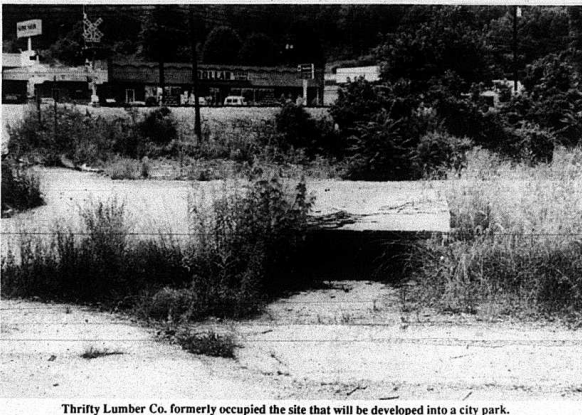
## Mt. Vernon, pays \$95,000 for city park site

On Tuesday the Agricultural Fair will begin at 10 a.m., with exhibits being entered until 1 p.m. The judging starts at 2 p.m.

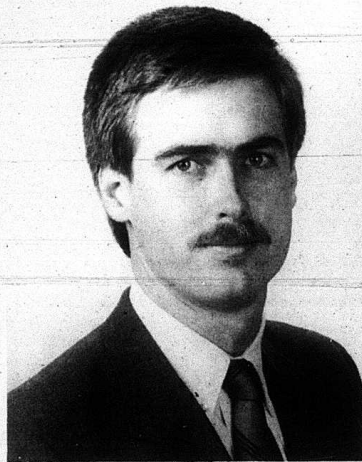

**Roads named for blacktopping**

Just in time for the summer months, Gov. Patton recently approved the first round of road construction and improvement projects for Kentucky's rural and secondary road program, including work in Rockcastle County.

The following projects are planned:

**Blacktop Resurfacing:**  
-2.8 miles of KY 328, Bee Lick-Quail Road  
-1.8 miles of KY 1249, Mt. Vernon-Sand Springs Road

-1.7 miles of County Road 1365, Brodhead-Chestnut Road  
-2.3 miles of County Road 1258, Popular Grove Road

The projects are estimated to cost a total of \$577,313 and will be financed by the Rural Secondary Road Program which receives its funding from the gasoline tax. These funds are distributed to each Kentucky county based on the county's land size, population and amount of rural and secondary roads. Patton believes this program plays a vital part in the efficiency of Kentucky's transportation system. "Our smaller state and county roadways are critical to Kentucky's overall transportation network. These are the routes we depend on every day." The projects

will be completed by contract and are scheduled for a July 25 bid letting. The Transportation Cabinet estimates

a total of \$37 million worth of projects will be authorized under this program by the end of this year.

### JUST WHEN YOU THOUGHT IT WAS SAFE TO COME OUT

Just when Kentucky tobacco farmers thought it was safe to come out, a new set of recommendations has just been released which is a greater threat to farmers' livelihood than the recent agreement reached between the tobacco companies and 39 state Attorneys General.

In fact, the Advisory Committee on Tobacco Policy's recommendations are a back door to prohibition. That Commission, headed up by former FDA Administrator Dr. Kessler and former Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, was formed at the request of Members of Congress who believe the recently announced settlement between the tobacco industry and Attorneys General didn't go far enough in regulating tobacco.

But their report is from the bygone days of big government. Rather than reflecting mainstream America's desire to eliminate youth smoking and protect adult choice, the report indicates no interest whatsoever in seeking a compromise on the problem of youth smoking. It's clearly been written by those who refuse to settle for anything short of a ban on all smoking in public.

You can't get much closer to an all-out prohibition than these proposals. And that's bad news both for Kentucky farmers and for adults who choose to use a legal product.

I've always contended that the FDA is far less interested in reducing youth smoking than in prohibiting adult smoking, and this report puts a spotlight on those ulterior motives. Of particular concern to growers and smokers alike is the report's call for banning smoking in all work sites and in all places of public assembly, including "all outdoor areas where people assemble." This would effectively prohibit smoking anywhere except private homes, although someone's own backyard could be considered off-limits under the proposal.

Other provisions include banning, not just advertising, but sales of tobacco products around schools, playgrounds, health care facilities, and other "areas where children congregate." This means that a bar or other adult-only facility located in such an area would be banned from selling tobacco products, even if it required a photo ID to prove patrons were adults. And the report goes as far as declaring a "zero-tolerance" smoking policy for adults who work with children, even when they're not at work.

Where does this leave tobacco farmers? Not in the fields. The only specific proposal relating to tobacco farmers was a recommendation to eliminate the tobacco program altogether. Once again, Kentucky's tobacco farmers continue to be an afterthought. They're being told "tough luck" by Big Brother types in Washington, and as far as I'm concerned that's not acceptable.

While many Kentuckians would agree with the provisions targeted at youth smoking, the report reflects an extreme approach to adult smoking. Anyone serious about reducing youth smoking will recognize the adult smoking provisions not only as unreasonable, but as the equivalent of a bullet that will shoot down any tobacco settlement even before most Members have had a chance to finish the review process.

And then how many children will these zealots have saved?

**Summer Squash:**  
An Abundance of Opportunity

Most first-time gardeners have an amusing story to tell about how many zucchini they harvested after planting the entire package of zucchini seeds. Easy to grow, a healthy zucchini plant can produce approximately 8 pounds in a season. Two or three plants should yield enough to feed a family of four and provide some to give away as well.

Summer squash are easy to prepare and possess a mild flavor that makes them excellent additions to everything from grilled kabobs to frozen yogurt. Since they are abundant all season, be creative in your uses. Basil, allspice, rosemary and marjoram combine well to enhance their flavor.

Summer squash include a number of different warm-weather vegetables which include the most popular - zucchini, yellow crooknecks and straightnecks, and the less-known patty pan, a pale-green squash with a scalloped edge.

Summer squash should be refrigerated after harvest and should be eaten within a few days of harvest for optimum quality and nutrition. Summer squash is a good source of vitamin A, phosphorus, calcium, potassium and niacin. A 1/2 cup serving contains 45-65 calories, depending on the preparation method used.

For a little variety, try the following recipe:

**Chocolate Squash Cake**  
Yield: 10 Servings

- 6 large eggs, separated
- 1/2 tsp cream of tartar
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup unsalted butter, softened
- 4 squares of bars of semi-sweet chocolate, melted & cooled

- 1 cup ground roasted almonds
- 3/4 cup packaged unseasoned bread crumbs
- 2 cups yellow squash, coarsely shredded

Beat egg whites and cream of tartar in a large bowl until soft peaks form. Gradually beat in 1/2 cup sugar until stiff peaks form. Set aside. In medium-size bowl, beat butter, remaining 1/4 cup sugar and the melted chocolate until creamy, scraping side of bowl down occasionally. Add yolks, one at a time, and continue beating. Reduce mixer speed to low and beat in almonds and bread crumbs until well mixed. Fold yellow squash into almond mixture. Fold in beaten egg whites. Spread batter into a 9-inch springform pan that has been greased & floured. Bake at 325 degrees F. for 50-55 minutes or until cake is done. Cool on wire rack for 10 minutes. Remove from pan and cool completely. Cake will sink upon cooling. Ice with Chocolate Glaze.

**CHOCOLATE GLAZE**

In double boiler over hot water, melt 1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips with 2 TBSP vegetable shortening. Remove from heat. Beat in 2 TBSP corn syrup and 1 TBSP milk until smooth. When cake has cooled completely, pour warm glaze onto center of cake. With spatula, spread side of cake with almond layer of glaze to seal any crumbs. Then evenly spread remaining glaze to cover cake. Refrigerate cake until glaze sets.

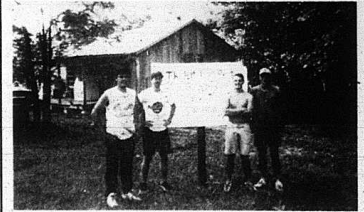

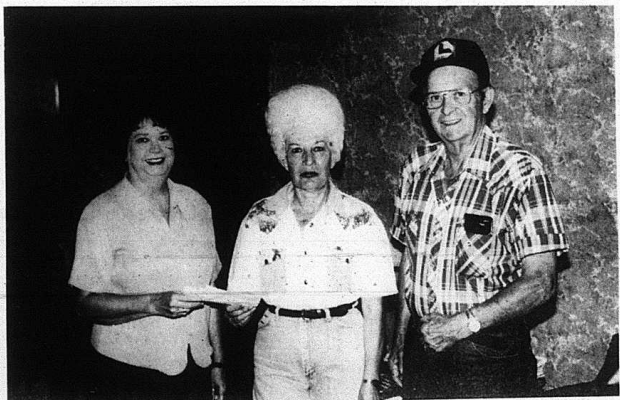

# Shelter opens as tribute to grassroots effort

Local supporters and staff of Kentucky Baptist Home for Children will gather July 28 for the dedication of a new shelter designed to care for abused and neglected young people.

An open-house at the new Southern Regional Shelter will be held from 3:30-6:30 p.m. with a dedication program at 4:30 p.m. The shelter is located 10 miles east of Somerset in Boston, off Forest Ridge Road. The shelter provides short-term care for young victims of abuse, neglect or family crisis. The new 16-bed shelter replaces an aging structure on White Street.

The new shelter is the first building completed with funds from an ongoing 25-county capital campaign for KBHC program. Volunteers, led by Somerset businessman, Oscar Hornsby, have met their initial goal of \$1.8 million and are now working towards a \$2.65 million challenge goal. \$2.3 million has been raised to date.

"I knew the support was here," said KBHC's Southern Region administrator in the region and to fund a London-based after-school reporting center to provide additional care and support for children in need.

Kentucky counties involved in the campaign are Adair, Bell, Boyle, Casey, Clay, Clinton, Cumberland, Garrard, Green, Harlan, Jackson, Laurel, Leslie, Lincoln, Knox, Madison, Marion, McCreary, Metcalfe, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Russell, Taylor, Wayne and Whitley.

Expansion of Kentucky Baptist's ministry into the region began in 1994 when Operation Hope, a children's shelter located on White Street, was scheduled for closure due to financial crisis. KBHC's board of directors approved the emergency acquisition in order to keep the facility operating. Even as it accepted the existing facility, the agency realized the building would need to be replaced to provide a better environment for residents.

Acquiring the shelter was only part of KBHC's response to social service needs in the area, however.

Cornerstone Counseling, KBHC's Christian counseling ministry that now has 18 offices around the state, had opened an office in London in

1994. That office now serves as the hub for offices in Berea, Corbin, Harlan, Pineville, Somerset and Stanford.

KBHC's Family Foster Care program that began in 1995 with one worker based in Somerset. Now there are three in the region, including worker based in London. Foster care specialists recruit, train and provide ongoing support to families who welcome children into their homes.

Later KBHC began a partnership project with the state of Kentucky to offer family preservation and reunification services in the region. The Family Preservation Program provides intensive short-term intervention to help families on the brink of having children removed from the home. The Family Reunification Demonstration Project helps families receive children back into the home after a placement in a foster home or residential facility and provides follow-up after care for the child and family.

In 1996, KBHC opened the Wilderness Camping Treatment Program in Somerset, to serve boys who have suffered from abuse, neglect or some other family crisis. The youth in the program learn team work and build self-esteem through frequent camping trips and other outdoor challenges.

KBHC provides care for children who have been abused, neglected or whose families are in crisis. The agency assists more than 3,200 children and adults across Kentucky each year.

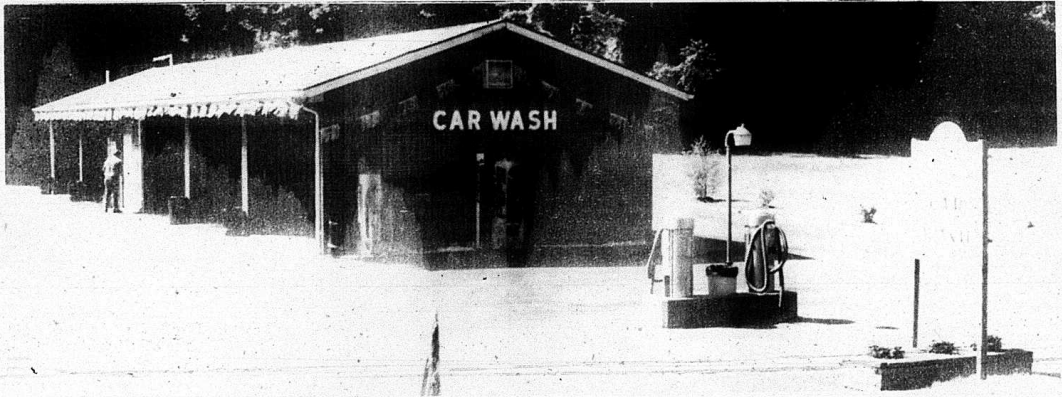
In addition to the program in its Southern Region, KBHC residential programs include Spring Meadows Children's Home in Louisville, Glen Dale Children's Home in Glendale, the Baptist Youth Ranch in Elizabethtown, the Dixon Temporary Shelter in Dixon, the Baptist

Youth Shelter in Morehead, and the Genesis Home in Mayfield.

In addition to its Southern Region offices, Cornerstone Counseling serves Ashland, Bowling Green, Erlanger, Frankfort, Harold, Hazard, Henderson, Hopkinsville, Madisonville, New Castle and Owensboro.

blockers. The subject had also been discussed at length earlier this year, but the board delayed a decision until Tuesday so they could research the topic of blockers and filters in more depth.

The subject was brought to light earlier this year when newly-elected board member Terina Boling indicated that she thought the board of education was delaying action on the matter, a matter she and her husband Jeff have been very outspoken about.

Mrs. Boling and her family are also members of the Bible Baptist Church.

Mrs. Boling and others from Bible Baptist told the board that county students were accessing pornographic material on the Internet. They said that children had given "testimony" to that fact and Mrs. Boling said, "they are even printing pictures."

But Superintendent Larry Hammond said that anyone, especially a concerned parent, such as those in attendance, should notify school officials if they knew such things were actually happening.

"Anyone not doing so is doing their child, themselves, the school and the entire county an injustice," Hammond said.

Hammond also said he certainly would look into any legitimate complaint, but parents and/or concerned citizens should come up with factual documentation and not just accusations.

School Board Chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith agreed with Hammond saying that such claims, "should really be taken with a grain of salt."

Griffith and Pensol said that from research they had done there was not a filtering system available that will block out all unwanted materials and that parents, students and teachers were responsible for keeping the obscene materials from being accessed.

Mrs. Pensol told the board and those in attendance that she did not think the Internet and pornographic material was problem at this point.

She said she knew of only one other school system (Bourbon County) that used a filtering system and that during a meeting Monday none of her colleagues in the technology field nor the state department of education recommended using a filtering system.

She said she did not think it would be practical for such a system, because all obscene material will not be blocked and, in many cases, some material that students and teachers actually need will be blocked.

Mrs. Pensol also said she thought the best way to keep students from accessing obscene material was through the use of the Acceptable Use Policy, whereby students and parents sign a form in which they agree to use the Internet appropriately. Mrs. Pensol also said that school supervision was a key and suggested possibly more training for personnel. "If a student is caught using the Internet improperly they will be banned from the computers," Mrs. Pensol said.

Board member Terry Burton said he did not want any student exposed to obscene material, but he too thought the key was supervision. He also suggested that the board review their actions and the filtering system at the end of next school year, which the board agreed to do.

Board member Dwight Griffin recommended that Mrs. Pensol be in charge of obtaining the filtering system she thought would best serve the county saying, "that is your field of expertise." The board agreed with Griffin.

Mrs. Boling also said that she would like for all school personnel to be made aware of the board's action. "We have recognized this possible problem and teachers should be aware

of that and continue to do their jobs and maybe even do the supervision better," Mrs. Boling said.

After the meeting Mrs. Pensol said she would have a filtering system in place as soon as possible and would probably use one of the commercial filters that are available.

he believed to be Valium and in the trunk of the car he found two pounds of marijuana.

from the public to help defray the purchase costs and, hopefully, enough donations will be made to help with the development of the area.

To keep citizens abreast of the status of the donations, Cromer said a memorandum will be erected in the existing city park to record the donations. 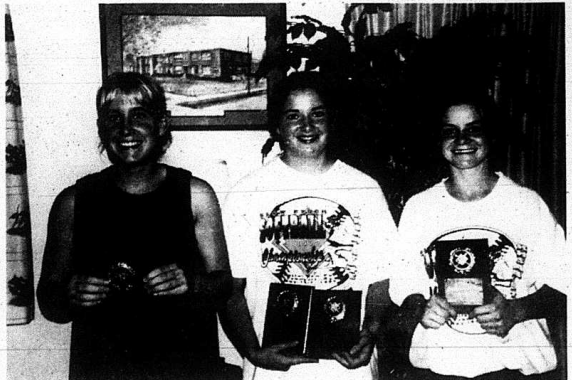
**Hunter Education course to be rebroadcast**

Modern gun deer hunters have more options in central Kentucky on the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR) 1997 managed deer hunt application. Applications, available by calling the KDFWR at (502)564-4336, will be accepted until August 31, 1997.

Six new hunts will take place on Curtis Gates Lloyd Wildlife Management Area (WMA) in Grant County, Mullins WMA in Kenton County, Lapland WMA in Meade and Breckinridge counties, Kentucky River WMA in Henry County, Mud Camp Creek in Cumberland County

and R.F. Tartar in Adair and Russell counties. This adds up to 362 new quota hunt slots under zone 3 and 4 regulations.

These are names will sound familiar to some modern gun hunters. Until this year, they were open under state-wide regulations with some special restrictions — they were not open to hunting on the weekends.

"This really cut down on the opportunities for many hunters, who must apply in advance to hunt on these areas during the 1997 modern gun deer season. 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## Rockcastle Hospital announces advancements in medical technology

Patients at Rockcastle Hospital can now take advantage of two additional advances in medical technology without having to travel far from home.

The hospital recently purchased a new CT scanner and computerized medicine carts, both of which will help increase patient comfort and care.

"This puts us right on par with the top hospitals in the area," said Lee Keene, Rockcastle Hospital administrator. "Now patients will be able to have advanced tests done here, instead of making special trips to Louisville, Lexington or Knoxville."

The CT scanner has "spiral" capabilities, which means it allows fast, non-stop scanning. Most other scanners use the slower "stop and start" method, said Jesse Pennington, Rockcastle's CT technologist.

"Patients have already noticed a difference," he said. "Patients spend less time on the table, so there's less discomfort. Scans that used to take 15 or 20 minutes are done now in under five minutes."

But the new scanner doesn't sacrifice quality for quickness. The machine has the ability to scan in 1 mm increments or "slices," instead of the

typical 10mm scans at many hospitals.

"With the spiral capabilities, we can actually go back in and look between the slices if something looks suspicious," Pennington said. "That will give us a 30 percent increase in finding pathology and help make clearer diagnoses."

Patients also have noticed two other benefits. The table lowers closer to the floor for easier patient access and there is a larger opening in the gantry. "Some people are a little claustrophobic," Pennington said. "The larger opening helps reduce patient anxiety."

CT scanning - a safe and painless procedure - is one of the most important medical tools because of its accuracy, Pennington said. "I really

think we now offer as good a CT scan as any hospital in the nation."

The computerized machine cart also provides many advantages. "The new carts not only record all dispensing that takes place, but also decreases the room for human error," said Stella Young, director of pharmacy services and coordinator of the

new medserv system.

"The pharmacy can now monitor the inventory instantly, allowing for increased control and significant time savings. This allows the staff - both pharmacy and nursing - more time to spend on patient monitoring and care."

The carts are organized through an on-line central computer system located in the pharmacy, allowing for stringent inventory control. Each cart has its own on-board computer as well, which screens for correct dosage administration and drug interactions.

Through the use of a touch-screen display and keyboard on the cart, the

nurse simply enters the patient's name and drug to be dispensed. The cart then pops open the drawer that has that medication.

All drugs are separated into individual drawers and each drawer also is divided into bins, which allows for increased accuracy in medication administration.

This new system is more efficient for nurses and pharmacy staff. It allows for closer monitoring of medication administration, which will help identify potential problems sooner.

"It's a win-win situation for everyone," Young said.

Some of Marty Stuart's early hit albums are "Marty" and "Templed." His great-grandmother was a Cherokee, his grandfather was a down fiddler, his dad a gospel singer; his mother a piano player and he grew up a rocker. All of this went in the distinctive Cyrus style.

Life became a whirlwind of touring activity in the years that followed. "Could've Been Me," "She's Not Cryin' Anymore," "In The Heart of a Woman," "Somebody New," and "Words By Heart," all soared into the country to 10. He garnered awards from the American Music Awards, the Country Music Association and the Juno Awards, to name a few. Additionally, he's received numerous humanitarian awards, and was inducted into the VFW Hall of Fame. More important, Billy Ray Cyrus won the hearts of fans everywhere. A tireless charity worker, children's crusader and true "good guy," Cyrus' giving spirit and open-soul honesty affected virtually everyone who met him during his meteoric climb to stardom.

The public honored him with three nominations, including Entertainer of the Year, at the 1996 TNN/Music City News Awards. When the Olympic torch passed through middle Tennessee a month later, enroute to At-

lanta, Cyrus was chosen as one of its carriers.

When John came, he looked at me suspiciously. I asked him what the problems were in his marriage, and he replied, "Vivian thinks it's my drinking, but I don't think so. The big problem is that we don't know how to talk to each other."

I asked John to tell me more about their communication problem. "We can talk to each other," he explained. "We always end up fighting."

"And how much do you drink?" I asked. "I guess I drink a little too much sometimes," he admitted, "but that helps me relax after a hard day."

"Would you be willing to quit drinking if it would help save your marriage?" I asked him.

"But my drinking is not the only

problem," he argued. "Vivian has problems, too."

"That is true," I agreed, "but you will have to quit drinking before the other problems can be solved. A marriage requires two sober people to make it work." John had nothing to say.

As a counselor I see this type of situation fairly often. One partner is trying to change the other and having little success. "I'm not trying to change him," Vivian protested. "I just want him to quit drinking."

"Vivian," I replied, "trying to get him to quit drinking means that you are trying to change him. The odds are that he is not going to change, and I can tell you for certain that you can't change him."

"How can you tell for sure?" Vivian questioned me. "All things are possible, aren't they?"

"All things are possible," I agreed; "but some things are not likely. You are building your whole life around the belief that John will change. What if he doesn't?"

Vivian wanted more of an explanation. "John doesn't want to change," I explained. "The only reason he came to counseling was to try to get you off his back."

"But can't you talk to him and make him see what he is doing to himself?" she begged.

"I can't make him see anything," I replied. "I made another appoint-

ment for him. If he wants to quit, he will accept that one. But that as up to him. NEITHER YOU NOR I CAN CHANGE HIM." But sometimes he quits drinking for two or three weeks," she added.

### "It is Written"

Today we would like to study for a few moments the conversion of the Ethiopian eunuch in Acts 8:26-39.

First, we would like to notice that the angel of the Lord spoke unto Philip, and also the Spirit spoke unto Philip, in verses 26 & 29. "And the angel of the Lord spoke unto Philip... Then the Spirit said unto Philip..." It would appear unto me, that if it was the Holy Spirit who was supposed to be involved in the direct operation in the hearts of sinners apart from the word of God, then why did he speak unto Philip and not the eunuch? The truth is that God has ordained that the gospel is to be preached by human instrumentality, 1 Cor. 1:21. "For after that in the wisdom of God the world by wisdom knew not God, it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe."

Now notice that the eunuch was studying from Isaiah 53, and had a question about the passage for Philip to answer, vs. 30-34. Philip begins at this same passage of scripture, and preaches unto him Jesus, verse 35. Let's notice what vs. 38-39 says: "And as they went on their way, they came unto a certain water, and the eunuch said, 'See, here is water: what dost thou bid me to be baptized?' And Philip said, 'If thou believest with all thine heart, thou mayest. And he answered and said, I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. And he commanded the chariot to stand still; and they went down both into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him." How in the world did the eunuch know anything about baptism? Well the Bible says that Philip preached unto him Jesus, verse 35. So we must conclude that when we preach Jesus we will also be preaching about baptism. Folks who do not preach what the Bible says about baptism, are failing to preach Jesus, as Philip did. We also see that the eunuch made the good confession in verse 37, (Romans 10:9-10). Now take note that the eunuch was baptized that very day Philip had the opportunity to preach Jesus unto him. He did not wait days or weeks to be baptized as do human denominations practice today. After the eunuch believed and obeyed the gospel, noticed the attitude he had, in verse 38, "And when they were come up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord caught away Philip, that the eunuch saw him no more; and he went on his way rejoicing." Have you done as the eunuch did?

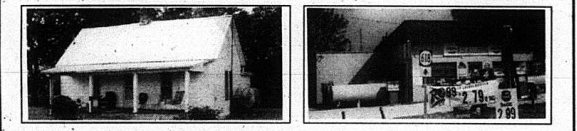

# Agricultural News

By Warden Alexander, Director

The final date to report crop acreage for tobacco and all other crops except small grains was July 15. If a crop WAS NOT PLANTED by the final reporting date of July 15, the acreage must be reported by 15 calendar days after the planting is completed to be considered timely filed. If a crop report is filed after the final reporting date because the crop was planted late, a statement will be added to the report saying when the crop was planted, and initiated by the producer. Late-filing fees will not apply if the crop is reported within 15 days after planting. Late-filed reports may be taken on tobacco even if planting was completed prior to the deadline, with no late fee charge.

Nominating petitions for the FSA Committee election are being accepted now through October 27. FSA is looking for small operators, truck farmers, people who grow specialty crops, women — anyone who has not had an active voice with the County Committee in the past. For the County Committee system to work as it should, all of local agriculture needs to be represented and farmers need a voice. If you need further information, contact your County Committee or now you can help, contact your local Farm Service Agency office, located on Highway 150, 3 miles west of Mt. Vernon or phone us at 256-2525.

The Non-Insured Assistance Program (NAP) provides protection against widespread loss caused by a natural disaster to designated areas for which crop insurance is not available. To qualify for this program an

area must have at least 5 producers of crops on separate and distinct farms that were affected by the same natural disaster with total production loss of at least 35%. Producers must have a crop report on file prior to the July 15 deadline to be eligible for benefits. Late-filed reports may be filed, but will require a filing fee. Some of the non-insurable crops in Rockcastle County include hay, pasture, soybeans, pepper, sweet corn, green beans, any fruit or vegetable grown commercially for food.

A new program, Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP), was established to assist crop and livestock producers to deal with environmental and conservation improvements on the farm. Sign-up for this program began June 3, and will extend until July 30. The objective of the assistance to be provided is the ensure the maximum level of environmental benefits possible.

Rockcastle County has not been allotted any funds for this program at this time.

Producers who received cards concerning the AMTA (corn) program should come in and revise undesignated shares prior to August 1. Undesignated shares mean that payments have not been allotted to anyone. Shares should be designated so that final payments can be issued in September.

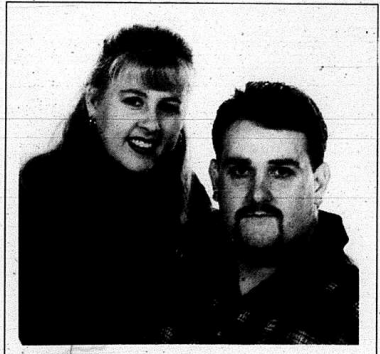

Holbrook and the granddaughter of Walter and Laura Shepherd of Mt. Vernon. She is a member of First Baptist Church of Mt. Vernon.



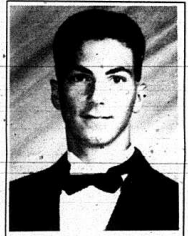
### Shepherd selected as Summer Missionary

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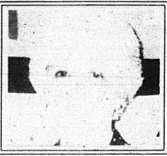
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# Library News

Another summer month is almost gone and school will soon be ready to start a new year. This summer has really flown by but when you are busy time does seem to go faster. July is always a very busy time for me

at the library. A thirty page annual report for the fiscal year 96-97 has to be finished by July 31. I have this prepared but have to wait for some of the county officials to sign it before sending it to our regional office.

In preparing this, I have found some interesting facts and I would like to share them with you. There have been approximately 34,300 people come into the library in this fiscal year. This is an increase of about 12,000 people from last fiscal year. The total number of books in our library are 31,494.

Also, in the annual report we are asked to describe the current status, including strengths, weaknesses and problems of our total library program. Here is my response to this... "This fiscal year 1996-97) has been an exciting time for everyone at the Rockcastle County Library. There had been a big improvement in the library last year due to the expansion and renovation, but this year has proved to be even more eventful than the previous one. Last September, I presented a program on the expansion and current needs of the library, to the Kiwanis Club. Several of the business people discussed the possibility of making some donations to help the library move forward in the field of technology. This became a reality with donations from the two banks in the county, the County Bar Association and one large anonymous donation.

In November, two computers and two color printers were purchased and the local computer dealer donated one computer and a color scanner to the library.

The computers have proved to be one of the most valuable resources of the library. This has brought more new people into the library and after seeing the other things that are available for the public, they have taken advantage of them.

This library is blessed by having

one of the best Board of Trustees in the history of the Rockcastle County Library. They have made decisions to help in the growth of the library and have readily assisted the staff in carrying out their ideas for promoting the many new services now available to the patrons.

The Kentucky Library Trustees Association gave the Rockcastle County Board of Trustees the Kentucky Library Board Award for 1997. This was a well deserved award and was greatly appreciated by the board members.

The first five year Long Range Plan will meet soon to finalize a new plan to help the library meet the needs of this county in the 21st century.

The next big step for the Rockcastle County Library is to become automated but due to the lack of funds this cannot happen for several years without a grant or a great increase in state-aid. A small fund has been started for this purpose from another donation from a factory in Nicholasville.

Also, plans have to be made to promote the bookmobile service. This has been of great benefit to the people in remote areas of the county and shut-ins. But the bookmobile is over fifteen years old and cannot continue to run much longer because of several problems that occur with an old vehicle. It is hoped that a used one may become available to replace the old one. Due to lack of funds, it would be impossible to furnish a new one since the cost is more than \$10,000.

As always, the lack of money to

continue with and add to the services already available is our biggest problem. But we are hoping to continue to make more improvement to keep this library comparable with many larger libraries."

I hope this hasn't bored anyone, but I thought it would be interesting for everyone to know more about the library.

We have received many new books and I will briefly give you some titles and authors. 1. The Tenth Justice by Brad Melzer. 2. The Obsession by Catherine Cookson. 3. & 4. As The Lily Grow's and Prairie Rose by Susan Kirby. 5. Lord of the Isles by David Drake. 6. Cimarron Rose by James Lee Burke. 7. One Ragged Ridge Road by Leonard Foglia. I have finished this and greatly enjoyed it. I have also finished 8. Power Of A Woman by Barbara Taylor Bradford. This is a great book. Skelton Canyon by J.A. Jawce. 10. Deception On His Mind by Elizabeth George.

This is not all of the new ones. You need to come in and see what is available.
