The method for freezing zucchini depends upon its future use. If your recipes call for shredded zucchini, the zucchini can be shredded and frozen raw and frozen raw using with the juices. To use in recipes,

it can be thawed and drained. Due it can be thawed and drained. Due to freezing, it will no longer be crunchy. For many casseroles gucchin slices are needed. Sliced zucchini freezes best when cut into 1/2-inch slices and heated in boiling water for 3 minutes. It should then be promptly cooled in cold water and drained before packing into containers.

Use fresh zucchini or frozen zucchini in this recipe:

ZUCCHINI NUT BREAD

cups flour

3 cups flour

1 tsp. baking soda
1 cup cooking oil
1 tsp. salt
1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
2 cups grated zucchini

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

Legislative **Update**

Rep. Danny Ford Reports from

Economic and scientific research
is underway to expand the uses of
tobacco and to develop commercial
opportunities so Kentucky's leading
cash crop can compete in today's
market.

This week in Frankfort, Dr. Maelor Davies, director of the Tobacco and Health Research Institute (THRI) at the University of Kentucky, spoke to members of the General Assembly Tobacco Task Force about alternative uses for tobacco. The Institute receives \$3.1 million in funds from a portion of the state cizarette tax

portion of the state cigarette tax.

We know tobacco is big business
in our state. Tobacco sales for 1994
generated more than \$840 million.
We led the nation in burley production (420 million pounds in 1994)
and ranked second to North Carolina
in total tobacco production. (fig. other in total tobacco production. (In other crop production, such as corn, winter wheat and hay, our state was in the top 20 nationwide in 1994, last year top 20 nationwide in 1994, last year for which we have statistics.) However, with continued efforts

by tobacco opponents to restrict the sale and use of tobacco, I believe it is very important that we look at the different uses for tobacco, not neces-

article uses for boacco, not necessary different crops.

According to Dr. Davies, THRI has \$1 million in grant money for a year study of the use of tobacco in association with antioxidants, lung physiology, nicotine, carcinogens, disease resistance, and cancer, in relation to chewing tobacco.

The Institute is also exploring the possibilities of alternative uses by expanding its program in biotechnology for products that will be cash profitable for tobacco farmers. As of February 1995, there were 30 Substances for commercial purposes, such as vaccines, food ingredients, sweeteners, cosmetics and enzymes used in laundry detergents. THR has filled two platents on undisclosed products which according to Dr.

Davies, should generate additional

Davies, should generate additional interest in the Institute's program. The Tobacco Task Force will-continue to meet periodically on tobacco concerns in Kentucky, Members may also take several field trips, such as a tour of the THRI facility, attendance of opening day of burley sales, and possibly a visit to a tobacco processing facility.

As we meet on flegislative matters during the interim, it is important that I know your views and opinions re-

General Provisions for Kentucky and Out-Of-State Livestock

All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a health certificate. A health certificate means a legible record covering the requirements of the state of destination accomplished on an equivalent from the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services, United States Department of Agriculture, that is prepared and issued by a licensed accredited veterinarian.

Health Certificates for Kentucky livestock shall be void 150

Health Certificates for Out-of-State livestock shall be void 30

If animals are from tuberculosis accredited or brucellosis certified herds, the accompanying health certified shall show the accreditation and certification number with the date of the last herd test for tuberculosis and brucellosis.

SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS FOR KENTUCKY CATTLE

All cattle for exhibition shall be identified individually on a health

<u>Brucellosis</u> - Animals 12 months of age or over shall have been negative to an offical card test for brucellosis conducted in a state federal laboratory within 150 days of the date of exhibition, unless exempt by one of the following:

Originate directly from a certified herd Have been officially vaccinated under 20 months of age for the dairy breeds.

<u>Tuberculosis</u> - Native Kentucky cattle are not required to have been negative to a tuberbuiln test to enter shows in Kentucky.

Other Disease Requirements - Cattle infected with warts or ringworm are not eligible for entry.

Hunter education mandatory

If you were born on or after January 1, 1975 and wish to hunt in Kentucky, you must carry a valid hunter education course completion card. This means that you must attend and complete one of hundreds of courses offered across the state each year. Hunter education courses are free

offered across the state each year. Hunter education courses are free and available in most counties. The Signal will list dates and time of classes in the near future.

Mandatory hunter education began in Kentucky in March 1991. The course, geared toward safety and ethics in hunting, takes 10 hours to complete and is spread over three days. The first two sessions consisted classroom instruction, discussion and film watching with some short breaks between. The third and final segment is conducted at a firing range where participants learn the proper procedure for loading and firing a number of hunting arms.

Following the live-fire segment, participants must pass a written ex-

amination to confirm what they have learned during the course. The test is scored at the range. In the following weeks, participants who successfully complete the course will receive an

complete the course will receive air orange hunter education patch and card in the mail. Your hunter education card is valid for life and is accepted anywhere in North America. The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildliff Resources' (KDFWR) modern Hunter Education Program degan in May, 1977. This is when the first Hunter Training Officers (HTOs) held Kentucky's first volunteer certification class. Today there are over 700 trained men and women who volunteer to teach hunter education courses. These teachers donate many hours and sometimes their own equiphours and sometimes their own equiphours and sometimes their own equip. hours and sometimes their own equip-ment to improve hunting by making participants aware of proper hunting procedures. Their time translates into federal government matching funds. Like the excise taxes that hunters and shooter pay on their equipment, these

funds pay for conservation and wild-life management

Since its beginning, hunter educa-tion has not only reached young hunters. Most students in the hunter education courses are adults. Some are chaperoning future hunters while others are simply interested in improving their range of hunting skills. ORDINANCE NO. 010

ORDINANCE NO. 011:

(Elimination of a tax; replacement with franchise).

Summary
The Fiscal Court <u>repealed</u> a tax that had been placed on Local Bank Shares for many years under KRS
136.270. Acting under authority granted by Houe Bill 416, the County's Fiscal Court <u>eliminated</u> a tax and replaced it with a franchise fee upon institutions, as provided within Chapter 136. All counties affected

ORDINANCE NO. 012:

ORDINANCE NO. 0.12:

(The Fiscal Court felt it in the best interests of the county's taxpayers to stop the escalating/spiraling costs charged to the county for maintaining and housing juvenile criminal offenders by enacting this "Parental Responsibility Ordinance," which is the first in the state. It is designed to protect homeowners/ landowners from possible harm by juvenile criminal offenders, to protect innocent juveniles from petralls harm at night, and to require the parents of juvenile criminal offenders to reimburse and otherwise pay for all costs incurred by the Courtry of Rockcastle for housing and maintaining said juveniles at a cost of up to \$100 per day plus all transportation and other charges that have otherwise been charged to the county. The FiscalCourt in recent memory paid as little as \$500 per prevar to house juveniles; those same related charges are now running as high as \$5,000 per month. The Fiscal Court took this action in an effort to protect local taxpayers from paying those charges).

Summary
The Fiscal Court declared it necessary, in order to preserve the peace, health, safety and welfare of all citizens-both juveniles and adults- and to attempt to protect the public's reasury against large created by the incarceration of unprecedented numbers of juvenile criminal offenders appe. Rockcastle Juvenile Court, to enact said ordinance. Included, but not limited to, are the following: I nuclea age twelve (12) permitted or allowed to be upon public streets between the hours of 10:00 p.m. under age twelve (12) permitted or allowed to be upon public streets between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. without parent, legal guardian, or adult selected by parent or legal guardian to supervise child's behavior. No child under age of sixteen (16) years permitted to be upon public streets or in any public place between the hours of 12 a.m. (midnlight) and 6 a.m. without adult supervision or upon an errand or other legitimate business directed by his parent or guardian and has proof of such permission. Parents are to arrange for proper supervision for minors when the parent is absent to require minors to attend regular school sessions; to keep illegal drugs out of the home; to take necessary precautions to represent the minor formaliciously or willfully destroying real, personal or mixed property belonging to the Courty of Rockcastie; or is located in the Courty of Rockcastie; to forbid the minor form Meeping stolen property, etc., and to seek help from appropriate governmental authorities or private agencies in handling or controlling the minor, when necessary as according to law; to be responsible for all incarceration ossts should minor be incarcerated by Juyenile Court related to any of said ordinance;
Parents to be held civility responsible for damages caused by delinquent acts; calls for fines of \$75.00 to \$500.00 and imprisorment for up to thirty (30) days for failure to exercise reasonable parental

responsibilities/control.
