

## Bringing It All Together - KIRIS

Kentucky Instructional Results Information System (KIRIS) is the state assessment instrument. Rockcastle County teachers in grades 3 (exit level primary), 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 were focused on administering a complete battery of open-response and multiple choice items which addressed the content areas of reading, math, science, social studies and writing. The window for the completion of this section (transitional component) was April 15 - May 3, 1996. All but two (2) schools have met the state assessment requirements for the 1995-96 school year. The portfolio section (writing/math) was finished on April 19, 1996. The performance events are scheduled through May 12, 1996. (Rockcastle County Middle School and Mt. Vernon Elementary are scheduled inMay). Rockcastle County High School began their assessment in February; however, for the 1996-97 school year, the high school window will be more in line with the elementaries and middle school.



### **Bige Towrey honored for** contributions to education

On February 29, Forward in the Fifth honored Bige Towery, former superintendent of the Rockcastle County School System, for the contributions to improving education. Towery received this year's Earl Wallace Award, which is named for the Forward in the Fifth founder who

was a leader in Kentucky's education reform movement. Approximately 40 wellwishers joined him for a dinner in his honor which was held at the Boone Tavern Hotel in Berea.

JoAnn James, former Forward in the Fifth Chair of the Board of Directors, said that Towery was the kind of leader Wallace wanted to

She recalled that in Forward in the Fifth's early days, Wallace often told James that when she had questions about the organization's work, she should call on Towery's wisdom for her answers. "He wanted to make things better for the children of Rockcastle County," James said before presenting Towery with the award.

Towery accepted the award, saying he'll always be grateful that he had the opportunity to work for the children of Rockcastle County.

He spoke about the changes in education in Rockcastle County that the school system made even before they were required to by the Kentucky Education Reform Act. In reflecting on those changes, he acknowledged the contributions of the many educators in the system with whom he had worked. "It (the award) symbolizes so much of what we all did together, "Towery said.

Towery also introduced Dixie Holt, his former teacher whom he asked to accompany him to the dinner. He recalled going to school in rural Rockcastle County where Holt taught him in grades five through eight. "She instantly made the difference in my life when I went into her classroom," he recalled. Long before anyone thought about KERA, Holt was using multi-age groupings and integrated learning. Besides helping Towery learn to stay on task and out of trouble, "I remember her saying to me, you could be a good teacher," Towery said.

A number of other guests at the dinner congratulated Towery after the dinner and gave their regards to Holt, who also taught them.

School media specialist Lois Cameron has seized the opportunity to they say they want more projects in the media upgrade the reference section, replace older center. These activities would encourage stubooks and purchase more Accelerated Reader books. She would also like to focus on nonfiction books, learn how to operate the automatic check-out program and modernize the library by replacing some furniture and shelves.

Most people would think of these as typical ways to improve a school's media center. But when Roundstone teacher Norma Eversole asked a group of students what they would like to see changed in the media center, they offered an assortment of suggestions.

Eversole began by telling students about the purpose of a media center and the duties of a media specialist. She then asked them: If you had \$5,000 for the media center, what changes would you make? Some of the students said they would like to have better research materials for their work on papers and projects, such as more books on historical figures and access to electronic information sources. "I got information on Abraham Lincoln on the CD-ROM at home. I liked it," said Gina McClure, an upper-level primary student.

It would also be easier for the students to find information in reference materials that are upto-date. Encyclopedias and biographies in Roundstone's center are old, so they aren't as useful to the students. Students experience difficulty finding recent information in books published in the 1970's. "We get left behind if tion to the large amount of the school budget that we don't get on the bandwagon," said Eversole. has already gone towards the media center.

Students would also like to see more activities in the media center. They said that sometimes they do not have anything to do at the media center when they are in there with a class.

Cameron organized one project that combined social studies and the media center in which students researched explorers and created art projects and stories. "They (the students) came up with their own choices for their

Roundstone Elementary School in Rock-projects. I was very pleased with most of them said Cameron. She agrees with the students when dents to use the media center more often.

Some of the other changes students wanted to see in the school media center ranged from videos and new books to more comfortable furniture. Jessica Thacker, a fifth-grade student. said that the media center should get new videos that could be used for all students, especially the smaller students. Adam York, another fifth-grade student, said there should be newer books on the shelves. He also said the center desperately needed softer chairs to sit on. Other students laughed and agreed. Kevin Knuckles, a fouth-grade student, thought the media center needed better decorations -- such as posters of real prople and pictures of famous historical figures. Amanda Rogers, also a fourth-grade student, felt more biographies of historical figures should be available in the center.

Even when the students came up with these ideas, they knew the rules and standards that would be set in the media center. If they did have more computers to access information, a time limit would be set so that all students would be able to use them.

David Pensol, Roundstone's principal, said the school is planning to make a lot of the changes the students suggested. They have gone to the school council and asked that the funds to be funneled towards the media center, in addi-

Pensol plans to make the media center a part of the school's curriculum. To fit it into all the subjects students are studying would help benefit the center as well as the studnets. "Library power has been good to us. If nothing else, it helps us to kick ideas around with our mentor --Rosenwald Dunbar," said Pensol. Roundstone has already learned a lot from their mentor school and are very pleased with their media center changes so far.

### Nineteen arrested on drug related charges

Nineteen Rockcastle countians got an early wake-up call from state and local police Tuesday matering, after warrants were issued for them in connection with drug related

in connection with drug related charges.

About thirty police officers began rounding up defendants at 6 a.m. and, by 8 a.m., nineteen people had been arrested, according to Rock-castle County Attorney Jeff Burdette.

Burdette said that warrants were issued for 21 people, including former Rockeastle County Sheriff Clarence "Jib" Hasty.

The arrests were the result of a year-long undercover "investigation by Kentucky State Police, according to Rockcastale Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael, who empanded a special Grand Jury in Rock-castle County last Tuesday. Twelve indictiments were returned the other nine people were charged with misdeamenapes.

"The Grand Jury returned indictments in each case presented by the state police," said Carmichael. "The state police," said Carmichael. "The state police have done an excellent job and we believe they have very arong evidence against these people," the commonwealth attorney said. "During the past year we have experienced several drug-related homicides in Rockcastle County,"

round-up sends a message that illegal drug activity will no longer be toler-ated nor ignored," he said. -Both Carmichael and Burdette

Both Carmichael and Burdette said they plan vigorous prosecutions of those arrested.

Burdette said Wednesday he heard some complaints after the roundup about not arresting other larger possible drug traffickers in the county.

"We have stopped a lot of street sellers and we will continue to work hard to see that this type of crime doesn't go on in the county," he said.

### Ellis Robinson found dead

A Rockeastle County man, missing since October 1995, was discovered last Thursday on a rock ledge above the heavily fraveled Ky, 461 Mt. Vernon by-pass.
State highway workers found the body of Ellis Robinson, 31, of Copper Creek, on the middle tier of the steep highway cut along the read

steep highway cut along the road, which connects travelers from Interstate 75 to Somerset and Lake Cumberland.

By Rep. Danny Ford Legislators may return to Frankfort this summer to address worker's com-pensation. The governor announced pensation. The governor announced during the regular session of the 1996 Kentucky General Assembly that he would call a special session if his request for legislation was not passed that would dealy for one year the collection of \$40 million from the collection of \$40 million from the collection of \$50 million from the worker's compensation special fund and extend the time the Kentucky Employers Mutual Insurance Authority (KEMA) has to build up its reserves. Both measures were defeated. A bill that would have made a positive impact on workers' compensation was buried in committee. House Bill SIR would have established definitions for on-the-job injuries and would have excluded aging from the process of determining injury. It would have revised the criteria for determining disability: limited the reopening of claims to within two years from the date of an award or order, and decreased litigation costs. Shortly after the session, the governor instructed the workers' compensation advisory council to hold weekly public hearings in Frankfort to address various problem areas in

the workers' comp system. This eightmember panel is to make recommendations on possible solutions regaring areas such as programs, costs,
eiligibility.coverage and claims. Testimony will be heard from business
owners and business groups, insurance companies about premiums; and
representatives from coal industries.

scheduled for May 16 (Medical Proyders); May 23 (Injured Workers);
and May 30 (Legal and Rebuttal),
Each forum will begin at noon in
Room 149 of the Capitol- Annex

The governor has the sole authority to call a special session and set the agenda. Whether he calls a special session this summer likely hinges on the outcome of these meetings.

#### Agriculture News

Afone-time signup period of May
20 through July 12 has been announced for producers wishing to
enroll their farms in a Production
Flexibility Contract. The contracts,
authorized by the 1996 Farm Bill, are
for seven years, beginning in 1996
and ending in 2002.
This is the only opportunity producers will have to enroll and those
who fail to do so now will not becligible at a later date. There will be
no further additional signups except
for land coming out of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). This
required by the 1996 Act and there is
no discretion to extend this date.
Farms with a planting history in

Farms with a planting historia,
one of the past five years of wheat,
corn, grain, sorghum, barley, oats,
upland cotton or rice are eligible to be
enrolled in this program. Farmers

may plant as they wish under the program, but fruits and vegetables may not be planted on contract acres, except under certain circumstances. A producer may enroll all or part of the farm's contract base acreage in the program and, after signup, may request a permanent reduction in the acreage without penalty. Base allot-ment notices will be mailed to pro-

ment notices will be mailed to pro-ducers in early May. Questions are being directed to the FARM BILL HOTLINE at 606-224-7645.
FCIC coverage is no longer a requirement for USDA benefits. Producers who elect not to take out Producers who elect not to take out the CAT coverage may waive their disaster benefits and still receive price support benefits. A waiver request form must be signed in the county office if a producer decides not to take the insurance. It is also not necessary to come in by the previous May 2 deadline to cancel coverage, but this is still the deadline for purchasing coverage. Policies will automatically be terminated if payment is not received in the county office by July 15. Producers may sign the waiver request upon crop certification, signing AD1026 Sodbuster, or manuals earlier.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) participants have the option to extend their contracts or apply for an early release. To apply for an exten-sion or early release application, must be filed by May 31, this pertains to

producers who wish to restore their crop acreage bases for the 1996 crop year. For more details contact the

Crop certification deadline will be July 1st, this is also the last day a tobacco lease may be signed. ALL crops must be planted at the time of certification. It is required this year for ALL producers growing burley tobacco on their farm(s) file a crop reports. It is also a requirement for CRP acreage and fruit or vegetable


