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Rockets have perfect season
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Pulaski Co. man killed in head-on collision on 461

A three vehicle collision three miles south of Mt. Vernon on Hwy. 461, Saturday afternoon, claimed the life of a Pulaski County man.

According to a passenger in a Campbellsville College mini-van, the wreck occurred around 1:30 p.m. after the 18-year-old driver, Clay Wheeler of Campbellsville, attempted to remove his coat, while driving the van north on 461.

The passenger said that while Wheeler was removing his coat, he lost control of the mini-van and crossed the center line into the southbound lane of 461 and into the path of a Ford F-450 farm truck driven by Boyd "Buster" Broyles, 72, of Plato Vanhook Road, Somerset.

Police say the mini-van struck Broyles' truck, causing it to cross into the northbound lane, directly into the path of a tractor-trailer, driven by James W. Franklin, 30, of Carlisle, Ohio.

Rockcastle County Deputy Coroner Marvin E. Owens pronounced Broyles dead at the scene, after members of the Mt. Vernon fire department cut his body from the wreckage.


It took firefighters about 45 minutes to free Broyles' body.

Wheeler and Franklin were taken to the Rockcastle Hospital where they were treated for minor injuries and released.

Several passengers in the college's mini-van were not injured. Broyles and Franklin had no passengers in their vehicles.

KY 461 was closed for about three hours while Kentucky State Trooper Don Trosper reconstructed the accident.

State Trooper Staci Dixon is conducting the investigation surrounding the accident and the case will be presented to the Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Burdette calls on court to sponsor training program

At a special meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court on Friday, Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette asked the court to sponsor a training program to deal with possible security issues and the handling of a potential chemical or biological threat in the county.

Burdette suggested that the county's newly appointed Chemical Stockpile Emergency Preparedness Program (CSEPP) Director Wayne Berry, conduct the training.

Berry is the former Chief Planner for the state of Kentucky. He held that position for 28 years and was in charge of training CSEPP Directors across the Commonwealth.

Berry, who is a Rockcastle County native and former school teacher at Mt. Vernon High School, also taught Civil Defense Courses for the University of Kentucky Extension program specializing in radiological defense courses.

"If Mr. Berry, who has vast experience and connections with potential trainers would be willing, I think it would be an excellent opportunity for our local agencies to benefit from his expertise," Burdette said.

The request by the County Attorney comes after the perceived threat at the City of Mt. Vernon's water plant at Renfro Valley on October 13.

That incident drew several people from many different agencies together and since that time the county attorney has been vocal in calling for training and security measure modifications related to all utilities and water supply systems in the county.

The personnel were there and it was a learning situation for everyone, but also, a situation that led us all to believe that we need training and information in the event something might actually occur," he said.

"I think that the county and city governments along with water agencies will be making changes necessitated by these times," he added.

Burdette told the court that he thought law enforcement personnel, fire fighters, 911 dispatchers, disaster and emergency services personnel, postal employees, water agency employees, local physicians and anyone else who may be called upon in the event of a biological or chemical crisis in the county.

Carloftis told Burdette that he would discuss the training with Berry.

Public Forum to be held

A public forum will be held at 7 p.m. on Monday, November 5, 2001 at City Hall in Mt. Vernon.

Brad Swartz, a representative from the Renaissance KY program will be in attendance.

He will make a presentation to Mayor Karen King, City Council, and community members, to introduce and familiarize everyone with the program. The public is encouraged to attend.



State basically turns deaf ear on concerns about KY 461

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet has basically turned a deaf ear on a request by Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis concerning three intersections along KY 461 in Mt. Vernon.

In August, the Judge asked the transportation cabinet to review the intersections at US 150, KY 1326 and US 25.

The Judge pointed the lack of lighting at 150 and the fact that motorists run upon the signal from both directions on 461, before they realize it's 461.

The Judge told the transportation cabinet that the intersection at 1326 was dangerous because of no stop light and the four lanes of traffic that intersect there and that many young drivers who go through there on a daily basis.

The Judge also told the cabinet that the intersection at McDonalds was dangerous because of the volume of traffic traveling toward the interstate, was usually going at a high rate of speed, which made it difficult to cross the southbound lane to turn onto US 25. The Judge said it was also very dangerous because vehicles often backed up in the left turn lane, to the point that they were actually in one of the lanes of 461.

The transportation cabinet sent Carloftis a letter last week, saying that they found no reason to change



She Stays Because She "Loves" Him

"Love makes the world go round," the song says, but what is love? Many different kinds of feelings are called "love." It may be helpful to define love by what it is not rather than by what it is. Four stories about fictitious characters illustrate what love is not.

1. Janie has been with her husband for fifteen years. Their three children are all in school now, and she has gone back to work. "My marriage has always been difficult," she tells her counselor, "but lately I don't have enough patience to bear it."

The difficulty in Janie's marriage is that her husband has a girlfriend. George is pretty open about it: "I'll do what I want to do," he tells Janie. "Nobody is going to run my life for me." Apparently this is not the first time George has been involved with another woman. "As far as I know, he's only had three other girlfriends since we have been married," Janie reports.

The counselor asks Janie, "Why do you stay with him?" And Janie says, "because I love him!"

2. "Why won't he stop drinking?" Marsha asks her counselor. "If he loved me, he would stop."

Marsha's twenty-five year marriage is not going well. Her husband Tom quit drinking two months ago, but now he has started again. "He's such a good man when he's sober," she says. "What am I doing wrong?"

Her counselor asks, "Why have you stayed with him for all these years?"

"Because I love him," Marsha replies.

3. Virginia missed two consecutive appointments with her counselor. The counselor called to see if

she were OK, and Virginia said she had been sick. They made another appointment for the next week.

Virginia is very subdued when she comes in for her appointment. The laughing, smiling Virginia has disappeared. "Did he hit you again?" the counselor asks.

"No," Virginia answers, "he didn't hit me. He pushed me up against the wall... and shoved me down on the floor... and pulled me out the door by my hair."

In her tenth year of marriage, Virginia has been abused for the last five. The Department of Social Services has contacted her numerous times to see if she wants their help. She always declines.

"Why do you stay with him?" her counselor asks. "Because I love him," Virginia tells her.

4. "He never says nice things to me," Laura told me. "In fact, what he does say to me is sometimes unprintable. He calls me names, horrible names, and accuses me of going out with other men. I have never been unfaithful to him, but he won't believe me. He tells me that I am stupid and ugly and that no other man would ever have me. And he says all of these things in front of our children!" According to Laura, all this had been going on for the last 15 years, becoming worse in the last five.

"Why do you stay with him, Laura?" I asked. "Because I love him," she told me.

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New School Immunization Requirements

Requirements

In keeping with current recommendations by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the American Academy of Pediatrics, and the American Academy of Family Physicians, Kentucky has revised the required immunization schedule for children to attend day care centers, preschool programs, and public and private schools for the 2001-02 school year.

Pursuant to Kentucky Administrative Regulation 902 KAR 2:060, changes are as follows:

Hepatitis B Vaccination - Three (3) doses of hepatitis B vaccine are required for:

- Any child born on or after 10/1/92.
- Any child entering the 6th grade.

Varicella (chickenpox) Vaccination - one (1) dose of varicella vaccine is required for:

- Any child at least 19 months of age up to 7 years of age, unless a parent, guardian, or physician states that the child has had chickenpox disease.

Measles, Mumps, Rubella Vaccination - Just a reminder that two doses of MMR are required for:

- Any child born on or after 10/1/90.
- Any child entering 6th through 12th grade, who does not already have this completed.

Tetanus-Diphtheria School Requirement

Due to the current severe shortage of adult tetanus-diphtheria (Td) vaccine, the school requirement for routine Td boosters during adolescence has been temporarily suspended. Therefore, provided the child has documentation of a complete baseline tetanus-diphtheria series, the school requirement for a routine 10-year Td booster (usually due between the ages of 14-16 years) should be deferred until 2002 when supplies of Td are expected to become more readily available. When this routine booster is deferred, a green provisional immunization certificate should be provided for the school record. Children who have been deferred MUST have the required booster not later than the first day of the 2002-2003 school year.

Supplies of Td vaccine should become more readily available early in 2002, and it is recommended that this

deferred dose be administered as soon as possible after vaccine becomes more available.

Pediatric formulations of diphtheria-tetanus (DT) and diphtheria-tetanus-acellular pertussis vaccine (DTaP) should not be used as a substitute for Td vaccine for persons aged 7 years or older.

During the shortage, the priorities that are indicated by the CDC for Td uses are as follows:

1. Persons who are traveling to a country where the risk of diphtheria is high;
2. Persons requiring tetanus vaccination for prophylaxis in wound management;
3. Persons who have received fewer than 3 doses of any vaccine containing Td;
4. Pregnant women who have not been vaccinated with Td during the preceding 10 years.

Other requirements - Children attending day care or school programs, who are 49 months of age and less than 5 years of age must have a booster of diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTaP), polio (IPV), the second dose of measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) on or after the 4th birthday. This means that children already enrolled in day care, school programs, or any other licensed child care setting MUST get these boosters when they turn four years of age in order to remain in the program.

While not yet required by Kentucky for entrance into school or day care, the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices has recommended that the conjugate pneumococcal vaccine (Prevnar) become part of the routine immunization schedule for newborns and that it also be given on a catch-up basis to children under age two.

If the first dose is given between 2-6 months of age, three doses are required 2 months apart and the fourth dose at 12-15 months of age. If the first dose is given between 7-11 months of age, two doses are required at least two months apart and a booster dose at 12-15

months of age. If the first dose is given between 12-23 months of age, two doses are required at least 8 weeks apart. If the first dose is given between 24-59 months of age no other doses are necessary.

The vaccine is now covered under the Vaccines for Children Program and is also covered by most insurance carriers. If you have any questions about the new vaccine requirement, please phone the Rockcastle Co. Health Center at 606-256-2242.

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Early Breast Cancer Detection

The Rockcastle Co. Health Department has the ability to instruct in a method of Breast Self Examination called MammaCare. MammaCare training arms women with skills to find potentially cancerous tumors, early, before they spread and become deadly.

For years people believed that it was possible to learn the skill of breast examination by reading pamphlets or watching videos. Because breast examination is a tactile skill learning to do it well also requires special training involving the sense of touch.

The MammaCare Method of Breast Examination is highly effective because MammaCare's tactually accurate breast models teach fingers what to feel for.

Just how effective is MammaCare? The chart below shows comparative sizes of lumps found by people with various levels of training. These findings are derived directly from a number of published medical studies and are referenced on the reverse side of the MammaCare Lump Charts.

The average size lump found by accident by women untrained in BSE is 3.6 cm (about the size of a ping pong ball).	
The average size lump found by women occasionally practicing conventional BSE is 2.5 cm.	
The average size lump found by women regularly practicing convention BSE is 2.0 cm.	
The suggested standard for clinical breast examination is 1.0 cm.

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

Final Junior Pro Sign-Ups and Evaluation Drafts

The final sign-up time for the 2001-02 Junior Pro season will be Saturday, November 3rd at the Mt. Vernon Elementary School from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m.

The age groups for Jr. Pro are as follows: Junior Varsity League - 10, 11 and some 12 year olds; Training League - 8, 9 and some 10 year olds; Instructional League - 6, 7 and some 8 year olds.

The age cut-off is September 1, 2001. A player must play in the older age division at 8, 10 or 12 if their birthday is before September 1st. If their birthday is after September 1st, they default into the younger age group. Rockets achieve perfect mark again

The Rockcastle County Rockets ended with a perfect 10 and 0 regular season record after a 34-2 win over the Bell County Bobcats on Friday night.

It was the first time any Tom Larkey coached team had traveled to Bell County and came away with a victory over the Bobcats, who have a state title to their credit.

The win gave Rockcastle their second straight undefeated regular season and second straight district title.

The Rockets' high octane offense got off to a little bit of a slow start, with a couple of motion penalties and incomplete passes, but picked it up near the end of the first quarter.

The Rocket scoring went as follows:

Bell County's only score came on a safety, after a Bobcat punt was downed at the one foot line.

Offensively the Rockets had a total of 305 yards, while their defense gave up 129, the most in any game this season.

Anderkin was bright for 18 passing for 157 yards and one touchdown. He also threw one interception.

The quarterback also rushed eight times for 61 yards.
Reagan had 10 carries for 72 yards and he caught two passes for 26 yards.

Clay Dooley had eleven yards on five carries and he caught one pass for 15 yards.

Devin Taylor had 71 yards on two catches and Cody Reams had eleven yards on one catch.

Chris Strietzel was two for three in extra point kicks and Reagan scored on a two point conversion.

Defensive coach Tony Saylor said his unit did not tackle well on Friday night and that they have been working very hard this week to improve on that part of the game.

Seniors William Blair and P.J. Rowe led the Rockets on defense.
Blair had a total of 22 tackles and assists and Rowe had eight tackles and assists and was in on three sacks.

Junior James Michael Bussell also turned in a good performance from his cornerback position with seven tackles and assists, while adding a sack and being in on two more.

Junior Stephen Boring also

played well defensively with nine tackles and assists. He was also in on one sack.

Steve Blair was in on two sacks and had four assists.

Adam Chiles had one sack and three tackles and assists.

Offensively the Rockets will change very little, according to coach Larkey.


"Some kids will see more playing time on offense than they have in the past and we have been working on some different things, but basically things will stay the same."

Aaron Anderkin had a thirty-three yard gain Then he ran it across the line


And the Rock fans, coaches and team Were really feeling fine.

Jeff Burton, driver of the No. 99 Roush Racing Ford got by Mike Wallace on the outside during lap 279 of the 312 lap Checker 500K at Phoenix International Raceway for his second Winston Cup victory of the season.

Burton was also the winner of last year's Phoenix race. "We kept working on our car and made it a lot better than when we started," said Burton. "We're just a microcosm of what America is all about."

The win by Burton on Sunday gave Roush Racing its third win in three days.

The big story of the race was tires, and Burton managed to avoid right front tire problems that plagued 10 different drivers.

"We used the recommended tire pressure, so we were less likely to have those kind of problems," said Burton's crew chief Frank Stoddard.

Mike Wallace, who replaced Jeremy Mayfield in the No. 12 Mobil 1 Ford four weeks ago, had a career high second-place finish.

"Man, it was pretty big for us," he said. "Jeff (Burton) actually had a faster car, so we're happy to bring home a second."

Ricky Rudd, the third-place finisher gained a few points on points leader Jeff Gordon, but he still trails Gordon by 380 points with only four races left. Casey Atwood, who started from the pole in a Dodge finished 14th.

"We had a great car," he said. "I guess we ran over something. There wasn't anything wrong with the tire. I guess I ran over something because I felt it go down all the way down the back straightaway. I got into three and it came all the way apart. Luckily I didn't get into the wall. I was able to get in the pits and not go too far behind. We were able to make up the lap. At the end, there just wasn't enough time."

"When you're up front all day, you can kind of relax and you don't have to drive your butt off all day. I drove really hard there after I had the right front go down to make as many spots up as I could, but it felt like a pretty short race."

The Associate Member Lifetime Achievement Award honors an ASCP Associate member who has demonstrated a commitment to the profession through work, attitude and society activities.

Dr. Castleberry, was honored for her outstanding commitment to laboratory medicine through long-standing contributions to the advancement of the profession.

After graduation from the Livingston High School Dr. Castleberry received her Bachelor of Science in Medical Technology from Cumberland College, her Master of Science in Clinical Pathology from Ohio State University and her PhD in Higher Education at the University of North Texas. She was certified by the ASCP in 1967.

That year, she began work as medical technologist at Tampa General Hospital. In 1970 she became an Education Coordinator for the School of Medical Technology at Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas, TX. She moved up the ranks as clinical instructor, assistant professor, acting chairman and chairman in the Department of Medical Technology, School of Allied Health Sciences, University of Texas Health Science Center in Dallas.

She served on the ASCP Board of Registry's Board of Governors as its chair before she became ASCP vice president of the Board of Registry in

1981. She held this position until her retirement in April of 1999. During those 18 years the Board certified more than 175,000 laboratory technicians, technologists and specialists. She is credited with establishing the Biannual Wage and Vacancy Survey and Survey of Clinical Laboratory Science Programs. Both of these publications monitor trends in the profession and are used by managers, educators and practitioners. These two surveys provide the data to start new clinical laboratory science programs and to monitor the salaries and vacancy rates in the profession.

He is a member of the Livingston Lions Club and is involved with anything and everything where he thinks he can make a difference.





Houseplants and Clean Air

Since most of us spend a great deal of time in our homes, especially during the winter months, making sure we have healthy air is important. Live plants can and do promote clean air. The lush green jungles and rain forests are an important source of our planetary fresh air. Wouldn't it be great to forget about those household poisons that create our scratchy eyes, sinus congestion, sore throat, headache and fatigue?

Growing plants indoors can give you the same benefit as opening your windows. Plants actually "purify and revitalize" the air we breathe.

Our personal breathing zone is 6 to 8 cubic feet. Plants placed with this area add humidity and remove toxins from the air. For the greatest benefit, arrange five or more medium-sized plants in each area where you spend a great deal of time (bedroom, den, etc.).

Persons who suffer from asthma or allergies from mold and mildew are frequently warned to avoid having plants in the house. However, to get the clean air benefit, and eliminate the problems associated with asthma and allergies, cover the soil in the pots with 1-2 inches of aquarium gravel. This will keep the surface of the plant dry. In addition, do not allow water to stand in saucers.

Some examples of house plant air cleaners are: lady palm, English ivy, corn plant, Warneckei dracaena, mother-in-law tongue, rubber plant, peace lily, pothos, schefflera, spider plant.

NOTICE Rockcastle County Schools Plan For Inclement Weather School Closings Early Dismissal

Every effort will be made to keep parents and concerned citizens informed as to school closings, early dismissals and possibly a delay plan.

The number one concern is the safety of students. After an extensive evaluation of road conditions in the county, taking into consideration all roads, a decision will be made in regard to closing school.

School closings will be announced on radio stations and three television stations. They are as follows: Radio - WRVK (AM 1460), WVLC (FM 93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WRSL (FM 96.3), WLKT (FM 104.5) WKQQ (FM 100.1). Television - WKYT (Channel 27), WLEX (Channel 18), WTVO (Channel 36). If possible, the closing will be announced the evening before the closing date. If a determination cannot be made the day prior to the closing date, every possible effort will be made to reach a decision by 6:00 a.m. The announcement will be made no later than 6:30 a.m. This will be conducted the same for the delay plan, if it is concluded the delay plan would be the appropriate plan of action.

If the delay plan is used, breakfast will be served upon the arrival of students at school.

Early dismissal of school due to inclement weather will be announced on WRVK. Roads will be closely monitored as school is in session to determine if there is a need for early dismissal. If the need for early dismissal does occur, parents should make arrangements to meet children as they arrive safely.

Parents and students should not call any radio or television stations to inquire about school closings. This could delay the information distribution to the necessary channel by tying up the phone lines.

Rockcastle County School System Delay Plan

Occasionally, there are mornings when an additional hour is needed to check bus routes and temperatures/weather conditions sometimes can change between 6 a.m. and 7 a.m. As a result, the Rockcastle County School System will consider a one hour delay in school opening due to weather conditions.

If a one-hour delay status is warranted, the delay will be announced by the following radio stations: WRVK (AM 1460), WVLC (FM 93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WRSL (FM 96.3), WLKT (FM 104.5), WKQQ (FM 100.1), and the following television stations: WLEX (Channel 18), WKYT (Channel 27), WTVO (Channel 36), at 6:00 a.m. or as soon as possible.

There may be a time when a few isolated bus routes may not be made or may be delayed for an hour while the rest of the bus routes will be made on the regular schedule. These bus routes will be announced only on WRVK radio station.

In instances of a delay schedule, breakfast will be served as soon as students arrive at school.

No P&CP Signup for TLAP 00
During fiscal year 2000, FSA provided payments through the Tobacco Loss Assistance Program 2000 (TLAP00) to quota holders and producers to help them defray income losses in the 2000 crop year because of quota reductions. One of the eligibility requirements for TLAP00 was that farm must have received Planted and Considered (P&CP) credit for the 2000 crop year. This statute has been amended to provide that TLAP00 payments may be made to person(s) who are otherwise eligible without regard to whether the quota was used for the production of tobacco during the 2000 crop year.

Marketing Cards
Rockcastle County producers who have received marketing cards are reminded to carefully check their card for complete and accurate information. Please compare the farm number, warehouse number and pounds listed on the card to the information provided on the notification letter mailed with the card. If you find an error return the card immediately to the office for correction(s).

Warehouse Designation
Legislation now requires all farms with an effective quota greater than zero to file a designation of pounds to a specific warehouse, receiving station or dealer with which they intend to market tobacco by filing a form FSA 808.

Producers who have not designated
or those who have designated and wish to change their designation are reminded that next designation period is October 29th through November 2, 2001.

Barley Tobacco Penalty Rates
Penalty rates that will be charged to producers, dealers and warehouse operators for marketing excess tobacco during the 2001 marketing year has been announced at \$1.47 per pound.

Producers are reminded to review
the pounds available for marketing and pounds marketed to avoid marketing pounds above the 103% of the effective quota to avoid the penalty and/or reduction in the next year's quota.

Production Flexibility Contract Payments
The Agricultural, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2000, provides producers the option to receive Production Flexibility Contract (PFC) payments for FY2002, as either: two 50 percent payments or one 100 percent payment prior to August 1, 2002.

Once designated, any changes to the farming operation, including, but not limited to, payment shares and change of operators, must be reported to FSA, and applicable forms complete by August 1, 2002. Failure to report and complete changes by August 2, 2002, may result in all producers on the farm being ineligible for payments.

Producers are reminded all PFC
payment shares and necessary signatures must be obtained on the PFC and received in the county FSA office by August 1, 2002.

Rockcastle County Disaster Declaration

The Kentucky counties declared as disaster areas and eligible for Federal disaster assistance, including FSA Emergency Loans for eligible family farmers and the Kentucky counties named as contiguous counties were eligible family farmers may qualify for FSA Emergency Loan assistance, pursuant to the Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act included Rockcastle County declared a disaster area under Amendment #3. Applications may be accepted for both physical and production losses, and applications pending on the specified dates may be processed and completed when filed by the termination dates of April 29, 2002.





Vernon Police Department all participated in this year's program.



John McQueary reads *Jack Tales* to Ms. Regina Burton's sixth grade class as part of the Service Heroes Guest Reading Program.





Thornberry student teaching at EKU

An Eastern Kentucky University student from Mt. Vernon is among 63 teacher education students who are student teaching this semester.

EKU's College of Education places its student teachers in classrooms to gain practical teaching experience, said Dr. Bruce Bonar, director of professional laboratory experiences. are confident that they will meet the educational challenges of the 21st century."



Next week will be the closing exercises of the Brown Memorial School and everybody is cordially invited to attend. "CHEAP RATES" The L & N will sell tickets to Lexington Nov. 8, to 10, limit 15, for \$4.12 round trip, on account of General Association of Kentucky Baptists. Jarvis Noe, age 17 years, son of M. T. M. Noe, was poisoned Sunday by eating strawberries, Dr. S. Davis was called at once and in a short time had him out of danger. He is now able to be on his work. We call attention of our marshal to the shooting on the streets with 22 rifles at birds, which if not stopped will certainly result in something serious. So long as it is done only by the grown up people, there is but little danger, but boys will soon be the principle ones and then the danger comes, not from any intentional act but from carelessness.
