INSPECTION PERIOD

FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from June 11 through June 25 under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may 25 under the super inspect the tax roll

This is the January 1, 1997 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1997 will be due about September 15, 1997.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:00 a.m. nd 4:00 p.m

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior request a conference with the PVA to or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash stating the reasons for value of the property

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection particular usion of the inspection period

Any taxpayer falling to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110 ns of KBS 132 450(4)

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator. (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his

property. (2) He must file a v written protest directly with the Departmentt of Property Taxation within 30

(2) He must he a written protest orrectly with the Department days from the date of the notice of assessment.
 (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.

(4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax

FSA-Ag Credit provides loans for Socially Disadvantaged persons

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) can make and guarantee loans to so-cially disadvantaged applicantstoby and operate family-size farms and ranches. Funds specifically for these loans are reserved each year. A socially disadvantaged farmer and rancher is one of a group whose members have been subjected to ra-tiol, ethnic or endreg menuface been subjected to ra-

cial, ethnic, or gender prejudice be-cause of their identity as member of the group without regard to their in-dividual qualities. For purpose of this program, socially disadvantaged groups are women, African Ameri-cans, American Indians and Alaskan Natives, Hispanics and Asian and Pacific Islanders.

Direct loans are made to appli-cants by FSA and include both farm operating and farm ownership loans. Guaranteed loans also may be

made for ownership or operating pur-poses, and may be made by any lend-ing institutions subject to Federal or State supervision (banks, savings and loans, insurance companies and units of Farm Credit System including Bank of Cooperatives) and guaran-teed by FSA. Typically, FSA guarantees 90 or 95 percent of a loan against any loss that might be incurred if the loan fails

Farm ownership loan funds may be used to purchase or enlarge a farm

Producers are urged to call FSA at 256-2525 as soon as crops are planted to schedule a time at their convenience as soon as all crops are planted. Burley tobacco producers are advised to file a cropreport, since this will serve as a record of farm production for disaster leasing and medicition bistory.



Reducing Fat & Cholestoral

Dietary fat is either saturated or unsaturated. Saturated fats are found in animal products and whole milk dairy products and are solid at room temperature. Some vegetable products such as coconut oil, palm oil, occoa butter found in chocolate and vegetable oils that have been hardened by hydrogenation are mostly saturated fats. Saturated fats are a dietary risk factor in developing heart disease and raise blood cholesterol. Unsaturated fats include monounsaturated and polyblood cholesterol. Unasurated fais include monounsturated and poly-unsaturated fais. They are found in most vegetable oils and are liquid at room temperature. Oils high in polyunsaturated fais are safflower, sunflower, corn, soybean and octonesed. Monounsaturated fais are predominant in olive, canola and peanut oil. Blood or serum cholesterol is a produced by the liver or obtained

by eating certain foods. Dietary cholesterol is found in foods of animal origin, especially meats, egg yolk and whole-milk dairy

yolk and whole many products. Tips for Reducing Fat & Cholesterol: • Choose lean cuts of meat, fish and poultry. Trim all visible fat, including the skin of poultry. Serve smaller portions (3-4
