

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

Sales closing dates for crop insurance are much earlier than last year for fall planted crops and certain perennials. According to Warden Alexander, CED, 'Last year, sales closing dates were extended to accommodate producers because the copy insurance law was changed during the growing season. This year's sales closing dates are the standard and old 'dates." The sales closing dates for crops in this area are: crops that were not planted last year need to obtain at least the catastrophic level of insurance by the sales clos-ing date to be eligible for many USDA farm programs and loans. Cata-strophic coverage may be obtained at the local Consolidated Farm Service the local Consolidated Farm Service.
Agency office or from a crop insurance agent. Only crop insurance agents can sell coverage in excess of the catastrophic level of protection. Producers wanting to change their insurance provider or contract need to make the change before the applicable crop's sales closing date.

Rockcastle County farmers have the opportunity to nominate persons they feel would best serve their farm community on the FSA county com-mittee. Farmers may request and receive nominating petition forms from the county office. Farmers are reminded that to be valid, petitions must be limited to one

nominée each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve, if elected, and must be signed by at least three eligible voters in the local administrative area. Also, the petition must be received in the FSA office by the October 30 dead-line.

A list of the names of all known eligible persons to receive ballots in the upcoming election will be available in the country office on October 5 for public viewing, Anyone who meets the following requirements is eligible to vote in the election: any individual of legical voting age with an interest in a farm is owner, operator, tenant or sharecropper or who is eligible to participate in any FSA program.



Co-op meter reading begins in October

Jackson County RECC members will be seeing new faces around their homes as Tru-Check meter readers begin their duties in October. In fact, Tru-Check employes have been out in the field since August setting up routes for the new service and members will no longer need to read their meters after Cetober 1st. The primary reason for co-op meter reading is to provide the member with efficient and accurate billing. Tru-Check employees will read the meters approximately the same time each month and bills will be sent out within two or three days be sent out within two or three days

of the reading.

This will not only provide members with timely billing but also help eliminate meter tampering. Mete tampering is illegal and costs the co

tampering is illegal and costs the coop and its members i housands of
ollars each year.

Tru-Check employees can be
recognized by their red shirts and
vehicles with the Tru-Check name
on the side. They will come to the
meter at your home, barn or other
building, read the meter and enter the
reading into a hand-held computer.

At the end of the day, the meter
reader will download the information to a computer at the co-op office
and the bill will be sent out within the
next two or three days.

and the bill will be sent out within the next two or three days.

The Tru-Check company is based in Somerset and has been reading electric co-opmeters since 1986. Vice president Terry Ray said the firm provides services to 35 utilities in electric reading the services. es, including seven other

eight states, including seven other Kentucky electric cooperatives. "We are reading 630,000 meters each month," Ray said, "and by the end of the year, will have 300 em-ployees. We'ke also proud of the fact that, company-wide our mistake rec-ord is ,006%."

Ray said the company's founders all come from a rural farm background and "we understand we are on other people's property."

"Our employees respect other people's property," he added. In addition to more accurate bill-ing, the new service will also provide

members with current billing for the first time in the co-op's 57 years of

operation.

Now, the meter will be read every 28 to 33 days and the bill will be processed within two or three days.

This also means that the date members receive fheir bills will probably change, because billing will be done from the co-op office every day.

probably change, because billing will also result in a one-time catch-up bill. The bed one from the co-op office every day.

The change in billing will also result in a one-time catch-up bill. The bill members receive in October will cover energy used for an average of 2 days, some more, some less.

The amount of the bill will depend on when the meter is read on the new routes and when it was last read by the member.

Some members may not be able to pay the catch-up amount in one payment and they should call the co-op to make other payment arrangements.

"While changing over to co-ope may be confusing," said general manager Doug leary, we ask for your cooperation as we work together to get the program up and going during the next few months."
