

Students can qualify for RIST scholarship money five ways

The Rockcastle Incentive Scholarship Trust (better known as RIST) is dedicated to provide money for the furtherment of Rockcastle County students' education.

According to Mr. Dale Whitaker, RCHS guidance counselor, the main goal of the RIST's local community sponsors, is to "encourage more students to further their education, past high school."

RIST is based on a point system which allows students to earn points in five different categories: grades, attendance, parent participation, tests, and community service.

Students receive one point for each "A" they get on their report card. This year's seniors can earn a maximum of 16 points here. They can only count the past two years since the program is only

two years old.

The second method for earning points is attendance. If students miss three days or fewer throughout the school year, they can earn five more points.

Parents can also help student earn money-by attending majo r school-sponsored functions. A maximum of 15 points per year has been designated in this category.

The ACT, SAT, PLAN, PSAT, and ASVAB are tests that can camcredit for students in the RIST point system. Taking each test is worth one point with a limit of five total points possible.

The last category is community service, in which a student can earn five points per year for aiding in any form of community service. Documentation is necessary for points in this category as well as the parent participation.

As it stands, the maximum

amount of points this year's seniors can tally is 46.

The total points earned by all seniors who participate this year will be divided into \$5,000 and the money will be given out on awards night.

This money can be used for anything, including clothes, books, tuition, supplies, etc.

Eligible seniors will be recognized on May 19, but will not receive their money until around two weeks after school is

During this two week period the school will be checking records to confirm the number of points each student has earned.

For students who make good grades, attend school regularly, and plan to get further training after high school, very little additional work will have to be put into earning money from RIST.





waivers. The law allows the County to establish precincts without regard to the number of voters. Eventhough the law requires 350 registered voters per precinct, before the State will reimburse certain costs; italso allows a waiver in certain circumstances, and in years past we have been granted that waiver," Burdette said. (West Livinston nergict with 346 weeks. that waiver," Burdette said. (West Livinsgton precinct, with 346 voters, received a waiver this election based on the closeness to the voter require

The County Attorney has again appealed for a waiver arguing road conditions, distance and hardship on

the voters. The Board of Elections will review the issue again on Election Day, but the Fiscal Court will pick up the tab for now, Normally, the State reimburses the County \$255.00 per precinct.

The priority issues were reflective of each age group. Younger to middle age respondents would more likely be persons with children and families. Therefore, issues reflected this. Older respondents indicated concerns more along the lines of chronic or terminal diseases.

The Importance of Curing America's Drug Problem

The Importance of Curing America's Drug Problem

The use of illicit drugs is on the rise again the in United States and the repercussions are being felt across Kentucky and throughout America. In 1995 alone, drugs kilded more than 14,000 Americans. Between 70 and 90 percent of all persons incarcerated in state prisons are there for drug offenses. And last year, Americans spent \$150 billion for drug-related medical and criminal costs, more than we spent on education, transportation, agriculture, energy, space and foreign aid combined. These costs, both in lives lost and in actual dollars spent, are truly staggering, and only reinforce why we must find a way to solve our nation's drug crisis.

The current drug craze is being fueld by two traditionally competing factors, rising quality and falling price, that have uncharacteristically combined to form a deadly one-two combination that continues to make the problem worse. Currently, the potency of many drugs, particularly heroin and crack, is at record highs. Whereas heroin was only 4-10 percent pure in the 1970s, law wenforcement officials are finding that today's heroin is now 70-90 percent pure. Disturbingly, at the same time potency has increased, street prices have fallen. This creates a vicious cycle where it becomes cheaper and cheaper to become a regular user of more potent — and more dangerous — drugs. Thus, it also becomes easier (the higher the potency, the more addictive a drug is) and less expensive than ever to become a regular user and then an addict.

Yet, as the nation's drug problem has increased, we have seen a frightening tack of appropriate response from the White House. Since 1993, the White House has shifted the emphasis from drug revention and interdiction at the border to treatment of addicts and "roughly still and anti-drug effortion than the content of the properties." Such as Bolivia. Columbia and Peru, we should our national anti-drug effortions this journation and content of the properties. The course of our nation and course on the ou

do so. Solving our nation's drug problem must be one of our top priorities. A recent study shows that half of all street crimes are linked to drugs. Thus, eliminating the drug problem should dramatically reduce violent crime, making our streets safer. In addition, solving this problem would allow the government to focus valuable resources on other important issues like improving our nation's education system. If we can win the war on drugs, we win a major victory for our nation's future, leaving to our children a much safer and less violent society.





The record high production quotas for 1998 present many opportunities and problems for Kentucky's tobacco growers. One of the control of new permanent or temporary curing barn space is another option and competitive bidding-up of barn lease prices has already begun. However, some of the barn space problems can be dealt with before field populations are an excellent way to reduce barn space problems and capture some other costs saving benefits at the same time.

Farmers have been discovering the labor saving advantages of lower plant population for several years. Labor reductions of 2D to incommend to the control of the

Tey-year, more than 150,000 Americans are diagnosed with lung cancer, asid Dr. Connelius. "More than 100,000 people die each year from lung cancer, mostly because it remains silent until the symptoms are too far advanced to treat."

Though diagnosis and treatment techniques for respiratory disease continue to be improved, prevention emains the best medicine.

McGowen offers these tips for the control of the control

of non-smokers.

• Exercise. Under supervision of your doctor, develop an exercise routine that helps you increase your lung apacity.

• Take medication as directed. For

most respiratory problems, it's es-sential to continue taking medica-tion, even when you're not experi-

encing symptoms.

• Install exhaust fans in the kitchen, bathrooms and work areas that maybe likely to build up fumes. Aerosol likely to build up fumes. Aerosol products, gas appliances and house-hold cleaners are major fume irri-

ots.

Circulate air humidity. Usually everyday chores like cooking and running water produce enough hu-midity for most people. But if you need more, install a central heat hu-

Avoid mold and mildew. Both are usually found in places where moisture can accumulate (cellars,

She goes on to say that the one-way bridge was in use in 1890 and th present two-way steel reinforced cor crete bridge was built in 1988.

Reward offered for suspected vote fraud

The Kentucky Secretary of State's Office is offering a reward to citizens who turn in people suspected of vote buying or selling in the upcoming primary and general elections. This year marks the second in which Secretary of State John Y. Brown, III has offered this Fraud Busters program. Fraud Busters propriate for a \$1,000 reward for the first. In fellow indictionents for week buy. y indictments for vote buying or selling. Citizens who witness what appears to be vote buying or

selling should call a toll-free hotline to report it. The number is 1-800-328-8683. "I want to help make election fraud a thing of the past," Brown said.

"Want to neip make election fraud a thing of the past," Brown said. "And I figured the best way to fight money is with more money." Callers who believe they have witnessed election fraud will be asked

for details of the incident, such as the names of the vote buyer and seller the location, the time it happened and whether they know what race wa

involved. Callers will remain anony-mous. The information will be pre-sented to the proper legal authorities

sented to the proper legal authorities for prosecution.
Vote buying and selling are Class Delonies, punishable by imprisonment from one to five years.
Fraud Busters was funded this year by the 1998 Kentucky General Assembly. The Secretary of State's Officeis working in cooperation with the Automey General's Office to conduct the program.
"Fair and honest elections are absolutely essential to our Democracy," Brown added. "Fairad Busters is one way to highlight the problem of election if fluid and possibly help bring those who practice it to justice."

Laid-off employees who exhausted their unemployment insurance benefits before they were called back to work or found another job also may be eligible for retroactive benefits.

Qualified workers may apply for financial assistance, training and job search and relocation assistance. Both types of assistance will be available through March 26, 2000.

KIRIS to undergo changes next year

Hours of sweaty silence, sore fingers, splitting headache and frustration. What are these the symptoms of?

Could it be watching TV with the mute button and no interesting shows?

Nope. For several days in mid-April, it was what some students were complaining of during the state-required KIRIS testing.

The Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA), passed in 1991, caused drastic change in education and testing throughout Kentucky, but a recent attempt has been made by lawmakers to revise KERA and the Kentucky Instructional Results Information System (KIRIS).

New legislation (HB 53), passed by both houses in the recent general assembly, does not make as drastic a change as some had thought might be made.

These changes are intended to bring about the improvements that many people (including some educators) felt were necessary for the future success of Kentucky

The most recent change has been labeled CATS for Commonwealth Acccountability Testing System.

This new system, which will be enacted in 1999, has eight main features, most of which deal with testing and accountability.

A summary of the changes includes:

1. A normed component included in the test. This is primarily known as the standardized part (Please see KIRIS page 3)

House Bill 330 targets school safety improvements

"Every student and teacher has the right to be and feel safe in school," said Wilmer Cody, Kentucky Education Commissioner, as he addressed high school journalism students at a press conference on Friday, March 27 at the first annual High School Journalism Association Convention in Lexington.

House Bill 330, which will establish a center for school safety, passed the senate by a 35-0 margin on March 26. The location for the center will be established within the next two years.

The bill also will provide five million dollars for schools during the 1998-99 school year and ten million dollars for schools in 1999-2000.

During the first year, schools can only use the money for alternative schools. The second year, they will be able to use the money for school improvements.

"We will apply for the money if we see the need for it, and then the SBDM council will make that decision," said Mr. Ronnie Cash, principal at RCHS.

The bill also has an emergency clause which makes it effective immediately instead of waiting the 90 day period.

Some may think the bill was passed due to the recent incident at Heath High School and the Arkansas tragedy, but according to Jack Conway, Legal Counsel for the Secretary of the Cabinet, this bill has been at the top of the Governor's agenda for some time.

"We all play a role in keeping the school and the community safe," commented the president of the Kentucky Education Association, Janet Carrico.

According to Ms. Carrico, the teachers are the ones who will have to lead students away from

A survey was recently sent to random schools in Kentucky by Bill Scott, Director of student support services for the Kentucky School Boards Association.

This survey was to see to what extent substance abuse, teen pregnancy, violence, delinquency, and drop outs are affecting students.

From this data educators concluded Kentucky schools have had an increase in disruptive be-

According to Mr. Scott, students with behavior problems usually share the some community and family environent no matter whether they live in a city or smaller rural area.

Ms. Renee Smith, FHA advisor at RCHS, is currently working with other FHA sponsors and members on a project in which she is encouraging teachers to have their students write to their congressmen, asking them to support teen violence prevention laws.

One of the students shot at Heath High School was an FHA

Other local efforts to raise awareness for school safety were brought to the attention of the public by a parent at a recent school board meeting.

Ms. Donna Hasty, a parent, is advocating that metal detectors be placed in all five schools in the county.

Ms. Hasty, who is reportedly

circulating a petition in support of the detectors, may have more reason than most to be concerned. Her brother was a student at Jackson County High School in 1989 when a classmate held his class hostage at gunpoint in an effort to bring to everyone's attention that he wanted to see his father.

The new legislation provides schools opportunity for:

- -Inservice training on warning signs of abuse, neglect, domestic violence for teachers.
- -Home visits by school and social service staff
- -Family counseling and parent educa
- -Preschool education for high risk
- -Anger management/conflist resolution in school

Child abuse prevention needs more attention


Child abuse is one of the most controversial topics of the '90's and may be the most ignored. Whether it be sexual, physical, emotional or just plain neglect, some form of abuse occurs every

Statistics show that 2.8 million children are abused every year, but many go unreported according to the National Victim Center.

In Kentucky alone 63,313 cases of abuse were reported in 1995, Rockcastle County had 22 cases that were prosecuted.

However, most child abuse cases are not prosecuted because it's the child's word against the adults, and children are often too afraid of the abusers to testify against them.

According to information



found recently in the Lexington Herald Leader, one in every three females and one in every seven males is either sexually assaulted or abused before the age of eighteen, and many times the person responsible for these acts is a family member.

Ironically it seems abuse occurs during the jolliest times of a year such as Christmas according to the Women's Crisis Center Training Manuel. Of all the times of year this is the season when children should be cherished, not abused.

The behavior that a child displays as a result of the abuse can often masque as a troubled or misbehaving child or teen.

Symptoms are hyper-vigilance, hurting others without caring, and distractedness.

"Abuse is often a cycle that is repeated. Those who have been abused become abusers," Jill Ponder, Youth Services counsler explained.

Child abuse is a thoughtless

Awareness and counseling does help break this cycle, though.

"Any type of education about violence between two spouses or a parent and child is the first step in stopping the violence," Linda Lengal, counsellor for the Comprehensive Care Centers, com-

Attention Guys: Uncle Sam Needs You!

Or You might need him! If you're a guy about to turn 18 or are already 18, the best way to stay on Uncle Sam's good side is to register with Selective Service.

It's a federal law to register within 30 days of your 18th birthday. You also need to register to be eligible for certain benefits, such as federal student aid, job training, and most federal employment.

Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine up to \$250,000, up to five years in prision, or both.

You can avoid the risk of prosecution and loss of benefits by registering at any local post office or on the Internet, http:// www.sss.gov. There may also be a Selective Service registrar at your school, so you can ask at the pincipal's office.

Selective Service accepts late registrations before age 26, but the longer you wait, the longer you're breaking the law.

After you register, you will receive an acknowledgment of your registration from Selective Service within 90 days.

It will have your Selective Service Number on it. Keep it in a safe place where you can find it when you need it. If you lose your acknowledgment, you can contact the Registration Information Office at (888) 655-1825, toll-free.

Over 13 million men age 18 through 25 are currently registered with Selective Service. Remember, registration · was reinstated in 1980. Selective Service has been registering 18 year old men for 18 years. So, if you turn 18 in 1998 - it's your turn!

From the Principal's Pen



As for a group of 20 JROTC cadets, they have been planning all year for a tour of the the western part of the United States when school is out.

Called the Corps of Discovery, the students, accompanied by SGM Keith Taylor and his wife Ms. Jenny Taylor, will be spending seventeen days camping and hiking in historic sites.

Their plan is to loosly follow the route Lewis and Clark explored by traveling along the Missouri River from St. Louis to Chamberlain, South Dakota, near where the Sioux Indians attempted to turn back the original expedition.

From Chamberlain, they will turn directly west and head for the Badlands of South Dakota where they will hike eight to ten miles cross-country with no trails to follow, using map reading and land navigation skills they have learned in class.

They will also spend at least one night out on the prairie and participate in a guided nature hike conducted by Department of the Interior Rangers.

From the Badlands, they will travel to the Blackhills where they will spend several days visiting points of interest such as Mt. Rushmore, Crazy Horse Monument and Custer State Park. They also plan another hike while in this area, this time along established trails.

Leaving South Dakota, they will travel directly to Devil's Tower National Monument in Wyoming, where they will probably spend two days. From, Devil's Tower, they will travel to the Little Bighorn National Battlefield in Montana, spending the night in Bighorn Canyon.

SGM Taylor says if there is money and time, they might try to visit Yellow Stone National Park.

They will also be stopping at other historical sites such as the Wagon Box Battle, Chimney Rock, the Pony Express Museum and sites along the Morman Trail as they return home through Nebraska.

To prepare for this trip, students have been involved in route selection, budget development, and menu selection. All twenty students have recently completed adult CPR certification and will receive additional first aid training prior to departure.

Every student making the trip will be designing a travel guide to help others see the route. Cadels will be keeping a journal on the trip hat later will be part of the guide.

where groups of students from a variety of places may be compared to one another.

Comparison of test results for the same students (as opposed to previous methods of comparing results from different classes).

 Reduced writing portfolio time.
 This may mean fewer pieces of writing in the senior portfolio next year.

 Open-response or multiple choice questions on the test or both.

Arts performance events for schools with competitive programs.

 A simplified and fair accountability system that shows Kentucky is offering the best education possible.

 Teacher participation in testing development. This simply implies that teachers will take part in the new reform more so than before.
 A mandate to correct and not repeat KIRIS flaws.

Even though the current testing accountability system will not be altered until the 1999 school year, legislators emphasize that this year's results will count.

These results will be established as the new baseline for the year 2000 and facilitate the state in the distribution of rewards.

Ms. Ruth Allen, assistant principal, said, "Our juniors, even though there will be changes, have worked extremely hard and have taken all parts of the test seriously."

"Several students have said that they were well prepared," Ms. Allen added.

Principal Ronnie Cash said, "Our number one goal is to do the best we can do. That was our goal the first year, and it will always be. I'm very pleased with this year's juniors."

The details of House Bill 53 will be determined this summer through the help of legislators, parents, and educators. A legislative panel of experts will assist in the school test reform.

Kentucky teachers and administration will then receive further training in order to make the transition. An improvement in the test will be welcomed by teachers and students alike. Many think the test is too subjective and too long.

Mr. Rick Barnett said he would like to see a scoring system that is more fair.

Ms. Angie Alexander said she would like to see more questions in short answer or multiple choice form. "I don't think the open-response questions are bad; I just feel there should be other forms also."

"I'd like to see a better evaluation instrument that's more fair and valid," said Mr. David Riddle.

Referring to this year's test, juniors complained that the test was too long. "We had to sit too long. I'd rather it last more days than to sit, for so long," said Tammie Burton.

Josh Bowles said he was glad the school tried to help the jumiors out by having the review, but he said, "The information (reviewed) wasn't on the test."

Amanda Osborne said after the test that she thought the review "helped a little."

Stevie Bradley said he didn't think the review helped much because "we went though it too fast."

Counselor recommends ways to cut college costs

"Reducing the cost of college starts when the child is born. Steps you follow from that point on are what determine how much financial aid the student will get," says RCHS Guidance Counselor Mr. Dale Whitaker.

Cutting costs of education after high school is one of the main objectives of most students heading for college or technical school

According to information from the counselor's office, cutting the costs of college involves four simple steps:

Step 1: Career Planning

Start researching possible career interests early.

"This will keep you from taking classes not needed in college, said Mr. Whitaker. This is one of the unnecessary costs of an education.

Step 2: Choosing the right college

If you are interested in two schools, one of them may cost \$15,000 and the other \$5,000. However, more financial aid and scholarships may be offered from the more expensive college,

making it actually the less expensive of the two for you.

Most seniors are in the process of finalizing college plans, but right now is the time for undergraduates to begin researching colleges and narrowing the list so there won't be so much stress during the senior

Sten3: Good grades and test scores

"Most scholarships are awarded based upon GPA, ACT, or SAT scores, but scholarships can also be based upon community service and leadership positions, "said Mr. Whitaker.

Extra-curricular activities and accomplishments in certain areas such as music, art, or Governor's Scholars or Governor's School for the Arts are also the basis for many scholarships.

Step 4: Finding out how the financial aid system works

By filling out the Free Application For Federal Student Aid(FAFSA), a student can qualify for the PELL grants, state grants, institutional grants, work-study programs and low interest loans.

"Always apply for financial

aid, even if you think you're not eligible for it," said Mr. Whitaker.

"Although athletic scholarships are based upon performance, students must also be academically eligible to participate," said Mr. Whitaker.

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Laurel man says drugs and alcohol ruined his life

Chad Lowery was just your average high school student like most kids his age; he made mostly B's and C's; he got A's when he bothered to study.

He enjoyed working at the cinema, watching all the free movies. He had plans to go to college, buthadn't chosen a college yet from all the letters he had gotten in the mail. But, also like many high school students, Chad frequently experimented with drugs and alcohol.

Things began going wrong for Chad his sophomore year.

"That's when I started hanging around with different people, started drinking, started smoking pot. I was doing things that a lot of other kids were doing, but I took it to extreme excess."

Things got so extreme, in fact, that Chad started filtering money out of his father's savings account for drugs. Eventually, it was noticed.

A note left for him on the table said his parents wanted to have a talk with him when his father got home from work. Chad panicked and called two of his friends.

High on cocaine and a powerful diet pill called Adapex, he drove to a Livingston gas station, attacked a man, hit him repeatedly with a flashlight, and stole his wallet.

"All I could think about was getting Dad's money back...I knew what I was doing, but I wasn't thinking about the consequences: I didn't think about what would happen to the victim; the physical pain, the possible psychological problems I caused him. I didn't think about any of the repercussions."

The two men who were with Chad soon began bragging about what they had done. It didn't take long for word to get to the police.

At the age of eighteen, Chad was caught, taken into custody, and charged with first degree assault and first degree robbery.

Chad was convicted of second degree robbery and originally

sentenced to 10 years, but after spending time in the Laurel County Detention Center, LaGrange, and Lee Adjustment Center, he was let out on shock probation.

He soon got a job at a local restaurant and, after a while, was trusted with closing up, counting the money, and keeping the books. "Basically, I was walking the line. I was using no drugs...I was trying to do my best until one night I went to a party. There were a couple of kegs there and I started drinking. And drinking."

Chad thought it was time to gethome and, instead of asking for assistance from someone sober, decided to drive home drunk. He was pulled over and arrested for D.U.I.

One of the original conditions of Chad's probation was to abstain from all alcohol. His D.U.I. arrest put him back before the judge, and his probation was revoked.

He is now serving the rest of his 10 year sentence. "I'm up for parole in 6 to 8 months, but I don't feel good about it. I was already given one chance and I blew it, and I just think they'll be reluctant to give me another chance so soon."

Looking back, Chad sees plainly what went wrong in his life. "I should have paid closer attention to who I was hanging around with,"

Like many teens today, drugs and alcohol have, at least temporarily, ruined his life.

"You CAN stop using pot. It's not like you have to smoke it. But you just get to where you are more prone to use your extra money on it. You say, I could buy a book, go see a movie, or get a buzz. You usually end up buying the pot."

When Chad is released, he has big plans for his future. His goal is to become a general contractor someday, and plans to go back to school and get a degree in business management.

His parents are still there, pushing him to make something of himself. "They have been extremely supportive through this whole ordeal. I know I'm really lucky."

Chad is an excellent example

of "been there, done that," so he knows it is important that other teens see where drugs and alcohol can lead them.

"When you're in college, you're just thinking about going to frat and keg parties. Think about your future. Now I'm thinking about supporting myself, maybe having my own family someday...At the time, though, I wasn't thinking about what happens when Mom and Dad aren't there anymore. What happens when you're an adult and you have to work and support yourself?

"And when you do get caught and get in trouble like me, you miss little things, like getting up in the middle of the night and getting a glass of milk. That doesn't happen here, trust me. Having to sleep in a room with 8 to 30 other men...It's not exactly the most comfortable thing in the world."

During the six weeks, students will attend enrichment sessions that focus on the core subjects of medical fields, the sciences, mathematics, and study skills.



Students once sold magazines; now they buy tickets

For Rockcastle County, the tradition of prom began in 1973, the same year the first class graduated from RCHS.

Before that, there had been only a banquet for the junior and senior classes.

The first proms at RCHS were organized by the juniors and their Students sold sponsors. magazines in order to finance this farwell party for the senior class.

The magazine money was used for a band, decorations, and light refreshments, and the prom

However, after several years, this method changed. Some students didn't have extra time to help with this fundraiser, and others wouldn't take the responsibility seriously.

The main prom coordinator at this time became Mr. William Lynch. Students were charged a set amount for a ticket, an idea that had become popular at surrounding schools.

However, after six years, Mr. Lynch's physical problem caused him to decide to give up his prom duties, and that's when Ms. Cindy Witt, who had been volunteering to help Mr. Lynch, took over.

By this time, sponsors were allowing only two juniors from each homeroom to help organize the dance. These students were recommended by homeroom teachers.

Last year, Ms. Dana Singleton joined Ms. Witt as a prom sponsor. Now 24 juniors make up the committee which makes the decisions and does the work.

These juniors are chosen by Ms. Witt and Ms. Singleton from those who submit an application. They are chosen on the basis of their interest and willingness to make up work from missed classes

This year the prom cost about \$2,500, with decorations as the greatest cost. Ms. Witt says the pre-prom ticket sales indicate how much there will be in the budget to spend on the party.

Last year, she said, there was about \$6 left. The school, she said, will pay if the expenses are a little over. She said the most they have ever overspent was \$200

Ms. Singleton said tickets sales was set up a bit differently this year. As an extra incentive, those who bought tickets before spring break not only got a \$10 discount, but also got a free prom tee shirt.

Ms. Singleton said a total of 292 tickets were sold (more than had ever been sold) and only eight of those didn't show up for the

In the past, music was provided by live bands, but for the past several years, Mr. Ed's Outrageous Music Machine of Lexington has provide the entertainment.

The prom committee doesn't only decide on decorations, music and food. According to Ms. Witt, each preparing the gym for the

On Thursday and Friday before prom, the committee works all day in the gym, and from 9 a.m. on Saturday until the lastminute work is done.

Ms. Singleton said the committee worked very hard this year. "I did not have to ask anyone twice to do something. They were responsible for making the prom a success this year. Ms. Witt and I just supervised."

Junior and senior sponsors are expected to chaperone the party; however, all faculty are invited.



Students were also lectured by Kentucky Air National Guard Combat Controllers about their jobs of securing and protecting air fields during combat operations.



Two juniors were chosen in mid-April to represent RCHS as Governor Scholars for five weeks this summer.



Schools must now make equality reports each year

The Kentucky Board of Education voted April 8, to amend Title IX, a 1972 federal law which states that gender discrimination in education programs including sports, is prohibited.

The amendment requires that schools now provide written certification each year that they are complying with the law.

The board did this to ensure that every high school across the state has atheletic programs offering equal opportunities to both girls and boys.

If any high school fails to file documents certifying that they are complying with the law, then the school looses the right to participate in interscholastic sports.

Mr. Tom Larkey, athletic director, said he doesn't know of any area where Rockcastle High School is out of compliance.

Mr. Ronnie Cash, principal says, "I think that young ladies should be the same opportunity as boys in every area including sports and academics, and at Rockcastle we try to provide the same."

Some students at RCHS were recently asked how equally they thought girls and boys were treated here at the Rock.

Sophomore Brooke Roberts said, "I think our sports are treated equally here at school, but I think that because the state became involved and the girls' programs might n have been given a little boost."

"More or less every one is just as supportive of the girls as they are to the boys," said Stevie Bradley, a junior.

Mr. Larkey said, "I feel like the faculty does all that they can do to make the girls feel like they have the same oppoptunities. We can't help it if the girls don't come out for sports."

Mr. Larkey added, "When we are speaking in terms of girls being offered the same opportunity, we are not only speaking of the sports being offered, but also the facilities and qualified coaches."

At RCHS the following sports are offered: football, (boys) basketball (girls and boys), baseball (boys), slow and fast pitch softball (girls), cross-country track (girls and boys), track and field (girls and boys), golf (boys and girls) cheerleading (boys and girls), and dance team (girls).

RCHS had a tennis team a few years ago, but interest was lost in the sport and there were no easily accessible facilities.



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Track team having record-breaking season

Even though track isn't on the top ten popular sports, the boys' and girls' track teams are both doing exceptionally well this year breaking several school records and placing in the top three in many of the invitationals.

Bobcat Invitational

During the same tournament, the boys tied for third place with Clay County, Ten teams participated.
