Rockcastle County School System will participate in the federally funded Summer Food Service Program for children below the age of nineteen.

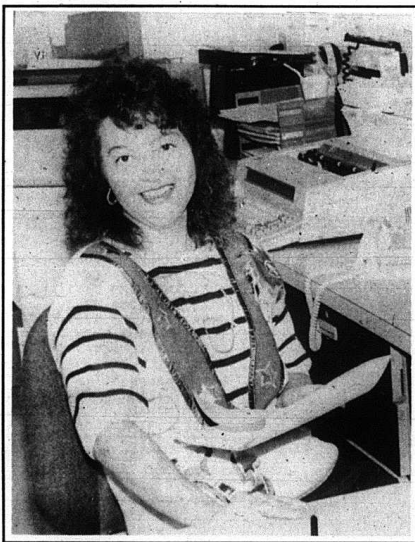

Children's actions may eventually land parents in jail

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court thinks they may have the solution to help you be a better parent -- through enactment of a "Parental Responsibility Ordinance."

At Tuesday's regular monthly meeting of the court, members voted unanimously to pass an ordinance that will ultimately make parents responsible for the actions of their children.

Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis requested the ordinance and Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette supplied it.

According to Carloftis, "We've got to do something."

The judge was evidently referring to the mounting monthly county bills to house juvenile offenders. Carloftis said that if something isn't done, the problem will bankrupt the county. County Treasurer Joe Clontz, CPA, agrees. "The county can't afford to pay for the incarceration of these juvenile offenders, we don't have the money," he said.

On Tuesday the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court passed the first reading of a parental responsibility ordinance

And, County Attorney Jeff Burdette agrees that it is a burden on the county but, as he told the fiscal court Tuesday, it is only going to get worse for a while. "I'm not going to turn my back on my responsibility to prosecute these juveniles. They need to learn a lesson and they need to be off the street, in a place where they can begin rehabilitation."

The county judge agreed. "We are currently spending around \$5,000 a month to house these offenders in other juvenile facilities," he said. "Ninety percent of the people will not be affected by this new law, but the ten percent that are may think twice before they let their minor child do whatever he or she so desires," the judge said.

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court may be trying to do something

unprecedented in the state of Kentucky. Burdette told the court there may be lawsuits filed to challenge the constitutionality of the ordinance.

Carloftis said Tuesday the court was ready for three lawsuits, should it come to that.

The ordinance basically affects parents and of children under the age of 16.

Parental duties outlined in the ordinance include:

1. To keep illegal drugs or illegal firearms out of the home and legal firearms locked in places that are inaccessible to the minor.
2. To know the Curfew Ordinance...and to require the minor to observe the ordinance.

(a) no child under the age of twelve (12) years shall be permitted

Benton Bullock subdivision residents petition county to blacktop roads

Several persons from the Benton Bullock Subdivision on U.S. 150 asked for county help with blacktop for their roads at a meeting Tuesday of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court. They were present at the meeting with a petition bearing 101 names of subdivision residents.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis told the group the court would like to help them in any possible way but that state regulations would prevent it.

The judge said it appeared Bullock owned the roads in the subdivision, if it was a subdivision.

County Attorney Jeff Burdette told the group he would look into the problem and report to them, once "we make sure it is a subdivision."

It was speculated that it might take Circuit Court action to finally settle the question and the judge told the group a clarification did not mean the court would accept the roads into the county program.

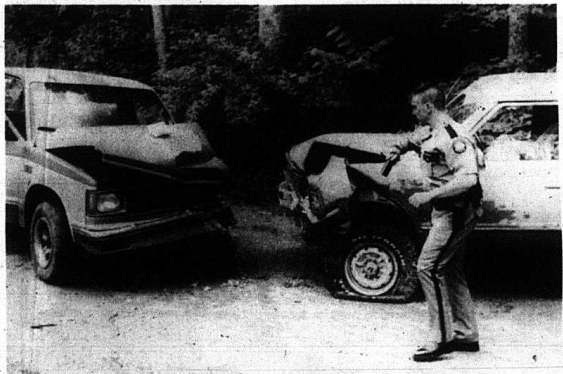
The court was told the state has

Man probably dead for two weeks before discovered

A Berea man whose body was discovered buried off U.S. 25 near Flat Gap probably was killed two weeks before he was reported missing, Kentucky State Police said yesterday.

The body of Lloyd Dale Holt, 36, was discovered early Tuesday after the suspect in the killing led police to the body, said Sgt. Joey Barnes of the state police's Richmond post.

Police plan to charge that suspect, Cecil McHone, 28, of Berea, in the slaying.

McHone has been serving time in Madison County Detention Center on a contempt of court charge since May 2, jail officials said.

Holt, better known to his friends as "Oldie Crow," was killed in mid-April, Barnes said. His mother reported him missing April 28.

He was killed by a single bullet through his head and neck. His body was found buried on property belonging to McHone's father, Barnes said.

Police think Holt was shot in Rockcastle County and then buried in Madison County.

Since Holt was reported missing, police interviewed more than 40 people for possible leads, Barnes said. A witness finally identified McHone as a suspect.

Holt knew McHone, said Barnes, who declined to release a possible motive for the crime.

Last Friday I attended one of those two and a half hour luncheons where you pay \$15.00 for a bowl of lettuce with some mystery meat in it but you get the opportunity to rub elbows with the high and mighty. The reason that you can't tell what kind of material my suits are made of is mid-arm is because I spend a lot of time rubbing elbows.

And the reason I do it is because I have a peculiar fetish for keeping callouses on my funny bones. I'm serious. A callous is better than a blister every single time. If you've never rubbed elbows before, chances are you'll get some blisters when you first start out. But if you keep practicing, the scars will heal over and pretty soon they'll get covered with multiple layers of rough skin. Rough skin doesn't look very good but it doesn't cause any pain. Blisters burn and bleed and hurt like hell.

But enough of that. I spent the noomish time of day at Georgetown College to share what turned out to be a pretty good salad and a glass of tea with a hundred or so other elbow-rubbers who had come to meet certain, elite members of the press. And to listen to a debate that was supposed to deal with ethics in news coverage.

The press included Louisville-native, Bob Edwards, of NPR's Morning Edition. Bob is less important than God to those of us who attend Church Services—on the one hand. On the other, he's more entertaining and informative than the news I generally get from Heaven.

John Ed Pearce, another native son and arguably the most articulate newspaper commentator in the world was also on the panel. (John Ed doesn't even have fabric on the elbows of his suits—just big holes

where it used to be).

Ginni Fox, another of my heroes, the Executive Director of KET, who has made Kentucky's public television system one of the very best in the nation was there along with Sam Dick, to represent the television media.

Sam is the anchor of Channel 27 (WKYT Lexington) News and even his competitors admit that he is at least one cut above what you'd normally expect of a local station newscaster. It's just a matter of time, and perhaps his preference, before we see Sam Dick holding down a chair on the CBS Evening News.

Mindy Shannon-Phelps, formerly a news reporter at Channel 18, formerly press secretary for Brer Horse Jones and currently Project coordinator for Jimmy Carter's Habitat for Humanity work project was on the stage. (I'm still wondering why).

David Hawpe, Editor of the Courier Journal, a fellow red-neck and hilariously par-excellence, was there. God knows I'd love to grow up and be just like Hawpe except I'm running out of time. The good news is that Hawpe will soon have a column in the C.J. I honestly can't wait. David Hawpe is one of the sharpest wits in journalism today, no matter where you look. Getting him out of the board room and into print will be a wonderful gift to Kentucky, for sure, and I'll be even more money that Hawpe will be published and read from coast to coast once he starts pushing the pen pencil. You'll see.

Buck Ryan, Director of the University of Kentucky School of Journalism was also on the panel and he talked a lot. In the meantime I wondered why the journalism schools at Western and Eastern Kentucky Universities (where they really do teach news gathering) weren't represented. But you can't have everything.

Conspicuous by their absence were

Lewis Owens and/or Tim Kelly of the Lexington Herald Leader, and in retrospect, either of those two worthies might have gotten the distinction on the track for which it was advertised and, I assume, intended. Not that it matters now, because I

and a couple of hundred other people had come to Georgetown to listen to a discussion about ethics in journalism. We'd come (at least I had to hear the Who's Who enlightened us about why the "news media" is held in such disdain by the American Public.

What we heard, instead, was total and absolute denial. No alcoholic who drinks two fifths of vodka a day and proclaims that he doesn't have a problem more strongly denies that problem than the hostesses I've just listed above deny that the news media is in deep crap.

What we heard over and over again from every member of the panel is that they can't seem to understand why anything is wrong. We heard over and over and over again how wonderful it is to have free speech and how important it is to be honest and to have integrity and just how much of those attributes every member of the panel possesses. We heard over and over and over again an absolute denial is wrong.

Toward the end of the discussion, I finally had the opportunity to ask about the difference between O.J. Simpson stabbing Nicole and the other jealous husbands killing their wives that we read about in weekly papers every week in rural Kentucky. Why did O.J. get all the press?

The answer is pretty obvious to me. When Jake shoots Judy in Hazard or Lancaster or Mt. Vernon or London or Whitesburg or wherever, the local press is obligated to report that it happened. Two paragraphs later it's over. It's never in print to me.

When O.J. Simpson stabs Nicole Brown it becomes an opportunity to sell advertising and television time and printed papers and the more that the editors can sensationalize the whole affair the more money they can make. When a Whitewater-like banking scam that can be associated with the president comes along, it gets reported and promoted and shoved down the reading public's throats to no end because it sells, sells, sells. When a local retailer rips off the local savings and loan for a few million dollars, the news media will give the story two paragraphs on an inside page.

So how ethical is it to occupy most of our time with a media popular event that will sell advertising instead of focusing on news that is really important? Don't ask any of the panel that was in Georgetown last Friday because they'll tell you they don't have any problems. They don't even see one.

The next time you see a drunk staggering down the street, grab him by the arm and ask what's wrong. He'll tell you the same damn thing. "I'm okay. Nothing wrong with me. Now leave me alone."

Judge Carlolitis said the library building presently needs a new roof and "the court can't afford to buy shingles." He said the Broadhead Fairgrounds also needed work.
The D-C Elevator Co. notified the court it will increase its price from \$36 a month to \$38. The cost is for periodic inspection required by the state of the elevator in the courthouse annex.

The court voted to continue the KA Co. Advance Revenue Program for another year.
Also approved by the court was the hiring of Robert Chesnut as a road department laborer.

Bids on household items were opened by the court. Basically the bids were:
Mt. Vernon Produce got the bid for culverts.

Mt. Vernon Oil and Tire got the bid for petroleum products.
M.A. Walker of McKee got the bid, along with Kentucky Stone Co., Mt. Vernon Quarry, Shopville Quarry and Clover Bottom for crushed limestone.

The court accepted all bids to correspond with the location of county trucks at the time of need.
Ashland Petroleum Co. of Lexington got the bid for cold mix, that the county won't use.

Elmo Greer and Sons of London got the bid for hot mix at \$20.50 a ton.
The Rockcastle Co. Conservation District has raised its budget 4 percent for the fiscal years 1997-2002 and this was turned into the fiscal court Tuesday.

The budget showed receipts of \$17,816 with \$19,816 available and expenditures of \$14,705 with a projected balance of \$5,111. Most ex-

or allowed to be upon the public streets or in any public place between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m.
(b) No child under the age of sixteen (16) years shall be permitted or caused to be upon the public streets or in any public place between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.
(c) Subsections (a) and (b) of this section shall not apply when the child is with the parent, legal guardian or adult selected by the parent or legal guardian to be with the child or if the child is over twelve (12) years of age and is upon an errand or other legiti-

mate business directed by his parent or guardian and has proof of such permission.
(3) To require the minor to attend regular school sessions and to forbid the minor to be absent from class without parental or school permission.
(4) To arrange proper supervision for the minor when the parent must be absent.
(5) To take the necessary precautions to prevent the minor from maliciously or willfully destroying real, personal or mixed property which belongs to the county of Rockcastle, or is located in the County of Rockcastle.
(6) To forbid the minor from keep-

(complete cite not presently known) located within the county of Rockcastle for the 1996 tax year and all subsequent years, a franchise tax at the rate of .025% on all deposits maintained within the county of Rockcastle as defined in KRS 136.7(?) (complete cite not presently known) maintained by such financial institutions.

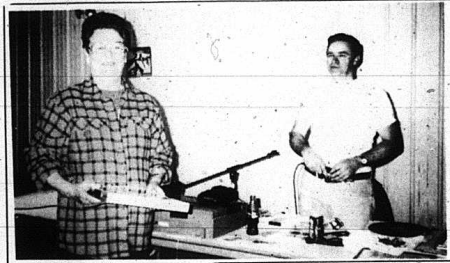

Bagworms are hatching

Bagworm eggs have now hatched and the young larvae are at their most vulnerable stage for treatment. This caterpillar is a serious defoliator of many different kinds of landscape and nursery plants. Infestation and injury are especially severe on evergreens such as juniper, arbutus and blue spruce. Bagworms overwinter as eggs within spindle-shaped bags made of silk and bits of plant material. Young larvae emerge and immediately begin feeding on the upper side of leaves, camouflaged within a tiny bag pointed upward. The bag is gradually enlarged as the larva grows. Older larvae strip evergreens of their needles and consume whole leaves of susceptible hardwood species, leaving only the larger veins.

CONTROL. The best time to control bagworms is during the next few weeks, while the larvae are small. Carefully inspect trees and shrubs for last year's bags. Preventive treatment is justified on plants that were heavily infested with bagworms last year. Small bagworms may also disperse to previously uninfested plant material after becoming wind-borne on silken strands. Evergreens, in particular, should be routinely inspected through mid-July. Overwintering eggs can be destroyed by hand-picking old bags during the winter or early spring. However, this window of opportunity has passed, and insecticides are now the only effective means of control. Products containing Bacillus thuringiensis (BT) work well (e.g., Dipel, Thuricide), as do Tempo, Orthene, Dursban and Sevin.

Crop reports are currently being taken. The deadline to file a crop report is July 1st. ALL crops must be planted in the time of certification. It is important that ALL producers

growing burley tobacco on their farms (5) file crop reports. Crop reports are required from farms that are participating in the Production Flexibility Program and the Conservation Reserve Program. An appointment

will be scheduled at your convenience to file the crop acreage report. FCIC is no longer a requirement for USDA benefits. Producers who elect not to take out insurance coverage may waive their disaster benefits and still receive price support benefits. A waiver request form must be signed in the county office if a producer decides on this option. Waivers may be signed upon crop certification, or anytime prior to receiving marketing cards or Production Flexibility contract payments. Signup is currently underway for the Production Flexibility Program (formerly the Wheat and Feed Grain Program). Farms with crop acreage bases for wheat and/or corn can sign a 7 year contract to receive payments. There are no planting requirements and no set aside acreage required. The contract may be terminated by the producer anytime during the 7 years to get out of the program. Deadline to sign up for this program is July 12. CRP acreage will be released in all counties nationwide for emergency haying and grazing, based on a national livestock economic emergency. CRP participants may file requests for emergency haying and grazing in all counties in all States regardless of

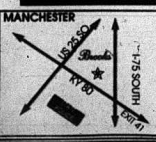

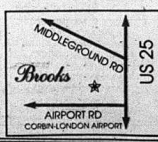

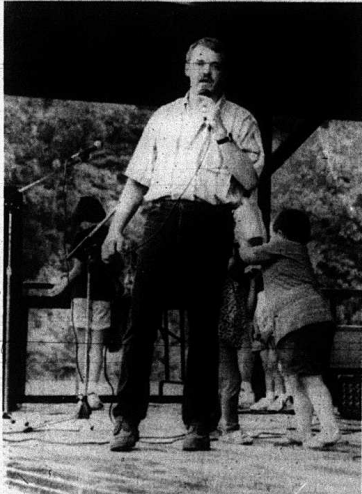
Rain doesn't dampen Walkfest 1996

Friends, family, entertainers, honor Renfro's Old Joe Clark

Over 1,000 people attended the Renfro Valley Barn Dance on June 1, and the surprise tribute to Old Joe Clark honoring his 50th Anniversary on the stage of Renfro Valley. After Clark and his son, Terry, made their usual exit from the stage, they were called back to the stage center by M.C. Jim Gaskin. Old Joe was seated in a rocking chair and first U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell, followed in turn by 5th district Congressman Hal Rogers, and Congressman Scotty Baesler of the 6th district shared tributes to the man who has garnered fans worldwide with his Bluegrass music and irrepresible country wit.

For the next part of the evening after this surprise, Old Joe was escorted to a seat in the audience surrounded by 40 of his family members and friends for the additional surprise of video messages. Kentucky Governor, Paul Patton added his congratulations. The governor is in Japan on a trade mission. Governor Patton credited Clark and Renfro Valley with drawing positive attention to Kentucky.

Also, participating in the celebration via videotape were some of country and bluegrass music's most enduring stars. Memories and anecdotes from Old Joe's long career were shared by Little Jimmy Dickens, the Osborne Brothers, the Reno Brothers, Bill Carlisle, Grandpa Jones, Porter Wagoner, and Ralph Emery. Country historian, Robert K. Oermann spoke of Old Joe's impact and influence on the country entertainment field. The audience, including a very surprised Old Joe Clark, viewed these messages on large-screen monitors.

"It's not often you'll catch me speechless," said Clark, "but this beats all. Bless their hearts, these folks just make me want to sign on for another 50 years." A videotape of Clark's performances over the years was presented to the entertainer at the close of the show. The commemorative tape is available to the public at Renfro Valley's Music Store.

Old Joe Clark was born on the Renfro Valley stage, a product of the imaginations of Renfro Valley founder John Lair and Manuel "Speedy" Clark. In those early years, Clark needed full stage makeup and false whiskers to fulfill the role. Old Joe's irresistibly ornery attitude and mastery on the banjo won him engagements on radio, television and movies and won him a stint on the Grand Ole Opry.

Renfro presents Rogers with protest petition

Congressman, Harold Rogers of Kentucky was presented with a petition for President Clinton signed by over 3,000 people protesting the outrageous increase in the price of gasoline. The petition referred to the industry leaders as Barons of Petroleum who are gouging the consumer and endangering the country with inflated costs which could have a domino effect should the increase prevail into the summer months.

Jane Thorne, General Manager of Renfro Valley Entertainment Center, presented the petition to Congressman Rogers with a request that it be delivered to the President. The petition states: "Residents of the 5th district of Kentucky and visitors to Renfro Valley Entertainment Center do hereby voice their concern and outrage about the price gouging by the Barons of Petroleum. Very few people have been untouched by the recent wave of gasoline price increases. Commuters to the workplace, trips to the grocery store and routine around-town errands have all become more costly. Despite the widespread effects of the price hikes, there has been scant effort to curb the growing problem."

History shows that similar major prices hikes of petroleum have been the cause for increases in the price of air travel and freight hauling, prices that were never reduced accordingly when "oil shortages" ceased to exist, which had a domino effect on the nation's economy.

We urge you, Mr. President, to get to the heart of the problem and take

REAL action against the Barons of Petroleum, to hold high-level negotiations to alleviate the burden that high gasoline prices placed upon the American public and to avoid an inflationary spiral which increased prices create.

Mrs. Thorne said that tourism and small business people from every walk of life such as restaurants, shops, Mom & Pop operations, and even

service stations, are being hurt by this artificial inflation of prices.

She stated, "We would like to have sent thousands more signatures to Washington; however, the short time allowed for gathering signatures to the petition kept us from obtaining thousands more. Everyone clamored to have the opportunity to sign the petition when made aware of its existence."

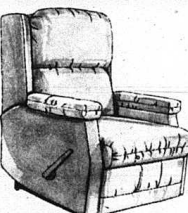

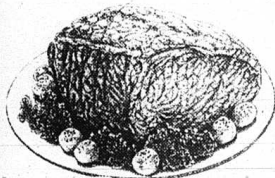

Now that the inside of the Rockcastle County Public Library building has undergone renovation, plans are being made for an upgrade on technical services.

Hooking on to the Internet hopefully will be the next step in improving at least one service for the public. There must be a place in every community where citizens can come and work on a computer. Not using a computer in the Information Age is like not using machines during the

Industrial Revolution.

Librarians no longer operate in a business-as-usual atmosphere. To remain the source of current and exciting information, library administrators must embrace the Internet as a viable information source.

The Internet will allow rural patrons connect to information, places and most importantly, people around the world. Imagine your patrons being able to e-mail children in Bosnia. It is a reality today on the

Internet.

Librarians have traditionally been thought of as information specialists. By providing Internet access within the community, they are once again filling the shoes of the information expert—the one who is in the “know”. Once again it’s almost time for the Summer Reading Program. The official opening at the library will be June 24th. There will be a sign-up sheet at the front desk and children may register on that date or any time after that date.

The children will be classed in three age groups I, Preschool through five years old. 2, Six through eight year old. 3, Nine through age twelve. Parents may read to the preschool through five year old children and these books will be counted as read. Each child must use their personal reading log. They will receive these and a book bag when they are registered.

The book log will be checked periodically and for 10 books read the child’s name will be placed on the bulletin board. Prizes will be awarded at the end of the four week for the most books read in each age group. This will be done at the pizza party on July 23rd. There will be other surprises at the party.

The age nine through twelve age group cannot read easy books this year. They must be chosen from the juvenile or EJ section of the library. Also coupons for free admission to the State Parks, The Children’s Museum in Lexington, Mammoth Cave, The Louisville Zoo and the Kentucky Horse Park will be given. Pam will have different rules and dates for the bookmobile and books read from either place will be counted at the place where the child is registered.

Some new books of interest are 1, WHITE SMOKE by Andrew Greeley. . . Assembled in Rome for the selection of the next pontiff, the Cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church are torn by internal conflict. 3. FLOATERS by Joseph Wam-bach. . . Mike Fortney and his patrol crew in Leeds manage to cruise above the standard police stress-pools of coffee and Pepto Bismol—they are water cops in the “Club Harbor Unit”, manning a patrol boat on San Diego’s

For Public and Community Service Albright participates in conference at Providence

Jessica Albright, of Brodhead, joined nearly 70 high school students from 37 states at Providence College from May 24-26 as the first group of participants in the national Feinsein Conference on Public and Community Service. A junior at Rockcastle County High School, Albright is the first recipient of the Horatio Alger-Louis Feinsein Humanitarian Award from Kentucky.

The conference was hosted by Providence College's Feinsein Institute for Public Service. Named for the institute's benefactor, Alan Shawn Feinsein of Cranston, Rhode Island, the conference is designed to offer these high school students an opportunity to develop ethical leadership skills in a framework of service activities and workshops, and to help them better integrate their community service with their high school curriculums.

Albright attended the conference as the first Kentucky recipient of a Horatio Alger-Louis Feinsein Humanitarian Award, named in honor of Feinsein's late father, a prominent Boston attorney for more than 60 years. The humanitarian awards, consisting of \$5,000 savings bonds, are presented by the Horatio Alger Association to one high school junior in each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia, who has made the most positive difference in the lives of others and best exemplifies the qualities of caring, compassion and brotherhood. Award recipients were selected on the basis of a submitted essay.

In addition to being named the recipient of a Horatio Alger-Louis Feinsein Humanitarian Award, Albright received the Kiwanis Presidential Public Service Award for Youth from the Rockcastle County Chapter and the Lady Rockets Personal Achievement Award for her

volunteer service. Albright volunteers as a coach and at a respiratory care unit.

She is also involved in extracurricular activities at Rockcastle County High School, where she is a peer counselor and was named an Academic All-State basketball player for 1995-96.

"When the conference was over, we believe we had further increased the capacity of young people to positively impact their communities," said Richard Battistoni, director of the Feinsein Institute for Public Service. "We wanted to help them to go back to their schools and work toward developing stronger ties between community service and academic learning at their schools, so that students, their teachers, and the communities of which they are a part can better reach their goals of serving others."

The Feinsein Institute for Public Service at Providence College was established in 1993 through a \$5 million grant from Rhode Island philanthropist Alan Shawn Feinsein to educate a new generation of community leaders. Providence College offers the only major and minor of its kind in the nation in public and community service studies and works to integrate and support service learning courses throughout the college curriculum.

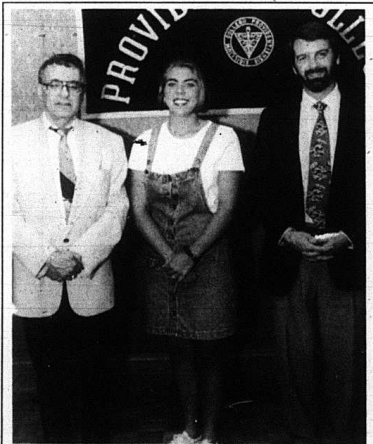
