SBDM meeting held at RCHS June 18th

The June meeting of the Rockcastle County High School SBDM Council was held on Thursday, June 18, 1998 in the high school conference room. Due to cancellations in members' schedules, the meeting was held prior to the regularly scheduled date. Chairman Ronnie Cash called the meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

Mr. Cash welcomed the council members and others in attendance. Council members present were Debra Brown, Joyce Machal, Charles Norris, Jeff Hayes and Tom Larkley.

During the review of the minutes, the dress code issue will be used in the workshop concerning school safety is held. Dress code will be addressed at the workshop as part of school safety.

The math curriculum was also tabled until the next meeting.

The council agreed to let the staff revoke concerning the bill issue.

Mr. Cash commented that he felt Mr. Larkley had received undue criticism during their last meeting.

Mr. Cash presented the council with the ISS report for the 1996-97 and 1997-98 school years.

Mrs. Brown asked about class work pertaining to ISS. Mr. Cash discussed the ISS report with the council.

Mrs. Brown commented that there should be a policy pertaining to summer school. Mrs. Brown also commented that she had taken it upon herself to visit Mrs. Cash's summer school class. All seven of the students had failed their science class previously, and they all had the same teacher. None of the students had Mrs. Cash before.

Mr. Cash stated that the administration will not vote in elections for teacher members of the SBDM council.

The minutes from the last meeting were concurred as follows: Mr. Prater stated that we do not need four people scheduled in ISS during football season. Mrs. Brown was the parish that questioned the National Teachers' Exam and past work records in the hiring of new teachers instead of Joyce Machal.

Mrs. Brown made the motion to accept the minutes after correction.

Mr. Cash stated that the Policy on Vacancies/Consultation will be used in all subsequent hiring procedures.

After discussion of consultation policies and vacancies, the council agreed unanimously to hire the five teachers who have been previously recommended (Patrick Greene, Chris Frith, Chris Larkley, Rhonda Rose and Darlene Martin).

The council understands that the hiring policy will always be used for filling staff vacancies.

Mr. Cash will use a date sometime in July for a working session of the SBDM council to review present policies and formulate any new policies that are needed.

Mr. Cash presented the council with a proposed staff schedule for 1998-99.

Mr. Cash reported that there is a possibility of opening a School to Work Coordinator at the high school.

Mr. David Riddle has expressed interest in that position when it does indeed open.

Mr. Cash presented a Teacher Classroom List. Jennifer McVey had asked if she could have a room with windows facing the lake. Chris Frith agreed to switch rooms with her. Mr. Larkley pointed out that rooms 101 and 102 will be switched with 101 being ISS and 102 being Mr. Barnett's room. Mr. Cash stated that

after teachers had wanted to departmentalize rooms, he and Mr. Noble had made the room changes. All room assignments will be made final in July.

Sgt. Major Keith Taylor submitted a letter requesting that he be allowed to switch rooms with Major Donahon, Room 307. Sgt. Major Taylor says he needs to be close to the storage room because he is responsible for issuing required equipment and supplies. Mr. Cash responded in that the council will look over the situation including looking at the rooms themselves and make a decision at the July meeting.

Sgt. Major Taylor emphasized that he was not complaining, but he felt the need to change rooms in order to do the best job possible.

Mr. Cash went on to commend the JROTC program and their achievements. He mentioned especially the Corp Discovery trip out West beginning on June 21.

Sgt. Major Taylor expressed how much he and the students appreciate all the community support of the trip.

Mr. Cash told the council that there would be a full report on the budget in July. He commented that he was pleased that athletics had closed "in the black." Mr. Cash went on to say that when money was left over in the general fund, he would like for teachers to be able to submit proposals for grants to fund extra projects in their classrooms.

The council could make the decision on the grant proposals as well as write the guidelines for the proposals.

The school handbook is being prepared for the printer. The delay has been the additions for the Safe Schools additions.

Mr. Cash acknowledged his appreciation to Mr. Norris, who served four years and Mrs. Machal, who served six years. Mr. Cash commented that they both had served the council well.

Mr. Cash informed the council that one office worker was paid approximately \$2000.00 less per year than the other two office workers. Mr. Cash stated that he believed that she should be paid by the same scale as the other workers and he would like for the council members to consider the situation and make a decision at the July meeting.

Mr. Hayes commended the FFA organization for their high achievement at the state level competitions. Among those awarded were: Jon Adams being elected State Sentinel, the Chapter meeting category placed second in the state (the highest Rockcastle County has ever placed).

Ashley Lawson and Steven Powell also placed at the state level and well as the Record Keeping category. Mr. Cash agreed that the program is an excellent program.

Mr. Larkley suggested that we have also put an agenda in the paper with the local paper. Mr. Cash agreed that we need to do a better job in reporting the school's accomplishments in the paper.

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Freezing Vegetables

Most vegetables freeze very well. Fresh, tender vegetables right from the garden are best for freezing. The fresher the vegetables when frozen, the more satisfactory your product will be. Over-mature vegetables do not freeze well. Tomatoes lose their firm texture and become soft and flabby, as do salad vegetables, such as celery, lettuce, green onions and radishes. Tomato juice can be frozen satisfactorily, but is so easy to can, you probably won't want to use premium freezer space. Vegetables high in starch content, such as potatoes and mature lima beans, do not freeze well. Among the products easily frozen are some that are the most difficult to can: corn, peas and green lima beans.

Washing is the first step in the preparation of most vegetables for freezing. Wash them thoroughly in cold water. Lift them out of the water, because grit settles to the bottom of the pan. Sort vegetables according to size for heating and packing, unless they are cut into pieces of uniform size. Broccoli and cauliflower may be soaked for 30 minutes in one tablespoon of salt per gallon of water to remove insects before packaging.

Vegetables for freezing must be blanched before packaging. With the exception of green peppers, vegetables maintain a better quality in frozen storage if heated before packaging. Blanching slows or stops the action of enzymes that help vegetables grow and mature.

After maturity, enzymes cause loss of flavor and color. If vegetables are not heated enough, the enzymes continue to be active during frozen storage. Then the vegetables may develop off-flavors, discolor or toughen and lose nutritional value. Heating also wilts or softens vegetables and makes them easier to pack. Heating time varies with the vegetable and size of pieces.

The most satisfactory way to blanch most vegetables is in boiling water. Use a blancher, which has a blanching basket and cover. Or fit a wire basket into a large kettle and add the cover. Using at least 1 gallon of boiling water for each pound of prepared vegetables, follow the blanching directions given for the vegetable you are freezing.

Most of the 28 sports will be held July 17-19 and July 24-26 in Lexington and surrounding counties.

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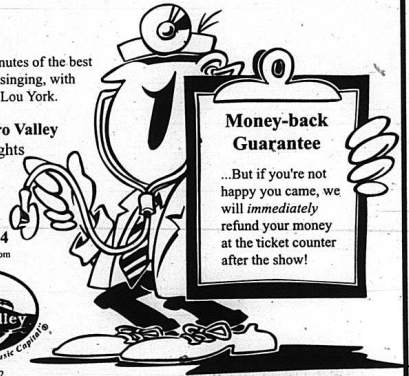

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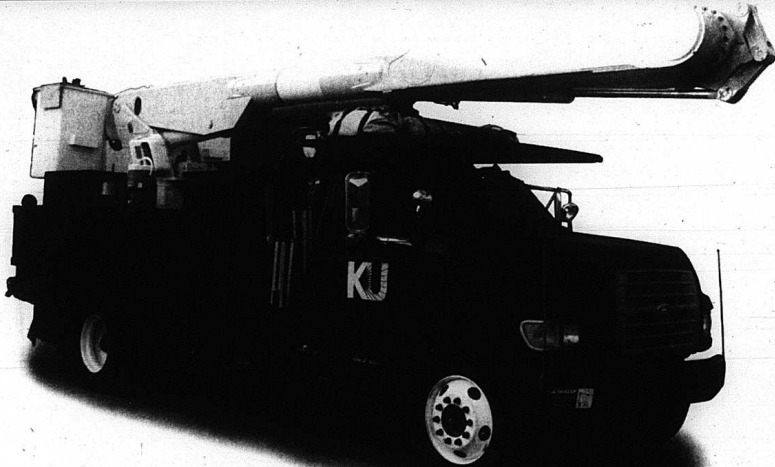

Livingston man released then jailed 14 hours later

A Livingston man was released on bond Friday afternoon, was back in jail approximately 13 hours later, facing other felony charges.
Aaron Blackburn, 20, of Livingston was being held in the Rockcastle County jail, after he was indicted last year by a Rockcastle Grand Jury.
Blackburn is accused of assaulting Barbara Setzer with a metal pipe on November 11, 1997, as he tried to break into her truck at her Livingston home.
But on Friday, Circuit Judge Dan Venturi lowered Blackburn's bond to \$10,000 property and his parents filled the bond so he could be released from jail.
Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Mike Pratt said that he was opposed to lowering the bond because of Blackburn's past actions, but that it was lowered anyway.
Pratt has filed a motion to revoke Blackburn's bond in the Setzer case, and he is currently being held under a \$15,000 cash bond on the new charges.

McKinney murder trial underway

The Rockcastle County man accused of killing his wife and her two small children in 1995, went on trial in Pulaski Circuit Court on Tuesday.
Gary McKinney, 31, of Level Green, has been behind bars since his arrest in 1995, by then Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Randall Reynolds.
Reynolds and Deputy Darrell Doan arrested McKinney for driving under the influence and later charged him with the murders after a friend of McKinney's told police McKinney had killed his wife and her children.
Shirley Faye Bowles McKinney, 29, and her children, Brian Lee Bowles, 11, and Amy Michelle Bowles, 3, were shot April 2, 1995 and their bodies were burned beyond recognition in a house fire in rural Pulaski County.
Autopsy reports revealed that Mrs. McKinney and Brian Bowles were shot multiple times, with two separate guns and Amy Michelle was shot once.

Not enough money to pay jailer's salary

More jail problems for court

Things are not good to say the least at the Rockcastle County Jail or on the renovation project site at the Jail either. The Jail's problems and problems with the renovation project were discussed at length during a special called meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court on Monday.
In fact, things are so bad, Rockcastle County Jailer Joe Howard was not paid on Wednesday, July 1, the day of each month he usually gets paid. The reason - no money.
Rockcastle County Treasurer Joe Clontz told members of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court that there was not enough money in the jail fund to pay the jailer's salary, which amounts to about \$2,800 a month net pay. Clontz told the court there was no money at all in the jail fund.

During the last twelve months, the court has transferred nearly \$90,000 from the county's general fund to the jail fund to meet expenses. But on Monday, the court did not make the necessary transfer so Howard could get paid and told Clontz to tell the jailer he would just have to wait to get paid, when funds were available.
Before the court's decision, executive secretary Anna Rose Mullins told the court that she was afraid to tell the jailer he would just have to wait to get paid, when funds were available.

New officer at Livingston

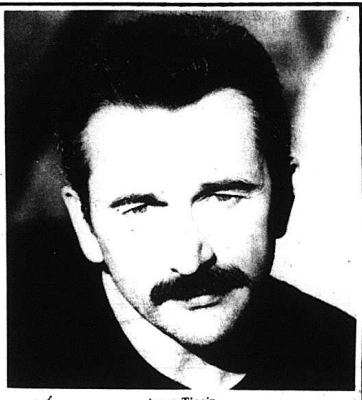
The City of Livingston has a new police officer.

Precious souls, children of an evil age, greetings and extrapolations from the whispering woods of Wabed, birthplace of the late Willmut Q. Aikenbach, world renowned author of *An American Werewolf in Wabed* (1937) and *The Village Idiot in Wabed* (1941), and part-time peddler of Dr. McNully's None-Better-Elixir for Ailments of the Innards and Outwards, such as phlebitis, lumbago, dropsy, gout, arthritis, flaccid syndrome, and Republicanism, who said, "What this country needs is a law that makes it illegal for a man to store marijuana in a barn he doesn't own."

A-mercy! Bless Bess and raise the rent! Where would we be, dear hearts, without the moral, armpit of Southern Baptists, that intertidal band of zealous believers who intend to bring this nation of ours back to its biblical roots? They were bold in declaring that wages are not on a plane with husbands. And that action is clearly a precursor of ponderous resolutions to that will put people in their places.

I, however, think Southern Baptists have not gone far enough. Let me explain. In *Chapter 20 of the Book of Exodus in the Old Testament* one finds a listings of the Ten Commandments. The other listing is in *Deuteronomy 5*. Don't let the differences bother you, for we know Scripture does not contradict itself. (2 *Hezekiah 7.11*) Any good conservative, fundamentalist commentary will explain away the differences and set you

heart at ease. Now, beloved, I call your attention to the commandment that begins in verse 8 of *Exodus 20*.

Thou shalt remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days shalt thou labour, and do all thy work: But the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God: in it thou shalt not do any work, thou, nor thy son, nor thy daughter, thy manservant, nor thy maidservant, nor thy cattle, nor thy stranger that is within thy gates. For the Lord blessed the Sabbath day, and hallowed it.

Now some sincere folk take sabbath to mean to be the last day of the week, which it was for the Old Testament worshiper. The early church, however, chose the first day of the week for their sabbath (which means "seventh"). Either way, a sabbath is being observed.

What concerns me -- and ought to concern all Scripture-loving Southern Baptists -- is what is *not* said in that commandment. Read it again.

Did you read it again?

Now, dear hearts, what does *it not say*? Yes! What the commandment does *not* say is that wives shall rest on the Sabbath! And rightly so. Somebody needs to be at home to cook meals, keep the fire going, and greet strangers in the gate. Occasionally the husband might let her go to church. On Mother's Day, for example. After all, she may have been submissive enough to win the flower given to the Mother with the Most Children. But

most of the time she should stay home and work. Her husband's 7th will cover her. Does not great literature refer to the wife (mother) as the one who "keeps the home fires burning"?

But, dear hearts, the notion of wives working really precedes Moses who wrote every word of the Pentateuch, including the verse that says "So Moses died in the land of Moab ... and he (the LORD God) buried him in a valley in the land of Moab...."

Surely Moses kept on writing until he finished the Pentateuch (the first five books of the Old Testament). Those of us who have a sense of the miraculous do not find the idea of a ghostly writer to be far-fetched.

Oh, as I was saying, the notion of working wives, submissive in all matters, comes early on in Holy Writ. When the LORD God took a rib from Adam and fashioned Eve, it meant she should stand under his arm, i.e., near his rib cage. That way she knew she was destined to be "under" Adam. Any other position is not scriptural.

Notice the language of *Genesis 2:18*: "And the LORD God said, 'It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make him an helpmeet for him.' (So we have the veritable *King James Version of the Holy Bible*.)

There you have it, dear hearts. The LORD God fashioned "an helpmeet" for Adam. And you don't have to be professor of linguistics to figure that out. It clearly means that after the wife gets the breakfast dishes washed, the children off to school, the boys made, etc., she should then go meet her husband wherever he is working and help him. And she should talk to him so he won't feel alone, just as long as she doesn't say too much.

I'm still investigating the report that the Executive Committee of the SBC will ask next year's convention messengers to call for a national repeal of the Emancipation Proclamation, thereby restoring slavery, which Scripture surely ordains because it says "Slaves, be obedient to those who are your masters...." (*Ephesians 6.5f.* -- the same epistle that commands wives to be submissive to their husbands, who are their heads.)

Also, word has it that some SBC leaders feel Spirit-led to call for a restoration of the "holy kids" for congregating worshippers. Isn't "Greet one another with an holy kiss" just as biblical as "Love one another"?

Normally I get a little reprieve from the allergies in June and July. Nothing blooming is giving me a problem most of the time. However, mold and mildew drive me as crazy and yucca, ornamental, oak and locust pollen. Right now about everything in Paint Lick has a blue-gray fuzz on it and it makes me stay stuffed-up and sneezing pretty much around the clock.

My garden finally dried out enough to turn the tiller late last Sunday afternoon. But I couldn't take the heat for more than 20 minutes at a time. I honestly don't understand how roofers and people who work outside take it. On the other hand it's a great way to lose weight. Sweat it off. I tipped the scales at 189 Sunday night and that's the lightest I've been in this decade.

But as I wait for it to cool off a bit more on this late Monday afternoon, a storm cloud is approaching like a locomotive out of the west and thunder is already rumbling in the dis-

tance. I don't even know why I even think about gardening until the middle of July.

There are roads in Garrard County, softer than the soil in my garden. The rain packs it down at night and then the sun bakes it hard the next day and this goes on and on and on. You can walk on it and think it would be dry as a bone. Rand the tiller a couple of inches deep and you have wet clay. Loreta even had the nerve to ask me last week if "those tomato plants are supposed to be yellow like that."

The fact is that what little stuff we have out yellow if it's alive at all. Most of fit rotted on the stump weeks ago. There have been five 24 hour periods over the last 45 days that it didn't rain here on Lowell Branch. We've had one two-day dry spell and one that has lasted three and a half

days so far. That's the one we're in right now and I've a feeling that it's going to be over within the hour.

Next year, if I garden at all, I'm going to try at least one rice paddy. In the meantime, I'm going to try to talk Virginia Ray into running her tractor-mounted tiller over the mess I have one more time and see if we can get in a fall garden. You can plant most varieties sweet corn and beans up to July 15 and actually have a better crop in September than you'd have in warmer weather.

And if the lack of gardening opportunities aren't bad enough, both Paint Lick and Silver Creeks have been too muggy and up over their banks to do any serious fishing since back in April. If they ever do clear up, the small mouth and drum fishing should almost be self-defense.

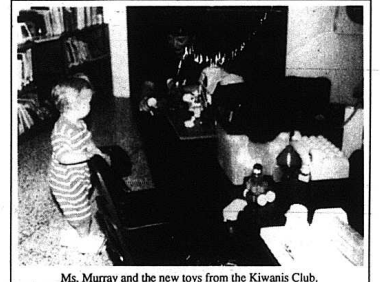
The children are also bringing in their castles that they have built. I am so glad that I'm not the one to judge

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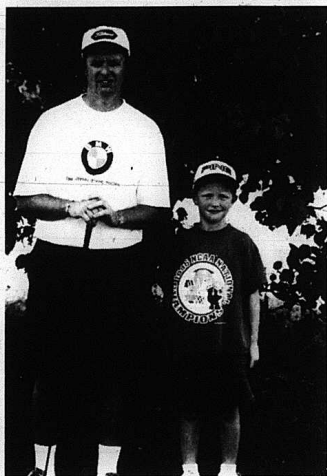

county's general fund was going to run short in the next couple of weeks and that it would make it difficult to meet the general fund's expenses, if more money was transferred to the jail at this time.

Members of the court agreed to meet in special session as soon as money is available to the jail.

But the jailer is not the only one associated with the jail that is not getting paid.

Mike Cameron, of Cameron Construction Company, told the court that he had two payments behind for work he had done on jail renovation project and that he had not been paid for work done in January totaling \$3,795.

Cameron told the court that he knew it was not their fault, but it had been difficult to get paid for work done since the project started.

"Architecture Plus is not doing their job, it has been like getting blood from a turnip, they just aren't doing the proper paper work," Cameron said.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlifolis told the court he had made calls to Ross-Sinclair, the company paying the bills for the jail renovation project on several occasions, but Cameron still had not gotten all that was owed to him.

Carlifolis left the meeting for a few minutes and called Ross-Sinclair about Cameron's problem. He later told Cameron and the court that the pay problem should be corrected the next day.

Cameron also reminded the court that they had approved payment of \$3,795 in March for rock removal in January, but he had not been paid for that either.

The judge looked up the bill in question in the March minutes and found where the court had indeed agreed to pay the money, but they took no other action.

Cameron also told the court it had been four weeks since he had been able to work, because demolition work in the old jail was not completed on schedule. "We are already behind and it seems to be getting worse," Cameron said.

The county is responsible for the demolition work themselves.

And then the court got some more bad news about the renovation project. Billy Curtis of Architecture Plus, who had been site manager on the project since it began this spring, quit on Monday.

The Judge-Executive, nor the court knew anything about Curtis' decision until Ann Rose Mullins told them he (Curtis) had turned in his keys earlier in the day.

Third District Magistrate Bill McKinney said he thought Architecture Plus should have been more on top of things and already had another site manager on the project.

However when Carlifolis called Architecture Plus they told him Curtis was supposed to work two more weeks and should have been at the court meeting. The judge did not say when Architecture Plus would have someone on site.

And, although only about five prisoners are being held in the county jail because there is no kitchen, the state department of corrections conducted a surprise inspection on Friday.

And, on Monday the fiscal court received a certified letter from the state threatening to shut down the jail all together.

Carlifolis told the court that the fire alarm in the jail was not working correctly during the inspection and that if it wasn't fixed immediately the jail would be shut down by the state.

In other business the court voted to help Brindle Ridge Fire Department borrow \$50,000 to build a new

building at Corway. The court's only requirement of Brindle Ridge was some type of collateral on the loan, since the court would be ultimately responsible, if Brindle Ridge did not repay the loan.

The court also approved the payment of \$25 rental fee for each polling place used in the county during the elections. Before some people had received more than others, although none had received more than \$25.00.

The court also approved the county budget for the next fiscal year, which began on July 1.

The court also approved the county budget for the county is \$2.3 million. The Road Department will get \$763,500, the general fund, \$614,726, the jail fund \$425,274 and 911 dispatching \$161,000.

The new charges against Blackburn stem from a Friday night of allegedly trying to break into one home and breaking into another home and a garage.

Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Charles Gray said he was called to Livingston around midnight Friday night. He said when he arrived he spotted Blackburn trying to get into a house on Mullins Street and when he told him to stop, he (Blackburn) ran off on foot.

Gray said that he was called back to Livingston around 3 a.m. Saturday morning after Blackburn broke into a garage on Main Street owned by Donald Rice.

Gray said that Blackburn appar-

ently cut his hand when he broke into Rice's garage and was bleeding "pretty badly."

The deputy said that while he and Kentucky State Trooper John Yates were searching the area for Blackburn they heard a gunshot come from the home of Vomie Mink on Main Street in Livingston.

Gray said that when officers got to Ms. Mink's home she told police she thought she had shot someone because there was blood all over her house.

"Ms. Mink said she shot in the air to scare him, but that the bullet must have ricocheted and struck him," Gray said.

But the blood in Ms. Mink's home apparently came from Blackburn's hand which was still bleeding.

"Blackburn left the scene again, but a few minutes later, one of Blackburn's brothers told police he had gone home and they could come and get him before he got himself killed," Gray said.

Blackburn was arrested around 4 a.m. Saturday and lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail. He was charged with two counts of second degree burglary and one count of attempted burglary.

In May, a Rockcastle County Circuit Court jury found Blackburn not guilty of assaulting officer Gray and Livingston water superintendent John Kuhn on August 23 of 1997. They did find him guilty of resisting arrest and sentenced him to 90 days in jail.

His next court appearance will be July 31.

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A look back at Rockcastle County

Reprinted from the 1992 Rockcastle History Book which was published by the Rockcastle County Historical Society.

Broadhead
Before there was a Broadhead, there was a Boone Fork (Sigall's Stand). The date of the original settlement has been lost in time, but probably when pioneers were traversing the trace to Crab Orchard and points further on.

The Louisville and Nashville Railroad Company purchased land for the right-of-way at the site of present day Broadhead from Mr. J.C. Woodyard, for one hundred dollars.

When the L&N Railroad reached that site in 1867, the settlement at Boone Fork was many years old. It boasted a church, a school and a Masonic Lodge, a thriving little community. In an account by John Crawford, given in June 1956, when he was eighty-one years of age, he stated that his family had lived there since 1843 and that his brother, Mode (twenty years John's senior) attended school there. The log school house was built in 1861, the seats were split logs and it had a punchion floor. The church, also log, was shared by both Christian and Baptist faiths. Raccoon John Smith, on one of his missionary treks across Kentucky, held services there.

With the advent of the railroad, people moved closer to that source of transportation and the businesses to which it gave birth. In 1868, a post office was established and named Broadhead to honor John C Broadhead, a cognator who did the grading of the railway. But the move was hot that rapid, in 1870, three years after the railroad became a reality, only eight or ten families lived in Broadhead. Several families still live at Boone Fork, but today it is considered a part of Broadhead.

Perhaps Broadhead made a slow start, but by 1890 it was a village of some consequence. A new school was built to replace the one at Boone Fork in 1881 and churches were built to replace the one shared at the Fork. The Baptist Church/Masonic Hall was built on a small hill overlooking the town in 1876 and the Christian Church was built in 1890. A Methodist Church was established in 7. The "Fritch" Hotel was built in 1890 by J.G. (Uncle Jerry) Fritch and had twenty-four rooms. The building was located alongside the railroad, just across from the depot. It served as a sleeping place for passengers arriving and its dining room served meals to railroad employees when they stopped in Broadhead to "take on" water from one of the two wooden tanks located there to service the

steam driven engines. Nor was Fritch's the only hotel in town. In about 1905, Mrs. J.M. Clark boasted that during one recent month, her establishment put up 2,264 lunches for passengers on the L&N. This was in addition to lunches served to business people and her regular boarders. Another railroad hotel and restaurant was owned and operated by "Uncle Billy" and Mrs. Lelia Murphy. The lunches for L&N passengers was shared between the three establishments. At one point in Broadhead's history, there existed at least two additional hotels. On the knoll behind the present day Landrumstead, Ms. "Candy" Mary Albright owned and operated a large wooden hotel and livery. Drummers who serviced the several general merchandise stores in town often stayed and would rent conveyances for traveling to outlying places of business. One other hotel was a brick building located in the middle of "down town."

Over the years, the town enjoyed the medical services of several capable physicians. Dr. Clark, husband of the above mentioned hotel proprietress was one of the very early ones. There were also Drs. Benton, Burdett and Gravelly. Dr. Bryon Owens showed great promise, but died before his practice was many years old. The older doctors made their house calls by either buggy or horse back.

As roads improved and cars came into being, Drs. Garrett, McWilliams and Carter drove cars and were familiar sights on the back roads of the county.

At one time, Broadhead supported two Drug Stores, those two being owned by Mr. Joe F. Watson and Dr. R. Clark. Probably before that time, a drug store was owned and operated by Mr. W.K. Shruggs. In more recent years, drug stores have been served by Mr. D.H. Gray and William Dillingham.

The Rockcastle Fair Association was established in 1895. First president was J. Thomas Cherry and J.W. Tate served as secretary. The Fair (later known as Broadhead's Little World's Fair) was a success from the beginning, past and present Rockcastle Countians gathered as for a Homecoming. Often, picnic baskets were packed and families came very early in the morning and stayed until it closed down in the evening. Even the L&N became involved. During the 1920's, so many people were eager to come to Broadhead for the Fair that L&N passenger train #23 would add an extra coach during the Fair season to accommodate them. Some enterprising soul met the train in his "hack" (a long, open horse-drawn cart with seats along the

sides) and conveyed the passengers to the Fairgrounds.

Broadhead's first telephone exchange was operated from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Granville Owens (Uncle Danny). In later years, Mr. J. Frank Dees, as agent for Bell Telephone Company, owned and operated the only telephone service in Rockcastle County. Broadhead's exchange was first in the building across the street from the Baptist Church. Mr. Dees had the building torn down and built his home on that site. The exchange was moved to a building next door and also served as the home of the current operator.

Mr. D.H. Gray came to town and opened a Drug Store in 1921. Mr. Gray married a local girl Eleanor Fritch, daughter of "Chuck" Fritch. The Fritchs were an old respected family in the community.

During the 1920's and 1930's, Broadhead boasted many businesses. In addition to the usual complement of grocery, hardware, clothing and drug stores, there were several restaurants. Also in the town and surrounding area, there were two flour mills, a canning factory, a creamery, stock pens, pulpwood and sassafras business and a tobacco factory.

On 15 October, 1924, a fire swept through the town and nearly destroyed it. The fire started in a small restaurant operated by Mr. Jack Lunsford, and that part of town between the corner where Charles Fletcher now has a grocery store to the corner at the traffic light, was totally devastated. Before the fire, Broadhead resembled a small western town, with false fronted wooden stores and wooden sidewalks. When merchants rebuilt following the fire, they did so somewhat more substantially with brick and concrete. Still standing, and occupied by several small businesses, is the three story brick hotel built at that time by Mr. Hal Christie.

Mr. Dan Gray opened the Gray Theater on 6 August, 1940, Broadhead's first theater. In much earlier days, before the "talkies", movies were sometimes shown upstairs in the Citizens Bank building. The building is currently occupied by the Dari Delight Restaurant. Also, in the 1940's, Mr. W.O. Yaden owned and operated a Skating Rink, located at the Fairgrounds. It was a very popular entertainment place and young people came from all the surrounding counties for the wholesome fun Mr. Yaden provided.

Over the many years since Broadhead's birth in 1868, the little town has enjoyed boom days and

slumps, but nothing hurt her so badly as the death of the railroad. The Louisville and Nashville, which gave her birth, crippled her severely when they discontinued their rail service. Interstate highways and a car (or two) in every garage added to her wounds. As so many small towns whose businesses were vital to the outlying farmers in days when the trip to town for supplies was accomplished by horse and wagon, much of Broadhead's commerce has fallen by the wayside. But, it is still a lovely place to live and many descendants of those hearty pioneers of yesterday do so.

Losses from black shank, however, can be minimized by conscientious application of fungicides approved for use in controlling the fungus, he said.

"Supplemental applications of Ridomil Gold or Ridomil 2E fungicides made at cultivation and at layby and directed to the soil and under the plant are strongly recommended," he said.

The use of the two pronged approach, he said, has proved beneficial only on sites where the disease potential is great or on sites where black shank-susceptible varieties are being produced.

Black shank poised for invasion on Ky. tobacco

Kentucky tobacco farmers could be facing still another challenge this year; black shank, a disease historically more economically damaging than blue mold.

Black shank, a fungus as is blue mold, needs hot, humid weather to proliferate to explosive proportions. Those conditions are forecast for the next week or so, which could mean that unprotected tobacco could be in peril.

"Heavy rains the past few weeks have set this year's crop up for a major attack of black shank. Continuing high temperatures and humidity

will propel this potential disaster," said William Nesmith, Extension plant pathologist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Black shank fungus is endemic in some areas. In those areas, black shank-resistant varieties are not resistant enough by themselves to stave off infection when disease pressure is high, he said.

Black shank-resistant varieties currently popular with tobacco producers have a third less resistance than varieties grown in the 1980's. That fact could mean even more economic damage from the fungus.



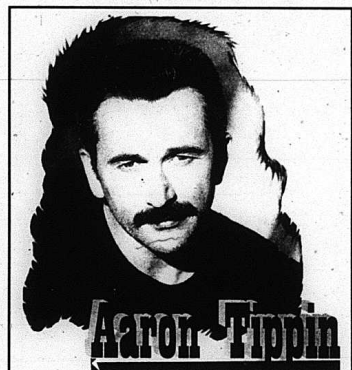
BOARD OF EDUCATION HOSTS OPEN FORUM

Several events have occurred this school year that brought into focus the need to enact legislation seeking to make safety at school and on school buses a top priority. With the number of occurrences seeming to increase and the public being more aware of these problems, the timing is right for legislation that will allow us to address this area of concern.

Responding to these concerns, the 1998 Kentucky State Legislature has enacted House Bill (HB) 330 requiring state school districts to assess school safety and student discipline during the next school year. A district-level assessment of data, resources, policies, procedures and needs must be completed by May 15, 1999. From this assessment each Board of Education (BOE) must adopt a plan for immediate and long-term strategies to address school safety and discipline.

In order to comply with HB 330, the Rockcastle County BOE will host an open forum designed to seek input on public concerns regarding school safety. According to Superintendent Hammond, "From information gathered, the BOE will review the following areas: behavior and discipline codes for clarity and appropriate notice to students/parents, hierarchy of responses to discipline problems and actual disciplinary outcomes, existing policies relating to student discipline and student information, and student supervision plan."

The Rockcastle County BOE hosted Open Forum on school safety will be held July 7, 1998, at 6:00 p.m. in the Rockcastle County High School Auditorium.

Who Cares Why He Changes?

"I want him to change because he wants to," Norma told her counselor, "not because I want him to." (All characters are fictitious.)

As a counselor who helps couples who have marriage problems, I have heard some form of Norma's statement many times. Diane told me that her husband never brought her little gifts nor even said, "I love you." When I suggested she tell him what she would like for him to do, she objected: "No. If I have to tell him what I do, then it doesn't mean anything if he does it."

Vernon wanted his wife to spend more time with him and the boys. "She works such long hours," he complained, "that she never has time for us." Again when I suggested he asked his wife to set aside one night a week as family night, he didn't want to. "I want her to stay home with us, because she wants to," he told me. "Not just because I ask her to."

When I talked to Vernon's wife, she had no idea that Vernon wanted her to stay home more. She felt that she was balancing work and family very well. The only way she would know about Vernon's request was if he told her.

Part of the problem here is an assumption that many of us make, and that is that our spouses can read our minds! But I don't even believe in mind reading!" Norma objected. "I know he can't read my mind." She seemed upset that the counselor would even suggest such a thing.

I then asked Norma, "Well, how is

he supposed to know what you want from him, if you don't tell him?"

"He should just know!" she replied defiantly.

"Meaning he should read your mind?" I asked.

"No!" she replied firmly. "I know he can't read my mind."

"Then how is he supposed to find out what you are thinking if you don't tell him?" I wondered.

At this point Norma was quiet. She didn't have an answer for my question, but she didn't want to agree with me. She was at a loss for words for one of the first times in her life.

Another part of this communication problem is the belief that Norma has that if she has to ask her husband to change, then any change he makes is not worth as much as it would be if he thought of it himself.

"Norma, I disagree," I told her. "Changing in response to a request from another is a sign of great love and caring. If you ask your husband to be more helpful to you with the kids (which was what she wanted),

and he does that because you asked him to, I see that as a sign of how much he cares about you."

"I've never looked at it that way before," Norma said, expressing a possible new insight for her. "I always thought it meant more if he did it on his own." She thought for awhile. "But what if I ask him to do something for me and he won't!"

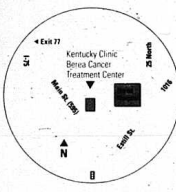
"You have put your finger on another reason we are afraid to ask for something," I affirmed. "Our fear is that the person will refuse (which is right), and then we will feel rejected."
