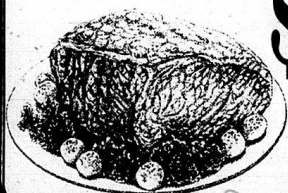

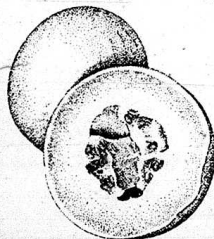

Indictments returned for drugs, theft

A Rockcastle County man, an East Bernstadt man and a Somerset man are due in Rockcastle Circuit Court next week, after they were indicted by a Rockcastle Grand Jury.

Two are charged with drug related crimes the other is accused of taking money off a dead man.

Hugh Michael Helton, 37, of East Bernstadt is accused of cultivating fourteen marijuana on June 8. Helton is presently lodged in the Rockcastle County jail.

Ralph Luther Raney, Jr., 34, of Somerset is charged with one count of trafficking in a controlled substance and two counts of possession of a control substance.

According to the indictment Raney had methamphetamine, pethidine and heroin in his possession on May 25 in Rockcastle County. He is free on bond until a September 8th appearance.

Adren Robinson, 37, of Rt. 2 Orlando is charged with taking \$634 in cash from James Alexander's body after he was shot to death on May 17 at Poplar Gap.

McClure pleads guilty to using minors in a sex performance

A Brodhead woman who is accused of sexually exploiting her own minor daughter and at least six other minor girls over a three year period has pled guilty in Rockcastle Circuit Court to five counts of Use of a Minor in a Sexual Performance.

Charlotte McClure, 31, was indicted along with Allen Charles, 36, also of Brodhead on twenty-nine counts last May after police received information that the two were using minors in sexual acts and videotaping the acts.

According to assistant Commonwealth Attorney David Tapp, police confiscated numerous tapes depicting children under the age of twelve engaging in sexual performances. Tapp said that after conferring with the victims' families, the Commonwealth has recommended a fifteen

year sentence on each charge.

McClure was apparently prepared to plead guilty earlier this year in Rockcastle Circuit Court, but on the advice of a friend, Billy Belcher, she decided to maintain her innocent and reject the advice of her court appointed attorney.

McClure's bond was revoked and she was returned to jail. Belcher was later indicted for practicing law without a license and that case is still pending in Rockcastle District Court. McClure was later released on bond.

McClure will remain out of jail on bond until she is formally sentenced, September 22nd.

Allen Charles has been scheduled for trial on September 5 in Rockcastle Circuit Court. He is held in jail since his arrest last April 12.

Kentucky Supreme Court upholds last year's murder conviction of Allen Gilpatrick

The Kentucky Supreme Court has upheld the murder conviction of Allen Gilpatrick, the former Mt. Vernon resident who was convicted last year of beating his wife to death in their West Main Street home last year.

The court announced their decision this week.

Gilpatrick is currently serving a life sentence and will not be eligible for parole until April 2006.

Rockcastle and Pulaski Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael said that he would strongly oppose any parole for Gilpatrick because of the brutality of the crime. "Mr. Gilpatrick senselessly took a life. He should be required to serve out his complete sentence," Carmichael said.

Gilpatrick's attorney John Clontz said the Supreme Court's ruling was not final for ten days and that he

would probably file a motion to reconsider, during that time.

Gilpatrick was convicted of kill-

ing his wife, Virginia "Ginny" Gilpatrick, after a week long trial in Pulaski County last year.

McFerron arrested after search

A total of 7 charges have been filed against Paul McFerron of Mt. Vernon, following an altercation Saturday.

When Deputy Sheriff Nathaniel Price arrived at the home of Clinton McFerron, a brother of Paul, he found Paul on the porch with a shotgun.

Price said Paul McFerron ran into the woods. He was later found walking along a rural road.

He was arrested and charged with criminal trespassing in the second

degree, disorderly conduct, resisting arrest and alcohol intoxication.

He then escaped from officers and was found later at his home on Town Branch Road, hiding under a bed, by Deputy Price.

He was charged with escape in the third degree, criminal trespassing, resisting arrest and disorderly conduct.

He was placed under \$6,000 bond, 10 percent cash, but later Judge Michael Henry set bond at unsecured \$6,000 and he was released.

Former prosecutor charged with D.U.I.

A former Rockcastle County prosecutor is scheduled to appear in Rockcastle District Court on September 18 after he arrested for driving his vehicle under the influence of alcohol.

Ike David Howard, 38, of Livingston was arrested by Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Doug Thomas around 8:30 on U.S. 25 near Fort Sequoyah.

Thomas said that he observed Howard's vehicle swerving back and forth across the center line as he followed him for three miles down U.S. 25.

Howard, who served as assistant county attorney, under former county attorney James H. Lambert was released on a \$200 cash bond, pending his arraignment.

New home for Senior Citizens

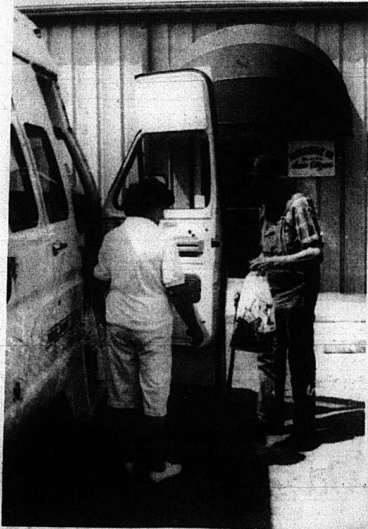
The Senior Citizens center for Mt. Vernon was officially opened over the week end with three days of open house at their new home on U.S. 25 South (former skating rink).

Dilce Combs High School sits out on a point in Perry County, near the bottom end of a long ridge that reaches

upwards on a timbered slope behind it some several thousand feet toward the sky. You can look out the school's front windows and see the confluence of Carr Creek and the North Fork of the Kentucky River. The view makes, to quote The Eagles, "a peaceful easy feeling" wash over anyone lucky enough to see it.

It's about as pretty a place in the state to locate a school even though I can imagine that many a school boy has stared out the window of his English class and dreamed of big catfish and smaller bass, but that surely might be his if he could only sneak away to bait a hook.

The school is also located at the junction of Highways 15 and 7. Highway 7 parallels the Kentucky River upstream some 20 miles to Blackey in Lecher County. 15 goes up Carr Creek through Knott County where it has been dammed near the Lecher border to form a magnificent lake.

I realize that none of this is news to our readers of this column who live up in the mountains, but what I'm trying to do is get some of the flatlanders to come up and see you the way that I do from time to time. The column runs in several papers down here, too.

I drive more than 120 miles from west to east when I come home. Up the Daniel Boone to Hazard and south on 15 to Dilce Combs and that high school is a landmark because it is located precisely where I begin feeling at home. No matter what road I take, up the creek or up the river, the territory that feels like home to me begins immediately after I pass Dilce Combs.

And within a few miles I am in sweet home, Lecher County. Sweet home, I call it, because it is just that. The land of my raising and home yet to the most gentle and accommodating people on the face of earth. Home to my brothers and hundreds of cousins who found ways to make livings there. Home to hundreds of good friends who did the same when I could not.

But I wasn't cut out to be a miner. I'm way too tall. And I couldn't get a job teaching because when I finished college I was on the wrong side of the political fence to get a nod from the Board of Education. Not that I would have lasted long in that profession anyway. Teachers no longer have

much, if any, control of their classrooms and I like to be in control of whatever I'm doing.

I like to tell folks that the three best things about teaching are June, July, and August.

I was able to find work in the flatlands doing something that I'm pretty good at. Working for The Christian Appalachian Project gives me vast opportunities to match up Private Foundations' money with work that I believe needs doing. There's an airport forty-five minutes away for folks coming in and it also accommodates my coming and going on a fairly frequent schedule.

So Garrard County is, too, sweet home. Paint Lick here is a long way from Blair Branch where the mountains are oh so high in Lecher County. But it's a good place for a misplaced hillbilly to be and I have fallen in love with the place. After a few days in the mountains, I'm always anxious to get back to Paint Lick.

Last weekend, however, I did make it back home. I had wonderful visits with more than a dozen old friends and I went squirrel hunting with brother Keith (Keizer) on Sunday evening. We killed and butchered a mess of squirrels and cooked them up in a heavy kettle. When they

were done we dumped them in a can of Carnation Cream along with the few spoonfuls of flour and let the gravy thicken.

We poured squirrel and gravy over hot crumbled corn bread with a few of our friends and relatives and we all wondered aloud why someone hadn't made the recipe into a chain of restaurants.

It's a mystery to me.

And I had the recipe on my mind as I drove by Dilce Combs High School on my way out of the mountains on my way westward toward Paint Lick.

As good as it tasted at Keizer's house, I doubt that it would ever go over down here.

In the meantime, I will look forward to coming back to sweet old Lecher County again soon.

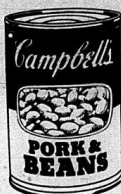

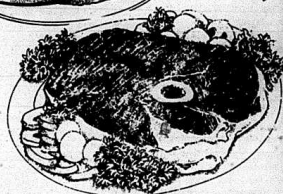

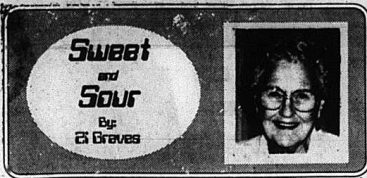

An Old Time Church

Getting to church early sometimes has more than one advantage such as getting the seat of your choice. It also gives one time to get better acquainted with other early arrivals and get the talking out of your system before service starts.

Such was the case a week or so ago when Polly and I were the first to arrive at First Baptist Church and had the advantage of watching others arrive and find their favorite pew.

This had been a scorching hot day and the air conditioned coolness of the auditorium brought sighs of relief as the people found their seats. This, in turn, brought about conversation of days long gone when there was no such thing as air conditioning. I, with tongue in cheek, asked where the fans were. You know, the little folding fans we used to use to create a breeze that was supposed to keep us cool. Then Polly began her reminiscing of those days when funeral homes furnished paper fans to the churches and they were scattered, along with the songbooks, on every bench. And the benches at the Buffalo Church that we attended were just that, big planks nailed onto vertical planks that held them up securely and a board nailed to the uprights for a backrest was an old fashioned bench. This was a homey little Baptist Church that most of the families in the area attended. Polly recalled many things that I had forgotten but, once reminded of them, other memories came flooding back. She recalled the little oil lamps fastened at intervals along the walls that gave off a soft warm glow, but not much light. She also remembered the amen corner, and the fact that men always sat on one side of the aisle and the women on the other. The men were in the amen corner. Behind the pulpit, a small table was placed to hold the water bucket. I guess this was so the preacher could reach it more easily to cool his parched throat as he preached about the hereafter. The fact was it was a temptation to the little ones (bigger ones, too), in the audience and they made frequent trips to it thus disturbing the services. Why do kids, big and little, always have to go potty or want a drink when it is most inconvenient?

Shuttered windows were on each side of the building and were kept open in the summer so whatever breezes were there could find their way inside. Outside these windows was where the young men and, sometimes the not so young men stood while the preaching was going on. It seemed to me there were as many people outside as there were inside. Maybe I got the wrong impression but I felt the ones needing the message worst was on the outside. All during the sermon, one could hear loud talking and laughter filling the air outside but that never stopped the preacher from delivering his message.

In memory, I can still see the women sitting on the front rows of the church, some with their bonnets on, some dressed more modern with their hair curled or neatly combed. Lena Jones always wore a beautiful white bonnet, the large ruffle on the back covering her shoulders and the finely quilted brim shadowing her face, starched and ironed to perfection. The men were usually dressed in freshly washed and ironed overalls with shirts buttoned close to the throat. The young people sat on the back rows and nervous tittering and giggling could be heard when a boy slipped quietly inside the church and sat down beside a girl he was "sweet on."

Back in those days, most of the churches had a bell to ring out the news it was time to go to church and the Buffalo Church was not found wanting for it had one in a neat little steeple above the front door and there was the sweet sound of a bell on Sunday morning.

The fans are no longer scattered along the benches, they were replaced many years ago with comfortable seats, nor is there a big stove taking up room in the middle of the auditorium. There are no lamps to fill nor chimneys to wash and shine before every service, electric overhead lights do the job now. And a carpet covers the floor so one can't hear the stomping of heavy boots as a young fellow slips in to sit beside his favorite girl. I haven't been to the Buffalo Church in many years and therefore don't know of all the changes that have taken place but I do now it isn't the same as it was fifty-five years ago when "Brother" Jewel Arthur, Killas Jones and Leander Jones were pastors of the Buffalo Church that sat beside the dirt road and next to the one room building known as Buffalo school.

their bodies work for them. They take a step toward independence. Children get a powerful sense of feeling good about themselves when they can say, "I can do it by myself!"

Being able to control the nearby world, even to a very small degree, helps develop a good self-image. Being independent helps your child's self-esteem. Eating a cookie without help, taking off shoes (undressing is easier than dressing), calling to show you something—these are all steps in growing up and learning to live independently.

Encourage appropriate play activities. Much of children's play is also a means of learning about and controlling their surroundings. Children practice putting toys inside of boxes, pegs in holes, all things in their mouths. All of these activities improve eye-hand coordination, skill, and knowledge.

Children think they're playing, but they're really working to understand their world. Later, they'll practice and imitate what they've learned (feeding a doll, steering a make-believe car, washing toy dishes).

Plan for play time in the daily schedule; it's just as important as feeding, dressing, napping, and bathing. Select toys your child needs at each stage of development; play time is best for learning new things. Expensive toys are not necessary. Infants and very young children need toys that do not need any fine-finger movements. Toys that are easy to grasp teach children how to use both hands to hold on and how to let go.

As children grow and develop better finger movements, toys can become more complex, with more pieces that fit together. Large, brightly colored toys are best, since young children are clumsy. Some children like toys with wheels on them. Your child should learn to play with all kinds of toys, but remember your child's own special interests when you pick toys for free play time.

How To Provide A Good Environment

Respect cycles of sleep, hunger and awake times. Don't go out to eat at nap time. Be firm about bedtime—staying up often makes children too excited to sleep. Also, children are not social eaters; good behaviour at a restaurant is good timing or pure luck.

Talk to your child, even if the conversation is one-sided. Language is often delayed in children with disabilities. You will have to assume greater responsibility, doing most of the talking—and most of the responding. Talk to your child, wait for a response, and then answer, even if your child does not respond.

It's hard to keep reaching out when your child doesn't know how to respond. Encourage eye contact when

you talk to your child. As a way to include your child in daily activities, describe aloud what you are doing ("What shall we have for breakfast? Scrambled eggs sounds good. Let's get out the butter.")

Children learn to move about and explore their world. Moving helps them learn where they step and the world around begins. They learn to roll over, to stretch, to reach to creep, to crawl, to stand up and to walk around. Children with disabilities may be slower in doing all of these activities. Encourage and help your child to try.

Moving around teaches children how to go after desired things. They get exercise and learn how to make

shapes the way your child grows and learns, responds and behaves. The best environment for your child is one that is safe, comfortable and loving.

Blackcats no match as Rockets roll 56-7

If Saturday night's brutal slaying of Prestonsburg is any indication, Rockcastle County Rocket fans will have a lot to cheer about again this year.

Somg Rocket faithful had talked about a possible down year, others had said this team just had not shown any heart in their scrimmage games, but after Saturday's 56-7 massacre of Prestonsburg, it is pretty evident that the "Rock" is solid once again, and will vie for their third district title in the past five years.

The Rockets, behind possibly the strongest offensive line in 2A foot-

ball in the state, totally dominated the Blackcats, scoring on every possession, except at the end of the first half and the end of the game.

The Rockets amassed 526 yards on the ground and held Prestonsburg to just 115.

"We played well on the line of scrimmage," taking control of the game on both sides of the football," said Rocket Head Coach Tom Larkey who began his 11th year Saturday night as head of the Rocket program.

About 1,500 Rocket faithful traveled to Mt. Sterling to watch the blood letting from beginning to end. The Blackcats could not even stop

the Rocket junior varsity and freshmen when they entered the game.

Larkey said that he was well pleased with the effort given by his team especially the offensive line, "I can't say enough about those guys," the head coach said Wednesday.

Larkey said that Jason Weaver, Eddie Todd, Jason Brock, Steve Owens and Adam Browning simply dominated Prestonsburg on nearly every running play. The Rocket line averages 247 pounds.

"They played extremely close to them (South Laurel), as we did when we scrimmaged them, I thought it would be a one or two touchdown game," Larkey said.

Always cautious about his team's chances, the coach wouldn't predict great things for this team, except to say that he thought his offensive line could be the best he has had in his eleven years. "We've got an extremely tough schedule and only time will tell about our chances for a district title," the coach said.

Larkey said that Corbin, Somerset and the Rockets would probably contend for the title, but that in high school football, things are never certain. Both Somerset and Corbin won easily Friday night.

The Rockets scored eight touchdowns Friday night against the last team to hand perennial 2A power Danville a loss. They started the scoring with a sixty-nine yard drive that culminated in a four yard score by junior Jon Cromer, who was named the Star of Stars in the Recreation Bowl at Mt. Sterling. Two years ago the Rock easily defeated Hazard in the same bowl game.

Dallas Rigby scored the second touchdown for the Rockets on a 38 yard run with over six minutes to go in the first quarter. Rigby carried the ball only three times Saturday night but he made all of his rushes count, gaining 96 yards for a 32 yard average.

The Rockets scored for the third time in the first period when Cromer caught a pass in the right flat from Senior Quarterback Jamie Linville and scampered 31 yards to pay dirt.

The only Prestonsburg score came

after a fluke play when one Prestonsburg receiver fumbled and another picked it off in mid-air and ran 45 yards to the Rocket 14. The Blackcats scored on the next play, but that would be the only bright spot for Prestonsburg in the oldest bowl game in Kentucky's history.

The Rock scored thirteen more points in the second quarter, one on a six yard run by Cromer and a 16 yard run by Rigby.

Linville hammered it in from the one yard line to start the Rocket scoring in the second half and sophomore Dusty McClure later scored on a 40 yard run and a three yard run. Placekicker Raymond Blackburn added three extra points, but he missed two, while Linville and freshman Andrew Carrera each added a two point conversion.

Cromer had 161 yards on 16 carries, senior fullback Neil Sparks, who failed to score, turned in an excellent offensive game with only ten rushes and 100 yards, Rigby had 96, and senior Jarrod Singleton had 40 yards on just 5 carries. McClure gained 82 yards on five carries as well, all in the second half and Ronnie Vanzant had 11 yards on 4 carries. Feshman Brooks Ingram had 13 yards on 3 carries. Linville threw for 36 yards on two completions, one to senior Jason Childress for twenty-five yards and the other the 31 yard strike to Cromer for the score. Childress' catch came as he was falling backwards to the ground at midfield.

The Rockets defensive unit, which played outstanding for four quarters was led by Steve Owens who had three solo tackles, two of them sacks. Jarrod Singleton also had three tackles and Ronnie Vanzant, Neil Sparks and David Coffey.

Eddie Todd added two tackles, as did Adam Browning, and Jason Childress.

Jason Weaver, Slade Calhoun, Dallas Rigby, J.B. King, Brian Seiff, Kyle Kirby, Jason McFerron, Dusty McClure, Mike Muncy and Anthony King each had one tackle.

The Rocket coaching staff is looking for a tough contest this week when they travel to Somerset to take on Pulaski Southwestern, a team that defeated the Rock 20 to 13 in last year's Jamboree Bowl.

Coach Larkey said that Southwestern, which lost last week by one point on the last play of the game when they fumbled the ball on a punt attempt in the end zone to Anderson County, has five players that are being recruited by major college teams.

"These best players are linebacker Matt Sexton a 6'3" 225 pound linebacker, who is a dominating force on defense," the coach said.

Southwestern's field is ready to play on this year. The school is located near the Mt. Vernon community of Pulaski County.

The Laurel County Sports Hall of Fame announced today the first middle school football bowl game to be played Saturday, September 2 at North Laurel Middle School.

The bowl game will feature three of the area's top middle school teams in North Laurel, Clay County and Rockcastle County.

The Laurel County Hall of Fame Middle School Bowl will feature a cheerleading competition as well as a Bowl Princess, which will come from one of the participating schools.

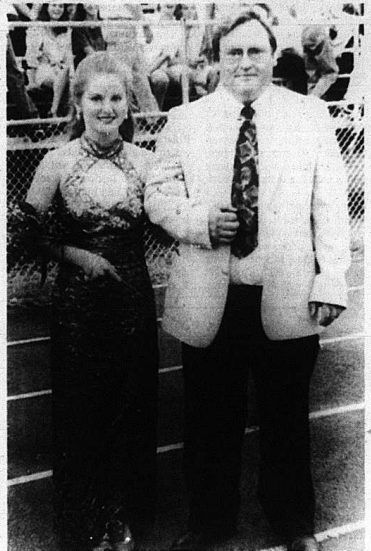
The Bowl Princess will be named between games while the cheerleading awards for first and second place.

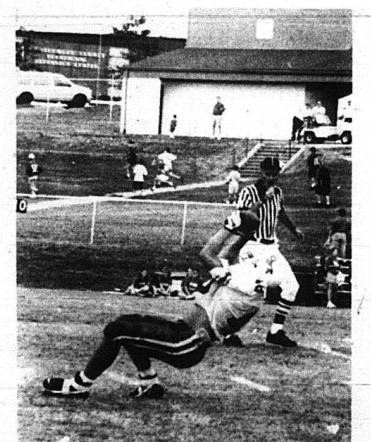

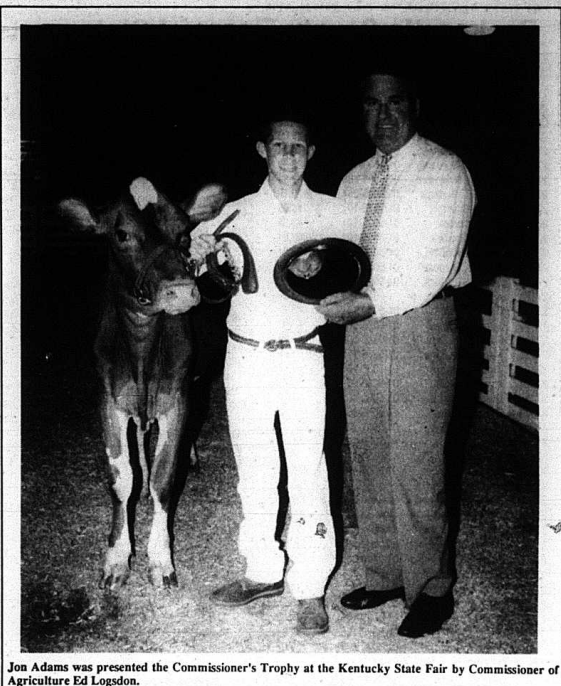
