Whitt.
Whitt, who has been at the nearby
Sowder Nursing Home for some 22
years, said the facility is not connected with the nursing home but hassome of the same partners.
The apartments will be open to
those who need assisted living yet
want to have some independence.
"We visited a lot of facilities in
Lexington and around and it just
seemed there was a gap between the
nursing home and living at home."

Whitt said.

The apartments, which open into a central room for extra security, will feature meal delivery seven days, housekeeping, transportation, social services, planned activities and laun-

services, planned activities and laun-dry facilities in each apartment.

The project was started in March of 1991 and is now going through the final inspection phases, according to Whitt, who said the owner is Buit-Well Development Company, a part-nership.

nership.

The facility will mainly serve senior adults and the handicapped,

according to Whitt, who said there will be eight units available.
"Assisted living provides services to help people remain independent for alonger time than what they could on their own," she said.

The design is for couples or persons, even brothers and sisters, according to Whitt, who said residents may come from anywhere, not just local communities.
"They can come from anywhere—we expect some retirees." Whitt said. "We have a list of people who have expressed an interest." "These apartments are not go ernment subsidized," Whitt sai

ermment subsidized," Whiti Said, pointing out that the money came from the private sector.

The plan included sports facilities, but those will not be finished along with the school and are called for after the school is better the school is school in the school in the school in the school is school in the school in the

The school will include facilities for mathematics and sciences, com-puter labs, classroom wings, agriculture shop, home economics, ba chorus, computer room, art room, media center, and an academic wing that will have classroom and lab functions as well as language arts

building, and will have locker rooms, weight rooms and coaches offices nearby. The gymnasium is central in the

The cafeteria will be smaller than the present one, but that is due to state standards. Even so, according to the architect, the use of the cafeteria will be more efficient and use outside hall

space. The floor plan is zoned into six different areas: academic wing, media center, home economics, art/music auditorium, gym and food services. Technology education in the form of computers will also receive space, as well as a traditional agriculture

According to the architects, the building features an efficient floor plan that exceeds the state standards by five percent.



The rainy weather has had most of us a little down over the past week or so. This includes the kids, newly released from school with visions of the freedom to frolic in the summer

But instead, they are in the house Some houses have several of them in there. Restless, champing at the bit to get out, irritable with each other and with you, making a mess, and bored. Parents have several choices under these circumstances: 1) escape either by finding an excuse to literally leave the house, or by pulling down that invisible curtain that helps

ally leave the house, or by pulling down that invisible curtain that helps you ignore the whole scene, and letting them fend for themselves; 2? yelling, nagging, pleading, giving orders, threatening, making useless suggestions that usually begin with. "Why don't you.", "3 pleating the kids with treats (bribery) like trips to the movies, pizza, new tops, playing games and reading stories; or 4) having a pre-conceived strategy for making shut-in days a pleasure. A little of each of the above choices is healthy. Parents do need to have an escape plan that will allow them to find space in each day for their responsibilities and pleasure for peace of mind. Parents do need to maintain discipline (though yelling and cajoling are pretty ineffective ways to do.). Parents should incorporate treats into their dealings with their kids, but heware of basing your relationship on what you do for them as this will encourage demanding self-centerleness.

No one would expect a teacher to walk into the classroom and "wing it," and a parent cannot be expected to either. There are so many variables in planning, that it is difficult to get to specific. Each parent must take into account the age and numbers of children, their interests, the personal-

They were covered until the raindrops started to fall, and I can remember looking up hopefully as the afternoon sky in Washington clouded over and lightening flashed in the distance so we could get to our treasures. Any table with a sheet draped over it can become an inviting rainy day cavern. Kids will outfit this space with a safe light source, probably pillows and blankets, favorite books or dolls or whatever, we used to like to call ours a "jail" and live out some fantasies in our self-imposed prison, pretending we couldn't escape and/or taking turns being the warden.
