours a "jail" and live out some fantasies in our self-imposed prison, pretending we couldn't escape and/or taking turns being the warden.

The parents' job is to develop some objectives with the children to get them enthused. For example they might read a story that could be acted out (possibly a trip to the library could be part of this process), or set up a box or corner for the activity. Once they have provided some stimulating ideas, materials and information parents can step back and let children's lively imaginations carry them along. Parents can be around for support and encouragement, but if they lay some solid groundwork, they can count on peace.

Younger children, of course, need more input from their parents; older children are usually happier if they are trusted to do their own thing, perhaps with a friend if there is not a sibling to do it with.

Acting, instead of re-acting is always a good policy. Preventing boredom and irritability works better all the way around than to try to break through the clouds once they have formed. Children who learn to amuse themselves and find the bright side of situations have a valuable tool for life.

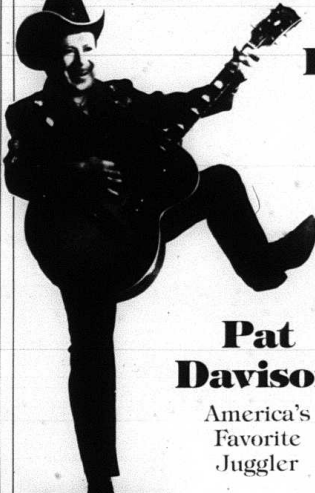

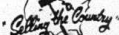
