

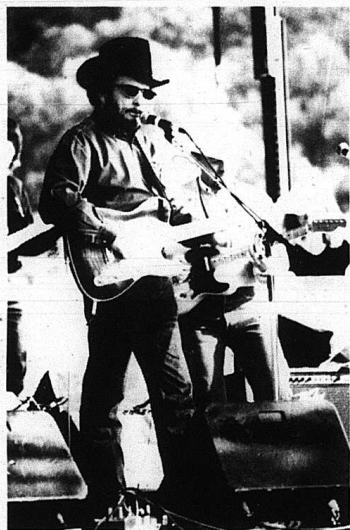

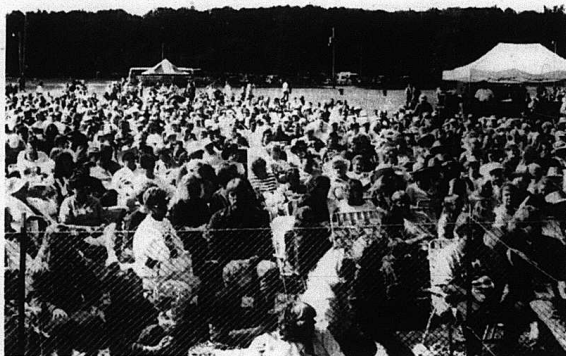

## Forgy tells Republicans he must have 5th district

 Calling himself a Reagan Republican and his opponent a Clinton democrat, Larry Forgy told a group of Rockcastle County supporters Monday morning, he would fight to have prayer put back in public schools and straighten out the mess the Kentucky Education Reform Act has made of Kentucky schools.

Forgy's comments came on the steps of the Rockcastle County courthouse before a small group of supporters and public officials.

The republican candidate for governor in the November election said it was up to republicans in the old fifth district to get the vote out in November for him to be able to win. Forgy told his supporters he would take care of the rest of the state, if they would take care of the fifth district.

"If the republicans in the old fifth district will drag it out like I know you can, you are looking at the next governor," he said.

"We will pluck my opponent like a chicken and send him down the road talking to himself," the Lexington attorney said.

Forgy told the crowd the only thing that would keep him from being the next governor was the republicans in the fifth district on getting out the vote.

"It will be another sad day for Kentucky, if they (the democrats) go back in office," he said.

The former member of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees told the crowd that the democrats in Kentucky government had "unknocked" with health care, schools, tobacco and taxes. "The party in power has failed, the time to change is now," he said.

"I support burley tobacco and always have, my opponent comes from a county where they do not grow a stalk of tobacco," he said.

"Bill Clinton drove a spike right at the heart of tobacco farmers when he tried to make it where you would be required to have a prescription to go across this street and buy a pack of cigarettes," Forgy said.

"I do not advocate that anyone smoke, but as long as people are

given the choice to smoke and there is a demand for tobacco, I want it grown right here in Kentucky," he said.

Forgy also visited the Rockcastle County Middle School before his appearance at the courthouse and he

## October 9 is last day to register to vote

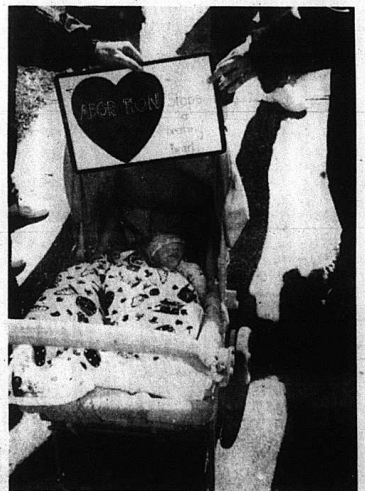
The last day to register to vote in the November General Election will be October 9, according to Norma Houk, Clerk, Rockcastle County.

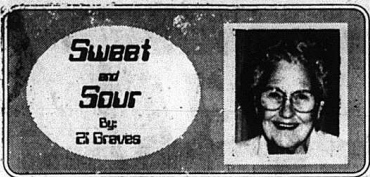

# FCIC Insurance Dates

Sales closing dates for crop insurance are much earlier than last year for all planned crops and certain perennials. According to Warden Alexander, CED, "Last year, sales closing dates were extended to accommodate producers because the crop insurance law was changed during the growing season. This year's sales closing dates are the standard 'old' dates." The sales closing dates for crops in this area are:  
Corn 3-15-96  
Tobacco 3-15-96

In most cases, crops insured last year are automatically insured this year. Producers planning insurable crops that were not planted last year need to obtain at least the catastrophic level of insurance by the sales closing date to be eligible for many USDA farm programs and loans. Catastrophic coverage may be obtained at the local Consolidated Farm Service Agency office or from a crop insurance agent. Only crop insurance agents can sell coverage in excess of the catastrophic level of protection. Producers wanting to change their insurance provider or contract need to make the change before the applicable crop's sales closing date.

# Nominations being sought for FSA committee

Farmers and other eligible voters are asked to nominate candidates of their choice by October 30 for the county Farm Service Agency (FSA), formerly ASCS. The FSA committee was previously known as the ASC County committee.  
The FSA county committee election will be conducted from November 24 to December 4 by mail ballot. FSA, an agency of the US Department of Agriculture, administers farm commodity, crop insurance, and conservation programs for farmers and makes farm ownership and operating loans.  
Rockcastle County farmers have the opportunity to nominate persons who would best represent their farm community on the FSA county committee. Farmers may request and receive nominating petition forms from the county office.  
Farmers are reminded that to be valid, petitions must be limited to one

nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve, if elected, and must be signed by at least three eligible voters in the local administrative area. Also, the petition must be received in the county office by the October 30 deadline.  
A list of the names of all known eligible persons to receive ballots in the upcoming election will be available in the county office on October 5 for public viewing. Anyone who meets the following requirements is eligible to vote in the election: any individual of legal voting age with an interest in a farm as owner, operator, tenant or shareholder, or who is eligible to participate in any FSA program.  
The opportunity to nominate, vote and be elected to office is guaranteed to all farmers, regardless of race, color, religion, national origin, age, sex, marital status or disability.

## Co-op meter reading begins in October

Jackson County RECC members will be seeing new faces around their homes as Tru-Check meter readers begin their duties in October.

In fact, Tru-Check employees have been out in the field since August setting up routes for the new service and members will no longer need to read their meters after October 1st.

The primary reason for co-op meter reading is to provide the member with efficient and accurate billing. Tru-Check employees will read the meters approximately the same time each month and bills will be sent out within two or three days of the reading.

This will not only provide members with timely billing but also help eliminate meter tampering. Meter tampering is illegal and costs the co-op and its members thousands of dollars each year.

Tru-Check employees can be recognized by their red shirts and vehicles with the Tru-Check name on the side. They will come to the same at your home, barn or other building, read the meter and enter the reading into a hand-held computer.

At the end of the day, the meter reader will download the information to a computer at the co-op office and the bill will be sent out within the next two or three days.

The Tru-Check company is based in Somerset and has been reading electric co-op meters since 1986. Vice president Terry Ray said the firm provides services to 35 utilities in eight states, including seven other Kentucky electric cooperatives.

"We are reading 630,000 meters each month," Ray said, "and by the end of the year, will have 300 employees. We're also proud of the fact that, company-wide our mistake record is .006%."

Ray said the company's founders all come from a rural farm background and "we understand we are on other people's property."

"Our employees respect other people's property," he added.

In addition to more accurate billing, the new service will also provide members with current billing for the first time in the co-op's 57 years of operation.

Under member meter reading, co-

op billing was always at least 60 days behind.

Now, the meter will be read every 28 to 33 days and the bill will be processed within two or three days.

This also means that the date members receive their bills will probably change, because billing will be done from the co-op office every day.

The change in billing will also result in a one-time catch-up bill. The bill members receive in October will cover energy used for an average of 62 days, some more, some less.

The amount of the bill will depend on when the meter is read on the new routes and when it was last read by the member.

Some members may not be able to pay the catch-up amount in one payment and they should call the co-op to make other payment arrangements.

"While changing over to co-op meter reading may be confusing," said general manager Doug Isary, "we ask for your cooperation as we work together to get the program up and going during the next few months."

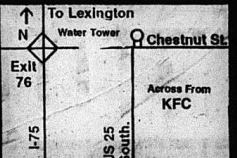

## Rockcastle native gets \$25,000 education award

Believing that the prestigious Milken Family Foundation National Educator Award was to be presented to a teacher in his school, Williamsburg Independent Principal Jerry Hodges was shocked last week to find out that he was the recipient of the distinguished national award and the \$25,000 award that accompanies it along with a week-long trip to California to pick up the check and go to a black-tie party.

Hodges, a teacher and administrator for 25 years, is the son of Estill and Alene Hodges, formerly of Mt. Vernon and now residents of Florida. His brother, Tommy Hodges still lives in the county as does Mrs. Hodges parents, Howard and Gertrude Stevens in Mt. Vernon. Mr. Hodges father operated a Western Auto Store in Mt. Vernon for many years and his mother taught at Mt. Vernon High School. Mr. Hodges wife, Brenda, is a chemistry teacher at Williamsburg.

The Milken Award is given annually to kindergarten through 12th-grade educators, primarily teachers and principals, in 30 states. This year, five of the winners were from Kentucky. This is the second award for an employee of the Williamsburg Independent School System, two years ago Bonnie Farrer, at that time a teacher under Hodges, won the \$25,000 award.

Hodges told a Times-Tribune reporter that it was hard to come up with the reason he received the award but his love for the school, teachers and kids were at the top of his list. "And our kids do real well on the test," he added.

Superintendent of Schools John Radjans said of the event, "Jerry Hodges is most deserving of the Milken foundation award. He is a blue-ribbon principal for a blue-ribbon school." Radjans said, "I'm happy for him, the school and the community. It's quite an honor for him and the entire community."

Hodges, who was named Kentucky's High School Principal of the Year last year, said the Williamsburg district is successful because it has

what many in America are still searching for: a true community school.

"It's a small community within a community," he said.

Hodges said that moving quickly to implement the Kentucky Education Reform Act helped the high school earn the highest school reform test scores of any high school in the state. An early convert to "restructuring," which includes ideas such as block scheduling, the district has invested heavily in technology and the high school, which shares a building with the elementary school, is hooked up to the Internet and has a new teleconference center that will allow students to communicate by interactive television with schools and universities anywhere in Kentucky or the world.

The one reform feature the school does not have is a management council of teachers and parents to decide issues such as curriculum and discipline. But Hodges said that's because he already involves teachers and parents on school committees and the faculty, which has the right to vote for a council anyway. It was, however, never felt the need for one.

"I'm not a dictatorial principal," he said. "I never have been and never will be."

## Agent who sold policies for insurance scam found guilty

Sentencing is scheduled Dec. 15 for a Tennessee insurance agent convicted of helping two physicians and a group of Kentuckians defraud the federal Medicaid program.

A federal jury in London con-

victed James Collake, 59, of Morristown, Tenn., on one count of conspiracy and 15 counts of aiding and abetting mail fraud. The trial in U.S. District Court at London lasted 10 days.

The charges were in connection with a scheme that involved two Tennessee doctors and about 40 Kentucky residents.

Investigators uncovered a network of people who bought large numbers

of insurance policies, then faked accidents and injuries. Prosecutors claimed Collake knew about the scheme when he sold the policies.

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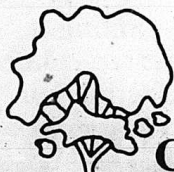
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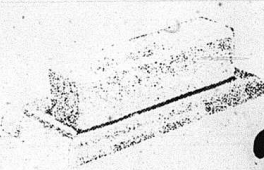
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# Mental mistake big in Rocket loss

In unusual fashion the Rockcastle County Rockets lost their homecoming game Friday night 16-15 to undefeated Whitesburg.

In even more unusual fashion, a mental error by both coaches and players probably cost the Rockets the ball game.

In the final minute of play Friday night the Rockets went for a two-point, extra point conversion, to try and beat Whitesburg in regulation play, but when center Jason Brock snapped the football, the Rockets had only ten players on the field.

Larkey said that after Jarrod Singleton scored from the 20 yard line, to pull the Rockets within one, Singleton and Cromer apparently saw kicker Raymond Blackburn standing next to him (Larkey) when they exited the field, "they must have thought we were going to kick the ball, and went to get a drink of water. We called timeout and put Stevie Owens, Jason Weaver and Eddie Todd on the left side of the ball so that we could run power left, the hole was there but Cromer wasn't sure of the play when he got to the field and he tried to go outside, where the defensive end was waiting. Of course the end was supposed to be picked up by Singleton out of the backfield, but Singleton wasn't there," Larkey said. "It was a hard loss to swallow, but we think it will be good for this team in the end," he said.

The Rockets had luck started on the first play of the game when John Hammond took the Whitesburg kick-off and after returning the kick to the Rocket 35 he fumbled it and Whitesburg recovered.

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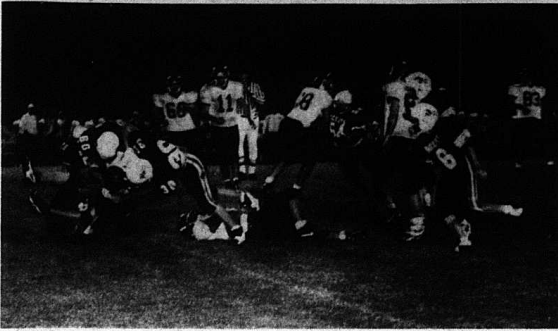

"I was really proud of the way our players fought their way back into the game, after falling behind 14-0," Larkey said.

"We weren't ready to play, when the game started but we regrouped and actually dominated the game for three quarters," he said.

**Contamination Of Brewed Tea With Coliforms**

On September 19, 1995, Fayette County was placed under a tea advisory for restaurants. Other counties are expected to have similar advisories in the future.

All restaurants have been advised to use safe handling procedures of brewed tea. You should check individual restaurants to see how their tea is brewed before purchasing. If they allow their water to reach 175 degrees and brew for five minutes or use automatic tea brewing machines, the tea should be safe to consume. Ice tea brewing machines bought for home use are supposed to reach 190 degrees for 8 minutes. This is sufficient to kill coliforms, if they are in fact present. Sun tea should not be brewed.

**REPLACE SODIUM WITH HERBS & SPICES**  
 Part 1 of 2

Herbs and spices give health-conscious cooks a flavorful alternative to salt.

Reduced-salt consumption is recommended for a number of medical conditions including high blood pressure, cardiovascular problems such as heart disease and fluid retention, kidney diseases and pregnancy.

Since the taste for salt is acquired, you can gradually reduce intake by using herbs and spices to replace salt. Eventually, you will be able to reduce the amount of salt in recipes or quit adding salt at the table. And you won't even miss it.

Herbs and spices have distinctive aromas and pungent flavors that add zest and contrast to food while helping you lower overall salt intake. You can also use salt seasonings to replace salt. These include lemon, lime or orange juice or peel, vinegar, nuts, seeds, onion, garlic, red or green peppers, pimiento and raisins -- to name a few.

Let your taste buds and imagination be your guide regarding how much and which spices or herbs to use. If a recipe isn't available, start with one-fourth teaspoon per 4 servings of food. Begin with one-eighth teaspoon if using red pepper or garlic powder.

If you've not browsed the spices section of your grocery store, take some time on your next visit to view the selection of individual spices and read labels for seasoning suggestions. You'll also find many ready-made seasonings including low- or non-salt mixes and flavored peppers. Always check the ingredient label for added salt.

These are suggested spices, herbs, and seasonings to use with various foods. Remember, there are no hard and fast rules. Let creativity be your key and praise will be your reward.

Use allspice, nutmeg, cinnamon or lemon, lime or orange peel to reduce salt in yeast breads, coffee cakes, cookies, pies and cakes. However, salt does play a role in making quality baked goods so it can't be removed completely. To give zest to cottage or cream cheese, add chives, basil, sage, vegetable flakes, onion or garlic powder, or vinegar. Season deviled eggs, omelets or scrambled eggs with basil, chili powder, chives, marjoram, rosemary or thyme.

You can use many herbs and spices on meats, chicken, fish and seafood. Some often used on meats

or poultry include bay leaf, basil, cumin, garlic, marjoram, mint, rosemary, oregano, sage, thyme and citrus juice or peel. To add zest to fish or seafood, try bay leaf, dill weed, garlic, lemon pepper, tarragon, citrus juice or peel, horseradish or vinegar.

Spices or herbs used in soup will depend upon the food used as its base. Salt-replacement seasonings for vegetable-based soups can include bay leaf, chili powder, chives, garlic, marjoram, oregano, rosemary, sage, savory or thyme. Spices or herbs used to flavor meat, chicken, fish or seafood main dishes also can be used in these soups.

Other seasonings for vegetable dishes include ginger, mint, nutmeg, cinnamon, dill, caraway or sesame seeds, vinegar, nuts, citrus juices or peel.

Paprika, black pepper and parsley are so versatile that they can be used to compliment the flavor of many foods.

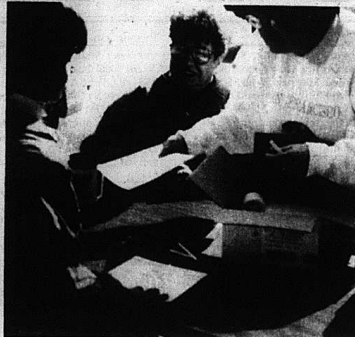
