
Lady Bug Beetle: Heroine or Headache?

Rarely does a new species of insect, and a beneficial one at that, insect, and a beneficial one at that, cause as much commotion as has Harmonia axyndis in such a short period. This ladybug beetle is new to Kentucky. Our first records only date back to a few specimens captured in Hickman County in 1992. Introduced from Eastern Asia, this species is an important predator of, aphids and scales on trees. There were numerous attempts (between 1916 and 1985) to establish it as a biological control

agent It is not known exactly how in became exablished in the United States are the first speciments collected in Louisana during 1988 Since then the beetle has increased its distribution to include Mississippi, Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, Oregon, Washington and ow Kentucky. Last spring, it was observed in apple trees in Fayette County.

This insect has spread rapidly
