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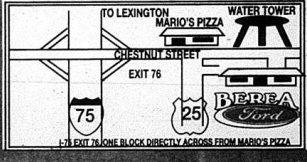

Court seeking \$1 million for Livingston project

By simply looking one would think that the embattled Daniel Boone Development Corporation had given up on the Livingston School revitalization project.

lachian Regional Commission for \$504,000.
The \$1 million would be passed on to the actual owners of the property, Daniel Boone Development Corporation.
Bryan Kirby, a specialist with Community and Economic Development Associates, Inc. of Richmond, told the court that once completed the

project could do great things for the Livingston area and the entire county.
With the help of State Representative Danny Ford, Daniel Boone received a grant in 1996 to buy the former school property, but since that time BBDC has not been able to obtain funding for the project.
"Kirby told the court that great things were planned for the site, in-

cluding a community center in the old gymnasium and much more.
Kirby said the main use of the site would be for specific job training, such as data entry operators and nursing assistants.
"You talk about welfare reform, this will be welfare reform at its best," he said.
Kirby said that local citizens will

be able to get their education, train for a specific job and have day care facilities on the site for their children.
The grant application specialist said that social service officers, Head Start, assisted living and a child support enforcement office are also planned for the school property.
Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis said that because

some county governments used to obtain such grants and then not use the money for years, a new state guideline requires that such projects be completed within 18 months. That is great news, if we can get this money approved, we can have a great facility in a year and a half," Carlotis said.

Boling resigns from board of education

After serving less than one year on the Rockcastle County Board of Education, Teresa Boling has resigned.

Mrs. Boling submitted her letter of resignation to the board during their regular monthly meeting last week.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond said that Mrs. Boling and her husband Jeff, had moved out of the county apparently to be closer to Mr. Boling's job.

During Mrs. Boling's short tenure, she fought hard for a new corporal punishment policy and for blockage of obscene material from the school system's Internet.

The school board passed a new corporal punishment policy which allows for spanking, although only the middle school council adopted the policy, and the board instructed the local technology director to find the best way to block obscene materials from the Internet.

But, Mrs. Boling's resignation leaves District Four without a representative. That vacancy will be filled by Kentucky Education Commissioner Wilmer Cody's office. Anyone interested can pick up applications for the board seat at the central office of the Rockcastle County Board of Education on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon.

Applications must be postmarked by September 2 and sent to Cody's office at 500 Metro Street, 1st Floor, Capital Plaza Tower, Frankfort, Ky. 40601.

Interested persons must be at least 24 years old, a Kentucky citizen for the last three years, a registered voter in Rockcastle County, possess a high school diploma or a GED certificate and, in most cases, the potential board member cannot have a relative employed by the Rockcastle County School District.

Superintendent Hammond said that if more or only one application is received, the application process must be repeated. If no more than one person applies at the end of the second application period, that person will still be interviewed and must be recommended by the commissioner's office. Hammond said that if the state deems that candidate not qualified to serve, the process begins over again.

County receives \$10,300 from G.T.E. for 911 dispatching

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court has received their first payment from G.T.E. for 911 emergency dispatching services in Rockcastle County.

Rockcastle County treasurer Joe Clontz told the court that his office had received \$10,343.21 from G.T.E. for the \$2.00 per month fee assessed by the fiscal court.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis said that money would be put into a special 911 account and administered by the 911 board.

The Judge told the court that basic 911 should be in place in the county in about two weeks.

"G.T.E. has required us to run conduct throughout the building to protect the phone lines, but that should

be done in a couple of days, so we can get them in here to hook up basic 911," Carlotis said.

The basic 911 will be operated by dispatchers in Sheriff Shirley Smith's office. Carlotis said that once the enhanced 911 is ready to be put into operation, the 911 board will decide on a proper site for the dispatching.

Carlotis said Wednesday that the board had received several "good" applications and that a personnel committee was looking over each of them. The Judge said that a coordinator would be hired by the board and more dispatchers would also be hired. "Of course the dispatchers in the Sheriff's office have first stab at the jobs," Carlotis said.

Vanwinkle on U.S. 25 at Mullins Station.

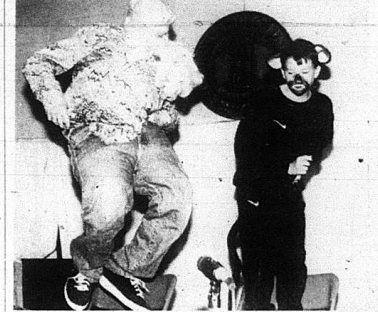
Price said that police blocked 25 for about two hours while Deputy Sheriff and Chaplain Mike Bryant and others negotiated with Vanwinkle.

Jon Norman Meadows, a regular columnist with *The Signal*, is unable to contribute a column this week because of pain associated with a chronic back problem.

Mr. Meadows called Tuesday to tell me of his inability to produce the column, explaining that a pain-reduction procedure last week had not helped and had, in fact, made the pain worse.

Jon Norman got hold of the right person if he was looking for sympathy. I had a bout with a back problem a few years back and there is nothing more painful or mentally depressing.

My family was great. I will have to say but it was hard for them to

sustain their sympathetic mood because there's nothing tangible to reinforce your illness. There's no bandage, no splint, no blood, no bruises to prove how badly you hurt. Jim carrying (dragging) me down the hallway to the bathtub with me screaming every inch, helped to reinforce it for them and the fact that I lost 20 pounds quite easily since I couldn't even raise my head from a flat position to eat also helped them to realize that was hurting and hurting badly.

The pain was not excruciating, it was just there constantly and nothing halted it. I made my mistake when the first diagnosis was made of the ailment by Dr. Coy of Richmond. He said it was an inflamed nerve root in the spine and the treatment was two weeks of complete bed rest to allow it to heal. I did go to bed - for two days and felt so much better I got out of bed and canned three cans of green beans (the girls picked the beans) and the next day woke up in agony. Jim was out of state on a hunting trip when it flared up so badly and poor Sara (my youngest of the oldest five) got stuck with the job of taking me to the doctor. When we got to Richmond, I refused to leave the car because it hurt too much to move. Sara had to go into the office and explain to the receptionist that I needed to see the doctor but couldn't (wouldn't) leave the car to walk into the office. (Did I mention that I am not a cooperative patient under the best of circumstances and that I don't

know the meaning of "stiff upper lip")? Of course, the receptionist's solution was to tell her to deliver me to the emergency room at Patric A. Clay Hospital and the doctor "would be there shortly."

The problem with that solution was that the emergency room entrance was temporarily shut down for construction so we wound up at the main entrance with two attendants dragging me from the car to load me on a gurney and me not cooperating and protesting all the way that they were killing me. We went through the main lobby (at least I and the attendants did, I think Sara managed to prolong parking the car to miss the trip), with me questioning their ancestors and their job competency. I was getting enough attention that I wasn't taken to the emergency room but directly admitted and immediately given a shot of morphine. Let me tell you, that was the first shot of morphine I had ever had and that's good stuff. For the first time in a long time, I was pain free and ready to go home because I wasn't hurting any more. Of course, when nurses came into the room shortly thereafter to weigh me and I discovered that I still couldn't stand upright without pain, and a lot of it, I got back in bed and asked when the next shot of morphine would be forthcoming.

Well, as I said, after numerous tests by a team of neurosurgeons and several days of hospitalization at Patric A. Clay and then at Central Baptist in Lexington, it was decided that I had an inflamed nerve root that would take several weeks of bed rest. If I had done what Dr. Coy recommended in the first place, I could have probably saved myself a lost summer, because that's just about how long it took all together to get straight-

 Taking A Bite Out of Crime

In the coming weeks, the House of Representatives will consider legislation that will help take a huge bite out of crime. Marijuana is a particular problem for our State. Kentucky is one of the nation's leading suppliers of domestically-grown marijuana. This drug is a danger to our people and our communities. Not only does it open the door to crime, corruption and violence, but it has made its way into our schools and into the hands of our children.

I have successfully included a major new drug fighting initiative that would designate Kentucky as a "High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area" and provide \$5 million for drug fighting activities in another bill that should come to the House floor in September. This new effort will give our federal, state and local law enforcement officials the manpower and equipment they need to fully attack this dangerous and illegal drug.

As a former prosecutor my message for criminals is simple: If you do the crime, you will do the time. As the chairman of the subcommittee that funds our nation's crime fighting programs, my goal is to make sure our nation's law enforcement officials have the resources they need to take a real bite out of crime.

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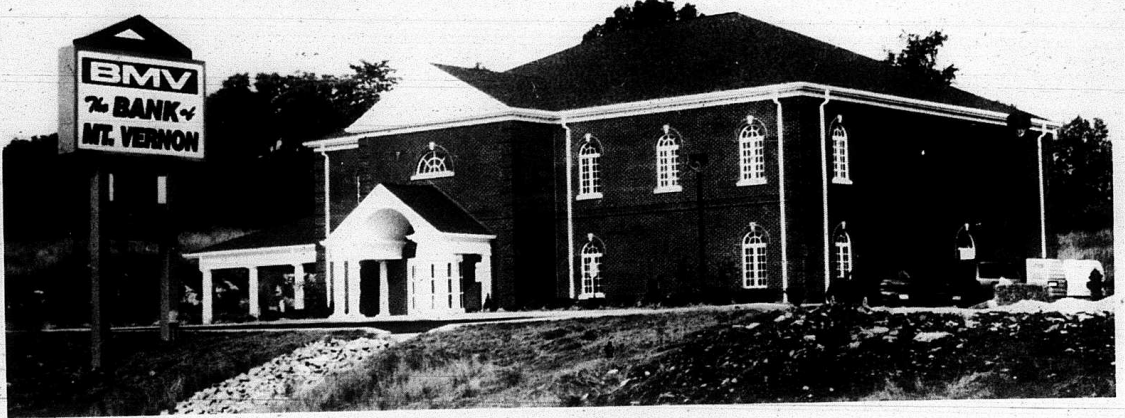

Looking for Doves?

Going dove hunting this season? Look for places where doves find food and shelter. The beauty of hunting doves is their habitat is all over Kentucky.

At this time of year you'll see doves perched on telephone wires, fences, in dead trees—just about any place near a food source. Doves will eat seeds such as sunflowers, wheat, millet and corn. As a result, if you can find a wheat field, sunflower patch, corn or millet field, you can probably find doves—especially if the normal agricultural practice of mowing and harvesting has recently taken place.

State wildlife management areas have great sections of dove habitat. These areas are scattered across the state and are listed in the Guide to Public Wildlife Areas, available from the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. If

you are interested in hunting these areas, get there in the opening days of the season. Some wildlife management areas are heavily hunted and can even be closed if they achieve maximum hunting capacity. Any special restrictions are listed in the yearly hunting guide for migratory game birds. Check directly with federal or special restriction areas such as Westvaco, Peabody, Fort Knox, Fort Campbell and Land Between the Lakes.

If you plan to hunt doves on private property, make sure you have the owner's permission every time you go there. Hunt only where allowed and conduct yourself in a way that will get you and other hunters invited back. Also, think of the landowner when you clean your birds. Sharing the harvest is an excellent way to say thank-you.

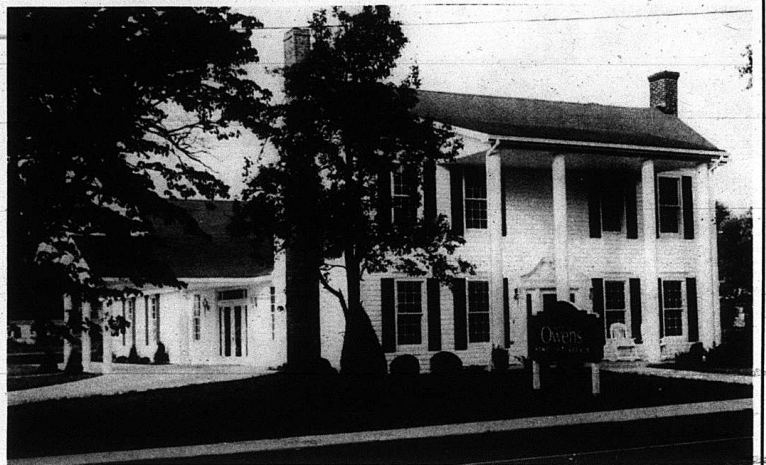

E.coli in Hamburger Patties

Ground beef patties packaged by Hudson may be contaminated with the *E. coli* bacteria. The frozen ground beef patties have been sent to national chains such as Burger King, Boston Market, Wal-Mart and Sam's Club. The packages bear the Hudson name and one of the following code numbers: 155A7; 155B3; 156A7; 156B7;

160A7; 160B7. Other code numbers may be released soon. Consumers should check their freezers for any frozen ground beef patties that have been purchased since June 4th.

Wal-Mart and Sam's Club stores have pulled all Hudson's ground beef, but customers may return any

patties they have purchased for a full refund, no matter when it was bought.

Since an *E. coli* infection can be fatal, especially to young children and the elderly, the improper cooking of these ground beef patties has serious consequences.

E. coli contamination is usually the result of contact with fecal material during processing or packaging. All meats should be cooked to an interior temperature of 160 degrees F. This temperature will kill *E. coli* bacteria and most other foodborne pathogens.

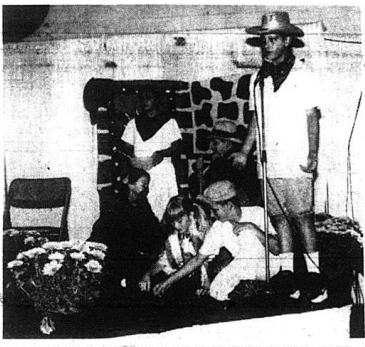

Welfare Reform Affects Rockcastle Counties

According to reports, the food stamp cuts in the welfare bill from 1997-2002 will amount to \$27 billion. This is equivalent to withdrawing nearly 24 billion pounds of food from the poor, an average of 4 billion pounds of food per year. This is just a small example of what we can expect in the next five years.

The poor have already been exploited, abused, used and flushed down the toilet of society. The needs of the poor are brought to the forefront of the political agenda when they need to institute more spending but the largest part of the money goes to administration and only a small portion goes to the ones who need it most.

Here is an article from USA Today... Tuesday, July 1, 1997 Food Fight: 27% going to waste... Americans waste 27% of their food—throwing out 365 pounds a year for every man, woman, and child, says a report released today. Even 5% of the 96 billion pounds of edible food tossed out annually in this county could feed 4 million people a day for a year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture said in releasing this report.

On average, a person consumes about three pounds of food per day. The 365 pounds each person wastes each year could be the equivalent of 1,000 hamburgers, 300 bananas and 60 sticks of butter.

Last week, a woman walked into the food bank and said she would like to make a donation. She pulled a tiny square from the corner of her wallet and began unfolding it, to eventually reveal a long-saved one hundred dollar bill. When she was asked for her name and address, so that a thank you

could be sent, big tears began to roll down her cheeks. "No, don't thank me," she responded. "I'm thinking you. When I was hungry, you fed me." And with that, she was gone.

It is sometimes easy to get caught up in the daily work of feeding the hungry and forget what happens to the people we serve after they leave us. It would be easy to de-humanize our work and forget the faces of hunger, if it weren't for the frequent reminders that the food we collect and distribute is for real people, with real lives, real worries, and usually a real sense of gratitude. These reminders come just often enough to make sure we keep a heart for our work.

The people we see everyday at R.E.A.P. are not the people that you will hear about on the news. The people we help are the ones affected by the recent discontinuation of GED programs and cuts in the food stamp

program. They are the people who are quietly trying to make ends meet, by working at minimum wage jobs, often part time, or budgeting their minimal social security checks. When they don't succeed, and have no where to turn, then they come to us.

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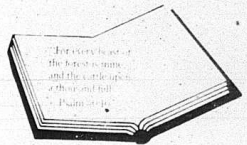

Kirby told the court that a small retail shop to show off local crafts would also be part of the revitalization project.

In other action, the court voted to buy a new pre-fab steel bridge to replace the old one at Mullins station.

The county will be responsible for installing the bridge to state specifications. When questioned by mag-

The steel bridge will be delivered in two twenty foot sections and installed by large cranes. Magistrate Donald Bullock said the bridge at Mullins Station was in very bad shape and he was glad it was going to be replaced.

The court also accepted a bid for labor costs for putting a new roof on the Rockcastle County Library building. Junior Overbey of Mt. Vernon was the low bidder of \$3,300, which includes taking off the old roof, putting on gutters and edging the roof. The county will pay for all materials.

Price said that the Kentucky State Police is investigation the fire as arson.

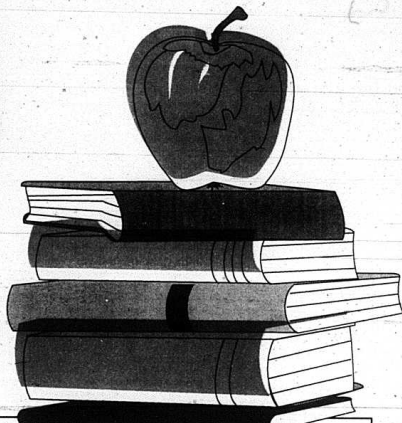
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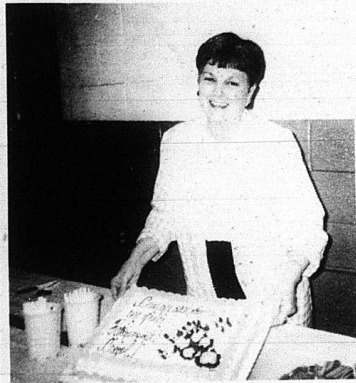

Born in Nashville, Kitty recalls that music has always been important to her entire family. She began playing the guitar at age 14 and began singing in church even earlier. When she was 16, Kitty met Johnny Wright, a young man whose interest in music matched her own, they were married two years later.

Kitty and Johnny and Jack Anglin were not only stars but were instrumental in the early development of the "Louisiana Hayride" in Shreveport, Louisiana. Their success there led to an invitation to join the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville. Kitty joined

the Opry where she was a regular member for 15 years and signed a recording contract with Decca.

Kitty Wells has pioneered many "firsts" in the Country Music industry. She was part of the first county music show to play the famous Palace Theater in New York City. Her solo number in 1952, "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels," made her the first female to reach number one in country music.

After two decades at the top of her demanding professions she is still "the queen of them all," a title that stuck because Kitty made it stick with one brilliant record after another. She has twenty three number one records to her credit and has recorded over 46 albums. Her record sales have been so astounding that no one knows the exact total, which runs into the millions.

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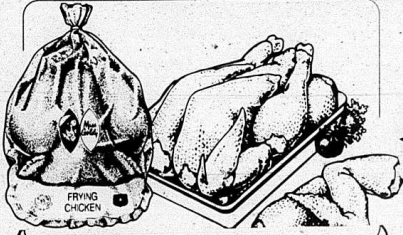
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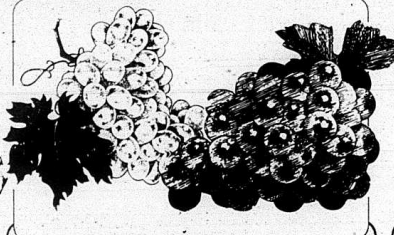
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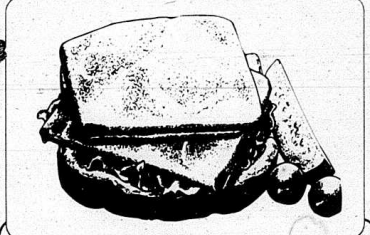
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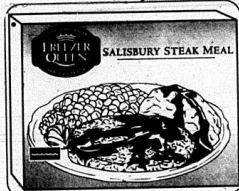
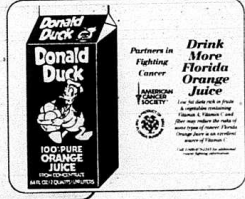
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News From The Aunt Polly House

Some people read maps, others ask directions. Please tell me how to get to Livingston, Ky. There have been many road changes, so when you ask directions, I will try to tell you how to get to Livingston, Ky. From Renfro Valley, take US 25 south about three quarters of a mile. Turn left onto I-75, proceed on I-75 about three miles to Exit 59, then turn left onto US 25, about seven and one-half miles to Livingston.

The beautiful hills of Rockcastle County borders the town of Livingston, Kentucky. Here the dark green waters of Roundstone Creek flow into the Rockcastle River just below the town. The Rockcastle River is listed as one of the wild rivers of the United States. Several hundred acres of Rockcastle County is in the Daniel Boone National Forest including Livingston. A trail for hikers is posted near the bridge that crosses the railroad and Roundstone Creek. If you step quietly along the trail, the crow will be the first to announce your arrival, along with bluejays, then several other birds will join in the chorus. The rocks, fern and wild flowers near the bridge get your attention and you will think of Indian scouts, wildcats and many others who have passed this way.

I love to drive down the tree shaded pavement of old US 25, admire the

wild magnolias and the yellow leaves of the beech, the dark red of the elm tree, poplars, walnuts, willows, sumac, and the purple leaves of the dogwood. During the fall of the year, the stately sycamore with its white bark and outstretched limbs reflecting in the waters of Rockcastle River, not many places can compare to its beauty. Along this route, you will see perched high on a hill to your right, the Castle Rock from which Rockcastle River and Rockcastle County got their names.

Livingston, Ky. was a very industrious town in the early part of the

century. Huge trees were floated down the river and sawed into lumber. Coal was mined from the hills and hauled out by wagons and mules. Sand was dug by hand and sold. Railroad crossings were hewed by hand and sold to the railroad company. The railroad played a major part in getting these products to market, and furnished employment for many residents.

After Highway 25 came through Livingston, many small businesses operated along this highway: souvenir shops, basket makers, handmade chairs, gas station and repair shops. After World War II, many residents left the area to find employment. On Labor Day weekend of each year, Livingston has a Homecoming celebration to welcome its people home.

The mayor of Livingston is Ed Lyle. The former mayor was Bill Medley. Livingston has a Volunteer Fire Department, Police protection, telephone service, water department, garbage pickup, grocery store, restaurant, mechanics, carpenters, painters, Lion's Club, Masonic Hall, Music Hall, Livingston Manor Apartments and many fine citizens.

In a small park set aside are markers of special interest of when the Livingston High School was built in 1927, closed in 1994 and one in memory of their native son PFC David M. Smith who received the Congressional Medal of Honor for his sacrifice to our country. He was born November 10, 1926 and died in Korea September 1, 1950. Highway 461 bypass is named the David M. Smith Memorial Highway.

Another native son is John Lair. Mr. Lair was born in Livingston, Ky. July 1, 1894. Mr. Lair taught school in Livingston and became the famous "John Lair" of radio and nationally known Renfro Valley Barn Dance, and author of several books of historical interest.

The Livingston motto: "Can't Hide the Pride."

And remains constant year after year. Is Romeo whispering sweet nothings into Juliet's gossamer car.

Meanwhile, in front of the grandstand the rodeo is underway. And cowboys are roping and riding. Trying to win the prize of the day. Has a maniac behind the wheel.

After the rodeo is over Out comes cars of iron and steel. And everyone of them, my friends Has a maniac behind the wheel. They are hemmed in by logs So they can't get away. Then they rev up their engines. And get ready to play.

Drivers put the pedal to the metal And it's an insurance company's nightmare. As they crash into each other And rip, roar and tear.

For there in the water and mud They beat, bang and slash. Then they back up and take aim And into another they'll crash.

The winner of the contest And I'm not funning. Is the one still left alive With his motor still running.

Down under the grandstand

Is the Agricultural Fair. With hundreds of exhibits Being put on display there.

The exhibits are so good. That they're beyond compare. And the folks of Rockcastle Can be proud of their Agricultural Fair.

The wee people are riding horses On the merry-go-round. While some are canoing on the river That lies upon the ground.

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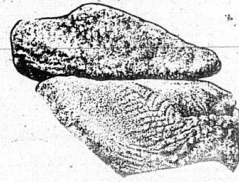


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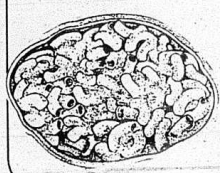


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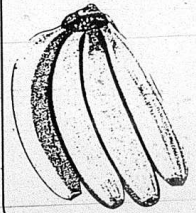

FFA attends EKU Field Day

Recently, several members of our Rockcastle County FFA Chapter attended the Eastern Kentucky University Field Day. While there, members participated in team and individual activities in conjunction with the judging contests held at the Kentucky State Fair, August 14th and 15th. Contests there ranged from livestock and dairy judging to seed identification and tobacco grading. Members from our chapter fared very well in competition, placing in the top percentage in all contests held.

Matthew Hayes placed as high individual in the Dairy Judging competition at Eastern, while the entire team, consisting of members William Leger, Amanda Clark, Travis Wynn, and Matthew Hayes, finished in third. This competition allows members to rank a group of dairy cows and includes a reasons class in which they must give an oral statement of their opinions and placing of the class.

The Livestock Judging Team, whose members participating were John Dyhouse and Jeremy Reynolds, fared well also. John placed as third-high individual, while Jeremy placed seventh in livestock judging. This competition has a wider variety of animals to work with than dairy judg-

ing. Participants grade three forms of livestock: beef cattle, swine, and sheep, and thus requires a broader range of knowledge. Members must grade these animals upon cleanliness, size, depth, efficiency, and productivity.

Dustin Crawford was fifth-high individual in the Seed Identification contest. This is a contest in which the participant must classify a group of seeds, as well as identify seed tags to determine the quality of a bag of seeds.

Our Tobacco Grading team did well in their contest, also, with members John Adams, Elizabeth Bullock, and Matt Chalif finishing seventh. In this contest, members grade tobacco groups by their overall color and quality to determine which stalks will bring the highest profit on the tobacco market. Eric Helton also served as an alternate dairy holder at Eastern's Field Day.

This field day served as a great practice session for our members who will later compete at the Kentucky State Fair. We want to personally thank Eastern Kentucky University for their hospitality in hosting this event and allowing FFA members from around the Commonwealth to participate.

The expansion of the program means even greater opportunities for AmeriCorps/SSC members.

"Almost invariably," Thames said, "our members go on to good jobs because of the extensive training,

experiences, and networking opportunities the program provides."

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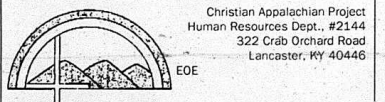

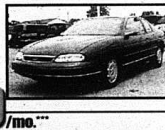

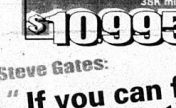

Agricultural News
Rockcastle Farm Service Agency

Warden Alexander, FSA Director The Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency is beginning the process to elect a County Committee in all our offices. County Committees administer federal farm programs at the local level and are responsible for establishing policy and the overall management of each FSA office. In an effort to reach all eligible voters in the county, we urge any and all producers who have not received a voting petition in the past election (Dec. 96) to contact our office immediately. Eligible voters are: farm owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers, of legal voting age if the producer is eligible to take part in any FSA program. This includes reservation land owners for Native Americans, spouses of eligible producers in community property states and spouses who are an owner, operator, tenant or sharecropper. Remember: If you want to vote in the upcoming election—your name must be on the voting list as an eligible voter. Now is the time to contact your local FSA office for voting eligibility.

FSA makes and guarantees farm loans and provides technical management assistance to family farmers. A "family farm" is defined as one that a family can operate and manage itself with a reasonable amount of hired labor. FSA loans are tailored to a borrower's needs. The FSA Agriculture Credit Manager helps the borrower analyze problems, determine available resources and plan how resources may best be used. The FSA loan programs are: Operating Loans, Farm Ownership Loans, Emergency Loans, and Youth Project Loans.

Recent warehouse examinations have revealed evidence of substitution by producers using warehouse receipts that were issued for a better quality of grain than was delivered by the producer for obtaining CCC loans. The quality of the commodity was upgraded to make the commodity eligible for nonrecourse loan. To be eligible for a CCC commodity loan, the quality and quantity of grain represented by a warehouse receipt must reflect the commodity delivered by the producer. Warehouse receipts that have been upgraded to reflect a better grade and quality than the quality that was delivered by the producer to the warehouse are ineligible for CCC loan whether or not the warehouse operator received monetary compensation. To be eligible to receive loans or loan deficiency payments, a producer must have the beneficial interest in the commodity that is tendered to CCC for a loan or loan deficiency payment. Commodities obtained by gift or purchase shall not be eligible to be tendered to CCC for loans or loan deficiency payments.
